#### Gorsebrook Lounge Improvements

During the month of August, renovations were started on the student run Gorsebrook Lounge. When both phase A and phase B of the improvements are complete the Lounge will boast a new color scheme, better lighting, a more relaxing decor, new furniture, and access will be available to the new Games Room from the Lounge.

Improvements had been discussed for several years and a plan of action was implemented during this past summer.

It is estimated that the Gorsebrook Lounge plays host to thousands of students over the run of a year and generates significant revenues for the student body. The improvements are seen as an investment in the health and future of a very popular campus meeting place.

#### Games Room Moves

Returning students to Saint Mary's will notice a new activity on the main floor of the Student Centre.

The student run Games Room which was located on the third floor of the Student Centre has been moved, to the main floor. The move makes the Games Room more accessible to student traffic and creates a more social atmosphere.

Because the Games Room is now located in space once occupied by the "Quiet Lounge", arrangements have been made for quiet studying areas on the third floor of the Student Centre. This is seen as a positive move as it places the lounge areas in a less trafficked and quieter area of the building. The newly renovated collonade area will also make a great place to relax. The new Games Room will boast video games, shuffleboard, darts, seating and tables and a high profile location. The Games Room will be open from 9:00 a.m. - 8:00 p.m. daily.

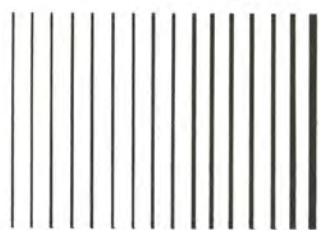

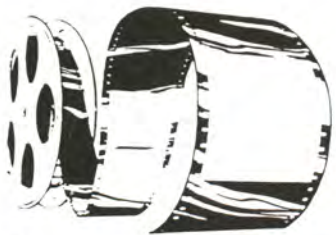

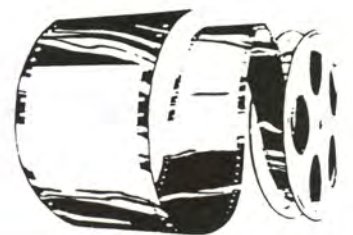

## Hookers on Davie

JANIS COLE AND HOLLY DALE, the two documentary filmmakers who won a Genie Award for their feature-length documentary, P4W, about the women's prison in Kingston, Ont., have a very simple ethical philosophy. *We try*, says Cole to give people who don't have a voice, total voice. Most of what you hear comes from the official point of view. So we feel comfortable providing the other side with a voice.

Their latest collaboration, **HOOKERS ON DAVIE**, gives some prostitutes of Vancouver's pimp-free Davie Street a voice. Davie Street is home to a large community of prostitutes who are proudly pimp free. Male and female, transvestite and transexual, these hookers rely on one another for support, counsel and protection.

To do *Hookers on Davie*, the filmmakers hung out on Davie Street for two months. The greatest strength of the film lies in the rapport they establish with their subjects. Their approach may sound to be ethically simple, but to their process of filmmaking which is a mixture of cinema verite and interviews, it is imperative that they are never seen as being a threat. They never recreate situations or stage-manage their subjects. *It would be impossible to develop the kind of trust necessary for this kind of camera honesty, if we were known to be interviewing 'the other side' all the time*, says Dale.

The film tells so much about why Davie's hookers remain so loyal to their work and their street. The documentary is by turns, funny, shocking, sad, and revealing, but it never abandons compassion. *Hookers on Davie* never romanticizes or romanizes prostitution or its people. It shows them as they are.

"*Hookers on Davie* was ten times harder to make than P4W. Dale admits. The process was exhausting and often frustrating. It takes energy to get as involved as we do!"
