

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

Individualism is Surprisingly Conformist Sometimes

This isn't an article about how Goths, in an attempt to be individual, all end up looking the same; we all know this. But still, individualism is an interesting concept. Famous philosophers such as Ayn Rand have championed individualism as the key to a moral life. Modern champions of individualism often brand those who focus on the value of the community, or who believe in community oriented institutions such as religion, as sheep. Ironically, many of these so-called "individualists" tend not to be disorganized for long, and instead build increasingly structured and homogenized organizations, while continuing to champion individualism. To me, individualism is more about freedom and a "live and let live" philosophy, rather than relentlessly attempting to ensure that everyone thinks as "individually" as everyone else.

The issue of individualism recently reared its head in a few different ways across the globe. In Italy, a woman recently complained about the widespread presence of the Crucifix in Italian schools. The European Court of Human Rights (ECHR) found that this woman's rights were being violated by restricting the right of the parent to educate their child as an atheist. The courts ordered Italy to remove the crosses from all of its schools. Taken at first glance, this situation seems to be a triumph of individualism, but this is not so. This is a triumph of an individual, which

is a very different thing. According to Italian law, the decision to put up a cross or other symbol is left up to the individual institution, in this case the teachers or principles. By forcing Italian schools to remove their crosses uniformly, they are taking away the individual agency of schools to decide what is appropriate for them. Similarly, the banning of all religious forms of expression in France is conformism, not individualism. The individualist approach in this case would be to allow the students in France and the schools in Italy to decide for themselves, even if the schools all decide the same way.

Surprisingly, it has been Poland which has reacted the most strongly to the ECHR's decision to ban Italy's classroom crosses. Under the Soviet Union the Polish were prohibited

from displaying religious symbols. The country now has crosses and other traditional symbols on display in many locations as a sign of its hard fought struggle to gain the right of freedom of expression. According to Poland, no matter what the ECHR says, they will never take down their crosses. What the Polish government understands is that these rulings limit individualism, not maintain it. If the Italian crosses were part of a widespread indoctrination system it might be a different matter, but sometimes a cherished cultural symbol should be seen as just that: a cherished cultural


In Canada, a different situation recently occurred during a stopover by Prince Charles in Quebec. A mass of Separatist protesters gathered and began hurling slogans and insults at the Royals. A massive political movement like the Quebec nationalist movement is intimidating, particularly when there are a hundred and fifty of them gathered in a single place, it's a group that can be hard to stand up to, but one woman did.

Suzanne Reny approached the group, by herself, and began protesting them. She didn't have an issue with their right to be there, but with their choice to be there and the content of what they were saying. If one reads English language newspapers, it would be easy to believe that everyone in Quebec wants to leave or is at least indifferent to the idea of Canada. "If they are going to come here as a gang and say 'We're the Jeunes Patriotes' and all that stuff and 'we represent Quebec,' well, I'm here to say they don't represent Quebec," she said. Reny just wanted her view to be counted.

Many of the separatists were also individualists like Reny, only they believed something different. Other separatists were not about individualism, but about advancing their beliefs and silencing others. When they decided to act physically against Reny, the separatists who were truly about freedom and individuality acted in her defence. While everyone in the group may have been committed to an independent Quebec, only some were committed to an individual one.

Blood Donor Clinic at SMU

Canadian Blood Services will be holding a blood donor clinic on-campus Tuesday November 24th between 12 and 4pm. There are 73 appointment times available and walk-ins are usually welcomed.

Donating is easy and (relatively) painless. The whole process usually takes less than 45 minutes and each donation can save up to three people. It is estimated that every minute someone in Canada will require a blood transfusion yet only about 4% of eligible Canadians donate blood each year.

Unlike the system in the United States, donors are not paid as recipients of blood donations as patients do not pay to receive it. Those who donate many times a year are often recognized for their contributions.

There is always a large push for blood donation around the holiday season. Although it is a time of celebration there is also an increased risk for injury. Poor weather conditions and bad decision making lead to many accidents that leave people requiring blood transfusions. Poor weather also limits the ability of donors to make it out to clinics

and flu season can place a strain on the number of people able to donate.

