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Abortion: A Product of a Corrupt Society? wrong or right—this is just a fact

I received a couple emails about Dr. Mercer's article on abortion. The basic idea was that the subject was treated with great philosophical care but that it did not touch on the serious emotional nature of pregnancy and the termination of pregnancy.

One feminist told me that birth control is a choice, but abortion is not a choice. Abortion is a way to deal with the aftermath of

Abortion may have to be a choice as a result of defective birth control. Broken condoms. Forgotten pills. Sometimes medication can dilute and render birth control ineffective. The woman may have no idea that this has happened. Or how about alcohol? A drunken mistake can put people into situations that have serious consequences. Don't lie! It has happened to a girl in every University

Abortion may be a choice because we live in a society that does not look approvingly on women who have children outside of marriage. Abortion may be a choice because of economic reasons - it is not easy for a woman to raise a child if she is alone or if her and her partner are still students. Abortion may be a choice because the girl is too young and the parents are not willing to help. There are many reasons for abortion. It is not my place to say if these are morally

of life in Canadian society. Being pregnant is not easy for a girl in University. Relationships, while promising are not solidified. Babies interfere with studying and with keeping new boyfriends. Babies interfere with partying and having fun -which is the expected stage of University life for most 20 year old girls. Babies don't raise themselves. Some people believe that a woman is actually "damaged goods" and that she should be scorned for having children and not being able to keep the man beside her. It is almost like abortion is a way to deal with a corrupt society that is unable to deal with women who are not married and have children. What if you don't feel comfortable having an abortion? What if it really bothers you inside? What if you feel guilty for the rest of your life? It is not easy to go against societal norms. It is also not easy to deal with guilt if you really feel inside that abortion is wrong.

Religion does not even have to factor into a decision for abortion to be a painful choice. Unfortunately. I just wanted to include some of the things that may happen when one is forced to deal with pregnancy when it is not a good time to be pregnant.

Things you Don't Think about

Generally, you might find out you are pregnant when you first missed your period. However, an abortion cannot be performed until the fetus is at least 6 to 8 weeks - no matter what. Most girls immediately have morning sickness. What a treat to go to class sick, with your breasts aching, and full of hormones that can make you very emotional. For most girls they have to suffer for a month with all the symptoms of pregnancy. This is a long, long time to think before they are even able to get the abortion - if that is what they

Some girls in University might want to keep the fact that they are pregnant a secretespecially if they are planning an abortion. No matter how liberal one wishes to be, it is not easy to tell the world you are having an abortion. You might tell your close friends, or the guy that is responsible but it is not easy. Try studying, getting good grades, and at the same time deal with morning sickness. I know some girls that dropped out of school for this very reason. It is not always easy to tell your parents, especially if they have strong ideas about abortion either for or against. The topic of abortion can (but not always) bring out the worst side in people. My mother would kill me if I had an abortion and I could never keep it a secret from herwe are too close. Another mother might be angry at her daughter for not sticking to school and getting her degree. It is not always easy to predict how your family

And the worst part of pregnancy for a woman - in my experience? What if the guy you thought was so great doesn't want the child and you do? Do you decide to become a mother and have a baby without a father? Do you have an abortion but secretly wish that your guy would wrap his arms around you, tell you he loves you, and you would run off and get married. To live happily ever after in happiness with your child? It doesn't always work that way. This can be devastating and while Canadian culture seems very uniform and similar beliefs vary greatly from person to person about the morality of

If you decide to have the baby on your own then what happens to school? Do you try to keep going or do you drop out? How do you provide for the baby? What if the father doesn't want to see the baby? What if the father does want the baby but you are not on good terms? What if you have no family support? If you are in a difficult situation like these - go and get help. The Counselors on the Fourth Floor of the Sub Building at SMU are free of charge and want to help in exactly these kinds of situations. Most Doctors will provide immediate counseling services for women and men that are completely confidential. In this situation take advantage of these resources. Do not try to go through this alone.

And for guys? What if you love the girl? What if you want the baby? What if you totally disagree with abortion?

