
# **EXTENDED LIBRARY HOURS**

# Writing Centre's Tip of the Week: The Bare Bones of Essay Writing

At its most fundamental level, writing is "communicating a message to a reader for a purpose." When writing an essay, it is important that you have a clear understanding of your message (thesis), your intended audience, and the overall purpose of your paper. With this in mind, and once you are ready to begin writing your first draft, there is a general structure that you can follow that will help you organise your essay in an effective and clear way.

The time-honoured advice about essay writing that harkens back to the good old high school days is just as valid in this context, albeit with maybe a few more details. An essay is basically made up of three sections: an introductory paragraph, a main body made up of coherent paragraphs, and a conclusion.

The introductory paragraph is a crucial part of any essay and usually includes the following elements:

☐ A general opening sentence that introduces your topic

☐ Context that provides important background details relevant to your topic

☐ The main issue that you will be developing in your essay

☐ A thesis statement that informs the

reader of your central argument or position


☐ An explanation of the importance of your argument

☐ A mapping scheme that outlines how you will proceed in the body of your essay

The main section of your essay is made up of a series of paragraphs where you outline the discussion of your topic and develop your argument. Depending on the length of your essay, the paragraphs may be grouped into subtopics that help organize your ideas in a structured manner and help the reader follow your line of

reasoning. Each paragraph starts with a topic sentence, which introduces the idea or point that will be developed, and it most often ends with a transition sentence that leads into your next idea or point.

The conclusion is where you restate your thesis, outline your main arguments, and highlight the purpose of your essay. A good way to conclude this paragraph is to end on a note that links your thesis to a larger context that is relevant and thought-provoking for the reader.

# The Cranky Professor George Jonas on Canada's university administrators

"The next great act of Canadian philanthropy must be to buy out all university administrators' contracts, and replace [the administrators] with the first persons encountered at the nearest bus stop. Whatever it accomplished scholastically, it would lead to a marked moral improvement of higher education in Canada."

That's George Jonas, from a recent column in The National Post.

It's a harsh judgement. Jonas is saying that the average Canadian on the street cares more about freedom of expression, freedom of discussion, and intellectual community than do the people who have risen to the top to run our universities. If Jonas is right, two people picked at random likely would do a better job protecting and nurturing intellectual community on the Saint Mary's campus than our current president and academic vice president do.

In defence of university administrators in Canada, one might note that when an administrator is doing her job well, we don't hear that she is. When security at a contentious event is good and would-be disrupters know they won't be tolerated, no story emerges for reporters to cover. We hear only about the bad administrators, the ones who, through incompetence or connivance, cancel the event or otherwise give in to the enemies of the university.

According to this line of thought, even if conscientious administrators are in the majority, we wouldn't know it, for the efforts of good administrators don't attract attention.

True, perhaps, but we have to add that much that administrators can do to harm campus culture will also stay out of the newspapers. Administrators can discourage a lively campus in all sorts of ways, with the result that nothing happens, neither within nor outside the classroom, that might rile the would-be disrupters or upset the sensitive. From the outside, a university might look like it's humming along nicely, even though those inside it are slowly dying of asphyxiation.

Thus, to the claim that for all we know, the vast majority of university administrators are doing their jobs well, a defender of Jonas can respond that for all we know, things are even worse than we've heard.

One might alternatively note against Jonas that protecting and nurturing intellectual community is not the university's administrators' only job. There's also running the place. There's also finding the money in order to keep running the place. Whatever's true, that an average Canadian could keep a modern university afloat isn't. But that wasn't Jonas's contention. Jonas was speaking of the superior values and moral fibre of the average Canadian, not their superior administrative or fund-raising abilities.

The record of either administrative treason against the values of the university or administrative cowardice in face of challenges to them is not short. Just in the past few years we have had officials at the University of Calgary pursuing disciplinary action against students who criticized a professor on Facebook, the letter sent to Ann Coulter by the provost at the University of Ottawa, the policy at Carleton University that restricts protesters' access to the quad, the decision at York University to require a campus group to foot an exorbitant bill for security for an academic event, the banning of political cartoons at both Carleton and Ottawa U, the attempt at Queen's University to have mediators monitor campus conversations for racism and sexism, the attempt by Kwantlen Polytechnic University to stifle research on assisted suicide, the refusal by various universities to stop student councils from discriminating against pro-life and other campus groups..., well, the list goes on.


