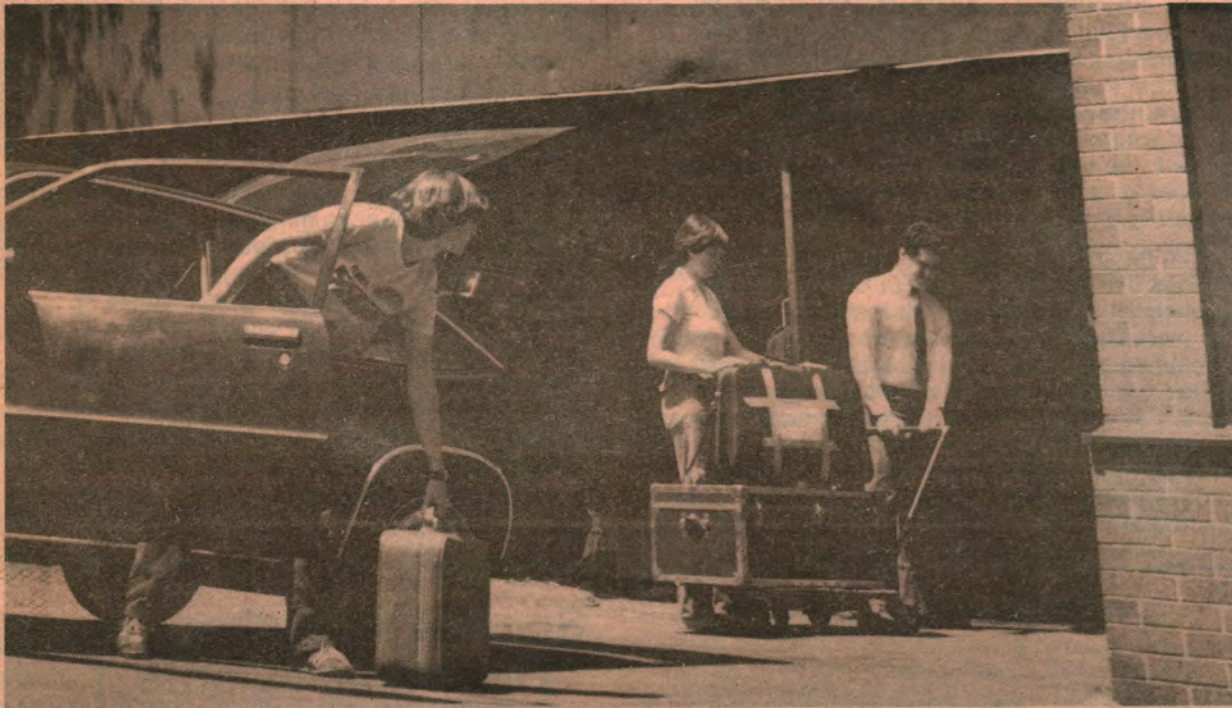

Saint Mary's welcomes new students, faculty, staff, and returning students for the coming year

Although students have been lined up outside the Continuing Education Department and the Registrar's office, and forecasters of enrollment figures are optimistic, the final enrollment statistics for the coming year will not be known for several weeks. According to the Registrar's office the statistics will not be available until December 1.

According to the Director of Continuing Education, Lloyd Fraser, it is much too early to predict what the enrollment figures for that Department might be.

At least seven new courses are being offered by the Department of Continuing Education, including four non-credit courses in the personal development area.

Approximately twenty-five new courses have been added to the academic curriculum, and thirteen new appointments have been added to the list of full-time faculty members. This latter figure includes faculty who are replacing those on leave and positions left vacant.

The contract for the Saint Mary's University Faculty Union was signed in July and a new contract will be renegotiated next year.

An agreement has been signed with the International Union of Operating Engineers, Local 968, and a tentative agreement has been reached with the International Union of Operating Engineers, Local 968B. Saint Mary's maintenance staff members belong to these two unions.

The Saint Mary's University Faculty Union (Professional Librarian Unit) contract is presently being negotiated.

Extensive maintenance work has been carried out at the University during the summer. Renovations have been completed in the arena and repairs have been made to the stadium.

Renovations have also been completed in the Loyola Residence. Walls have been painted and new carpeting has been installed on ten floors. The fire alarm system which has presented some problems in the past has been overhauled.

Enrollment in the Residence Complex shows an increase from last year's figures.

Dr. Joseph Jabbra, a member and former chairman of the Political Science Department, has been named Academic Vice-President of Saint Mary's University. Saint Mary's President, Dr. Kenneth Ozmon, announced the appointment in July.

