

Writing Centre's Tip of the Week

Midterms are over, but it's not time to relax yet. Convinced that you've got lots of time to start those big term papers or assignments looming a few weeks or a month away? Better think again. Want to save yourself a ton of frustration and sleep deprivation later? Start working on them now. I find it's really helpful to make a huge project into smaller, more manageable chunks. That way, you can work on it over a longer period of time, and won't find yourself trying to research and write the thing the night before

Day 1: Come up with your topic, start researching ideas.

Day 2: Narrow that topic and focus your ideas. Create an effective thesis statement, and plan for the paper.

Day 3: Make a detailed outline for each paragraph. Include your points and any quotes that you'll need.

Day 4 - 5: The brain work is already done! Follow that outline and start the rough draft.

Day 6: Complete the rough draft and take a breather.

Day 7: PROOF READ! A good way to do this is to read out loud: you hear mistakes before you see them.

Day 9: Start on that final draft, be sure to include those revisions. Day 10: Complete and hand it in.

You're Done!

A good thing to remember is to be sure to reward yourself when you finish each section of your paper or assignment. Go for a walk or watch some TV. Just do something to get your mind off the assignment so you'll have time to decompress.

I know it sounds like something that we've been told time and again, but trust me - it does make a difference. Another good idea after each small section that you finish, if you're wondering about your writing, drop into the Writing Centre and talk to a Writing Assistant. They can provide a pair of fresh eyes to look at your work with you to improve those writing skills.

Earthquake, Volcano & Tsunami Parcel Bomb Suspect Arrested Kill Hundreds in Indonesia

"in less than 10 minutes after the earthquake, the entire village of Monai was literally washed away by the 10 meter high tsunami"

directly from the script for the movie "2012", a massive earthquake that then caused a tsunami has hit Indonesia's islands and to top it all off a volcano erupts the next day spewing lava and ash into the sky and onto the ground.

Hundreds have been killed, left homeless or reported missing and thousands evacuated after a magnitude 7.7 earthquake hit Indonesia and caused a tsunami on October 25. A day later Mount Merapi, located on the outskirts of Yogyakarta city on Java Island, erupted killing at least 35

The US Geological Survey says the massive quake hit at 9:42PM local time and its epicenter was located 240 km west of Sumatra at a depth

According to reports coming out of Indonesia, a tsunami alert was issued almost immediately after the quake struck. The alert came too late for many; in less than 10 minutes after the earthquake, the entire village of Monai was literally washed away by the 10 meter high tsunami.

The majority of the 400 plus death

toll has been attributed to the tsunami and not the quake itself.

Indonesian government officials are struggling to cope with the intensity and scale of the disaster. Rescue and humanitarian aid efforts have been severely hampered by rough seas that forced boats and ships carrying aid and relief supplies to turnaround.

Mount Merapi erupted again on October 28, covering many villages with hot ash and forcing evacuations. An estimated 40,000 people have been left homeless, displaced or evacuated because of the devastating natural disaster.

Indonesia sits on the Pacific "Ring of Fire" and is prone to earthquakes and volcanic eruptions. Mount Merapi killed 1,300 people in 1930.

In December 2004, a tsunami caused by an earthquake of more than magnitude 9 off Sumatra's coast killed more than 226,000 people. It was the deadliest tsunami on record Indonesian President Susilo Bambang Yudhoyono, who had been due to take part in a summit of Asian leaders in Hanoi, flew back to Indonesia to meet with disaster survivors.

Officials in Yemen have arrested an unidentified woman in connection with a suspected terrorist plot.

Acting on information from United Arab Emirates and U.S. officials, Yemeni President Ali Abdullah Saleh ordered the arrest of the woman who was residing at a house in Yemin's capital city Sanaa.

Authorities in Dubai had earlier intercepted a suspicious package aboard a FedEx aircraft headed for the U.S. Another package was also found at an airport in the East Midlands region of north London in the U.K. before it could be loaded onto a UPS aircraft.

British Home Secretary Theresa May has said that the targets of the plot could have been an aircraft.

"I can confirm that the device was viable and could have exploded", said May in a press conference following

an emergency cabinet meeting.

