

## MARTIN GILL TRUST FUND

Martin is a 21 year old quadriplegic, who is unable to use any portion of his body from his shoulders down. He lost the use of the lower portion of his body as a result of a diving accident in August 1983.

He has completed his third year of Commerce at Saint Mary's University.

After struggling to live without the aid of a respirator, Martin was discharged from the hospital.

He is presently taking courses at the University of Alberta, where they have the special health care systems he requires. He would like to return to Saint Mary's University, but time and money are keeping him in Alberta. "It's my goal to be able to come

home to Nova Scotia and graduate from Saint Mary's."

In order for Martin to live as independently as possible, that is, with a live-in aide, he is going to need a considerable amount of equipment which is very costly.

Martin's present means of financial income is through social services as his accident was not covered by any insurance policies. Aside from existence funding, social services has no funds for any "extras" for people like Martin. Without the assistance of a supporting group, the chances of Martin obtaining funds for the needed equipment is nil.

## Commerce Society launches Martin Gill Trust Fund

In recent weeks you may have noticed that a number of soup cans, labelled the Martin Gill Trust Fund, have appeared on campus. They are part of the Commerce Society's campaign to raise \$50,000 to help Martin Gill return to Saint Mary's.

Mr. Gill was featured in the local media about four months ago. A native of Halifax and a former Saint Mary's student, he severed his spinal cord in a swimming accident in Alberta in the summer of 1983. The accident has left him a quadriplegic. He has been a patient at an Edmonton hospital and a visiting student at the University of Alberta since then. However, his ambition is to return to Saint Mary's to complete his Bachelor of Commerce degree.

Betty Wilson, his occupational therapist in Edmonton, wrote to the Dean of Commerce, Dr. Rick Miner, last spring to explain some of Martin Gill's problems. He is paralyzed from the neck down and has difficulty even moving his head. He has limited mobility and can manoeuvre his wheelchair by use of a "pope" stick which he operates with his mouth. It is a highly sophisticated instrument which requires skill and patience to use properly. However, Mr. Gill will require constant care for the rest of his life. He will also need somewhere to live and expensive technical equipment such as an environmental control unit, an adapted computer system, mouthsticks, special means of transportation and so on. The initial costs to get Martin Gill to Halifax and into his own home is in the region of \$50,000. None of these costs are covered by insurance policies and social services departments do not provide the extras that will give him some independence and a reasonable quality of life.

In her letter, Ms. Wilson wrote: "I really admire Martin's courage. He has a lot of obstacles to overcome because of his physical disability and I only wish financial burdens were not added to his problems. Any help you (the University community) can give this young man will be greatly appreciated by all of us who are working with him."

Dr. Miner asked the Commerce Society to spearhead the Saint Mary's campaign. Curtis Swinimer, President of the Society, has been putting it together. It has taken a lot of time and effort, but the Martin Gill Trust Fund has now been launched. Mr. Swinimer has been working closely with Mr. Gill's former high school guidance counsellor, Peggy Nelson of Prince Andrew High School, Betty Wilson, and the Kinsmen Club of Fort Edmonton. He has also just made arrangements for the Trust Fund to be established in affiliation with the Canadian Paraplegic Association of Edmonton, Alberta.

A number of local firms have offered their support. Four thousand copies of a leaflet, explaining the Martin Gill Trust Fund, were printed courtesy of Speedy Print in Halifax. The donation cans were provided by the American Can Company and the labels were produced by Farnell Packaging Ltd. of Dartmouth. The larger donation drums have been provided by the Ethiopian Relief Fund.

There have been other community events as well, including a hockey tournament organized by Mr. Gill's former minor league hockey coach.

The Saint Mary's Alumni Association plans to sponsor some fund-raising events in the near future.

### Faculty exchanges with Japanese universities

For several years, but infrequently, the Asian Studies Program at Saint Mary's has been host to visiting Japanese scholars from various disciplines. To put such visits on a more regular basis, Dr. Hermann Schwind, Co-ordinator of the Asian Studies Program, recently visited five Japanese universities in Tokyo, Nagoya and Sapporo, and negotiated with administrators and academic officials to establish faculty and student exchange programs. While three of the visits were first contacts which require further negotiations, two of the universities agreed to a trial exchange program.

Nanzan University in Nagoya will send one professor for a full academic year, beginning September 1985. A group of students from Sophia University in Tokyo will visit Alberta, Quebec and the Maritimes next summer, and will stay at Saint Mary's University for three days to meet with Canadian students.

