on a vast scale during the industrialization of Soviet Russia, has just been published by Oxford University Press.

Before the last war the author was Professor of Political Economy in the University of Vilna and was one of the leading Polish experts on Eastern Europe and the Soviet Union. Rejoining his old regiment in 1939, Professor Swianiewicz was taken prisoner by the Russians, and narrowly escaped the Katyn massacre of Polish officers. He spent the years 1940 and 1941 in Lubianka Prison in Moscow, where, he writes in his preface, 'The ideas expressed in this study germinated Among my fellow prisoners were several senior members of the Soviet political and economic administration, several outstanding technical experts, and a few university students, active members of the Komsomol. Every night some of us were taken to the premises of the N.K.V.D. for investigation, but in the daytime we were free to read and discuss; and this was as if one was participating in a permanent seminar on the problem of revolutionary transformation of the national economy. (My) thanks must therefore go to the changing membership of that stimulating seminar.'

The Soviet authorities, treating Professor Swianiewicz's pre-war activities in economic research as tantamount to espionage, sentenced him to eight years forced labour, but he was released as a result of the Soviet-Polish agreement of 1941. He went to Jerusalem as Head of the Polish Research Bureau for the Middle East; after the war he held various teaching and research positions in Britain and with the United Nations, and was Professor of Economics at Gadjah Mada University in Indonesia before coming to Saint Mary's in 1963.



SPRING CONVOCATION 1965



A total of 149 students, the largest graduating class in the 125-year history of Saint Mary's University, received degrees and diplomas at convocation.

Eight master of arts, two master of social work, 58 bachelor of arts, 14 bachelor of science, 35 bachelor of commerce, 19 bachelor of education degrees, 10 diplomas in engineering and three diplomas in journalism were conferred by Right Reverend W. H. Smith, Vice-Chancellor of the University, at the convocation ceremony, held in the university auditorium.

The honorary degree of doctor of civil laws was conferred on Air Vice-Marshal Edwin M. Reyno, a 1936 graduate of Saint Mary's, until recently chief of staff, Fourth Allied Tactical Air Force, North Atlantic Treaty Organization, Europe, and now at Canadian Defence headquarters. The honorary degree of doctor of letters was conferred on Canon H. L. Puxley, former president of the University of King's College and now director of the Canadian School for Missions and Ecumenical Institute.

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THE SILENT SPECTATOR

Talk about a shock!

I had been sitting in the back pew minding my own business when all of a sudden the roof fell in. This started me thinking (another minor miracle): The Vatican had exploded its first bomb! Bingo! And not a fallout shelter in sight! It was my first experience of a Mass attack.

Millions of words have accompanied the explosive changes in the Catholic Church. As an average uninformed member of the club I was asked to comment. In preparation I studiously avoided reading the explanatory literature, missed the series of lectures at the Parish Center, and refused to discuss the subject with my wife. All this qualified me as an unbiased amateur observer of the changing scene.

The Editor asked me to fill one column and I may have to do a subtle shift in midstream, mixing metaphors as I go and splitting a few infinitives. Fortunately Religion is a broad subject including even eccentric sects like Black Muslims.

Now that we are discussing the recent Clay-Liston fight you may be interested to know that Liston, an adult delinquent, earned \$10,000 a second for a total of \$600,000 in one minute. And so, as the Jesuits always say, a Saint Mary's University education is not always indispensable to success.

And now to get back on more familiar grounds. Participation of the laity is a good thing. (I divide all things into good and bad, black and white). This apparently means the laity are free to criticize the clergy. And many priests say that criticism is a good thing but they all say that "It is better to give than to receive".

Participation also means we have suddenly lost our reserved seats high up in the bleachers and no longer are the silent spectators. They want us to get in the game! This is going to take a lot of practice especially for us old-timers. Participation also means giving a helping hand in the choir and other things which I prefer not to discuss.

Participation does not mean selecting the architect for the new church, redesigning the parish hall or writing the Sunday sermon. This is Interference and differs in definition from Participation. Participation means personal involvement in the actual act of Sacrifice.

Contrary to opinion the altar has not been reversed. The priest is still in front of the altar. The Faithful have shifted around to face the priest. This confrontation encourages our participation.

