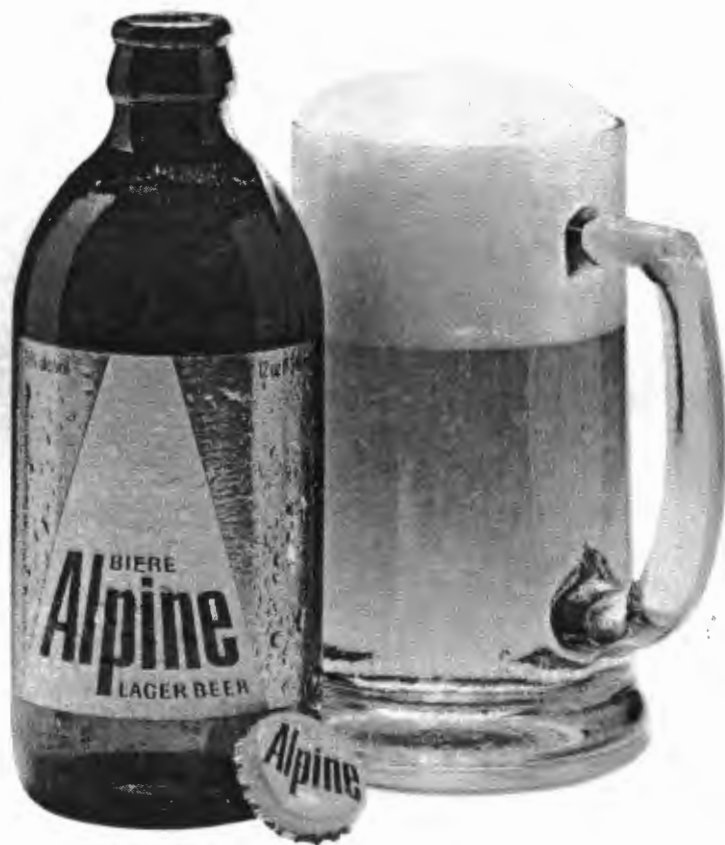

William Hall was the first Canadian to win the Victoria Cross. Born in Summerhill N.S. he left the province at the age of 12 to seek his fortune. Hall enlisted in the Royal Navy in 1852 and served on Nelsons flagship "Victory" at Portsmouth. William Hall saw action in many parts of the world. Boston Kings history in Nova Scotia begins in Birchtown where he was a carpenter. In 1789 he moved to Shelburne, and later on to Preston. At that time Shelburne was one of the three major ports on the North American Coast, second only to Boston and New York. In January 1792 a fleet of ships sailed from Halifax with Boston King and Approximately 1200 other Blacks Heading for Sierra Leone. For more information see your local library

Colonel Stephen Bluck was an officer in the Black Pioneers who fought for the British during the American War Of Independence. A former slave Colonel Bluck rose to prominence as a teacher.
