Alumni President Outlines Objectives

Earl Walsh, partner in the Chartered Accountant firm of Thorne Gunn & Co., was elected to the presidency of the Saint Mary's University Alumni Association last month.

Particular objectives which he and his executive will pursue during the next year will

1) The establishment of the position of treasurer on the Alumni executive to control the budgetary functions and enhance the function of general financial reports;

2) An increase in annual dues and a concerted effort to persuade members who are delinquent in paying their dues to bring them up to date.

3) A continuing effort to establish a full time Alumni director which is in part contingent on

4) The enforcement of constitutional changes that would in particular permit the election of the executive from the Alumni at large, rather than from those chosen by a committee of past presidents.

Mr. Walsh announced that the major Alumni events planned for the next year will be the Summer Homecoming in August; a special social evening; the annual Alumni dinner; Alumni athletics and Receptions at sporting events.

We invite your active participation in Alumni affairs and hope you will find time to attend the various events sponsored by the Alumni Association and to assist serving on the various committees set up during the year to organize these events.

If at any time you wish to become involved, I assure you the Alumni office will welcome you with enthusiasm. Please leave your phone number with the Alumni Secretary, Krisha



"As we go our separate ways and use the confidence, the tools, we acquired at Saint Mary's, we will remember each other and we will hang on to each other because we are all members of the class of 1973 and we will always have Saint Mary's University in common. That quiet, warm, happy feeling we will have as a memory in the future is a result of our time and the experience we were a part of together during these last years."

That was part of Bryan Duffy's Valedictory Address last year and, I feel, expresses the sentiments of many students and graduating classes that have "passed through the portals" of this university. Having graduated from, worked, and lived at Saint Mary's, my own ties are very strong and have been made so in many ways. For many of you Keith Hotchkiss, Ken Clark and Mike Quinn are outstanding athletes but Saint Mary's has made them more than that for me. Mike, his wife Nancy and daughter Kelly were my neighbours in residence and Mike's prowess at furniture moving was as greatly appreciated as his stick handling. Keith was a classmate in Chinese history and many a day we drove Dr. Mary Sun right up the Great Wall of China by our western pronounciation of "Hangchow" — Mary was ready to hang us! And, of course, Keith, Ken Clark and Rick Clare were among the stalwarts who manned the desk at High Rise 11 when I lived there.

David Hope, Paul Cormier, Pat O'Neil, Mike Larsen, Jack Radford, George Hallet, Ken Bendelier, Kevin Cleary, Laurie Smith, Bruce Smith and Murray Wilson are, for many of you, either part of the faculty or administration of the university but they are also Santamarians who gained part of their education in the same school as yourselves. Brian O'Byrne was Dean of Men in Residence and he and Dennis Reardon are remembered as captains of the hockey and basketball teams but, for me, their most memorable moments were not in the rink or the basketball court but in the limited confines of the history grad students room. There O'Byrne, Gerry Kelly, Murray Barkhouse, Bill Casely, Terry Punch and myself had Dennis almost convinced that he was indeed one of the world's greatest authorities on the rise of French Canadian nationalism.

Those are the kinds of feelings to which Bryan Duffy referred. For Bryan himself those memories would include Lennox Phillips, Paul Height, Bill Arthur, Malcolm Butterfield, Madeline Yogis and the rest of the Commerce crew.

Convocation represents the end of one stage of Saint Mary's life but opens the door for another — and the unsung heroes (not too many females have been involved as yet) who have kept the alumni association going, bid you welcome! They will keep you in touch with the school, the people in it and the people you met there. Through the alumni association you will meet others sharing your common bond. If you want to see this in action join in the fun of Homecoming '74 — it's your year so why not come and meet those who have gone before you? Mildred Harrington R.I.P.

When Mildred Harrington came to Saint Mary's fifteen years ago she had already completed a distinguished teaching career in her native P.E.I. However, to label her as a "teacher" is less than accurate because her main interest was developing human beings rather than imparting enough subject matter for a student to pass an examination. This was the role she played at S.M.U. for 15 years. She was much more a tutor than a teacher. Her greatest interest was in the student who was having difficulties studying. Her greatest skill was teaching students how to study, how to learn, how to be self-reliant. And it was this concern that endeared the students to her.

But along with this serious dedication to human beings and their personal development, there was a social dimension in her life that was almost apostolic. She loved fun. A party was always livelier when she was there. And it was not often she was not there. But even here there was a serious dimension. Socializing was a way of opening herself to others and of helping others to be open with one another. This ability to celebrate was for her an important part of being human. It was anything but an escape from reality. It was an important part of being human and a way of helping others to be balanced human beings.

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The homilist at her funeral service concluded his remarks with a quotation from that part of the Book of Proverbs that describes The Valiant Woman. People who knew Mildred well and had worked and played with her over the years thought it was very apt.

"Charm is deceitful, and beauty empty. The woman who is wise is the one to praise. Give her a share in what her hands have worked for, and let her works tell her praises at the city gates."

Miss Mildred Harrington served Saint Mary's well and her memory will linger long in the halls of academe she loved so much.
