This past year's activities began with the Convocation exercises in May of 1984. The Chancellors' Dinner on May 11th marked the golden anniversary of the class of 1934

Our athletic committee, under the chairmanship of David White, presented a report on the status of athletics at Saint Mary's to an ad hoc committee from the Board of Governors. # Annual University Art Exhibition

Leighton Davis, Director/Curator, was extremely pleased with this year's show, adding that it is not a juried exhibition. All submissions were accepted. This year 76 pieces were shown, including sculptures, photographs, paintings, drawings, collages, portraits and works in a number of different mediums.

#### Alumni Capital Campaign Drive

The Saint Mary's Alumni have organized a new Executive Committee to raise their \$1.2 million share of the university's \$13 million Capital Campaign.

Chairman of the committee is Jim Crane, who will work closely with members Rick Butler, Bob Dimock, Bob Hayes, Dick Loiselle, David Murphy, and Don Reardon. The committee hopes to revitalize alumni fund-raising through new initiatives and strategies.

Granville Kelly has been appointed Director of Operations for the Executive Committee. He will coordinate and implement policies and procedures in the areas of publicity and public relations; alumni information flow; volunteer recruitment, including managers, captains, and canvassers; special projects within the alumni campaign (dinners, speakers, etc.); and logistics and records.

The new campaign will first concentrate on the 4100 active alumni in Halifax/Dartmouth. The target for local pledges is \$600,000. As the drive gains momentum, the committee will institute successive stages in order to meet provincial, national, and international pledge objectives. The executive is enthusiastic, and the outlook encouraging.

# Technical Aids in Employment and Education for the Disabled

sponsored by the SAINT MARY'S UNIVERSITY ALUMNI ASSOCIATION

The project on technical aids took place between June 4th and November 30th, 1984. During that period, the two project employees acquainted the disabled population with programs and policies which may assist disabled persons purchasing equipment for employment and education.

The availability of such devices was also a major concern of the project. Most disabled people who require technical aids cannot obtain information which would help them choose an appropriate piece of equipment.

Because of this lack of awareness and information on the availability of technical aids, the workers decided to organize a conference bringing together disabled consumers, distributors of equipment, and professionals from employment and education. The conference was held at Saint Mary's on November 7th and 8th.

In preparation for the conference, the workers contacted and requested the participation of agencies, organizations, consumer groups, distributors, and all government departments involved with services for the disabled. A pamphlet was then put together and sent out to the organizations

A number of individuals were invited to speak at the conference to inform the disabled about government policies, programs, and services related to technical aids. The range of representation included the N.S. Department of Education; the N.S. League of Equal Opportunities, a consumer group; Vocational Rehabilitation; Student Services, Saint Mary's; and Special Education, Dalhousie.

The distributors at the conference displayed equipment serving the needs of the visually and hearing impaired. Aids displayed were the Information Through Speech
Computer Terminal; Versa Braille
and information storage retrieval
system; the Kurzwiel Reading
Machine; an FM public listening
system for the hearing impaired; and
a communication system that allows
the hearing impaired and deaf to use
the telephone.

The conference was recorded on video cassette for the benefit of disabled consumers. The video recording will be edited, and a 15 minute presentation on technical aids and programs stored in the Resource Centre, Room 427, Student Services at Saint Mary's. Students will then be able to borrow this information on request.

In summary, we feel that the project has been successful in communicating the availability of both technical aids and the programs through which such aids can be obtained and and and aids.

We would like to express our appreciation to the Canada Employment and Immigration Centre for funding the project. We would also like to thank the Saint Mary's University Alumni Association for their sponsorship.

It is our hope that this newlycreated awareness and the desire for progress do not cease with the termination of the project. For disabled consumers, high-tech may well be the key that opens the door to the future.

#### Alumnus Investigates Needs of Disabled Students

I was employed by Saint Mary's in March 1984 through a Career Access Program sponsored by Canada Employment and Immigration. For the past ten months I have been working with staff of Students Services and other university departments to make the University community more aware of the needs of disabled students.