The devices found in both packages are reported to contain the chemical Pentaerythritol tetranitrate (PETN) which is on of the most powerful types of plastic explosives. The PETN was packed into toner cartridges. While U.S. officials have confirmed that both packages were destined for Jewish synagogues in Chicago, it is still unclear whether the intended targets were the aircrafts or the synagogues.

U.S. Secretary of Homeland Security Janet Napolitano has said that the plot "has the hallmarks of al-Qaeda" and U.S. President Barack Obama

said that the coordinated attacks "credible terrorist threat"

In the wake of the discovery of the plot, both the U.K. and U.S. governments have placed an indefinite ban on all airfreight originating in

News of the thwarted alleged terror plot comes on the heels of a European terror threat alert. U.S. and European authorities had advised tourists and locals to be particularly observant and aware of their surroundings amidst fears of a Mumbai style terror attack.

Onlookers are now wondering if this most recently uncovered plot is cause to breathe a sigh of relief or if it's just a precursor of worse things to come as Al-Qaeda steps up its anti-American rhetoric.

Prison Pub-Crawl Anyone?

You may have noticed the signs around campus in the weeks leading up to Halloween advertising the largest pub-crawl in the city for students. Well it may not be a surprise to most that that pub-crawl was being put on by High Impact promotions, owned and operated by Jonathan DeYoung, who is well known among avid party goers in this city. His company is also responsible for the event known as the "world's biggest pub-crawl", which has become an annual summer stable in this city. It has become a symbol of excessive drinking and foolishness that this city has become so famous for. What you may not be aware of is the past week Mr. DeYoung was arrested by the HRPD and is being charged with 164 counts of fraud, forgery and identity theft. Mr. DeYoung was arrested October 22nd when police searched his Gladstone apartment and found a large amount of incriminating evidence there.


Many may be asking yourself how

such a respected member of society (ya right) could be accused of such a large amount of crimes, most of which are of a very serious nature, and could result in a very lengthy jail sentence. Well, Mr. DeYoung's defense attorney has requested that Mr. DeYoung be sent to the East Coast Forensic Hospital so that he can undergo psychiatric evaluations. He is claiming that Mr. DeYoung cannot be held criminally responsible for his actions due to a longstanding and preexisting mental disorder. Whether or not this is the case is up for the courts and the psychiatric professionals at the East Coast faculties to decide, but this type of move is questionable given the success of Mr. DeYoung's business and reports that have been gathered about his person and actions from various persons who know him.

Specifically, the police found several pieces of incriminating evidence, which they displayed for the media following his highly publicized arrest.

First, they found the actual machine that DeYoung is suspected of using to produce an unkown number of fake pieces of identification. They also seized at least 11 pieces of identification at that location, many of which contained information for actually people from this area and from other various locations in Canada. DeYoung also stands accused of having fraudulently obtained at least three payday loans from businesses in Halifax. He is also accused of having sold several people's I.D. from one end of Nova Scotia to the other.

Whatever the outcome of these legal proceeding they should certainly be of interest to students (I suppose especially those students who enjoy going on pub-crawls). This certainly will come as a surprise to many students who frequently engage in activities organized by High Impact Promotions.



Possible 20% Spending Cuts: Halifax School Board

The chair of the Halifax Regional School Board has expressed optimism that Nova Scotia school boards may not have to implement a 20 % budget

Boards across the province received a planning document from the provincial government last week that

suggests cuts totaling as much as 22 % over three years.

Halifax chair Irvine Carvery doesn't believe that's going to happen.

"It is a big number, but I don't believe that that's the number that is going to be reflected in our budgets," he said. "We have to remember that this is a planning exercise. I believe the

government and the department are looking for us to let them know what the impact would be and then base their decision on that impact."

Education Minister Marilyn More has said that with an enrollment drop of 35,000 students over the last decade, cost-saving scenarios have to be explored.

Palin for President in 2012?

Controversial, outspoken, opinionated, politically inept, popular and beautiful are all words that have been used to describe former vicepresidential candidate Sarah Palin.

At age 42 Palin became the youngest person and first female Governor of Alaska in 2006. Palin's subsequent surprise selection as John McCain's vice presidential running mate in 2008 catapulted her onto the national U.S. political scene. Over the course of the presidential campaign Palin would go on to capture worldwide media attention, usually for all the wrong reasons.