Each donation of one unit consists of a pint of blood. To give some perspective to how much blood is needed victims of automobile accidents may require up to 50 units

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of blood, cancer treatments can require up to 8 units a week.

Donating does not hurt any more than receiving a regular needle. Many who donate do not experience any pain at all. If experienced, it is typically a feeling of moderate pressure at the point of entry. Canadian Blood Services staff members are extremely reassuring for individuals who are uncom-

fortable and do everything possible to ensure a positive experience.

If getting H1N1 is a concern, it cannot be contracted through blood donation. That being said if you are sick with the flu it is recommended you wait until you are fully re-

covered before donating. All needles and equipment used are sterile, as only new needles are used and donors are not at risk of contracting any transmissible diseases when donating. Drinking plenty of fluids and eating before and after donating is recommended to keep yourself healthy.

Currently, there is an immediate need for O- type blood in Canada, but donors of all blood types are welcome to donate anytime.

If you are interested in giving blood but unavailable during the hours of the clinic at SMU you can call or visit the Canadian Blood Services website to find another clinic nearby. The main branch offices are located on the corner of Gottingen Street and donations can be made there. There are also volunteer opportunities with Canadian Blood Services if needles make you squeamish or you do not meet all the requirements.

Swine Flu Vaccine Controversy



Many Canadians are frustrated with the Government's Swine Flu vaccine campaign. First there was enough vaccine for all Canadians who wanted it, and now a small group of high risk individuals are being targeted until more vaccine becomes available. After all the hype it has now been made public that although people not in risk

groups are being turned away from clinics about 1% of doses are being thrown away because of a short shelf life. Once a dose of vaccine is placed in a syringe it is only approved for usage within a 24-hour period, after which it must be thrown out. Too many vaccines are being prepared and not enough are being distributed. Since receiving the vaccine late in October officials in Halifax have discarded roughly 80 doses.

The Olympic Flame has Arrived



The Olympic Torch has finished its tour of Northern Canada and is now in Nova Scotia. The Torch reached Cape Breton early Monday morning and travelled the province before arriving in Halifax on Wednesday. The 520 Torch bearers included Pittsburgh Penguin Captain Sidney Crosby who carried the torch through his hometown. There will be a celebration Wednesday evening at Grand Parade Square in downtown Halifax starting at 6pm and will include performances from Classified and DJ Skratch Bastid, an appearance by Crosby and fireworks.

Russia and U.S. Work on Nuclear Power Treaty.

Russia and the United States are closer to reducing their nuclear powers. U.S. President Obama and Russian President Dmitry Medvedev met over the weekend at the Asia-Pacific Economic Co-operation Forum. They discussed creating a treaty to reduce Nuclear Arms by the end of the year. Issues with violence and nuclear arms in Iran and Afghanistan were also discussed. Idealogical barriers previously prevented with talks between the U.S. and Russia, but Obama and Medvedev seemed confident when talking to the press of the improved relationship between the nations.

Keep the Noise Down

Partying seems to be a part of the university student lifestyle. Saturday night's were not intended for quiet reflection or studying, right? Actually, it depends on who you ask. In the South End, student housing is intermingled with family housing which can lead to problems for partygoer's.

The author of this article was recently at a party at an apartment in the South End in which to police arrived in response to a noise complaint from neighbours. Three officers arrived and spoke to the owners of the apartment about the situation. Luckily they were given a warning for their first offense, but not before being told that if the police had to return the residents of the apartment would be issued a ticket for \$450.

After the police had left, others attending

the party all offered different ideas about the visit. Some said "You can't be given a ticket on your first offense" or "That the Police have to come twice in the same night in order to ticket you." Also some felt that "Both neighbours have to complain before you can be issued a ticket."

After consulting the HRM Noise Bylaw (N-200) it appears individuals can be fined for "Yelling, shouting, hooting, whistling, or singing." Also punishable by fine, "The operation of any public address system, television set, disc player, tape deck; phonograph, radio in a manner such that the sound from the equipment being operated is audible beyond the bounds of property from which the noise is emitted." Both of these are considered illegal during the hours of 9:30pm and 7:00am Monday to Friday, Saturday nights between 7:00pm and 8:00am and Sundays and holidays between 9:00am and 7:00pm.