As far as I know, a man has absolutely no right to the fetus according to the Supreme Court of Canada. You cannot make any woman have a child if she doesn't want to. This can be heart breaking for men who really wanted to have that child. The right to choose is only in the hands of the woman. I tried to talk openly and ho Be smart about what you are doing girls. Don't trust someone else to provide birth control. You should pick the birth control and you should insist on it if you don't want to have children. Note to guys - be careful with the girl you are with. Don't put a girl into this situation because of carelessness. It is a choice to have an abortion but that is not always a simple situation. Or you could abstain from sex. I read about a small community near India where the men preferred to marry women that were already pregnant. The women were not necessarily pregnant by the husband to be. The culture was devoid of the issues related to our culture over paternity. This culture did not shame a woman for having children with whatever man she chooses. What a world this would be. I personally think that these beliefs would completely change the way we view pregnancy.

Muslims around the world are observing the holiest month of the year -- Ramadan, when Muslims try to attain an elevated spirituality through prayer and

Derived from the Arabic root word "ramida", denoting intense scorching heat and dryness, Ramadan is celebrated in the ninth month of the Muslim lunar calendar. Its start is determined by the sighting of the crescent moon indicating the beginning of a new lunar month. Muslims firmly hold that it was

in the month of Ramadan that the Holy Qur'an "was sent down from heaven."

During the month, observant Muslims fast from sunrise to sunset. After sunset, they often have large meals breaking the fast, with special foods and sweets. Smoking and sexual relations are also forbidden. Through the exercise of restraint, as they believe, the spiritual parts of human beings can achieve excellence; through pious prayers, they ask God for forgiveness and achieve

salvation.

As well as prayer, charity is an important element of Ramadan. "Ramadan is a Beautiful time." Homa Abdo, Arts and Sciences, Saint Mary's University '11, said. "A time to realize how thankful you should be...although you should be thankful everyday, sometime you forget it. It's like a reminder." She emphasized that in her country, people would be doing good things during Ramadan, "they help someone in need, such as giving money [a donation] ".

A total of 1.61 billion Muslims (2007 Population) do the same thing during Ramadan, but for Homa, there is a difference from Canada and back home. "I don't feel like its Ramadan time. Sometime I forget fasting, which I would do back home no matter what...in Halifax, there isn't much to do."

But Homa always loves helping people. She would help people in need with her friends.

It is crucial to comprehend the meaning of this important time in the Muslim year for the society. As John

G. Stackhouse (a well-known Canadian scholar and writer) once said since "Muslims are our neighbours and fellow citizens, both here in Canada and in the global community," we must understand what is important to them. Ramadan is important to

Our university has many Muslim students, from Canada or abroad. Alana Robb, Manager of International Student Services, told us it is very difficult for Muslim students from other places to deal with being away home during this month-long family festival. "Ramadan is very important to Muslim students Alana said, "We have been trying to recognize the different regions and national festivals of students of other countries with Saint Mary's students", hoping they hold their faith and keep their beauty in the spiritual part.

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Strategic Voting is Awesome

With a united right and a left and centre more divided than ever, Canadians have recently begun struggling with the idea of strategic voting. The basic idea of strategic voting is to try and make sure someone you don't want to win doesn't win, rather than trying to make sure someone you want to win can win. In essence, you are doing your best to vote against candidates rather than for them.

Where many take issue with the idea of strategic voting is that this plan constitutes a compromise of principles. For instance, if you want the Conservative government to win, one would want less Liberals to hold seats. In an individual riding, if there was a close race between the Liberals and the NDP but the Conservatives are third, it might be more prudent for a Conservative to vote for the NDP candidate in hopes of blocking a Liberal win. The issue for voters might be whether one feels comfortable enough to vote for a candidate who holds beliefs that are opposed to their own. For NDP supporters who want the Conservatives gone, the problem becomes even larger. In the end, it won't be their own NDP government that their vote will try to elect, but a Liberal government.

Strategic voting makes sense. For the Conservative voter, the situation above is a no-brainer. If your candidate won't win, you do what's best for the party, and that may include not voting for your own candidate. For those on the left, many have said they would rather see a Conservative get elected than have to betray their allegiances. This ideology is nice on paper, as long as that paper isn't a ballot. The Liberals, the NDP, and to a lesser extent the Green Party, all have very similar platforms, and the idea that it would be preferable to see a Conservative government who is the polar opposite of all three is ludicrous