Unlike most politicians, it seems that Palin's defeat in the presidential campaign has made her even more popular. At a time when many republican voters in the U.S. think that their party has strayed away from the basic GOP principles, Palin represents a breath of unabashed political fresh air. The self-described "hockey mom" of five has played up her connection to the "grass roots" of the conservative right wing.

Almost immediately after the McCain-Palin ticket lost in 2009, political pundits having been asking the same question: will she or won't she run for president in 2012. Well they are now that much closer to getting a definite answer to that question.

In a recent speech at a conference In California Palin told the crowd of about 10,000 "We cannot undo the damage done by the Obama agenda until we replace Obama himself",

New Leader for Progressives in NS

Jamie Baillie, Nova Scotia's new Progressive Conservative leader, the only person who ran for the job, has promised to repeal a controversial sales tax hike and bring back a balanced budget law if elected premier.

Jamie Baillie told delegates at a party convention that he would reverse the HST increase brought in by the NDP only when the budget is balanced. "We will roll back that two per cent HST hike the NDP used to pay for their misplaced priorities", "Balanced budget first, lower taxes second. I believe that is the responsible way to go about dealing with the financial health of the province" he told a crowd in Halifax as he was officially named leader of the Conservatives.

"These two elections, 2010 and 2012, go hand-in-hand. ... The theme of 2010 has got to be rebuke their errors, reject, repeal; and then the theme of 2012 — it's renew, revive and restore".

In an even more recent interview with Entertainment Tonight when asked about the 2012 elections Palin said "If there's nobody else to do it, then of course I would believe that we should do this".

Palin has been building her "brand" and gaining political capital through her alignment with the Tea Party Movement, an ultra conservative grass roots group. Palin's endorsement of key Tea Party candidates, such as Delaware Republican Senate candidate Christine O'Donnell, have paid big political dividends with 67% of her endorsees winning in these 2010 elections.

So with increasing popularity, political brand equity and an apparent vacuum with the GOP of credible candidates to run against Obama, is Palin really the GOP's best shot at putting republican in the Whitehouse in

Well, maybe...or maybe not.


Looking back on the 2008/2009 presidential campaign there are some very valuable lessons to be learned. Hillary Clinton was hugely popular, much more so than Palin, and widely favoured to win her party's nomination. Yet that was before a spoiler appeared in the formof Barack Obama, almost out of nowhere.

If Hillary Clinton, one of Washington's most shrewd political power players, couldn't become the first female president in U.S. history, then what makes Palin think that she

Palin has argued that Americans are tired of the ever expanding Obama government and their Wall Street bailouts. She argues that "common sense" American voters are going make their voices heard and votes counted both in these 2010 and the upcoming 2012 elections.

She could be right.

The Obama administrations campaign slogan of "change you can believe in" is now generally seen as having promised more that it has actually



delivered. Unemployment is at an all time Post World War II high at 9.6% and most Americans don't "feel that the economic stimulus package is working". Obama's Whitehouse is facing midterm elections that will most likely see the House, and maybe the Senate, revert to Republican

While a lot has changed in the last two years and even will change in the next two, it is still very early to be making 2012 election predictions. Just as Obama did in 2008, some unknown republican politician may emerge to stun the Washington establishment. Or Obama himself may prove to be a much more difficult incumbent to dislodge than many are giving him credit. Even Obama's most ardent detractors would admit that he is one of the best campaigners ever in U.S. national politics; he has that certain indescribable gift for delivering inspiring and motivational speeches. Obama has "gravitas", something political commentator and former senior adviser to President George W Bush, Karl Rove says Palin lacks.

In an interview with the Daily Telegraph he questioned whether Americans thought she had the "gravitas" for the "most demanding job in the world". He also questioned her recent decision to make a television reality travel programme about Alaska, saying the publicwould struggle to see the star of such a show in the Oval Office. Yet there is something to be said for TV personalities and politics in America.

Let's also not forget that Americans

like to elect "popular" people to public office. Former professional wrestler Jesse Ventura was elected Governor of Minnesota in 1999; former bodybuilder and actor Arnold Schwarzenegger was elected Governor of California in 2003 and former President Ronald Reagan was also an actor.