Of course, we have to add our own administration's intervention against a professor when a few students objected to the cartoons he had on his door, its sanctioning of a formal process into whether his posting of those cartoons harassed anyone (I'm not making this up), its mishandling of a disruptive protest at a campus event (and its mishandling of its mishandling), its unwillingness to hire security for a proposed public debate on multiculturalism...(let's stop here).

Whether through sympathy with this or that social or political programme or mere spinelessness, a great many university administrators have been acting against the ethos of the university as a place of intellectual community.

The practical problem is what to do about it. How can we work to create and preserve universities marked by freedom of expression and freedom of discussion, where controversial themes are welcome, where campus events never fall prey to the heckler's—or the thug's—veto?

By holding administrators accountable for their actions, and by insisting that only people committed to a free campus be hired as administrators in the first place.

Policing administrators is a task for students and professors, primarily for professors. If we professors do not state clearly that we expect a free university and make public our disapproval when our expectations are thwarted, nothing will change. The universities we get stuck with will be the universities we deserve.

# Pro-life Display Forced to Remove Controversial Sign

Last Tuesday, the Student for Life society set up a pro-life public display in the Loyola building, across from Tim Horton's. The display fell into controversy, however, when several students complained of being offended by a sign posted on the display that read, "Women do regret abortions". The group was ordered to remove the sign.

"We showed considerable restraint in how we share our message and were disturbed at how a calm demonstration was challenged because a few people disagreed with the message", says Student for Life society president, Catherine Sanders. Sanders also says that the rest of the display, which lasted from 9:00 AM to 3:00 PM, was

relatively calm.

This incident is one in a series of controversies involving pro-life demonstrations on Canadian university campuses, albeit a minor one. Recently, pro-life demonstrators were arrested at Carleton University after ignoring the University's denial to use the campus quad for a display in which graphic photographs were used. In March, trouble ensued at the University of British Columbia, when pro-abortion protesters caused a disruption at a pro-life demonstration that compared abortions to genocides.

A similar demonstration here, titled "Echoes of the Holocaust", caused controversy in 2009 when protesters disrupted the demonstration, causing it to be shut down.

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## Internet Whistleblower Under Attack

The future of WikiLeaks seems increasingly is uncertain. Its founder, Julian Assange, is a wanted man, its systems are under attack and it is facing condemnation from governments all around the world.

In case you don't know, WikiLeaks is a website dedicated to releasing classified government documents through its website and making them freely available to anyone with internet access.

WikiLeaks recently triggered global governmental alarm by releasing thousands of classified U.S. diplomatic cables. The site has since been under 'virtual' attack by hackers and has been booted from its U.S. server.

"Whatever happens to the domain name and the actual organization, the idea unleashed by WikLeaks is going to continue", said Joshua Benton, director of the Nieman Journalism Lab.

Ben Laurie, a data security expert who advised WikiLeaks before it launched in 2006, agrees.

"The concept is not going to die. It's really hard to keep things shut down if they want to stay up", he said. "Look at everything else people would like not to happen online — phishing, spam, porn. It's all still there".

Very little is known about the



day-to-day functioning of WikiLeaks. It has no headquarters and few if any paid staff. Yet, it does have a famous public face in Julian Assange, a 39-year-old Australian computer hacker with no permanent address. Assange is on the cover of newspapers and magazines around the world, but he has not appeared in public for a

Assange, who is reportedly somewhere in Britain, is the subject of a European arrest warrant issued by authorities in Sweden, where he is accused of rape, sexual molestation and unlawful coercion. On the urging of Swedish authorities, Assange was recently placed on Interpol's list of the most wanted criminals in the world.

If British police arrest him, he will likely be caught up in a lengthy legal fight against extradition, and his ability to operate as the face of WikiLeaks may be curtailed even further.

Assange denies the Swedish charges, which his British lawyer, Mark

Stephens, has said stem from a "dispute over consensual but unprotected sex". Stephens said Assange was happy to speak to Swedish prosecutors and had provided his contact details to authorities there and in Britain.

Assange has also made powerful enemies in the United States, especially since WikiLeaks released thousands of secret diplomatic cables from the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan earlier this year. With the latest leaks, U.S. politicians have called for him to be

prosecuted for espionage. Former Republican vice presidential candidate Sarah Palin asked on Facebook: "Why was he not pursued with the same urgency we pursue al-Qaida and Taliban leaders?"