The only things we are asked to change are our erroneous opinions. The only habits we are asked to forsake are our previous bad ones. We are all involved now in an everchanging movement towards the Truth—as pure as it was 1965 years ago.

And so, would you rather be a participant or a silent spectator? Well, man, ask Sonny Liston, ask Cassius Clay!

NEW FACULTY APPOINTMENTS

Saint Mary's has announced the appointment of Bernard S. Sheehan, B.E., S.M., Ph.D., a native of Halifax and one of its own alumni, as Associate Dean of Arts and Science.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence E. Sheehan, 6436 Edgewood Ave., Halifax, Dr. Sheehan attended College and Oxford Streets schools and the former high school department of Saint Mary's University.

Following matriculation, he studied engineering at Saint Mary's, graduating with great distinction in 1955. N. S. Technical College, where he studied under auspices of a Nova Scotia Government scholarship, awarded him its Bachelor of Engineering (Electrical) degree with honours in 1957, and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology its Master of Science (Electrical Engineering) degree in 1961.

After still further post-graduate studies, and teaching of graduate and undergraduate courses in feedback control, systems and computers, Dr. Sheehan was awarded his Ph. D. degree by the University of Connecticut in May.

Besides academic studies, Dr. Sheehan has had considerable practical experience in engineering. While a student at Saint Mary's, he was employed summertime with the Public Works Department of the City of Halifax and the Northern Electric Co. Ltd., Montreal. In 1957-58 he worked on the design of atomic reactors with Canadian General Electric Co. Ltd. at Peterborough, Ont., and 1958-59 lectured in engineering and served as first manager of the computer centre at Saint Mary's. While studying at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology he also taught in its electrical engineering department and was engaged by Boston engineering consultants on network theory.

His special fields of research at the University of Connecticut included determination of the optimum trajectory for atmospheric re-entry of space vehicles and state space synthesis of passive systems.

He is a member of the Engineering Institute of Canada, the Society for General Systems Research, the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers and Eta Kappa Nu, the Electrical Engineering Honor Society. He is also a commissioned officer on the retired list of the Royal Canadian Navy Reserve.

Dr. Sheehan is married to the former Nancy Mary O'Hearn, daughter of Mrs.

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NEW ADMISSIONS POLICY AT S.M.U.

The Senate of Saint Mary's University has approved a new policy of 'Early Admission' of students to the University.

Students will now be accepted without having to wait for the results of their final matriculation examinations. This will be done on the basis of the recommendation of the student's principal or teacher, along with his total high school record up to and including mid-year results in matriculation year.

Very Reverend C. J. Fischer, S.J., President of Saint Mary's and chairman of the University's Senate, in announcing the new policy said:

"With rapidly growing enrolment and increasing difficulty in recruiting appropriate teaching faculty, we need a clearer indication of the number of freshman students and their faculty and course registration before provincial examination results become available in late summer.

"Saint Mary's classroom, and more especially laboratory, facilities are limited and it is becoming necessary to divide some freshman and sophomore classes into three or more sections. Early admission of students will give the Registrar's office more time to sort out the complications of class scheduling and to assure the maximum use of physical plant.

"We hope also that our new policy of 'early admission' will help to break down the rigid formalism of the student's transfer from high school to university. During the last months of his matriculation year the student should now give more serious attention to the choice of his program while he can still receive the mature guidance of his counsellors and teachers. The guidance officers of the University will also be available to advise him.

"To put this policy in practice, the Registrar of Saint Mary's will require the cooperation of high school principals or teachers in completing the student's application form. This form will be as simple as possible and based on the excellent records now kept by high schools and the Department of Education. The key point of information will be the principal's or teacher's judgment of the student's ability to complete successfully a university program. This evaluation will become a part of the student's university record as the prime basis of his admission.

"In order that both the schools and Saint Mary's may gain experience and accuracy in this new procedure, for the first few years the student's acceptance will be subject to review by the Admissions Committee if he does not achieve minimum requirements in provincial examinations. He may then be advised to return to high school for a better foundation, or some conditions of additional or remedial work at the University may be imposed. The University will continue to use the final provincial matriculation results in the acceptance of doubtful or borderline students."

S.M.U. MOVING TO GRADE XII ENTRANCE