Rove may have a point, but, and this is a serious but, most Americans probably don't even know what "gravitas" means. But they do know that they do understand Palin's simple, down to Earth populist rhetoric. Sometimes that's all that is needed, along with lots of money, to become president in the land of the free and the home of the brave.

The media frenzy surrounding Palin's potential presidential candidacy also provides Canadians with a new reason to reopen the discussion about women in politics here in Canada. Canada's only female Prime Minister, Kim Campbell, only held the office for 6 months and never sat in Parliament as prime minister since her term began during the summer vacations and ended with the elections in fall.

With the political furor that both Hillary Clinton and Sarah Palin have been able to generate in the U.S., one has to wonder why Canada has yet to produce a female politician who can do the same on a national level within Canada as well as internationally outside of Canada.

Wouldn't it be really very interesting to have a female prime minister sitting in the Canadian Parliament?

Argentina & Barbados Mourn death of National Leaders

Former Argentine President Nestor Kirchner has died of a heart attack at age 60.

Kirchner's death has elicited an outpouring of national sympathy as large crowds turned out to pay their last respects as Kirchner's coffin was taken to the airport to be flown to his home town Rio Gallegos.

Current President Cristina Fernandez de Kirchner was joined by other South American leaders, including Hugo Chavez of Venezuela and Brazilian President Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva as Kirchner was buried in Rio Gallegos.

The Kirchner's had faced a great deal of criticism for appearing to circumvent the constitutional limit on two consecutive terms by alternately running for election to the

presidency. Just as Mr. Kirchner stood aside for his wife in 2007, it was widely thought that Mrs. Kirchner would step back and allow her husband to run in the October 2011 election.

The former president, who ran the country from 2003 to 2007, was his wife's chief political strategist after she succeeded him, and was also secretary general of the Union of South American Nations (UNASUR). Brazilian President Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva is widely expected to replace Kirchner as secretary general of UNASUR. Kirchner's death has created a power vacuum and a looming sense of political uncertainty for Argentina in the midst of a worldwide economic recession.

The island nation of Barbados is

also still reeling from the untimely death of Prime Minister David John Howard Thompson at age 48. Thompson, who had been battling with pancreatic cancer since early in the year, died at home on October

Thompson, the sixth prime minister of Barbados, was born on 25 December 1961 in England but grew up in Barbados. After a career in law he entered politics, winning a by-election for the Democratic Labour Party in 1987. He became head of the DLP in the early 1990s and was elected prime minister in January of 2008.

Thompson's death strikes a serious blow to Barbados as the country struggles to deal with the impact of the global economic crisis that

has had devastating effects on many Caribbean nations.

Denzil Douglas, the prime minister of St Kitts and Nevis, said Mr Thompson's death was a loss "not only the people of Barbados, but also the people of the Caribbean".

Barbados Governor General Sir Clifford Husbands has appointed the attorney general and Deputy PM Freundel Stuart to head the government until elections in 2012.

The Cranky Professor

The quality of public writing at Saint Mary's is dismally low. Should we care? If we should care, what can we do about it?

Let's begin with a few examples. Plaques in the classrooms instruct us what to do "In case of an emergency," rather than simply in an emergency. For about a year, a sign in the McNally Building advertised "accessible access" to the science building. Take a look at any of the plaques in front of the trees on campus. I haven't read one that wasn't incomprehensible, ungrammatical, or uproarious. (The title of this article is taken from the plaque describing an Ironwood tree.)

"Please note that the names of graduates listed in this program are subject to revision." That's from the Fall Convocation booklet. (I suspect it's the list that's subject to revision.)

Writing is bad just about everywhere on campus. It's not just signs and plaques. We can find bad writing in campus publications and university memos. Professors and administrators contribute more of it than do students.

Now of course not all public writing

at Saint Mary's is flat, insipid, or ungrammatical. "This Week at Saint Mary's," for instance, is usually clear, direct, and easy to read. Our Academic Calendar is better written than one might expect, though it wouldn't hurt to turn it over to a good copy editor for a final revision. Nonetheless, one cannot spend a day on campus without encountering writing that is poor or worse.

It's not hard to write well, especially when you are writing just to convey directions or information. There are easy rules to follow that almost ensure that one's writing will be easy to read and that it will mean (only) what one wants it to mean. Write simply and directly. Pay attention to the most literal meanings of one's words. Use the active voice. (The first two sentences of this paragraph violate this rule.) No more than one adjective or adverb per sentence. That's about it.