The detonation of fireworks or explosive

devices for purposes other than construction in a residential area is punishable at all times

The punishment for breaking a noise by-law is a fine of a minimum of \$300 for the first offense and is more than doubled for second offense to a minimum of \$700.

If the police do come knocking at your door during a party they do not want to speak to party guests and for your sake it's probably best if they don't. If it is the first offense and you are compliant to their requests to turn the music down their visit may not result in a ticket, but do not assume that you will not be ticketed solely because it is your first offense.

To prevent other un-necessary fines remember to keep open liquor inside, refrain from peeing off the balcony or on the side of the road and turn the music down. Remember there are families in the area who may not appreciate the musical styling's of Britney Spears or Jay-Z quite as much as you do.

The SMU Gallery is Missing a Painting



The Forum will provide students with the opportunity to meet employees from many sectors and

discuss employment opportunities in Nova Scotia. The aim of this event is to educate students at all levels, and in all programs of study about opportunities for employment in Nova Scotia. It is also a chance for students to learn what kinds of occupations are available in the province.

Although some employers may be looking to hire for summer, co-op's, full or part time jobs the event is more focused on educating students as opposed to finding jobs. It is a great opportunity to network with employers and learn about market conditions in the province.

If you have questions this is a great chance to get them answered. Examples of questions that employers will be prepared to answer include: What courses and experience are nee-

Preparing for Old Man Winter

With the first snowfall of the season a few weeks ago catching many off guard it is time to prepare for another Nova Scotia winter. The weather is changing quickly and the cold temperatures are here making it harder to pretend winter is a long way off.

Winter storms often lead to power outages, which can be more than just inconvenient if you aren't prepared. Since electric heat is of no use during a power outage be sure to have plenty of blankets on hand to keep warm. Flashlights are also essential, as are the batteries. Candles can also be

helpful but need to be used with caution.


A worthwhile investment may be a hand crank radio as it relies on human effort and not electricity to run it making it easier to stay up on radio coverage of the situation.

Avoid opening the refrigerator during power outages unless it is necessary. This helps keep the cold air inside. If using a propane camping stove take it outside when cooking to avoid dangerous fumes.

A small shovel can be handy to have, even when living in an apartment, just in case you need to get out before a path is cleared. Road salt or sand is helpful as it can prevent slipping on ice.

For winter car safety stock the trunk with similar materials, including a shovel, ice scraper, extra hats and mittens, and a blanket. Flashlights or candles are also a good idea, as well as a first aid kit and a few granola bars and bottles of water. It is also a good idea to get your car a tune-up before the winter weather arrives to ensure the vehicle is safe for winter driving. Keeping a small supply of sand or salt in the vehicle is also recommended.

Programming the number for Nova Scotia Power into your cell phone and posting it along with other emergency numbers in an accessible place at home, is a good idea to make contacting help easier.

Modern Warfare 2 banned in Russia

As predicted, Modern Warfare 2 is going to be the most successful game of the year. With 4.7 million copies sold on the first day across North America and the UK (breaking the previous record, set by Grand Theft Auto IV, by 1.1 million copies), Modern Warfare 2 is being hailed as the most successful launch of any form of media, ever. Despite a rocky promotion cycle, full of controversial decisions regarding the absence of dedicated servers on the PC version and a viral video with an offensive acronym, the game has pulled through on the merits of fantastic gameplay and story elements. Even after shipping, however, the controversy surrounding the game lives on. Let that soak in for a minute. The plot is just as rich: the show takes on the form of a parody of a children's show, where the show's actors have accidentally ingested hallucinogenic drugs, believing they are really the characters they portray on the show. 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A Diamond In the Rough: A Review of The Blind Side

Recently the Journal was able to attend the screening of one of the most anticipated movies of November, The Blind Side. The movie is based on the true story of Michael Oher, a 2009 draft pick as offensive linesman for the Baltimore Ravens NFL football team and is soon to be released everywhere on November 20th.

The film follows Michael 'Big Mike' Oher, an inner-city youth from a broken family who manages to get accepted into Briarcrest High School, a religious private school because of his potential athletic ability. However, because of his lack of mental stability, he flounders, and is viewed as a lost cause by most of his teachers.

