



## President's Installation Speech

Doctor D. Owen Carrigan was installed as President of Saint Mary's University on Oct. 7, 71. Following is the speech he delivered on that occasion:

First of all, I would like to express my sincere thanks to all of you who have been kind enough to come to Saint Mary's University to participate in my Installation. I also wish to extend my thanks to the Board of Governors of Saint Mary's University, which has given me the opportunity of becoming President of a University with such a long and fine tradition in higher education. I am looking forward to my tenure, and I am pleased that the position also makes it possible for me to return to my native Province.

Since this is primarily an academic occasion, it is fitting that my brief remarks this afternoon should be devoted to academic matters. Therefore, I am going to take the opportunity to voice my concern about a developing national trend which I believe could have some potentially disastrous consequences for higher education in this province. The trend which I refer to is the increasing pressure on universities for rationalization of courses and programs, and for the affiliation or amalgamation of institutions. This pressure is coming from provincial governments all across Canada and is motivated by a desire to reduce the volume of expenditure on higher education.

Since the end of the Second World War, universities all over North America have been expanding at a high and continuous rate. Many new ones have come into existence and some within a few years have become large entities. This unprecedented growth has created two major problems. One is the problem of size, the other is the problem of finances. The former has put a heavy burden on students and faculty, the latter has put a heavy burden on the taxpayer.

Many formerly small or medium size universities have become huge, multiversities. Arthur Porter a well known academic and consultant from the University of Toronto has observed that "Most large universities suffer to a greater or lesser extent from the monolithic syndrome which gives rise to depersonalization of members of the university." This depersonalization, I am convinced, has contributed in large measure to the

upheavals that have taken place on many university campuses in recent years. Students are frustrated at being little more than numbers on a computer, at sitting in large classes of from 200 to 1,000, at not being able to get to know professors or being able to receive even a reasonable amount of personal attention. Yet these are all too often the facts of life on a large campus.

The bigger universities seem to have lost their individuality. The experience is the same for students whether they are on one campus or another. It is assembly line education seemingly devoid of institutional diversity. The result is a lack of identification for the student and possibly even a deterioration in the overall quality of undergraduate education.

The other side of the coin of rapid growth is the ever increasing financial burden that this has meant for the taxpayer. The tax burden has reached the point where public attitudes now favor a curtailment of expenditures on higher education. Provincial governments across Canada are responding by trying to find ways of effecting economies.

I would be the last to criticize reasonable attempts at making universities more efficient and effective, and I have already taken a public position on this. However, I am critical of any proposals that would seriously jeopardize the quality of education. I believe that rationalization to the extent that some universities are denied the right to legitimate program growth and development and amalgamation of smaller units into larger entities would do just that.

Too often we in Nova Scotia have lagged behind other parts of Canada in our development. The one notable exception has been education. We have one of the finest educational systems in Canada. The strength of our Nova Scotian universities is that we have traditionally offered a highly personalized educational environment along with considerable diversity. We have not been carbon copies of each other. Our universities offer a diversity of program, philosophy, and educational experience. Our students have come to campuses where they study with relatively small numbers in their classes, where they can get to know the professor and the professor gets to know them. They not only learn in class but can pick the

professor's brain after class in the coffee shop or at his home. Our universities, because of their size, have afforded students an opportunity to get to know a large cross-section of their fellow students, thus enabling them to develop socially as well as mentally. Our universities have been unique. Each one has had a distinct style, and esprit de corps. The results are readily demonstrable. Our graduates go on and are successful in graduate schools all over the world. Our graduates go into business, education, government and other fields of endeavor and are equally successful.

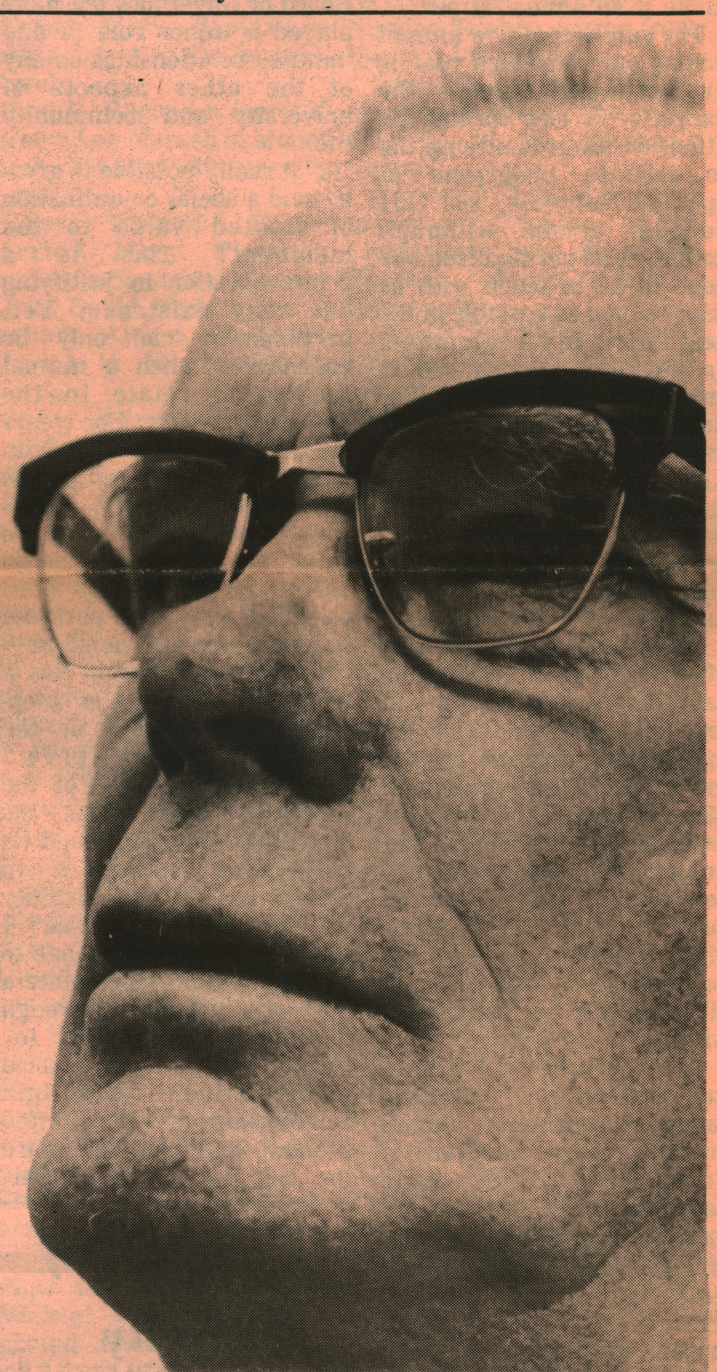
The very educational environment that we now have in this province is what many large universities elsewhere are desperately trying to achieve. All over, the big universities are trying to find ways of breaking down into smaller units, of getting smaller classes and of making the educational experience more personal. Why then should we in Nova Scotia interfere with a system that is already the pacesetter?

