



Message From The President



Last April I assumed the Presidency of the Saint Mary's University Alumni Association. I am honored that you have shown such confidence in my abilities and I will endeavour to follow in the capable footsteps of my predecessor, Patrick Curran.

Your 1980-81 Executive has been meeting on a regular basis since April concentrating its efforts on the areas of membership and social events. With respect to social events, the 4th Annual Alumni Golf Tournament was held in August at the Oakfield Golf Club and the 1st Annual Tennis Tournament was held in September. Both events proved very successful. Our Skating Sessions, open to all Alumni, have commenced on Sunday afternoons at the Alumni Arena. Under the Chairmanship of the Alumni's Vice-President, Don Keleher, plans are well advanced for the Annual Alumni Dinner to be held Saturday, December 6, 1980.

In the area of membership, a Committee headed by Richard Bishop is working hard to update lists so our Alumni will be better informed on our Association's activities and university life in general.

We Alumni have one major responsibility to Saint Mary's and that is to support her, to pay her back in one way or another for the years we have spent in gaining our education. Support for Saint Mary's will differ with each individual. Some may give large sums of money; some may provide less aid but may be constantly on the look-out for young people in their communities to attend our institution. Whatever way you as Alumni can support Saint Mary's, that support will be appreciated and will provide tangible evidence that we are concerned about the future of Saint Mary's.

Presently, the University almost entirely subsidizes the operations of the Alumni office. This is a situation most uncommon to other universities where perhaps only a small percent of the total Alumni operation is subsidized by the University. In the coming years, Alumni will be called upon to reverse this trend thus enabling the University to redirect funds presently earmarked for the Alumni Office to other programs within the University.

Certainly the 1980's will be difficult ones, universities not excluded. It will be incumbent upon Alumni to play an ever more increasing role in ensuring the future existence and viability of Saint Mary's as a learning institution.

I ask you as Alumni to seriously consider what Saint Mary's has meant to you and keep it in mind for future support in whatever form that support should take.

Annual Dinner

Don Keheler, Vice-President of the Association and Chairman of the Annual Dinner Committee has announced plans for this year's event.

The dinner will be held on Saturday, December 6th. A number of factors prompted the change, for this year, from December 8th. These included the space needs of the University for the examination period beginning on the 9th, the availability of special guests and the preference for a Saturday evening.

The dinner has been planned as a springboard for the University's participation in the coming International Year of Disabled Persons.

The association will extend publicly its appreciation to a number of public and private organizations that have made significant con-

Alumnus To Be Honored

Terence Heenan, B.Sc. '47 will receive the degree of Doctor of Engineering (honoris causa) at a special convocation of the Technical University of Nova Scotia on November 16 in Toronto. Mr. Heenan is one of four distinguished engineers to be so honored.

Following graduation from Saint Mary's and Nova Scotia Technical College, Mr. Heenan began his professional career with the Maritime Telegraph and Telephone Company where he later became Assistant Chief Engineer. In 1965 he was named chairman of the Advisory Group, Trans-Canada Telephone System. He later became Vice-President of the British Columbia Telephone Company and its chief executive officer.

In 1978 he was named President of the Trans-Canada Telephone System and Chairman of the Board of Management.

Three brothers of Mr. Heenan are also alumni of Saint Mary's, Reverend Gregory B.A. '48, Peter B. Comm '54, and Joseph B.Sc. '57.

Over the past years, there have been many inquiries from out-of-town Alumni asking what ever became of the Pic or Winnies Lodge et al. Now all those inquiries are going to be put to rest in one fell swoop in a rather nostalgic look at some of those famous haunts.

Before I begin, however, let me invite you in the phraseology that is most appropriate: "Let's go to the Nelson for a quart, the Pic for a beer and clams, the LBR for some chicks, the Derby for a steak or Winnie's for a smoker.

The first stop on our sojourn would have to be Winnie's Lodge on Inglis Street. It still exists, perhaps a little grottier than it once was, but in general, unchanged. The basement entrance at the back still leads down to that musty scene of so many stags, smokers or society parties that somehow, never stayed very private. I doubt very much if the smell of stale beer and cigarettes could ever be removed from that low-ceilinged den. It would seem like the only death that the party room could fittingly receive would be to be bronzed and mounted on a walnut plaque for the trophy case in the Student Union Building.

Though a little bit more popular with later students at Saint Mary's University, the Lighthouse Tavern on Barrington Street would have to be our next stop. The original men's tavern still exists with the neon boy peeing in the river, but now it's mixed. There are as many females as males in there now. (Not in the river—in the tavern.) The most surprising aspect about the "Lightie", however, is the large addition which was put on the south side several years ago. It has a kitchen, dance floor and plays disco music! It is a far cry from country and western on a Longshoreman's harmonica!