Educated at the Université Saint-Joseph, Beirut, Lebanon, and the Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C., Dr. Jabbra came to Saint Mary's in 1971.

While at Saint Mary's, he has served on several committees, and held a number of appointments, including the Academic Senate

Bob Hayes joins Fitness and Amateur Sport

Bob Hayes, Saint Mary's Director of Student Services since 1975 and Athletic Director since 1958, has taken a one-year appointment with the Department of Fitness and Amateur Sport in Ottawa. The appointment was effective August 1, 1980. His job is to carry out a feasibility study on the establishment of national training centres for national and international class athletes.

The hope is that some means can be developed to overcome the problems that Canada faces, for example, in training teams for Olympic and other international games competition. According to Mr. Hayes, one of the obvious difficulties is geographic. "If we are to produce a team of volleyball players, giving the best players a chance, and if these players come from one coast to the other, and if as amateurs they are attending school or whatever, how do we get them together for sufficient time to fuse them into a world-class team? These are the types of problems the study will try to address."

While he admits that on the face of it this may look like simply an attempt to improve the medal count for Canada at international meets or to increase the number of records established by Canadians in Canada, he points out that there is a broader scope to the program. It is felt that in helping to create more athletes who capture the imagination of the public by their success in world competition, the government assistance program will be reflected in the participation of the public in

fitness and sport activities. As Mr. Hayes points out, such sports as tennis have benefitted greatly from the high level of international tennis competition and the effects are likely to be even greater if the particular stars are closer to home, as with skiers like Nancy Greene. Therefore the overall aim is to raise the standard of excellence of Canadian athletes, not only the ones who will set world records but the neighbourhood jogger as well.

When asked if he thought that a year was long enough for him to do the job, Mr. Hayes said he thought so but his work at the moment is still in the embryonic stages. His first month was spent mainly in meetings with the various sports consultants within the Department and measuring the scale of the problem.

His many friends will be interested to know that Mr. Hayes reports that he is by now perfectly fluent in French as well as English.

Mr. Hayes's work may be interrupted for a day or so in September as he plans to attend his induction into the Nova Scotia Sport Hall of Fame. He was chosen for the honour under the category of Player. Mr. Hayes was active in sports while in the Royal Canadian Navy in Halifax. He played football with the Ottawa Roughriders for a period that was cut short by a recall to the Navy during the Korean War. He maintains, however, that they just wanted him back to play on the Navy team as an athlete.

Mr. Hayes was granted a leave of absence by Saint Mary's to take the federal appointment.

Elizabeth Chard President of CIAU

Elizabeth A. Chard, Registrar of Saint Mary's University, was elected president of the Canadian Interuniversity Athletic Union at the annual meeting held in Halifax in June. The term is for a period of two years.

A native of Halifax, Nova Scotia, Mrs. Chard joined the History Department of Saint Mary's University in 1961, and for several years was chairman of that department. She was appointed Registrar in 1973.

A widely recognized personality in the field of sports administration, Mrs. Chard has held various administrative posts with the Atlantic Intercollegiate Athletic Association, the Canadian Women's Intercollegiate Athletic Union, and the Canadian Interuniversity Athletic Union.

Obituary



Reverend John Edward Power, S.J.

Rev. John Edward Power, S.J., Associate Professor of English at Saint Mary's University for several years, died July 18 in the Halifax Infirmary.

Born in Moncton, New Brunswick on December 23, 1922, Father Power was educated at Saint Joseph's University (Université de Moncton). He graduated from Loyola College, Montreal, with a Bachelor of Arts degree, and received a Master of Arts degree from the University of Toronto.

In 1942, at age twenty, Father Power entered the Society of Jesus, and was ordained a priest in 1955.

Father Power first came to Saint Mary's in 1949 to teach English at the Saint Mary's High School. He later became its principal, and with the closing of the High School he joined the staff of the University's Department of English.

His scholarly publications include "Henry More and Isaac Newton on Absolute Space: An Extra-Scientific Category", which was published in the *Journal of the History of Ideas* in 1970.

He is survived by his father, Robert, who now lives in Montreal, and by three brothers, Robert and Bernard in Montreal, and Father Fred Power, S.J., who lives in Toronto.

PBS to visit Saint Mary's

Two representatives of WMED-TV, the Public Broadcasting Service, from the University of Maine, Orono, Me., will be in Halifax in mid September. A public meeting to discuss future programming of the educational network will be held at Saint Mary's University on Tuesday, September 16 at 7:30 p.m., in the Art Gallery.