Should we care about bad public writing? That is, should we care to complain about it, and should writers and administrators, whoever is responsible for campus signs, memos, and publications, heed our complaints?

As writers, we care to write well because we want to be understood

and enjoyed. As readers, we want to understand what we read and we want not to be pained while reading it. Of course, we like also to be entertained, and this creates a dilemma for us. The plaques in front of the trees are certainly amusing. Yet those who wrote and erected them meant to inform us about the trees. If our amusement distracts us from learning, the writers failed to do what they wanted.

What to do about bad public writing? We don't want to be nags, and, anyway, complaining won't work unless the people we complain to care. They might not care. That they don't care is evinced simply by the extent of the problem. If bad public writing on campus doesn't matter to editors and

administrators, then we might as well give up and get used to it.

But it's possible that it does matter to them, or, at least, that it would matter to them if we complained, louder and more often.

Here's my suggestion. Take a photo of a sign or plaque you'd be embarrassed to have written. Send it by email to the president, to the academic vice-president, to a dean or two, and maybe to some other senior administrators. Simply ask that they replace that sign or plaque with a well-written one.

When it comes to memos and campus publications, the matter is a bit trickier. We don't want to favour

style over content, we don't want to be pedantic, we don't want to rag on people for their innocent mistakes, and we certainly don't want to foist our preferences on others. (We're happy, of course, to discuss the merits and demerits of our different preferences. This should be done in the spirit of creating and refining our particular voices, not in the spirit of correction.)

So stick to obvious problems in syntax and clarity. Direct your comment to the editor of the publication rather than to the author. Send it privately. Don't expect a response, but send a thank you should you receive one.

Let's see what happens.

Ghana Internship: an unforgettable experience

I had never heard of Kintampo, Ghana before this summer, despite a local monument's claim to it being "The Centre of Ghana and the *Universe*." Now, I'll never forget it. I worked there for three months with the Kintampo Health Research Centre on an internship funded by the Canadian International Development Agency's Students for Development Program. And it was definitely memorable.

I helped with an ongoing epidemiological study of malaria in pregnant women and their children. In brief, malaria is an infectious disease caused by blood parasites and transmitted by mosquito vectors. It causes various symptoms, including fever, vomiting, headache, and results in 3,000 deaths worldwide daily, the majority in sub-Saharan Africa. Pregnant women and children are particularly vulnerable.

The study I worked on intends to establish baseline malaria prevalence for a birth cohort from birth to two years in the Kintampo and Nkoranza districts of Ghana's Brong-Ahafo Region. It also investigates whether malaria during pregnancy affects children's susceptibility to malaria in infancy. Eventually, the results will be used for malaria vaccine studies and medical care decisions.

This was my first time staying in a "developing" country as well as being involved first-hand in public health research. I was hooked. For the first half of my internship, I worked with the fieldwork coordination team. In our Land Cruiser with an expert driver endearingly known as "Ajuma Wura" (Hard Worker in Twi, the most common traditional Ghanaian language), we braved bumpy, washed out roads whose "puddles" we nicknamed after the Great Lakes ("No, I don't think Lake Toronto is one of them").

We visited remote, often impoverished study communities where the children appeared in hoards to chase, glimpse, or stroke the hair of the elusive "obruni" (white person). There we resolved participant issues, including blood draw refusal and data inconsistencies. We also discussed logistical strategies with fieldworkers, Ghanaians in their early twenties hired to live in the communities, collect monthly blood samples, and visit the study participants daily to ensure their health. Occasionally, we transported sick study participants to hospitals in neighbouring cities.

I also helped plan and administer a qualitative study on insecticide-treated net use among pregnant women. I was interested to learn about their commitment to ensuring the health of their families. When not in the field, I worked in the nearby clinic where study mothers bring their babies for sample collection and free medical treatment when they're suspected of having malaria.

After somehow maintaining my pallid complexion despite spending most days under the scorching sun (maybe it was the layers of SPF60?), I spent the second half of the summer training in the Centre's air-conditioned lab. There, blood and tissue samples

from various studies are processed.