If we proceed along Barrington Street past that now defunct but popular Romans Food, we hit the foot of Spring Garden Road. A quick trip up would bring us to the corner of Grafton Street, and a right turn would lead us to the former Picadilly Tavern. The building is still there but now it's called Papa Gino's Italian Cookery. The exterior is relatively unchanged but inside there is hardly a similarity. Gone are the old tables with those great maps of early Nova Scotia, the wall silhouettes of bar maids and tri-corned patrons and the bleary-eyed old men who stumbled in for some warmth, a beer and some spirited conversation. Also, instead of ordering a hot hamburger, fried clams and a draft you'd get pasta, salad and red wine. The old Pic is gone, my friends!

Now, if you knew someone who had a car or were ready for a brisk walk, you could head down to the Derby for a steak. It still holds court on Gottingen Street, still has the beer barrels across the front and, of course, still has a host of derbied waiters. The inside is pretty much the same except for a few partitions and the addition of a downstairs washroom. As in all cases, it too, is a mixed tavern, though a stalwart hold-out to the end. As always, there are good steaks there, but the Midtown Tavern back on Grafton Street is the popular spot these days.

If you're still up for a little carousing, we can start back towards Saint Mary's and stop in at the Lord Nelson. Before heading in, however, the usual thing would be to check at the door of the LBR to see if there were any "chicks" there that you knew. With any luck you could spot someone from the Mount or Dal who would invite you to sit with them. Now, however, you'd likely be at the end of a line waiting to pay a cover charge for the entertainment. That's right, the LBR, no longer a corral for "checking stock"; is now a spot where Celtic groups abound. The sound of tin whistles, fiddles and tenor voices replace the din of conversation and shouts for more beer.

Going over to the "men's" side of the Lord Nelson is no longer a banishment from the ladies. Here, too, pulchritude abounds. There are still the familiar Chambers cartoons and naval plaques on the walls but the quart beer is gone. Otherwise, this bastion of the beer drinking university set is intact.

Want to have a coffee before we head back to the school? Not upstairs at Murray's we won't! It's now an expanded Lawton's Drug Store. The Port of Entry across the street is out, too. It's now Pepe's and a little rich for our blood. Guess we'll just have to head on down the "Gag"—pardon me—the Garden View!

Old Journal Jottings

December 15, 1950—Saint Mary's won a M.I.D.L. debate against Saint Francis Xavier Thursday, December 7, when Ron Dulhanty and Ted Riordan upset the resolution "education should be exclusively in the hands of the federal government" and tipped the hands of the judging scales in their favour.

April 25, 1951—"Bill Dishlin, Arts IV, silent and composed during the proceedings, was found guilty on six counts last Friday by the "Grand Jury" of Saint Mary's University Supreme Court at the annual Mock trial . . . Dishlin smirked as he listened to Judge Pat Crosby pass sentence, "seven years away from the Mulgrave Youth Centre", the maximum allowed by law.

(The Jury was composed of: Paul Chisholm, Beaton Downie, Eric Edwards, Patton MacLean, Joe MacDonald, Ron Gillis, George Steele, Ray Waller, Cecil Robertson, Gerry Blackburn, Jim McLaughlin, and Colin Campbell.)

February 13, 1953—"Arguing that television in Canada should not be controlled by the CBC, Jack Hayes and Bob O'Connell of the Arts Society handed the hitherto undefeated Commerce debaters their first loss of the current year."

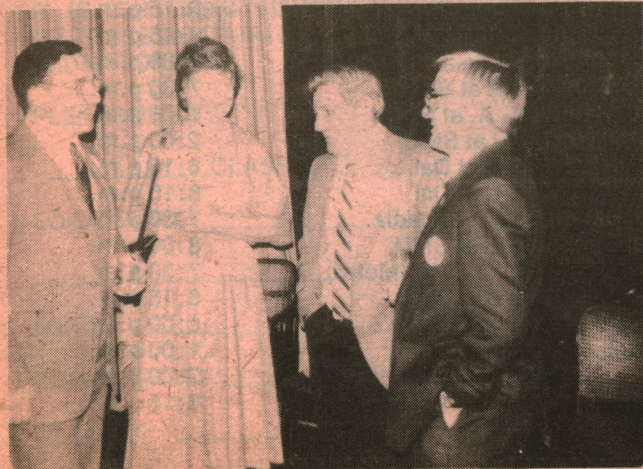