Assange has acknowledged he has "become a lightning rod".

"In the end, someone must be responsible to the public and only a leadership that is willing to be publicly courageous can genuinely suggest that sources take risks for the greater good". "I get undue attacks on every aspect of my life, but then I also get undue credit as some kind

of balancing force", he said during a question-and-answer session on The Guardian newspaper's website.

As WikiLeaks released the first few

hundred of what it says are a quarter of a million secret diplomatic cables this week, pressure on the site grew. Amazon.com Inc., which had provided WikiLeaks with use of its servers, evicted it on December 1st saying the website had violated its terms of service. The site remains on the servers of its Swedish provider, Bahnhof AB. On December 2nd, WikiLeaks' American domain name system provider withdrew service to the WikiLeaks.org name after it came under concerted cyber-attack. Service provider EveryDNS said the attacks threatened the rest of its network. WikiLeaks responded by moving to a Swiss domain name, WikiLeaks. ch. On December 3rd, the French government moved to ban WikiLeaks

Chased from one country to the next, WikiLeaks also appears perennially cash-strapped, appealing on its website and Twitter for donations to "keep us strong".

from servers in that country.

In an online chat on December 3rd, Assange said that WikiLeaks had taken steps to make sure it was not silenced, sending the "Cablegate" material and other secret documents in encrypted form "to over 100,000 people".

"If something happens to us, the key parts will be released automatically", he said. "History will win". Whatever happens to WikiLeaks, the 'anti-secrecy' cat may be out of the bag. Daniel Schmitt, the former WikiLeaks spokesman, has said he wants to set up a rival secret-spilling site, and others may follow.

"I think the basic concept has a future", said Steven Aftergood, who works on government secrecy policy for the Federation of American Scientists. "Anonymous disclosure of restricted records is easier than it has ever been. The virtues of transparency and government accountability are more widely recognized than they have ever been. Those two factors together provide a foundation for this kind of activity".

"Whether it will be Julian Assange's WikiLeaks or the new German spinoff or another initiative remains to be seen" according to Aftergood.

Benton, director of the Nieman Lab, said that the so called 'Cablegate' means governments will have to develop a response beyond condemnation and legal threats. He compared it to music file-sharing, which was greeted with hostility by a music industry that soon realized it had to develop ways to make money from downloads.

"They (governments) can't think of WikiLeaks as an opponent they need to defeat". "They have to think about how they are going to deal with it", says Benton.

### Massive Volcano Eruption in Ecuador

Ecuador's Tungurahua volcano erupted on December 4th, sending ash and lava spewing nearly a mile into the sky.

Residents evacuated the area after the country's National Agency of Risk Control issued a "red alert". The warning was later downgraded to orange, as the volcano became less active.

Activity at Tungurahua, which means 'throat of fire' in the native Quechua language, peaked on Saturday December 4th between 8 a.m. and 2 p.m., according to the Geological Institute in Quito.

At one point, the ash cloud reached nearly 3 km (1.9 miles) above the volcano's crater, according to the institute, and lava flowed about 2 km from the crater. The volcano is 140 km south of Quito, Ecuador's capital.

The glacier-capped volcano stands five thousand meter high has erupted periodically since 1999 when

increased activity led to the temporary evacuation of the city of Banos at the foot of the volcano. Major eruptions also occurred in August 2006 and February 2008, according to the government's emergency management agency.

Prior to this more recent activity, the last major eruption was between 1916 and 1918. Relatively minor activity continued until 1925, the Smithsonian Institution said on its volcano website.



## Spain Re-opens Airspace

Most of Spain's air traffic controllers have returned to work and airspace has reopened, after a walkout grounded flights and stranded thousands.

The government had imposed emergency measures not seen since military rule ended in 1975, threatening to prosecute workers who refused to end the strike.

Spanish officials said 250,000 people had been affected by the walkout and warned that disruption could continue for up to 48 hours amid a long-running dispute about working hours.

Spanish Minister of Works, Jose Blanco, said the situation was improving, and all Spanish airspace had now reopened.

According to Blanco, "normality will take some time, between 24 and 48 hours, if the controllers return to work as they must".