Circulating through the hematology, parasitology, bacteriology, and chemistry units, I learned a variety of skills: I can now confidently identify malaria species in blood samples by microscope (unfortunately— orrather, fortunately-not so useful in Canada). Those nights, asleep under my bed net, I dreamt of floating Plasmodium falciparum trophozoite rings. I also know some of the methods used to diagnose bacterial infections. All I need is Gram stains, a microscope, hydrogen peroxide, and a bit of your urine to let you know if you likely have a Staphylococcus or Streptococcus infection.

Overall, the internship was an invaluable experience. It has enhanced my understanding of development issues and international health research. It also changed my career goals—I'm now considering a degree in Public Health next year.

If you're a student interested in an amazing summer doing work in a

developing country related to their degree, check out the Students for Development program. It funds three to six month internships in developing countries for students in 3rd and 4th year undergrad through to PhD students. Each year, the internships address different priorities; this year, they were increasing food security, stimulating sustainable economic development, and securing the future of children and youth (mine fit into the latter). Labour Day reflections: Our prejudice is showing

On Labour Day, we will be obliged to cast our minds to the triumphs and travails of working people. There is much to be alarmed about, as average earnings in Nova Scotia have dropped over the past 25 years as productivity has risen. But for one group of Nova Scotian workers, insult is added to injury. There are more than 19,000 African Nova Scotians. Their rate of unemployment is 15 per cent higher than among whites. Not only that, but when African Nova Scotians with university degrees do find jobs, they are paid \$10,000 less, on average, than other Nova Scotians. These startling figures come from the provincial government's Office of African Nova Scotian Affairs, and no matter what numbers you look at, it doesn't look good for African Nova Scotians.

The 2006 Canadian census tells us that more than 12,500 (of the 19,000) African Nova Scotians live in metro Halifax. They represent about four per cent of the population of metro. But results of my recent investigation paint a gloomy picture of African NovaScotians'employmentprospects. A count of visible minorities working at the "front of the shop" retail sales at over 300 establishments in HRM reveals that out of 965 people, only 23 or 2.3 per cent are African Nova Scotian. African Nova Scotians are under-represented by 42.5 per cent.

A look through scores of newspaper articles strongly suggests a reason

for this gross disparity: good, oldfashioned discrimination. Let's consider the HRM alone as an employer:

- In 2009, Charles Adams, the only black building inspector in his HRM office, complained to the Nova Scotia Human Rights Commission that he was subject to a "threatening, harassing and discriminative work environment." For example, an emailed message sent to Adams and his co-workers during African Heritage Month noted that one Monday was National Breast Day, and "we would rather have National Breast Day than Martin Luther King's birthday any day. Ha-ha-ha. Pass it on."

- In 2009, a group of black firefighters attended a closed-door HRM council meeting to present evidence of discrimination on the job; they also contacted the Human Rights Commission.

- In late 2008, Sgt. Robyn Atwell, a black police officer in HRM, filed a human rights complaint detailing racism and sexism by her co-workers.

- In 2008, Royce Hellesoe, an African Nova Scotian who had worked for HRM for four years as an outside worker, complained to the Human Rights Commission that a co-worker had called him the "N" word and that his co-workers and supervisors told racially offensive jokes. He also complained that he was denied better positions which were given to white employees - though he had more

seniority.


- In 2007, black constable Lewis Cain claimed he suffered discrimination from co-workers and supervisors in the HRM police force and was fired; he launched a human rights complaint.

- Mary Harnish, a civilian employee with the HRM police, filed a human rights complaint in 2005. She alleged that co-workers made racist comments to her on the job, causing her to quit

- In 2002, the late Randolph Symonds, who worked for Metro Transit, filed a human rights complaint that he was targeted and harassed by co-workers because of the colour of his skin. It was settled behind closed doors.

What can we take from these facts as Labour Day approaches? We Nova Scotians like to think of Scotians like to think of ourselves as "good people" who do not discriminate. But it has been 30 years since "adverse intent" - the excuse that we did not intend to discriminate - was dropped from human rights adjudication. If discrimination happens, no matter the intent, we can be held responsible.

We do not have to look too far to see that we Nova Scotians are part of the problem. For instance, the mere idea of a designated seat on HRM council for an African Nova Scotian councillor has been met byan embarrassing surfeit of derision and anger. I daresay our prejudice is showing.