This was until a white family finds him wandering the streets searching for shelter, and decides to take him in and pushes him to reach his full potential. The movie's main characters are Michael Oher played by Quinton Aaron as the reclusive son of a drug-addicted single mother, and Sean and Leigh Tuohy played by Tim McGraw and Sandra Bullock

as the family that takes him under their wing. The film is written and directed by John Lee Hancock and based on the 2006 book The Blind Side: The Evolution of a Game

by Michael Lewis.

My first thought of the movie was that it was going to be just another sports movie, with a down on their luck hero who got lucky. I have seen many football movies with all having basically the same outline and I'm guilty of categorizing this film before seeing it. However, to my great surprise, I was extremely impressed with the entire film from start to finish.

Hancock was able to capture not just a sports movie but was able to tell a tale of an emotional journey of hardship and second chances.

The audience was able to relate and feel the pain of new comer Quinton Aaron as he portrayed the struggle that Michael Oher went through to get off of the meanest streets of Memphis, Tenn. Growing up Michael had no idea where he would sleep, what he would wear or even what he would eat. Oher was large in stature but small in personality, being virtually invisible in school until a teacher realized that he was absorbing lessons in class, even when he seemed not to be.

The movie started off with an in depth description by Sandra Bul-

lock's character about the reason why the blind side of the quarterback is so vital. Everyone knows who the quarterback is on the team.



Even though it is well known that the quarterback is the most well paid player on the football team, recent changes in the professional game have caused the position of offensive left tackle to be the second highest paying job in the NFL. The offensive left tackle is the man who protects a right handed quarterback's blindside from opposing players. If the quarterback is seriously injured it would be due to the lack of protection from the position now played by Michael Oher of the Baltimore Ravens. For this reason he is seen as an insurance policy of the team and became one of the most valued football prospects

Oher was so vital for this position because his physical type was as Sandra Bullock's character stated, "wide in the rear and massive in the thighs with long arms, giant hands and great feet." Unfortuna-

tely, having a great physical ability alone couldn't take Michael to where he is now. Thus we have the underlying plot of the entire film. At age 16, Oher was so under-socialized and uneducated that for him a book was a foreign object and a trusted adult a complete unknown. This is where the Touhys made such a remarkable impact on his life. According to standardized tests Michael Oher was

a lost cause when he entered Briarcrest Christian School, as a 6-foot-5-inch, 340-pound giant with zero learning or communication skills and a profound inability to indicate his own desires. The Touhys were able to give him something that he lacked his entire childhood-a family and a future.

Both Sean and Leigh noticed great potential in the young man who simply needed the love of others to bring out his gift. But Leigh Anne became the driving force behind the Tuohy's decision to give Oher the chance for a new beginning. Their decision is the reason why this movie stands out compared to other 'sports' films. When debating over nature versus nurture, what the Touhys did shows

a remarkable clarification of how Oher's extraordinary physicality and natural smarts could only be released in a nurturing environment.

However, I do question the premise (held by many, it seems), that the only way out of the ghetto for black people is sports and for their talent to be recognized. The truth is, however, that even if all the barriers to inner-city talent in sports removed, the number of people the market can handle with such high salaries is limited --- there are only so many sports stars that can be discovered. The true path out of the ghetto is actually through education, so that productivity can be increased indefinitely, but I guess that is beyond the scope of this movie.

Hancock made sure that the flow of the film was simple yet tasteful and excels in making not just a sports movie but a character comedy, with Sandra Bullock doing an outstanding job as the role of a strong mother figure. The movie is a sure blockbuster that leads the audience to some insightful selfdiscoveries and allows us to view a teen's transition from an old to new environment. It was an uplifting story of compassion, commitment, and life altering second-chances that will make you laugh and cry throughout the film. The Journal guarantees that "The Blind Side" is a different kind of sports movie.

Treating Others Disrespectfully

There are three ways in which we treat other people disrespectfully. We manipulate them, we humiliate them, and we burden them. Whenever we treat a person disrespectfully, we express some degree of contempt for her.

Treating people disrespectfully consists in failing to acknowledge through one's actions that other people's projects are as significant to them as one's own are to oneself. We treat others disrespectfully when we don't care that they are living lives that matter to them.