While Spanish Airport authority AENA said some flights had already begun to leave, many airlines have already cancelled the majority of their flights in and out of the country until Sunday December 7th.

## Ivory Coast Elections produce TWO Presidents

Presidential elections usually have only one winner. Not so it seems in the troubled West African nation of Ivory Coast (aka Cote d'Ivoire). Two rival candidates have both declared themselves victorious and both have been sworn in as the new president.

Incumbent Laurent Gbagbo defied international appeals to step aside and was sworn in as the new president in a formal ceremony inside the presidential palace that was broadcast live on television.

Less than an hour-and-a-half later, his rival, Alassane Ouattara, told reporters that he, too, had taken the oath of office and asked Prime Minister Soro Guillaume to form a new government.

The Constitutional Council declared Gbagbo the winner Friday, invalidating earlier results from the Independent Electoral Commission which handed Ouattara the victory with 54.1% of the vote.

The Constitutional Council said Gbagbo had won the election with 51.45% of the vote to Ouattara's 48.55%. It tossed out votes it said were marred by fraud in northern regions that were considered Ouattara strongholds.

It was the job of Y.J. Choi, the special envoy in the Ivory Coast of U.N. Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon, to review and sign off on the results. Choi said that, even if Gbagbo's complaints were taken into consideration, Ouattara was the winner.

"Having evaluated all the tally sheets, 20,000 of them, we are in a position to know what happened really," Choi said in a telephone interview from Abidjan. "With absolute certainty, we know that Ouattara won the election".

With his credibility in question, Gbagbo defied calls from international leaders to respect the will of Ivorian voters by taking the oath of office in front of a room full of supporters and military commanders.

"These past days I have noticed serious cases of interference", Gbagbo said. "The sovereignty of Cote d'Ivoire, is not negotiable. My responsibility is to defend it".

French President Nicolas Sarkozy appealed for calm and urged military and civilian officials to respect the will of the people.U.S. President Barack Obama warned Gbagbo: "The international community will hold those who act to thwart the democratic process and the will of the electorate accountable for their actions".

Ouattara, a former economist for the International Monetary Fund who served as prime minister, had been banned from previous races. Gbagbo's critics said the incumbent stoked tensions by accusing Ouattara of masterminding the civil war. Ouattara has denied the allegation.

The stage seems to be set for Ivory Coast to devolve into civil war once again as was the case in 2002.

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Orthoptists/ophthalmic medical technologists are allied health professionals who perform a wide range of diagnostic and highly technical procedures and, in consultation with an ophthalmologist, plan, implement and monitor treatment of a wide variety of ocular disorders, including disorders of binocular vision and ocular motility. They are engaged in a wide range of activities including research into ocular motility, education of other eye care professionals, patient education and vision screening.

The program involves 7.5 class credits, two extended practica and a thesis in an area of vision research. Students are permitted to exit the program after two years (prior to completing a Master's thesis) with a Graduate Diploma in Orthoptics and Ophthalmic Medical Technology.

Applications for the MSc (Clinic Vision Science) program beginning in September 2011 are now being accepted. Applicants must hold a four-year bachelor's degree with a minimum B average (GPA 3.0), with at least one undergraduate class in human anatomy and/or physiology, and a class in psychology with a laboratory component. Exceptional students may be accepted without these prerequisites on the condition that they are fulfilled either prior to or concurrent with the program. Work/volunteer experience in the health care field is considered an asset.

Students whose native language is not English must demonstrate the ability to participate in a graduate program conducted in English prior to acceptance into the program. The minimum acceptable score on the TOEFL test is 580 for the written test and 237 for the computer test.

Financial assistance may be available to qualified students.

Deadline for applications is March 1, 2011.

# Credit Cards to be Discontinued

For those of us who pay our tuition through the use of credit cards, such as myself, the title of this article isn't pleasing at all. Yes, these tiny little cards, which have been both a blessing and a curse to so many people, may be knocked out of SMU's system as a way to pay off tuition. This may not be a big deal to students from within the province or even within the country. However, it might be a concern for international students who rely on their parents or their own credit cards to cover the cost of tuition. It also means losing out big time on those hard-to-come-by miles.