Participating in the 1 1/2 hour meeting will be Bernard Rosetti, program manager and Linda Burroughs, audience relations coordinator of the public broadcasting television station. The Halifax visit will be the second of such meetings in two years, designed to establish a liaison between the University of Maine's broadcasting system, reached in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia by cable system, and the Maritime universities.

Saint Mary's President, Dr. Kenneth Ozmon, travelled to the Orono studio in March, in association with other university representatives, to participate in a membership campaign, providing an opportunity to show television viewers the extent and scope of the universities' activities.

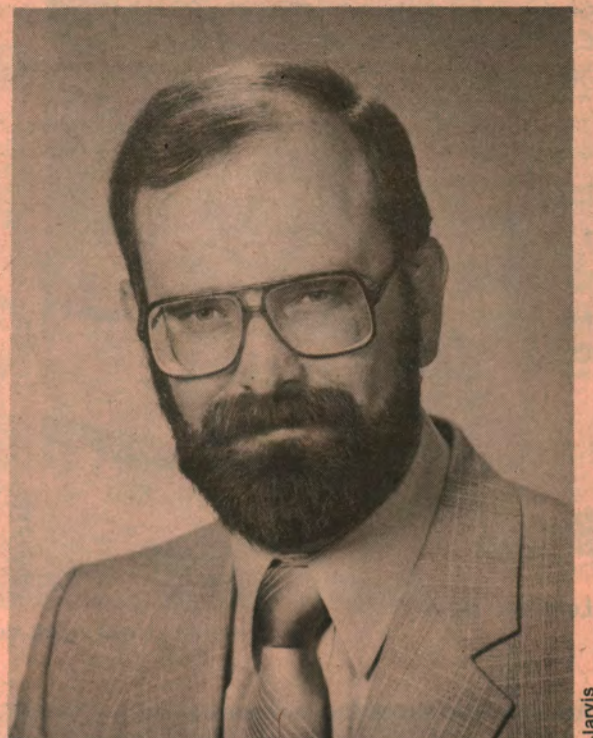

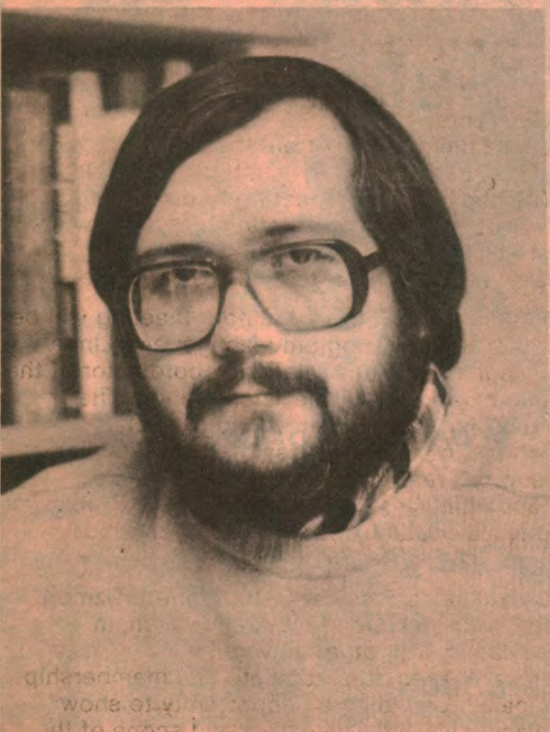

Association, and is a resource person for the Department of Manpower and Immigration. He is also Chairman of the Institute of Public Administration of Canada, Nova Scotia Chapter.

Dr. Jabbara has taught courses at Dalhousie University and Université de Moncton.

He speaks and writes five languages—Arabic, English, French, Greek and Latin.

Dr. Jabbara assumed his duties as Academic Vice-President on August 1, beginning a two-year term.

The new Dean of Science at Saint Mary's is Dr. Douglas H. Williamson. The announcement was made by Saint Mary's President, Dr. Kenneth Ozmon in July and Dr. Williamson's appointment began on August 1.

A native of Croyden, England, Dr. Williamson left a post as Professor of Geology and Dean of Science at Laurentian University in Sudbury,

Ontario to come to Saint Mary's. He replaced Dr. Charles Bigelow who took a position at the University of Manitoba in 1979. Dr. Jack Ginsberg served as Acting Dean during the interim.

