### New Facilities at Huskie Stadium

Saturday, October 10 marked the official opening of the upgraded field and new track at Saint Mary's Huskie Stadium. The funding for the facilities was made possible through a Federal government grant of \$1.8 million. Gerald Regan, Labour Minister and Minister in charge of Fitness and Amateur Sport for Canada announced his government's decision at last year's Alumni dinner.

Mr. Regan was present for the Opening of the track and field which will serve not only Saint Mary's but the major sporting events from across the province. Also on hand for the occasion were Dr. Ken Ozmon, President of SMU; Don Keleher, President of the Alumni Association; John Akkerman, Vice President of the Students' Representative Council and many members of the University community.

The field, the first artificial surface in Eastern Canada, is ringed by a 6 lane Chevron track of "nearly-Nova Scotian-blue". The colourful combination of the green field with its white, blue and yellow lines, rimmed with the blue track is definitely reminiscent of this province's tartan. The spectacle is certainly most appealing.

Besides the opening ceremonies, however, Huskie fans were treated to the exciting win of their football team over the St. F.X. X-men, 38-21. It put the finishing touches on a proud day for Santamarians everywhere. The field, which will receive constant use by the football, soccer, field hockey and intra-mural teams, has already proven itself to be a big hit with the student population in general. The track, as yet a novelty to the Saint Mary's sports scene, will doubtless spark the initiation of more competitive running at the site.

The VII Pan American Wheelchair Games scheduled for Halifax from August 20-29, 1982, will be using Saint Mary's facilities for its track and field events as well as for the opening ceremonies. This world class sporting event featuring upwards to 20 countries from North, Central and South Americas, has chosen Saint Mary's not only because of her fine outdoor facilities. Beyond that is the University's fine record for offering barrier free education opportunities to the disabled student. We can all be proud.



## Bob Hayes to be Honoured

Perhaps the most illustrious individual in amateur football in Canada. Bob Hayes (73), Athletic Director of Saint Mary's University, is to be noured, November 20 at the Grey p Dinner in Montreal. In respect for his great contribution to the development of amateur football in the Maritimes, he has been chosen as one of the four recipients of this year's C.A.F.A. C.F.L. awards. These citations (Canadian Amateur Football Association — Canadian Football League) are given annually to those individuals who have aided in the growth of the sport in Canada. There can be little doubt that Bob Hayes ranks highly among such an esteemed group.

Besides being honoured nationally at the Grey Cup Dinner, the name of Bob Hayes will appear on the C.A.F.A. - C.F.L. scroll at the Canadian Football Hall of Fame in Hamilton.

In its ongoing effort to keep in touch with all aspects of Saint Mary's University, the Alumni Board invited Mr. Hayes to address them at their Sept. 17 meeting.