Of course, many would like to see more drastic moves by

the left to stop the Conservatives. Some, such as former Saskatchewan Premier Lorne Calvert, have proposed uniting the left, just as the Canadian Alliance and Progressive Conservatives united the right a few years ago. Others suggest that the Liberals, NDP, and the Green Party, should look at polling data, choose the party in each riding with the best chance of beating the Conservative candidate. Then, the other two parties endorse that candidate and drop out. While either of these would involve some tough pillswallowing on behalf of all three, it would almost ensure a Conservative loss. There isn't a single poll which shows the NDP and the Liberals below the Conservatives unless their numbers are added together. These parties need to figure out if their goals are more important than their

Strategic voting has also gone on the internet, with people trying to both eat and have their cake by swapping their vote with other people. The idea has been popular for a while in Britain. but only recently gained steam in Canada through Facebook groups which are promoting the idea. These groups typically provide a list of battleground provinces, and tell whether a Liberal, NDP, or a Green has the best chance of winning. People then contact each other, and make deals to swap votes. For instance, if you support the NDP. but your riding has much stronger Conservative and Liberal candidates, you would link up with a Liberal supporter in a riding with much stronger Conservative and NDP candidates

The Liberal supporter would then vote NDP in their riding, on behalf of you, and you would vote Liberal, on behalf of them. The largest of these groups, created by Matt Sevelli, (who went to Oxford!) is called the Anti-Harper Vote Swap Canada. Currently at over 7500 members, with several ridings possibly coming down to a few votes in difference between the Liberals and the Conservatives,

> Sevelli's group is poised to make a major difference this election.

Some have called my own riding, the sleekly named Dartmouth South Portland Valley, one of the tightest three way races in the country. I don't know if that's true or not, but I do know that there's a good chance I'll be considering voting strategically this election rather than for whatever leader impresses me the most come election day. Maybe you should consider strategic voting too.

State of the Election

Stephane Dion has started to bring out some of the more high profile Liberals in an effort to shake up his campaign. Former leadership rivals Bob Rae and Michael Ignatieff have both attended Dion press conferences and fielded questions for the man. This effort to emphasize the Liberal party as a "team" will likely be increasingly common until the election, as the Liberals attempt to put some charisma on the field to counter Stephen Harper's personal popularity (although recent polls have put Jack Layton as the most likable candidate,) and paint him as a "one man sun-king".

The Conservatives have attacked Dion's "dream team," pointing out the deficit Rae left after being premier of Ontario, and Ignatieff's lack of political experience (he does however have a book review in an upcoming issue of The New Republic.) Some in the media have also asked if Rae and Ignatieff's presence are indicators that they would have been better leaders for the Liberal party. Regardless, with the Conservatives hovering near or at majority territory, Dion needs to do something different other than stress how much he enjoys being underestimated.

Other MPs which we can expect to see in the coming weeks include Ralph Goodale and John McCallum. These MPs will likely be targeting the nation's troubled economy, while Stephen Harper has a masters degree in economics, John McCallum is the former senior vice president and chief economist of the Royal Bank of Canada, the nation's largest company, and so will try and add some credibility to Dion's economic plans. Mr. Goodale will serve the same purpose; the former finance minister will be trying to remind voters that under him and the Liberals the nation took in multi-billion dollar surpluses, and will claim that this economic prosperity has been "squandered" by the Conservatives. Some have suggested that Mr. Dion appoint an American style "running mate" -the person he would select as his Deputy Prime Minister, in order to excite the public the way Sarah Palin excited the American public.

Northern Exposure

Stephen Harper is trying hard to move the three Liberal ridings that make up the three territories Conservative blue after this election, and have recently taken his campaign up north. The northern territories are a favourite place of Harpers, and he's visited them every summer since his government has gotten into power. Of course, he's there for reasons beyond sightseeing. Harper has been extremely adamant that Canada remain in control of its arctic, increasing regulations for the Northwest Passage, -a waterway Europe and the U.S. assert is not ours to regulate- as well as increasing military operations in the area. Tensions over arctic sovereignty are increasing as of late, with Russian President Dimitri Medvev recently stating plans to annex a portion of Canada's territory near the North Pole. Russia previously invoked the wrath of the Canadian public when they used a submarine to place a Russian flag underneath our ice. Stephane Dion criticised Harper's approach to the arctic, calling it overly militaristic, and futile

against a superior fighting force.

Dion wryly commented: "We can't win against the Americans, we can't win against the Russians, and we're too civilized to shoot the Danes."