For those of you who may not know, credit card companies pocket a certain percentage away from the 'merchant' over each transaction made, usually near 3%. To put things in perspective, the average international student pays around \$12,700, according to SMU's 'Money Matters' web page. So if this average student decides to pay off all of his or her tuition with a credit card: \$381 (12,700 x 0.03) goes to the credit card company. Other than being a

tiny gain for Wall Street, this is also a \$381 loss for the university. Now take into consideration everyone who pays through the use of credit cards, and you've got yourself a huge amount of money; or a huge loss if you're a

With tuition hikes becoming a serious possibility as I reported in last week's issue, the Board of Governors was

summoned to decide on the fate of these tiny 3 by 2 inch pieces of plastic. On Monday, November 29, there was a vote held by the board to decide the fate of credit cards to pay off students' tuition. It all boiled down to either finding some way to increase revenue or offset costs. How SMU would find a way to increase revenue would be to increase tuition, so the board decided to save us from this burden.

66 So is accepting credit cards wasting money or will banning them alienate students?

The Journal did a quick poll around the school and asked students how they paid their tuition fees. Here are the results:

The number of students polled doesn't come anywhere near the total population of Saint Mary's, but it is clear that quite a large number of students do use credit cards to pay off tuition. The students that I talked to showed a great deal of concern. It's a big deal for some international students: "I have a \$1000 transfer limit. How in the hell am I supposed to pay? Make six trips? That lineup is insanely long at the beginning of the year!", "I'm an international student, it's the only way to pay!", "Credit cards all the way, gotta love them air miles," some students were reported saying.

It's an issue for some domestic

students as well. Students are upset that they're losing a convenient way to pay off their tuition. A very common concern is that students have a withdrawal limit on their bank accounts, so they're worried that they won't have an easy method to pay. Laura Prouty, a second year engineering student, said,

"If your loan doesn't come in on time or doesn't cover your tuition fully, it's not like everyone has an extra 5 or 6 grand lying around the house."

So is accepting credit cards wasting money or will banning them alienate students? Whatever the answer might be, the change doesn't happen until January 1 of 2012. If you're really going to be affected by this, I guess you could always pay your tuition in advance (tuition is normally due in the middle of January, you could pay late December and they would have to accept it.). However, before jumping to drastic measures, sources indicate that the university is already working to develop alternate methods to compensate for the future lack of credit cards.

# Christmas Baking Spectacular!

For some, the holiday season represents a quiet time of reflection as one prepares for the year ahead. In my household, the holidays are a time of family, louder family and rich, delicious food. My earliest memories of Christmas were of cooking with my mother on Christmas eve. While the adults nursed their "magic happy coffees", my sisters and I, drinking eggnog in blatant disregard of a pesky little milk allergy, would help cube bread and melt butter and onions for the stuffing, peel vegetables, set tables and, pinnacle of pinnacles, decorate the cookies. In those moments of sticky sweet glory, we were artistic masters working in coloured sugars and sprinkles! To this day, Christmas cookie making is an all day affair. Though I no longer fear the wrath of Santa should I get caught sneaking a bit of cookie dough, I still enjoy spending the time elaborately creating the treats of the season. Here are a few treasures from my family's kitchen. Enjoy with friends and happy holidays!

#### Whipped Shortbread:

There are many types of shortbread. These light as air (despite the whole pound of butter) drop cookies are by far the best I have ever eaten. You can use margarine in a pinch, but I would advise against it. The world is your shortbread - go for the butter!



1 whole pound of delicious butter (2 c), softened till gooey

1 c icing sugar

Preheat the oven to 300. In a very large bowl, beat the butter. Add the remaining ingredients together and whip until very fluffy (about 10 minutes). The batter should be very pale yellow/almost white. Drop by tablespoon onto a parchment paper-lined cookie sheet. If you don't have parchment paper, leave the sheet un-greased.

Bake at 300 20-30 minutes. This recipe makes 4 dozen delicious butter-gems.

For an extra dollop of fantastic, top with a tiny bit of buttercream frosting and red and green glacé cherries.

#### Gingerbread Men, Women and Assorted Holiday Shapes:

This recipe produces a soft, subtly spiced cookie. The fun part is the cutting out. Go ahead - make them

anatomically correct.