Dr. Williamson came to Canada in 1953 after completing studies at Aberdeen University. He worked with the Ontario Department of Mines and taught at Mount Allison University before joining Laurentian University in 1966. At Laurentian he served as head of the department of geology, associate dean of science, and dean of science.

He has served in many administrative posts both within universities and in government, including the New Brunswick Research and Productivity Council, the Council of Ontario Universities, the National Research Council, and the Canadian Association of University Research Administrators.

Dr. Williamson and his wife, Rosemary, have two children.

Artist-in-Residence Appointment

During the summer Dr. Kenneth Ozmon, Saint Mary's President, announced the appointment of Leighton Davis as Artist-in-Residence at Saint Mary's University. Leighton Davis has been the Director-Curator of the Saint Mary's University Art Gallery since May 1979. The Artist-in-Residence designation is in addition to this position, recognizing the fact that Mr. Davis is an accomplished artist in his own right.

As an artist, Mr. Davis is known nationally as a printmaker and watercolourist, and particularly for detailed existentialistic nature studies. His work has been displayed at art galleries across Canada including a Canadian one-man touring exhibition.

Mr. Davis graduated in 1979 from the Nova Scotia College of Art and Design with a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree, having majored in lithography and art history.

A special edition of one of Mr. Davis's prints was produced last spring as gifts for the Honorary Degree recipients at Saint Mary's May 12 Convocation.

Some pieces of Mr. Davis' work will be included in the first exhibition of the Saint Mary's Art Gallery 1980-81 program.

Mr. Davis will also be giving a non-credit course in life drawing during the second semester of the 1980-81 academic year.

Commander Anthony Law, Artist-in-Residence at Saint Mary's since 1967, retired this summer.

Permanent Collection to be displayed.

The first exhibition of the 1980-81 program at the Saint Mary's Art Gallery will be "Permanent Collection" and will include paintings, prints, drawings, and pottery from the Saint Mary's Permanent Collection. It will run from September 3 until September 28.

Over the years the University has acquired an extensive collection but opportunities to see it in large part have been rare. Various pieces are to be found at any one time in offices, board rooms, and so on. In this exhibition approximately 40 works will be shown. Included will be work by Anthony Law, Tom Forrestal, Gustl Stark, and Donald Pentz.

While September is perhaps too busy for the presentation of an outside exhibit including a formal opening, lectures, etc., it was felt that it is a good time to display the University's own collection. It may help in demonstrating to new students the University's direct involvement with art.

Special Exhibit in Small Gallery

Beginning with the run of the "Permanent Collection", on September 3, a smaller exhibit will be shown in the adjoining Small Gallery. On display will be a collection of prints by the well-known Canadian artist Alex Colville, on loan from Saint Mary's new Dean of Science, Dr. Douglas Williamson. Dr. Williamson and Mr. Colville became friends while both taught at Mount Allison University.

This exhibition comprises five Colville prints, some familiar, some rare.

Preview of Next Exhibition

An opening will be held October 1 for the exhibition "William Leeming and Pavel Skalnik" which will run October 1 to November 9.

William Leeming, a lithographer and painter, is a resident of Toronto, born in Toronto, and a graduate of the Ontario College of Art and the Nova Scotia College of Art and Design.

Pavel Skalnik is a native of Czechoslovakia and studied in Prague and Paris. As a painter and printmaker, Mr. Skalnik has a long list of international showings. He is currently teaching at the Université de Moncton.

All are invited to the opening at 8:00 p.m. Wednesday, October 1 in the Saint Mary's University Art Gallery.