Harper also pledged to create new social programs for the poverty stricken northern communities, emphasizing his commitment to them. Previously, Harper has come under scrutiny for removing funding for indigenous Canadians as well as scrapping the Kelowna accord. Tom Flanagan, Harper's mentor and former Chief campaign advisor, is a noted anti-Canadian indigenous rights advocate.

Newsreel:

- Gary Ritz, conservative agricultural minister, made two jokes about a deadly Listeria outbreak, including one in which he stated that he hoped a new case of the disease was the Liberal's agricultural critic. Ritz championed deregulation of food inspections earlier in the year.
- Good news for Bob Rae, his Conservative opponent stepped down after... Well we don't know. The official word is that he was not ready to commit to four years of service; the unofficial word is that he had posted negative comments about the passengers on the Greyhound bus where a man was beheaded.
- Two of Jack Layton's British Colombia MP's resigned for fulfilling stereotypes about their province this week. One had been selling coca, peyote, and other 'legally grey' seeds, while another had video of him smoking pot surface on Youtube. The New Democratic Party favours decriminalizing marijuana, and Jack Layton once appeared on Pot TV asking for votes. Some see the party's acceptance of these resignations as betraying that position.
- The Liberals announced major arts funding, while the Conservatives sent out pamphlets to their members asking if they want to spend over a billion dollars a year on the CBC.
- In a move that was immediately spun into 'Layton pledges hand gun ban' by the media, Jack Layton announced that he would give provinces the power to ban handguns.
- On Sunday, Elizabeth May started her "whistle-stop" tour across the country via rail. This is being done, according to May, to draw attention to the need for an efficient rail system, and because it's better for the environment. The fact that trains are cheaper than renting a jet is also probably a factor. Did you know Elizabeth May is an American? (She's from Connecticut.)
- The Toronto Stock Exchange stopped its downfall and had one of its biggest gains in history last week. This came on the heels of a Bush Administration announcement that there would be massive bail outs for various banking institutions, allowing them to begin giving out loans again. The TSX had been hurting amid a decrease in buying power in the US, which is Canada's largest trading partner by

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Huskies Hammers Axe Men

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





Letter to Senate

What follows is a letter I recently sent to members of this year's Senate at Saint Mary's.

I am writing to you in your capacity as a member of the Academic Senate. I want to draw to your attention to two matters I believe fall within Senate's concern. One has to do with statements in is a religious university; the other has to do with the status of the Instructor and Course Evaluation form as the sole official instrument on campus by which students evaluate their professors and

1) The "General Information" section of the Academic Calendar states the four objectives of the university as given in the Saint Mary's University Act of 1970. One of the objectives is to "give special emphasis to the Christian tradition and values in higher education." This objective should be deleted from the Calendar.

First, it's simply false that we at Saint Mary's give special or any emphasis to the Christian tradition, at least as we understand that tradition. Most of us are simply indifferent as to whether our teaching or research is within any Christian tradition or embodies any values Christians honour.

That it's false that we give special emphasis to Christianity is sufficient reason to remove the statement of that objective from our Calendar. But there is a second, practical, reason for deleting it from the Calendar. Its presence in the Calendar is misleading. Students and prospective students will read it as a true declaration of an actual objective of our institution, as well they should. Those who wish to attend a university with a religious objective will be attracted to Saint Mary's and might well be disappointed when they find that religion is merely a lingering rather than a real presence here. Those who are put off by religion will avoid Saint Mary's.

The Calendar makes other false assertions about religion at Saint Mary's. "Because of its traditional commitment to Christian education,

Saint Mary's University continues to emphasize personal and social values derived from the experience of Christian civilization." This is from the "Chaplaincy" heading under Student Services, and it ought to be removed as false and misleading.

2) Senate erred in 2005 when it approved the Instructor and Course Evaluation form for use at Saint Mary's. The error doesn't have to do with problems in the ICE form itself, though it is a terrible form reflecting a poor philosophy of university teaching. The error is in Saint Mary's having any single official form at all. Any particular form will privilege certain teaching goals and teaching styles over others. Having a single official form for the university makes the goals and styles valued by the form the university's official goals and styles. We ought not have an official teaching philosophy at Saint Mary's, and we certainly shouldn't encourage our students to suppose that we do.