½ c butter or margarine 3/4 c sugar 1 egg 2 Tbsp orange juice 2 Tbsp molasses 1 1/2 c flour 1 tsp baking soda 1 tsp cinnamon 1/2 tsp ground cloves

1/2 tsp ground ginger

Beat the butter and sugar until combined. Add the egg, molasses ad orange juice and mix well. In a separate bowl, stir together the dry ingredients. Gradually mix the dry ingredients into the butter mixture until smooth. Cover and chill two hours, or until firm. Preheat the oven to 370 and grease two cookie sheets. Roll out dough on a lightly floured surface to 14" thickness. Cut out desired shapes. If you're decorating your gingerbread creations with coloured sugar, add that

Bake 10-12 minutes.

If icing or melted chocolate is your decorating weapon of choice, wait until the cookies are cooled and then go nuts.

#### **Chocolate Mice Truffles:**

The first year we made these truffles, my Dad cut bite marks into a plate of sugar cookies and strategically placed these mice truffles around the

carnage. These magical Christmas vermin have been a main fixture ever since. This recipe is great for you folks in residence - all you need is a microwave and a fridge!

1 c. chocolate cookie crumbs (buy them - don't try to make them) 4 oz melted semi-sweet chocolate

chips extra chocolate cookie crumbs

slivered, blanched almonds (in the baking aisle)

silver balls (at the Bulk Barn)

Melt the chocolate over low heat until smooth. If you are using the microwave, melt the chocolate 30 seconds at a time, stirring between heatings (burnt chocolate smells worse than burnt popcorn and is more expensive). Stir in the 1 c. of crumbs and the sour cream. Chill 1 hour, or until firm. Roll the mixture 1 teaspoon at a time into ovals, bringing one end to a point.

Roll the balls in the extra crumbs. Each mouse gets 2 silver ball eyes and two almond ears. If you want to be really precise, use thinly slivered black licorice for tails and whiskers.

Cover tightly and refrigerate up to 2 weeks or freeze until needed.

#### Idiot Proof Fudge:

The name says it all. Even my

Grandad, who is notoriously picky with his sweets, likes this incredibly easy recipe for perfect chocolate fudge. This can also be made in a microwave.

18 oz chocolate chips (I use [ semi-sweet, [] milk chocolate) 1 14oz can sweetened condensed milk NOT evaporated milk 1 1/12 tsp vanilla

Melt the chips and sweetened condensed milk over low heat until melted and combined. Remove from heat and stir in vanilla.

Spread the fudge into a tinfoil or wax paper lined 8x8" pan (this will make removing the fudge much easier on you and your bakeware), and chill 2 hours or until set. Cut and enjoy!

#### Variations.

Mint fudge - use all semi-sweet chocolate chips and use mint extract instead of vanilla. Top with crushed up candy canes if you're looking to impress

Peanut butter fudge - use peanut butter chips

Dark chocolate fudge - use half and half bittersweet chocolate and semi-sweet chocolate chips

Super impressive fudge - use rum or any liqueur-flavoured extract instead of vanilla (hazelnut and almond are particularly delicious) and top with chopped nuts.






#### Pencil Ban Lifted in Massachusetts **Elementary School Angela Lindsey**

Wendy Scott, a teacher at North Brookfield Elementary School in Massachusetts, sent a memo to her sixth grade students' parents, informing them that the students are no longer allowed to bring writing utensils to class, but rather that a pencil would be supplied to them during the day and collected before the student returned home for the day.


Broadbent has been suspended due to these "deeply offensive" comments, according to Chartres. "In common with most of the country I share the joy which the news of the engagement has brought.

#### Torrent Sites Seized by United States Government

Closely following the sentencing of the Pirate Bay creators last week, the United States have taken a new approach to shutting down file-sharing websites, seizing the domain names with court-ordered search warrants. It appears that the websites are being taken down with no legal proceedings prior to the shutdown, but rather without the owner even being aware that the action is being taken until the site is already down.

The Department of Homeland Security (DHS) has seized as many as 82 domains directly from the Internet Corporation for Assigned Names and Numbers (ICANN), but is not doing so under the Digital Millennium Copyright Act (DMCA) or the Combating Online Infringements and Counterfeits Act (COICA), despite the fact that these acts were put into place specifically for situations regarding copyright infringement, including illegally shared media files.

The websites and web servers themselves have not been seized, however – simply the domain names themselves. Because of this, many of the sites have turned to Twitter to announce that they have simply relocated to a new domain, most often ending in .info instead of .com, since domains ending in .com are controlled by Verisign, meaning that they are in legal jurisdiction for the United States.