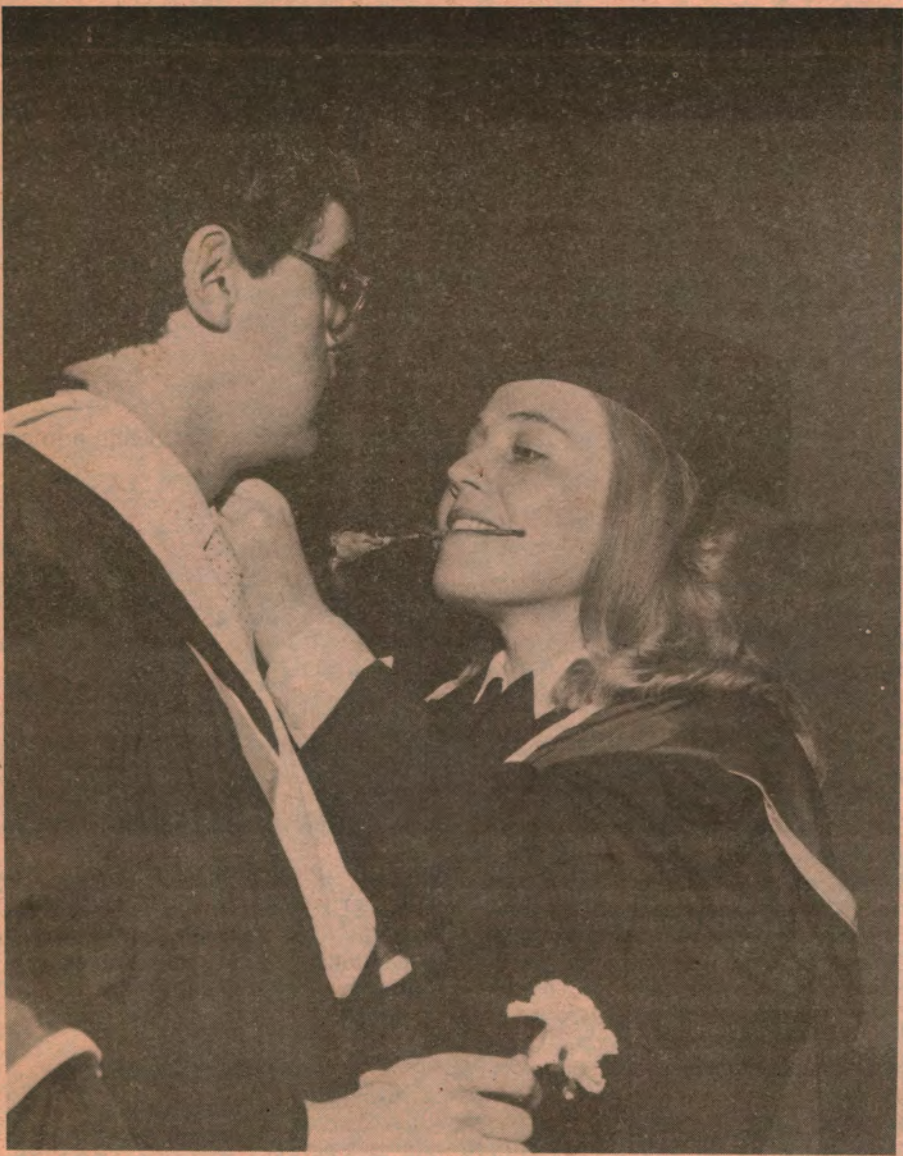

MURRAY BAILLIE (Library) received an Extension Course Certificate in Public Relations from the University of King's College on May 20, 1980.

PROFESSOR GAVIN BOYD (Political Science) is on sabbatical as a Visiting Research Professor in the Centre for Asian Studies and the Political Science Department in Arizona State University, Tempe, Arizona. A volume on *Region Building in the Pacific* which he is editing for Pergamon Press is to be completed by April 1981. News from the IEC

Young people and multiculturalism

The International Education Centre is a resource and a research centre and its summer activities reflected both aspects of involvement. In addition to Third World development education, work at the centre has been concentrated on the issues of Canadian multiculturalism and, more specifically, ethnic studies within Nova Scotia.

In May the I.E.C. sponsored a conference for the Multicultural Youth of Nova Scotia. Members of the association attended workshops on such topics as "The Dilemma of Cultural Education in Schools", "Government Recommendations on Multicultural Youth Policy" and "The Non-academic Intercultural Education of Youth". Senator Irving Barrow was the keynote speaker at the closing banquet.

In June the I.E.C. began work on a Summer Youth Employment Project, funded by Canada Employment and Immigration. The project was to assess the availability of multicultural resource materials and people in the Halifax area. The project has been carried out under the direction of Dr. James Morrison and Prof. Mary Boyd of the I.E.C., and Ms. Judy MacIntyre, supervisor for the project. In addition to Ms. MacIntyre, seven other students were employed on the project.

One of the main objectives of the summer project was the compilation of a directory which includes the names and contacts of the various ethnic groups in the Metro area, along with a brief description of any associations. Seventy different ethnic groups have been identified, and the directory will be on file in the Metro university and public libraries.

Secondary projects undertaken by the students employed by the grant have been:

(1) Research and coding of data for "Impact of Religion and Ethnicity", a study conducted by Prof. Ron Cosper of Sociology. The study compares the importance of class and occupation with religion and ethnicity.