## Notes on the China Project

The China Project now employs twelve Canadian teachers, eight Chinese teachers, and five other staff members at the Beijing Language Training Centre in the People's Republic of China. The Language Training Centre started the first French language program in January 1985. Last November, 334 applicants were tested for academic and work studies competence in English, a record number. Three such tests are administered each year.

**Sondra Marshall-Smith**, a program supervisor with the Burnaby School Board in British Columbia, has been appointed Head Teacher of the Language Training Centre.

**David Swanson**, a teacher from Malaspina College in Nanaimo, B.C., is the In-China Co-ordinator. He recently returned from Wuhan, the site of a potential new language program.

**Dr. Hermann Schwind**, Project Director, returned from a visit to Beijing. There, he met with officials of the Ministry of Foreign Economic Relations and Economics, the University of International Business and Economics, the Canadian Embassy (Development Division), and World University Services of Canada.

**Judy Matthew**, Co-ordinator of the Atlantic Region Orientation Centre, attended a conference of the Canadian Bureau for International Education in Montreal. □

### Second Language Training Program proposed

The Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA) has asked Saint Mary's University to develop and administer a second training program for China. This program is part of a \$50 billion energy project for four hydroelectric dams near the city of Wuhan, Hubei Province.

The planning phase of this project will be financed by CIDA. A consortium of Canadian companies will send a group of technicians to Wuhan to familiarize Chinese engineers with modern energy planning. The Wuhan Language Training Program will be administered by the China Project Office. □

## At the Art Gallery

### Works by Graham Metson (February 12 to March 30)

A collection of works by artist Graham Metson will be on display at the Saint Mary's University Art Gallery from February 12 to March 30. This is the first major exhibition of his work in Nova Scotia in the past seven years. It

will include a number of his drawings and paintings. His larger works will be displayed in the main gallery while some of his smaller collages and mixed media pieces will be shown in the small gallery.

Metson, who was raised in England during the second world war, has vivid memories of the London Blitz. These recollections, together with impressions from his young adult life in the pop culture of the late 1950s, have given him strange and poignant material to draw on in creating his works of art.

His colourful, almost violent paintings, depict subjects ranging from pop satire to religious symbolism. In some instances he has used collages to place futuristic images beside or on top of mythological images.

Metson has had many shows throughout Europe and North America, among them "Blood Networks" at Chicago's Museum of Contemporary Art in 1969. As part of the exhibition, Metson asked fellow artists, poets, musicians and entertainers to join together in a celebration of giving blood. In 1976 he researched "Gleams of a Remoter World", an exhibition at Dalhousie Art Gallery on occult art in the 18th century. That same year, he produced a photo-documentary on the Halifax Explosion, entitled "Halifax: 09:06, December 6, 1917".

Public museums and galleries in Australia are currently touring Metson's thirty "Kanadian Kaper" paintings, and have asked him to lecture on Canadian Folk Art. □

says, because the University is ideally suited to disabled students.

After completing his degree, Mr. MacEachern decided to return to his first love, auto mechanics, and in particular, to teach the subject. He tried to obtain a teaching post but each time lost out to a more highly qualified applicant. (Vocational teachers on Prince Edward Island do not require a Bachelor of Education degree but it is preferred.) Therefore, he elected to enrol at Saint Mary's to complete all course requirements for a fully qualified vocational teacher on the Island.

He was encouraged to apply for a Donald E. Curren Scholarship, and recently received \$1000 from the

Scholarship Fund. The Curren Scholarships are administered by Dalhousie University in the name of Donald Curren, Q.C., former Director of the Atlantic branch of the Canadian Paraplegic Association.

Mr. MacEachern now lives in one of the residence suites that have been adapted for disabled students. Does his disability hinder him in his chosen profession? Apparently not. He has spent most of the past five years working as an auto mechanic in a garage in his home town of Hampton, P.E.I. He also just completed one month practice teaching in the Auto Mechanic Division of the Dartmouth Regional Vocational School — and he received an 'A' grade. □

## Alumnus investigates the needs of disabled students on campus



Barry Abbott, who is blind, graduated from Saint Mary's with a Bachelor of Arts degree in English in 1978. He has worked as a freelance journalist for Touchstone magazine and contributed items for CBC's Information Morning.)

I was employed by Saint Mary's in March 1984 through a Career Access Program sponsored by Canada Employment and Immigration. For the past ten months I have been working with staff of Student Services and other University departments to make the University community more aware of the needs of disabled students.

My present position as Public Information Officer with Student Services has involved me in a number of projects. I have assisted with fundraising for disabled programs, gathered materials for the resource centre, and supported the installation of Braille plaques in the Student Centre elevators.