Senate ought to declare that any evaluation form a professor at Saint Mary's uses is an official evaluation form. And Senate should make it widely known that professors may use whatever form they want. Saint Mary's would, thereby, acknowledge its pluralism with regard to teaching goals and styles. The university would also be helping to prevent our students from forming bad ideas regarding university

Senate could, of course, continue to sponsor the Academic Calendar asserting that Saint Mary's the administering of the ICE form, but why would it

Long Distance Learning

Ever think "man I'd love to get out of here", "I want to travel", or "if I spend one more semester at home my parents are gonna drive me insane"? Well if you have, Saint Mary's University offers a great study option for you. Take a semester to study abroad; engross yourself in a new culture and travel without loosing a whole semester of learning.

Saint Mary's has a great International Learning Program, with over 30 study programs available at host Universities in 17 countries, including Australia, France, Mexico, Taiwan, China, Japan, and Sweden. There is an agreement between many of these Universities and SMU that allows students to pay Saint Mary's tuition for credits they receive at host Universities.

Once you have decided where you would like to study the International Activities Office can, in most cases, put you in touch with other SMU students who have spent a semester abroad. This is a great way to get another perspective of what life in that country is really like. This also offers an opportunity to get suggestions or little facts that may help on the trip that you may not be able to find out otherwise; little facts such as 'buses are privately owned in Sydney, Australia' meaning they run on no fixed schedule, which is helpful to know before you arrive in a new place. arrive in a new place.

The International Activities Office is willing to offer lots of help and assistance to anyone considering a semester abroad; if you want more information check out


the International Learning link on the SMU website.
Students can take courses taught in English
even in countries where English is not the primary language. It is also important to note that employers are now looking for students with international experience. The opportunity to study abroad often works out best when students are in their third year of study, but with planning students may be able to go in other years as well. Graduate students are also eligible for the program.

Once you have selected a destination and a list of possible courses it is important to meet with an academic advisor to find out how, or if, your courses will transfer back as SMU credits. Depending on the marking schemes at host Universities it may actually be better if the marks don't transfer back. Saint Mary's does however award credit for courses on a pass/fail basis without giving it a specific letter grade.

In addition to the "tuition swap" program there are many grants, scholarships, and bursaries available to students once they are accepted into the program. With commitment, budgeting, funding, and a plan, studying abroad can be affordable for nearly all students. The cost of living in most areas is comparable to that of Canada with additional expenses for airfare, insurance, and initial set-up. Check out the Internationals Activities Office for more information.

If you are unsure of where you would like to study, there are plenty of ways to dive into cultural settings here at SMU. Join a society, enroll in a language course, or attend an on-campus event that is focused on a culture other than your own, or just engage others in conversation, you never know what you might learn.

Last week I wrote about the high cost of academic materials including textbooks, and the different option you have as a student when selecting your academic materials. If you missed it, you can check the blog address above for the whole scoop. Academic materials, such as text books and course-packs, are very important to students as well as faculty. For students they can be a supplement to the ideas and information presented in class, and for professors they can be an additional tool to relay the information to students.

Due to the high importance and high cost of academic materials, 21 universities from across Canada, including Saint Mary's, have joined to create CRAM, the Canadian Roundtable

on Academic Materials. This new organization represents the student associations and bookstore from these campuses. The first meeting took place in November of 2008 in Toronto. This was initially organized by the student's association and bookstore from the University of Alberta. The members discussed the direction of the new organization, different ideas about what CRAM could accomplish, and shared information about the issues. They decided to create an ongoing medium for cooperation between Canadian bookstores and students. The group will also ideally include all stakeholders, including faculty representative, the publishers, and librarians. This past June, I had the opportunity to attend the second major meeting of CRAM. The conference was very informative and productive. We had the chance to meet with key repre-

sentatives from the publishers and express our concerns over the rising cost of textbooks. We also had information sessions on copyright issues, what other campuses are doing to make a difference, among others. There was lots of discussion between the student representatives about running book exchanges, working with the administration on our campuses, and organizing an awareness campaign, all of which SMUSA are currently focusing on. CRAM is also planning media releases to draw attention to this issue, as well as advocacy campaigns targeting various levels of government.

CRAM and SMUSA want to create awareness on the side of the students, the faculty and bookstores and ensure that we play a role in helping to bring down the cost of these materials to students. Overall, the primary goal is create an affordable option for academic materials for all students.