(2) Compiling a perpetual ethnic calendar which describes the holidays observed by ethnic groups within the province. This project has been carried out under the direction of MANS (Multicultural Association of Nova Scotia). The calendar carries illustrations depicting the different costumes and customs of the groups.

(3) Research into the archival material relating to ethnic studies in Nova Scotia. In particular, the students have been investigating the history of "Pier 21", the immigration building on the waterfront which was used from 1924 until 1971. The students have been interviewing immigrants who came to Nova Scotia during that time.

(4) Marketing project to determine the community's attitudes towards cultural institutions. This project has been carried out under the direction of Dr. Nathan Kling and Prof. Corrine Duffy of Marketing.

(5) Projects to determine the motivation level of immigrants and immigrants' children. This project has been under the direction of Prof. Victor Catano.

The summer employment project will end September 5, and there will be a reception for all participants at the Centre September 3.

Ethnic Research in Nova Scotia

The I.E.C. also received a grant from the Secretary of State for "Ethnic Research in Nova Scotia", which has funded five monographs on ethnic groups within the province. Researchers and their projects are:

(1) Gordon Haliburton "Religion as a Force in the Scottish Approach to Education in Nova Scotia"

(2) Terrence Punch "The Irish in Halifax-Dartmouth: A Confederation Minority"

These research papers will be published and distributed by the I.E.C. as part of a series entitled the "Ethnic Heritage Series". These and other materials will be in the collection of the centre, which is freely available to the academic community and the general public.

Hockey Huskies coaching changes: Bob Boucher goes to the NHL

Dr. Kenneth Ozmon, President of Saint Mary's University, has announced that a one-year leave of absence will be granted Head Hockey Coach Robert (Bob) Boucher. The leave of absence will permit Mr. Boucher to accept an assistant head coaching position with the Philadelphia Flyers of the N.H.L. Brian O'Byrne, Development Co-ordinator for Hockey in Nova Scotia, will take over head coaching duties of the Huskies for the 1980 - 81 season.

Bob Boucher began his career at Saint Mary's in 1967 and has since earned the best won-lost record in Canadian intercollegiate hockey, winning 231 games, losing 33, and tying 4 for a winning percentage of 81 percent. His achievements include eight Atlantic titles, five trips to the final game of the Canadian Championships, and three to the National Semi-Finals. Mr. Boucher was chosen Canadian Coach of the Year in 1973 and 1978, and was Co-Coach of the Student National Team in 1974 and 1975.

Interim Head Coach Brian O'Byrne graduated from Saint Mary's University in 1972 and is a former star defenseman with the Huskies from 1968 through 1972. Mr. O'Byrne was captain of the team four years and earned an All-Conference berth every season. He was a member of the All-Canadian team twice. Never far from Saint Mary's, Mr. O'Byrne has instructed at hockey and skating schools, and served as assistant coach on several occasions.

As Development Co-ordinator for Hockey in the Province since 1973, Mr. O'Byrne is responsible for upgrading minor hockey coaching, assessing skill development in minor hockey players, and overseeing referees and coaching certification programs. He is Chairman of Special Projects for the Hockey Development Council of Canada and is currently involved in a pilot project for the C.A.H.A. for the National Junior Olympics.

Bruce Hopkins assumes Arena management

Bruce Hopkins will take on the duties of Manager of the Alumni Arena in Bob Boucher's absence (as Mr. Boucher joins the N.H.L.). This will be in addition to a number of other jobs Mr. Hopkins does in the Saint Mary's Athletic Department.

Besides being Arena manager, he will continue as Assistant Football Coach, Director of the Intramural Program, and as budget and equipment coordinator for the Athletic Department.

Al Keith named Acting Athletic Director

Al Keith has been appointed Acting Athletic Director at Saint Mary's University. The appointment, effective August 1, 1980, was announced by Saint Mary's President, Dr. Kenneth Ozmon.

Mr. Keith will continue as Head Football Coach at Saint Mary's, as well as assuming the duties of Athletic Director. Robert Hayes, who held the positions of Athletic Director and Director of Student Services, has taken an appointment with the Federal Department of Fitness and Amateur Sport.

Al Keith became well known in college sports as a football star on the Saint Mary's Huskies football team in the early 1960s. He began coaching at Saint Mary's in 1969, becoming Head Coach in 1970. During six years of coaching the Football Huskies he established a 36 - 4 won-lost record, including a national championship.

Mr. Keith left Saint Mary's in 1975 but returned in April 1979, once more to coach the Football Huskies. His new, additional appointment runs until June 30, 1981.