#### Set rules - and stick to them.



# Canada's Economic Action Plan

If aren't aware by now, during the depths of the recession the federal government instituted an economic action plan in order to stimulate the Canadian economy. The purpose of their plan was to stimulate the domestic economy through the establishment of new public infrastructure initiatives which in the process create jobs for Canadians. Through the stimulus package establishments, organizations & governments received free federal funding across the country in order to further enhance Canada's public infrastructure.

By example one has to look no further than our very own campus to see stimulus dollars at work. If you've been around campus lately I'd imagine you've seen the extensive amount of renovations the McNally building is currently undergoing. These improvements were made possible in part by the stimulus package in conjunction with other money. That is to say SMU used money from a capital campaign & they also received provincial funding too. Regardless, some of the money used in order to renovate McNally building was from the federal government's economic action plan. If one were to look even further locally, through Canada's Economic Action Plan the HRM has received approximately \$35 million in funds that have been used to enhance & build upon the current public infrastructure that exists today. These programs can be seen in projects such as the \$10-11 million Ragged Lake tunnel project. Unfortunately the project is running behind schedule and on its current path may have difficulty meeting the March 31st, 2011 completion date. This deadline does not pertain specifically to when the HRM envisions the project will be completed but when federal payments for such projects will stop. Essentially it is a government imposed date that represents the time in which the

federal government had intended to halt funding towards Canada's Economic Action Plan. Thus local governments that seek to use federal money that is needed to complete infrastructure projects must do so by this date or run the risk of not having the luxury of federal funds to pay for them.

As one looks to the horizon & the future of Canada's economic Action Plan, things look bright. Recently while speaking in Mississauga, Ont. Prime Minister Stephen Harper announced his government's intention to push back the official date to when the program was to end to October 31st, 2010.It is uncertain precisely why the government has chosen this path. Regardless, the added timeline of the program will allow projects that may not have been completed to be finished by the extended deadline & paid for by the federal government!

For example, this aids our very own HRM municipal government as it allows for a bit of breathing room as they near the completion dates of their construction projects (i.e. completing the Ragged Lake tunnel project is not nearly as time sensitive now)

It is important to realize that regardless of one's personal opinion of the federal stimulus program has shown that it provides tangible benefits to Canadians. Therefore, I would strongly defend the program. Solely, for informational purposes the Ragged Lake tunnel project or the renovation of McNally tangibly displays the benefits of the program that it creates for Canadians. The program also helps to illustrate the benefit that can be received when the weight of the federal government's pocketbook is thrown behind initiatives designed to enhance the lives of all Canadians. I suppose the best way to appreciate this is to look around at the newly renovated McNally building next time you study there!



critical layers to the NFL. These layers namely, are the players & the owners. Unfortunately, they do not see eye to eye on the economics of the NFL. So with this in mind

the National Football Leagues Players Association (NFLPA) recently sent a one page document to all players informing them to prepare for a lockout March 4th 2011.

The document was sent by NFLPA executive director DeMaurice Smith. In it he said the union had an "internal deadline" for agreeing to a new collective bargaining agreement. Furthermore, he also stated that this deadline had passed.

Given these conditions players have been warned to treat their last 3 game cheque at the end of the season with care. They have been advised to seek guidance from their financial advisors in advance of the lockout & loss of income

The issue of a lockout stems from several issues the two parties can't seem to agree upon. In the near term the league has announced the cancellation of the players health insurance. It seems rather strange

for a sport known for its strength & hardship on the human body to cancel their health care coverage; I wouldn't suggest the NFL does not see the value in covering their players with health insurance. However, it appears the league feels they shouldn't have to

pay for it. They feel the players should be paying for their own coverage.


As we move down the laundry list of issues the players & owners can't agree upon the list becomes rather long. Regardless, there are a few highlights to note. A major area of contention is the length of the season. As it currently stands the owners want to lengthen the season. Essentially they feel the appetite for football in America is great enough to justify a longer season. Additionally their costs would remain virtually unchanged



while their sources of revenue would rise. To illustrate this point, the owners will have already paid their players under via their contracts & the stadium will have been built & paid for. Thus adding games to the season provides incremental revenue they wouldn't have otherwise.