Actroid-F, made by Japanese robot maker Kokoro, has been billed by Guinness World Records as the "first true android". There are videos on Kokoro's website showing the robot replicating the operator's facial expressions and body movements. Actroid-F made a public showing in Tokyo dressed as a nurse.

A **3G** base station has now been installed by **TeliaSonera** subsidiary **Ncell** at 5,200 meters (17,000 feet) which will reach the peak of **Mount Everest**. This will allow climbers to surf the internet from the peak, as well as make 3G video calls.

Mars rover Spirit had its wheels broken through the crust of the sand pit known as "Troy" in April 2009, and NASA gave up on extracting the rover in January 2010. However, the spinning of the wheels exposed soil which indicates that the surface of Mars may actually be wet. In the newly exposed surface layers, minerals such as hematite, silica and gypsum were revealed, which do not dissolve easily in water. However, under the surface, centimeters below the crust, it was revealed that iron sulfate minerals existed, which are minerals that dissolve easily in water. Scientists are hoping that Spirit comes out of hibernation when Martian spring arrives next month, but since the

solar panels were facing from the sun during the winter hibernation and Mars sat through colder temperatures than ever before, chances are slim.

China has passed the US and the rest of the world with the reveal of the world's fastest supercomputer. The Tianhe-1A in Tianjin has achieved this record by using 7,168 NVIDIA Tesla M2050 GPUs and 14,336 Intel Xeon CPUs consuming 4.04 megawatts

A 22-year-old mother from Jacksonville, Florida pleaded guilty to second-degree-murder after her 3-month-old son interrupted her Farmville game. She claims that she shook the baby, smoked a cigarette "to compose herself" and proceeded to shake the baby again. She believes that the baby may have hit his head during one of the two shakings.

2K Games has announced a retraction of its previous announcement stating that the downloadable content for BioShock 2 would not be coming to PC, and have re-started development on these expansions. According to the developer, The Protector Trials should be expected sometime inDecember, but there is no timeframe for Minerva's Den.

A study at Vanderbilt University in

Nashville has revealed that even when a typing error is corrected before it appears on a screen, subjects' fingers automatically slowed down after mistyping a word. The typist wasn't explicitly aware of any mistakes that they had made, but their fingers automatically wanted to correct the error. Psychologist Robert Logan says that this change in timing reflects a type of automatic performance assessment. "The body is doing one thing and the mind is doing another," he says. "What we found was that the fingers knew the truth."

A DOS emulator, developed by FastIntelligence and known as iDOS was briefly released for iOS, but was removed within a few hours of release. It seems that the reason for removing this emulator is simply because it is an emulator. Germ-Free Devices

Flu season is creeping up on us, and with advances in technology, we find ourselves using touch-screen devices daily, as well as community keyboards at the computer labs here on campus. A study by Stanford University students claims that your phone is covered with 18 times more germs than a toilet handle! The study also found that if you put a virus on a surface, such as that of an iPhone, about 30 percent of the virus will get on your fingertips. From here, the virus can reach your eyes, mouth or nose, all of which are the most likely routes of infection.

Because of this, it is suggested that we take as many precautions as possible to avoid getting these viruses. The most obvious point to make is to wash your hands! Not just after using the bathroom or before eating (though you definitely want to do that) but especially after using something that is shared by the community: computers, public transportation, or a vending machine, to name a few.

You also want to do your best to keep your mobile devices clean and germ-free. Most of these gadgets come with cleaning instructions in the package, but there are a few general rules of thumb to follow when cleaning them.

Use alcohol or disinfectant sparingly. This advice is a bit controversial, because many items, especially those with touch-screens, are prone to damage from alcohol-based cleaners or disinfectants. If you are unsure of whether you can safely use these products on your gadget, go the safe route and use a slightly damp (not wet) lint-free cloth. If you are able to use alcohol-based products, it's recommended that you use the bottled liquid and not pre-soaked wipes. This will allow you to better control the concentration of the product, and use it in small doses.

Use screen protectors, and change them often. Screen protectors allow you to use alcohol-based cleaners on items that you wouldn't normally be able to, and give you a chance to take them off and put on a new one when you feel you've used it for long enough. The idea of being able to literally start fresh when you want to is wonderful, and also helps keep your screen scratch-free.