We manipulate another when we get that person to assist us in our own projects independently of her will to help to us. That is, we manipulate another when we trick her into giving us assistance, when we arrange things so that her consenting to help us is not free or informed. Manipulating another is disrespectful and contemptuous because in manipulating that other, one gives scant regard to her existence as a person in her own right.

Lying is always manipulative and, thereby, always disrespectful—even when it is done benevolently, even when it succeeds in making things better for the person lied to, and even when it does this at some cost to the liar. A liar uses another person to attain her ends independently of the other person's free and informed consent to be used toward those ends. That is contempt, no matter what good results from it.

Notice here that manifesting disrespect for a person doesn't require that the other be aware of our contempt, of our failure to appreciate her personhood. We can treat another disrespectfully though neither she nor anyone else ever notices. And, as we've seen, manifesting disrespect for another need not harm her, nor harm anyone else.

Those of us who wish never to treat others disrespectfully as well as to help make things better sometimes find ourselves unable to fulfil both wishes. To keep peace among our colleagues, we must lie to Sally; to treat Sally with respect we must speak honestly to her, though doing so will produce bad feelings and hostility all around.

No argument can show that we should value good consequences over respect or respect over good consequences, and no argument can establish at which degree of badness one should put respect aside. (We can't imagine what it would be to make a mistake about these things, so we have no idea what getting them right could consist in.) For my own part, I prefer respect over producing good outcomes, and even over avoiding bad ones—except when the bad outcome threatens to be really bad. (Or so at least I say. My actions, I fear, might speak differently. I might choose being nice over being respectful more often than I imagine.)

We humiliate another when we make her feel small in her own eyes. We humiliate her when we cause her to find her projects and feelings insignificant or foolish—in comparison, that is, to our own. We certainly have our reasons for humiliating others,

just as we do for manipulating them. Humiliating others can be an enjoyable expression of one's power, or an effective means of elevating oneself above the other.

We burden others when we force them to deal with us, to look after us, to clean up the mess we have left behind. Of the three forms of disrespect, burdening is perhaps the least studied, the least understood. Philosophers who prefer good consequences to respectful treatment are right to note that burdening usually creates bad consequences, but the bad consequences are incidental to the contempt it expresses.

Some simple examples of burdening: littering; walking slowly three abreast on a public sidewalk; talking while the movie's playing; playing music loudly in your apartment. These are examples of someone depriving others of an enjoyment or getting in their way. They also illustrate the fact that one need not intend to treat others disrespectfully to burden them. Burdening, that is, can result simply from insensitivity, indifference, or inattention. This is a way in which burdening differs from both manipulating and humiliating.

But of course we live among others and so we are always getting in each other's way. Getting in someone's way, then, cannot, all by itself, be disrespectful. Moreover, it's often because of your temperament or prejudices that you charge me with having got in your way. It's just as easy in such cases for me to say that it's you who is burdening me, you being so delicate and all, and to deny that I'm burdening you.

No, getting in another person's way is not in itself disrespectful. What matters is whether the burden is imposed fairly. One treats another contemptuously when one burdens that other unfairly. Our task now is to think hard about in what fairness and lack of fairness could consist here.

Know your Prof. -Dr. Mark Mercer

Every so often the Features Section of the Journal dedicates an article on a certain professor here at

Saint Mary's University. This week the Journal has decided to speak to one of the most influential professors here at Saint Mary's University, Professor Mark Mercer, who has also been actively involved with The Journal.

Professor Mercer is a philosophy teacher here at Saint Mary's University and writes the Cranky Professor column for The Journal each week. If you are an avid reader of his column then you realize that his columns are intended to spark or convey an idea or argument. Every week Features is fortunate enough to publish one of his thought provoking opinions, and recently I was able to meet the man behind the column.

Professor Mercer is now in his eleventh year here at Saint Mary's University and teaches philosophy, mainly contemporary analytic philosophy, along with Greek philosophy based on the teachings of Plato and Socrates. He received his PhD. at the University of Toronto and a Masters at Carlton University in Ottawa.