Campus Spotlight: Flux Fitness; Martial Art **Boot Camp**

This week we sat down with current SMU student Dawson Wambolt to talk about his business with SMU alum Alana Green; Flux Fitness, and the associated Martial Arts Boot Camp. Wambolt, a Psychology major and English minor brings the Boot Camp aspect while Green, Marketing and Small Business grad pumps it up with martial arts.

LM: Tell us about your business; what do you do, when did you start, where did you get the idea? DW: Martial Art Boot Camp (MABC) is a hybrid training program utilizing innovative body

weight exercises tailored for the needs of martial artists and fitness enthusiasts alike. Participants will learn how to properly execute fitness and martial art techniques for a lifelong, healthy and active lifestyle. The Martial Art Boot Camp is intended to give athletes of be it through physical motivation or a more dynamic training philosophy. I had started with the business in January of this year, which was after Alana and I had been working for awhile with her martial art students at Green Choi Kwang Do to boost their fitness. We had decided that it was a program that had potential in the fitness community, so we created the business. LM: Who is your target demographic?

DW: Generally students and anyone interested really, the age range is typically 18-45

LM: I understand you have web products underway, tell us about those. Also, where are you located and when does MABC run?

DW: We are in the process of launching our webstore at www.martialartbootcamp.com, and we have at least one weekend bootcamp per season run out of our Fort Massy location. We also do bootcamps by request for groups, and it can be done out of a number of concievable locations. We are looking into housing classes on a weekly basis right now.

LM: How do you find balancing school with running a

DW: It can be a little bit of tough work, but you just have to stay on top of your game. Do your readings every night for class, that way it is just a little bit of work on top of regular business. Then we talked quite a bit to the producers to discuss what we were going to do, what we were going to wear, and how we had to set up our presentation to work within the strengths and limitations of television. Just before we left for Toronto, we had a mock Dragon's Den with a few local business people and profs from the SMU Commerce department experienced with venture capitalism. We then adjusted ourselves

accordingly and boarded the plane for Toronto. While there we worked hard rehearsing our pitch with advice fresh in our minds and showed up to CBC studios on the 6th of June. While waiting we got to see a few familiar faces of TV walking around, such as George Stroumboulopoulos walking around with his producer several times, an interview conducted with Salaman Rushdie near the Royal Canadian Air Farce dressing rooms, and the props from old children's shows like Mr. Dressup. When it came to conducting the actual taping we were set and prepared. The tension on the set is not as thick as the show leads you to believe, and the Dragons are actually quite kind and respectful, especially Kevin O'Leary who they paint as the ruthless one. The outcome was decided there by the Dragons, and we cannot state what had happened until the our segment airs sometime this season. We will be given a week's notice before the show airs, and when that happens we will let everyone know to tune in.

to Cures

Students at the University of Tirana have set their sights on the hostile environment of Lazarat, Albania. Commonly known by today's standards as a violent epicenter for cannabis cultivation, Lazarat is plagued with civil unrest between villagers and police units.

In its prime, before the political and economic unrest of the 1990's, Lazarat was home to a secure of crops in the past to economic market of medicinal and aromatic herbs. Unrest collapsed the local markets, leaving the villagers resorting to growth of illegal drugs for economic stability.

Students from the University of Tirana's SIFE (Students in Free Enterprise) team saw an opportunity for economic growth and increased safety in the area. After meeting with community leaders, the local government and SIFE team created a plan to help villagers grow medicinal and aromatic herbs once again. The SIFE team's first step was to teach business skills within the community so the farmers could make better informed business decisions; this included the students' gaining extensive knowledge of appropriate cultivation methods for

The team found several

companies willing to sign 5-year contracts in the region, exporting crops all over Europe and the USA. With 60 farmers currently involved, the initiative grossed total revenues of \$433,000 USD and a net income of more than \$300,000 USD.

Thanks to the initiatives success, it is undergoing its second year of operation, with more families jumping on board to grow legal herbs. The participating families have seen huge changes in interactions with authorities in the area; from torching assistance and aid. Bridges to the area have been rebuilt along with next generation will be able to lead healthier, wealthier lives.

This is just one of many ways students around the world are making a difference on a global scale. Great job and continued success to the Tirana team.