Clean the entire device. Don't forget about the back or buttons – use a cloth on them as well. Be careful



of getting any liquid cleaner in the working parts. Most places recommend that around buttons (such as the menu button on your iPhone) you use a dry, dust-free cloth, simply to avoid any drips that would cause the button to stop functioning.

Research your options. There are many products on the market to help clean your mobile devices, from the Violight UV Cellphone Sanitizer (a device with two ultraviolet lamps to stop germs from replicating) to sprays designed specifically for cleaning iPhones and other touch screens. Always do your research, though, and if you're feeling unsure of the safety of a cleaner, opt for the safe choice – dust-free cloth and lots of hand-washing!



Death, Disease and Access: The Issues around Access to Water and Basic Sanitation

Imagine turning on your tap one morning and not a drop of water trickles out. Your initial reaction would probably be to scratch your head and wonder what is going on! WTF is the water? Now, just for a moment think about all the things that you're not going to be able to do because you have no water; flush your toilet, brew your morning coffee, brush your teeth, take a shower, make breakfast and the most obvious, drink water. Now imagine that the only option you had was to walk 6 miles to the nearest source of clean water to get the water you needed to carry on with your day. How are you going to get to class, work or do anything else for that matter? Not a good start to your day, now is it? It may not be for you, but this is reality for nearly one billion people all over the world, that's about one seventh of the world's population.

Yet we, and by we I mean people here in North America, take for granted that we can turn our taps and have access to clean drinkable water at our own whim. Unlike us, they live in fear of the water they do have; and the lack of sanitation facilities is making things even worse. Just imagine if there were no toilets and all of our human waste was just running off into our water supply? Well, sadly



for 2.6 billion people who have no access to basic sanitation facilities, that's also reality.

Here are some quick facts about the current global situation; In Africa, 300 million people—40 per cent of the population—lives without basic sanitation and hygiene, people spend 40 billion hours every year just walking for water, most of which is unsafe to drink anyway. Water- and sanitationrelated diseases are responsible for 80 per cent of illnesses and deaths in the developing world, killing a child every eight seconds. At any given time, half the world's hospital beds are occupied by people suffering from water-and sanitation-related diseases. Every week, nearly 38,000 children under

the age of 5 die from unsafe drinking water and unhygienic living conditions. I could go on, but I think you get the point.

In light of these issues, the UN General Assembly has declared that access to safe, clean drinking water and sanitation is a human right; one that is vital to the full enjoyment of life and all other human rights. A basic human right, one that you and I enjoy every day but for the far too many of the world's poorest and most vulnerable, attaining this right is 40 billion hours away.

The solution to this problem is not simple; it involves looking at a myriad of solutions, as well as

understanding what factors are contributing to the problem. Nonetheless, there are many organizations working to tackle the issues surrounding access to clean water and basic sanitation. One of these organizations is WaterCan. Since 1987, WaterCan's programs have reached over 1.2 million children, women and men in the world's poorest regions, breaking the cycle of poverty and disease and increasing opportunities for health, education, gender equality, and economic growth. Working in partnership with indigenous organizations in eastern African, WaterCan supports small scale, community driven projects that: are long term, sustainable development initiatives, which use low-cost, locally appropriate technologies to integrate water supply, sanitation and hygiene education. They emphasize community ownership and their projects benefit and involve women. They are working towards ensuring that this basic human right is attained, and they could use all the help they can in achieving this goal!

SMUWaterCan, is a new society that is supporting WaterCan's initiative to ensure access to clean water and basic sanitation and hygiene education are provided to as many people as

possible. Recognizing organizations such as WaterCan cannot thrive without adequate funding, SMUWaterCan will be organizing various fundraising and awareness events to help raise money and increase awareness on the issues surrounding water. Check out http:// www.watercan.com/whatyoucando/ chapterchallenge.htm for more info. It only costs \$25 to provide one person in eastern Africa with clean water, basic sanitation and hygiene education for life. Think about that for a moment. \$25, that's a night downtown, or maybe even dinner with friends. While that \$25, may not seem like much, it is enough to transform an individual's life, for the rest of their life.



Lacrosse Team Set to Play for League Championship