My present position as Public Information Officer with Student Services has involved me in a number of projects. I have assisted with fund raising for disabled programs, gathered materials for the resource centre, and supported the installation of Braille plaques in the Student Centre elevators.

In the last few months I have worked closely with David Leitch of Counselling Services towards the establishment of the Maritime Centre for Disabled Students. The goal of the Centre is to make postsecondary education more accessible to hearing-impaired persons in the Atlantic region. The

program will combine the resources of several universities in Atlantic Canada to provide services such as interpreting, note-taking and language skills for hearing-impaired persons enrolled in post-secondary institutions.

I began my job at Saint Mary's knowing that it might be some time before I would be able to work with a degree of independence. I wanted to be capable of performing my duties with minimum assistance from co-workers. I believe I have made progress toward this goal, but it would not have been possible without technical aids.

#### **Education Student Wins Curren** Scholarship

David MacEachern is a man with an unusual ambition. The 30-year-old education student from Prince Edward Island wants to teach auto mechanics at a vocational school. What is so unusual about his ambition is that David MacEachern is disabled as the result of a car accident in 1973. He is confined to a wheelchair

The accident has not deterred him. After recuperating, he enrolled at Saint Mary's in 1975 and graduated four years later with a Bachelor of Science degree in psychology, with a minor in engineering. He chose Saint Mary's, he says; because the University is ideally suited to disabled students.

After completing his degree, Mr. MacEachern decided to return to his first love, auto mechanics, and in particular to teach the subject. He tried to obtain a teaching post but each time lost out to a more highly qualified applicant. (Vocational teachers on Prince Edward Island do not require a Bachelor of Education

degree but it is preferred.) Therefore, he elected to enrol at Saint Mary's to complete all course requirements for a fully qualified vocational teacher on the Island.

He was encouraged to apply for a Donald E. Curren Scholarship, and recently received \$1000 from the Scholarship Fund. The Curren Scholarships are administered by Dalhousie University in the name of Donald Curren, Q.C., former Director of the Atlantic branch of the Canadian Paraplegic Association.

Mr. MacEachern now lives in one of the residence suites that have been adapted for disabled students. Does his disability hinder him in his chosen profession? Apparently not. He has spent most of the past five years working as an auto mechanic in a garage in his home town of Hampton, P.E.I. He also just completed one month practice teaching in the Auto Mechanic Division of the Regional Vocational School - and he received an 'A' grade.



Under Head Coach Kathy Mullane, the Saint Mary's University Field Hockey Belles dominated the Atlantic Conference, finishing with a regular season record of 11-1. A pair of victories in Fredericton during the October 27th-28th weekend gave the Belles the league championship.

The team went on to Vancouver for the C.I.A.U. Championships on November 2nd and 3rd, where they retained their fourth place Canadian ranking. The Belles were 1-3 at the nationals.

Team Captain Annelie Vandenberg again gained a berth on the All-Conference team. She was joined by rookie sensation Darlene Stoyka, who was also named to the All-Canadian squad and received C.I.A.U. Athlete of the Week honours.

Stoyka, a member of Canada's Olympic Field Hockey team, rewrote the A.U.A.A. record book with her outstanding performance this year.

She recorded 35 of the Belles' 68 goals during the regular campaign, smashing old records for most goals in a single season by both a team and one player. A nine-goal performance by Stoyka in a 15-1 victory over the St. Francis Xavier X-ettes on October 10th broke two more records: most goals in a single game by one team and one player.

The 1984-85 Field Hockey Belles have once again carved their initials in the league silverware, rewriting several pages of the record book along the way.

#### 1984-85 Women's Basketball

Pre-season competition at the Acadia, Laval, and Brock tournaments yielded a championship at the Tipoff in Wolfville and a consolation title at Laval for the Saint Mary's women's basketball team. From there, the Santamarians got down to the business of clinching a playoff berth.