When we discussed his certain style of teaching, he humbly stated that he feels he teaches no different than any other teacher. However, he does admit to teaching with a certain style and purpose compared to other professors

There are many styles of teaching, especially in the philosophy department. Dr. Mercer knows that there are ways a professor can take an idea and try to make it exciting as possible for the students by focusing on multiple ways of approaching it. However, Dr. Mercer takes a more focused approach and states,"Here's an idea and give me one objection. Work it out carefully and explain why it's an objection and respond to it." He wants his students to be able to look carefully closely at the full picture along with the details. If possible he would take a few classes to focus on one idea and make sure examine it fully.

When considering test, his beliefs are similar to other Philosophy professors. Dr. Mercer stated that initially he never really believed in tests as a method of evaluating philosophy students. The courses are built more around thinking about an answer and evaluating it, rather than simply "right and wrong". According to Dr. Mercer, if it makes sense keep it, if not then throw it out. However, he has realized that some students like the comfort of being able to have a "right" answer. Thus for his lower level courses he has included test so as to give students that challenge.

Presently he is teaching Theory of Knowledge or the question of how

we conceive a proposition to be true. This course is intended to teach students how to justify their beliefs and the reasons that these beliefs are true. Therefore he teaches you to line up all of your reasons to develop a sure argument to justify your beliefs

so that you can answer skepticism. Dr. Mercer also teaches Critical Thinking or the study of rational decisions. Nextterm he will be teaching a 2nd year course that he clearly loves called Contemporary Issues in the Philosophy of

the Mind. He described this course as the study that asks the question: Are our minds our brains, or are they two separate entities? "There is stuff happening in your brain and there is stuff happening in your mind. But what's the relation? If one is caused by the other then we know where our brain is, but where's your mind?" Mercer helped to show me that they are one in the same but with two different descriptions.

Dr Mercer is a very profound teacher that has many different beliefs and values. He likes to discuss different ways of thinking based on the teachings of Plato, his ideal system among other things. We also discussed the value of virtue and how people use the vision of what is good and wrong.

Apart from other intellectual topics he shared with me the origin of the Cranky Professor Column. The reason for the column was to be able to openly express his opinions and ideas. After two and a half years the Cranky Professor has become one of the most well known sections of the Journal. His writings are made to be plain and informative, and in his third year as a Journal Columnist it has become clear that Mercer's ability to provoke discussion has remained as strong as ever. Dr. Mercer tries to convey his idea or arguments without letting the form they are conveyed in come between the idea and the audience. He wants the medium and the audience to connect.

Students at Saint Mary's University should be delighted to know that he is always open to discuss different topics. He is also the undergraduate Advisor for the Philosophy Department, so he can give you valuable insight for the future. However, be prepared for very intellectual discussions that will leave you thinking about life from many different perspectives you probably have never even thought of. His parting words are for that student to just think passionately with a clear and rigorous conception about all perspectives. Then engage on the basis of that understanding.



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The Power of Giving

Just in time for Christmas: Nova Scotia Power, Inc (NSPI) applied to Nova Scotia Utility and Review Board regarding customers getting a break on their power bills. The hearing is set for December 2nd, 2009. If the application is approved, NSPI customers' power rates will decrease 1.4%. So what else do we have to thank for this: the implementation of the fuel adjustment mechanism. The mechanism is lowering NSPI's fuel

Nova Scotia customers who use electrical heat and hot water will save an average of \$2.50 per month. Customers who have non-electrical heating and hot water will save \$1.25 per month. Over the past years power rates have increased for Nova Scotians, so this happy news bring in the jolly season a month or so early. We still have to wait until the hearing occurs and then will know for sure.

Compared to residential customers, commercial and industrial clients will see a small difference in their savings because the rates for commercial and industrial clients are based on fuel costs than those of residential customers. Across Nova Scotia, customers will save \$22 million. The decrease will last for one year. After which the board will reconvene to discuss the impact the reductions had on profits of the company.

NSPI mentioned that due to its fuel-adjustment strategy, commodity prices are lower and they are able to switch between multiple fuel sources. Customers will get a rebate if it turns out that the through the fuel adjusted system costs are lower than projected. Conservation is another mechanism that we have to thank. Patrons are becoming more eco-friendly and are turning off lights where necessary. This reduces the demand for electricity. Due to the economy downturn, customers are also looking to save a few bucks by conserving energy as

On a sad note; SMU player Meaders was seriously injured during the third quarter when making a tackle and had to be removed from the stadium in an am-