There are many ways of effecting economies without changing the existing pattern of instruction. In a province like this we could explore the possibility of purchasing supplies and furnishings on a co-ordinated, co-operative basis. Our universities could explore the use of common designs for buildings, thus effecting savings in architectural fees and construction costs. I am sure there are many other areas that we could profitably explore as well. But these are possibilities that would not interfere with our individuality.

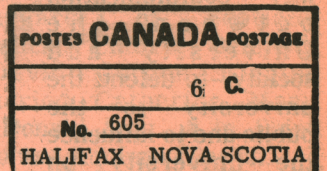
The important thing is that in seeking ways to effect economies we not create more problems than we solve. Education is not like a manufacturing industry

where the bigger the factory the lower the per unit cost of production. In the field of education larger units sometimes mean proportionately larger costs. So amalgamation or even rationalization would not necessarily effect savings. Such trends, however, could create the "monolithic syndrome". They could

endanger the diversity and student centered system of education that we now have. If we are fortunate enough to be in the forefront of an educational trend, then we should spare no effort to preserve our uniqueness, or student centered environments, and our diversity of philosophy and style.

Of recent interest, has been the publication of the long-range proposals for alumni members at the University of Toronto. This extensive study has proven to be an informative document for any alumni organization in attempting self analysis. A brief excerpt may sum up the major challenge of our alumni as it exists today at Saint Mary's University.

"The alumni are in the best position to provide for a two-way communication between the University and society—to defend the university to the public and to influence the university on behalf of society. The basis of the relationship between alumni and their university must be one of mutual benefit. While the primary aim of alumni, through their organizations, should be service, it is also necessary that the university as a whole recognize that its

obligations to its members do not cease when they receive their degrees. Alumni, as a body, cannot be expected to give time, money or counsel over the long-term simply as a result of nostalgia or indebtedness or in response to 'grace and fervor' events such as class reunions and football games".

At Saint Mary's we are an independent body in comparison with many of our counterparts in other universities. We have very good representation on the Board of Governors but have played a minor role in any 'mutual' relationships on any of the other aspects of university and community life.

Is it really possible to grow beyond a social co-ordination of limited value to the members? This is a prime question in justifying our very existence. Yet, participation can only be engendered when a mutual facility to relate to the university exists. For years we have carried on, with limited contributions to the university, limited vocal support of the university life style, while our influence on university affairs has been relegated to the personal influence of a few members—not the body at large. Has it been sheer apathy or ineptitude by members or the various executive?—Perhaps, but what of the university itself? Has the University ever searched its collective conscience to determine its responsibility to the alumni of its past? I extend a sincere challenge to the University to formulate a link with our body through definitive proposals for communication and participation. Nostalgia relationships are of limited life and functional bonds are the only long-term answer.

## 50 Years As Jesuit

A sociologist at Saint Mary's University for 26 years, and chairman of his department for 25 of them, Rev. Daniel W. Rourke this year celebrates the fiftieth anniversary of his entrance into the Society of Jesus. Relatives have joined him in the Canadian Martyrs Parish Center to mark the occasion.

A respected Canadian criminologist and penologist, the 69-year-old priest came to SMU — then Saint Mary's College — in 1945 to teach English and sociology, but served also as dean of extension and director of athletics.

Father Rourke assisted in originating Saint Mary's extension credit courses program. During his deanship, the university originated an extension school in Dartmouth, where Father Rourke taught for two years. Additionally, he

inaugurated here Junior Canadian Football and the Senior Canadian Football League, for which he acted as chairman, referee and sports broadcaster.

Born in 1901 in Saint John, New Brunswick, Father Rourke, educated at Normal School in Truro and St. Francis Xavier University, inaugurated basketball at St. F.X., and was associated with the reformer priest Jimmy Tompkins when he created his "People's School".

Father Rourke, who entered the Society of Jesus in 1921, completed his classical studies at Ignatius College in Guelph, Ontario, studied philosophy and earned a M.A. in sociology at Spokane's Gonzaga University, and studied theology in both Ireland and Wales.

A math, physics and English teacher at Campion College in Regina before coming to Halifax, he coached various athletic teams in city leagues in the Saskatchewan capital. During World War II, he organized air cadets in Regina, served as Air Force chaplain and C.O. of a squadron.