Regardless of what happens it will be interesting to see how the matter is resolved. The future of the NFL in the near term is in question, surely. However in the long term the NFL has a place in the

landscape of professional North American sports. Will the NFLPA learn a lesson from the NHLPA, in that while lockouts may work to prove a point or improve working conditions & wages but they also come with consequences. These ramifications might be viewed through diminished public opinion & respect. I hope a lockout can be avoided, because, well on Sunday's I want to watch DA BEARS!



# Renewable Energy; Solutions, not just hot air

Almost 80 percent of the electricity produced in Nova Scotia comes from imported Coal. Originally the plan for coal power was largely based on the fact that we had coal resources right here in the province, therefore it made sense to use local resources to generate energy and to create jobs at the same time. Now, we import coal from outside of Nova Scotia, and are tied to fluctuations in price. Currently coal, despite it's price variations, is still the cheapest source of electricity in Nova Scotia. The issue with our continued coal usage is the renewable and emissions targets that have already been set. In April 2010 the Nova Scotia Government announced a target of 40% renewable energy target by 2020. It would be wasteful and fiscally irresponsible to abandon coal immediately as a source of power generation. But what do we do to meet our renewable targets? Wind energy is an increasingly popular option, at least in part, to meet that target.

The implications for wind power is that there must be a fast and reliable method for supplementing wind during the instances of low power generation that will invariably arise. The current system uses a 'day ahead' model of power usage predictions. Temperature, sunset and other variables that would impact power usage can be used reliably to predict what the energy demands would be on any given day. Wind is not nearly as predictable, with day-ahead predictions being nearly three times less accurate than hour-ahead predictions. Nova Scotia's current coal powered plant is not flexible enough to respond quickly. An error in wind forecast, for example, could not be compensated for by increasing energy output in the coal plant, whereas it would take hours to increase that output of coal. The current idea is to use natural gas generators to make up for any shortfalls. It is a fossil fuel, but it burns cleaner than both coal and oil.

A common misconception of electricity by the public is that is stored in batteries. The reality is that any power being used from the Nova Scotia grid is being generated that very moment. The best example of energy storage widely used in Canada is hydro. Water is held in reserve, and when met with a need, can be put through a turbine to generate electricity. This is used in Quebec, whereas they have

an abundance of hydro power. This is not easily implemented in Nova Scotia, having markedly less Hydro generation opportunities. With the current technology of batteries it would not be realistic to store and maintain the amounts of power necessary to keep an intermittent source of power steady. The cost would be prohibitive, and the maintenance of them problematic. Newfoundland's hydro will be a useful way to steady wind's variability; Nova Scotia will be getting an undersea cable from Newfoundland at the cost of 1.2 billion dollars; that deal will be Danny Williams' legacy having signed it before resigning. It will be payed for by Emera, and 20% of the energy that flow through it will belong to Nova Scotia for the next 35 years.

Due to the variable nature of wind energy, and a lack of storage options, wind power must be farmed from multiple locations in order to keep a reasonably steady source of power. By having more than one wind generation station, the variability of weather can be somewhat lessened. There are several key locations where wind generation is feasible where a minimum of new power lines are required. The developments of these areas would be relatively small, and placed close to existing transmission lines in order to mitigate the considerable costs of building more transmission lines. In South Nova, Upper Annapolis and Halifax Metro, connecting wind projects would be the lowest cost, in the range of tens of millions of dollars in each case. Nothern Nova Scotia would need infrastructure improvement costing around \$100 million, and the feasible areas near the Canso Strait and southern shore of Cape Breton would range from \$200-250 million.

What would this mean for ratepayers? Any amount of increase of costs equals and increase in rates. There is no 'secret stash' of money that is available to build windmills, or undersea power cables. Whereas coal is the cheapest source of energy, anything we do to displace it will ir crease our power bill. The reason we had coal to begin with was to keep costs low; environmental concerns around global warming was what prompted this change, and the initial resistance against it on a political level was the fact that it would increase costs. However, we can take some comfort in the fact that we are investing in future generations, instead of selfishly wasting the resources we

13. **The Killers** (with Elton John and Neil Tennant) – "Joseph, Better You than Me" (2008)


I dismissed this song for quite a while as product, but it turns out to be pretty thoughtful. The Killers have recorded Christmas singles each year for the last four years.