In the last few months I have worked closely with David Leitch of Counselling Services towards the establishment of the Maritime Centre for Disabled Students. The goal of the Centre is to make post-secondary education more accessible to hearing-impaired persons in the Atlantic region. The program will combine the resources of several universities in Atlantic Canada to provide services such as interpreting, note-taking and language skills for hearing-impaired persons enrolled in post-secondary institutions.

I began my job at Saint Mary's knowing that it might be some time before I would be able to work with a degree of independence. I wanted to be capable of performing my duties with a minimum of assistance from co-workers. I believe I have made progress toward this goal, but it would not have been possible without certain technical aids.

One of the most important aspects of the Career Access Program is that it provides up to \$10,000 for the purchase of specialized equipment; in my case, a Compaq microcomputer. This system includes a speech synthesizer and a diskette with an Enhanced Talking Program which enables me to control verbal input and output between myself and the computer.

When typing on the Compaq micro-computer, I have three options: the pronunciation of each letter as it is typed, upper or lowercase designation, or the vocalization of words once the spacebar or a punctuation key has been depressed. The reading mode offers some flexibility. Each line on the screen can either be spoken or spelled, including the positioning of capital letters and punctuation. I can also hear each letter or punctuation mark as I move the cursor around the screen. The system not only permits me to write up documents unassisted, but also allows me to proofread them before accessing my printer. Its real significance is that the computer makes my work accessible to me and to those who are my employers.

It has always been my belief that disabled persons can "pull their own weight within society" if they are given the opportunities and the technical advantages now available. A university environment fosters an opportunity for ALL individuals to express their potential regardless of their physical limitations. I further believe that Saint Mary's has encouraged this developmental process. It is my hope that I will be able to continue to play an active role in support of more accessible post-secondary educational systems for disabled persons. □

## Microcomputer Services News

At noon on Wednesday, December 12, a ceremony took place in the Learning Resources Services Department of the Killam Library at Dalhousie University. The occasion was to mark the opening of the Microcomputer Information Centre, the latest co-operative effort on the part of Saint Mary's, Mount Saint Vincent, Dalhousie and the Technical University of Nova Scotia. The opening was attended by all four university presidents and the Minister of Education, the Honourable Terence Donahoe. The presidents took the opportunity to sign a joint agreement establishing Interuniversity Services Incorporated, which had been known as Purchasing and Centralized Services.

The Microcomputer Information Centre has been established to assist faculty, staff and students in making the best possible use of computer technology and to create a general policy regarding the purchase and use of microcomputers. The manager of the Centre, Kay Desborough, and the advisory committee composed of representatives from the four universities' computer centres are working together toward these broad goals.

Centre staff will provide, by appointment, current, accurate, objective information about the use of microcomputer technology within an educational environment, to faculty, staff and students of the four universities. Clients will be shown micro-

computer hardware and software which could meet their individual needs, and will be able to test much of this equipment in the Centre, with the guidance and assistance of Centre staff.

In keeping with the educational focus of the Centre, courses with specific topics relevant to educational applications of microcomputers will be co-ordinated through the various university Computer Centres. In addition, workshops and seminars will be presented by Centre staff and other resource persons as needs are identified. Cost of these courses and seminars will be minimal.

## Newsletter published

The advisory committee, known as the Committee on Inter-university Computer Co-ordination, produce a periodic newsletter regarding co-operative computer progress among the four universities. Highlights of the first issue, Volume 1, Number 1, follow:

- The report of the Study on Inter-university Computer Co-operation (March 1984) is now lodged in the libraries of each of the Halifax universities.

- An inventory of computer hardware and software available in Halifax universities is now in preparation. A copy may be obtained by accessing the Dalhousie CYBER and giving the command: BGN, CIUCC. The routine will then offer the user various options for copying.

- The Microcomputer Information Centre has been established and appointments may now be made. The manager is Kay Desborough and her telephone number is 424-8893.

- The Council of Metro University Librarians has presented a draft proposal for the acquisition by the Metro Universities for an on-line integrated library system which will handle ordering, cataloguing and circulation of library materials and provide an on-line catalogue of the Metro Universities' joint holdings.

**Margot Schenk** (Library) gave a slide presentation about her recent trip to China to the Halifax Library Association on October 1, 1984.

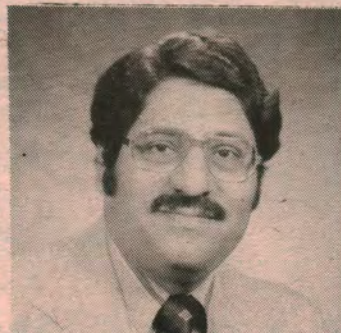
