Lynch and MacDonald still crossed the ferry, Father Filion and his grammar were seen at every French class. "Campus Jottings" made their first appearance in the "Journal" but, being unknown, we rarely made them. Eddie Boyd began a long career of ringing bells. C.O.T.C. paraded every afternoon. Leahy and Brennan were Boarders, Tom Purcell and Emmett Campbell fell in with the other three trainees (twice a month). Bishop ("The Mole") used to awe everyone the way he did Maths. The B.S.U. had its origin. We all went to Antigonish on a memorable hockey trip and everybody (that had enough strength) came home. Some of us saw the Mock Trial when "Chose Theriault's" life hung in the balance and Spud Murphy as foreman of the jury fell asleep. We went to Aldershot and who'll forget. Johnnie Marvin broke his ankle in the Rorum, and "Who Ride on White Horses" was a marked success. As Freshmen we dreaded Economics and Upperclassmen. Fall of '41 Sophomore year found the College boarders as a self-contained unit. "Zekie" Campbell and Beedie forsook Arts for Commerce. Bud Graves returned after a gruelling year in the world of business to augment the ranks of the Commerce men. Pat O'Neill came from St. Pat's and threw in his lot with the Artsmen. C.O.T.C. parades were changed to two a week. The football team journeyed to Antigonish and the score, the Norfolk, and the juke box's, 'I don't Want to Set the World on Fire" are but hazy memories. The handball alleys blew down one Sunday afternoon. We struggled through Milton and "Andromaque" while Beckie wrote the "Jotter Column", which continued to be the Journal's most widely read and popular column. Jim O'Neil was Sodality Prefect and Father Burns replaced Father Filion as Moderator. "The Upper Room" was presented and most of us wished it hadn't been Leahey and Brennan were still "Boarding" The College sponsored its first Press Exhibit. In hockey, we won the Provincial championship and Pineo ("Peener") won the most valuable Player Award. Bill Dalton, Charlie Reardon and Jimmie Moriarty were Cheerleaders and pep rallys were really that. Mr. Hayden's sketches enlivened Bulletin Boards. Jack Campbell was Year Book Editor. We marched out of Aldershot on June 6. Norman's Malady was the highlight of Camp.

My Tata Thank to Mike Edgar still talks about those delicious marshmallow cookies of Wally Folley's (the "Marshmallow" was Colgate's tooth paste), and Odie's visiting those quarantined, taking off a respirator to talk and putting it back on before leaving. Fall of '42 Juniors and the beginning of the "It" Show era. Arts spent their free periods looking for class rooms. Tom Purcell was Editor of the hapless Anthology. Beckie was still writing "Jotter" Columns. B.S.U. was dissolved and its members took refuge in the Commerce Department. We had a new O.C. in Major McManus. Gene Savard coached college football. Gerald Reardon and Tom Sullivan were the A.A.A. Executive. Mike Edgar and Phil Vaughan debated successfully against Acadia. Joe Fultz was still getting through Latin; Mike Merrigan was still trying to. In hockey we won against Acadia only to lose against St. F.X. Pat O'Neil sang, "At the Midnight Hour", in History class. Bud Graves wrote his memorable treatise on "Our Town". "Peener" and his Ford had parted. Leahey and Brennan were still "Boarding" but Leahey found time to become a "39'er" while Reyno coached the Engineers' team to victory. Fall of '43 The Last-Mile-Seniors; and unsuspecting Frosh looked up to us. Mike Merrigan was a Sergeant; Eddie Boyd was boarding out and Tom Purcell jumped every time Father Filion mentioned the word "Journal" in French class. Don Campbell again looked after the Book Room and was A.A.A. For a week or two Arts had Monsieur Gautheron for French Secretary. # C. O. T. C.



One of the best moves of the year was the formation of the Student Council. The enthusiasm with which it was received, promises that the Council will grow and strengthen in future years.


On November 7, 1943, at the suggestion of the President of St. Mary's, Rev. F. C. Smith, S.J., such an organization became part of the life of the student. The student body then nominated and elected an executive council which in turn appointed a committee composed of one representative from each faculty, presenting a complete cross section of the student body. The result of the election placed Raymond V. Beck of Sr. Science as the first president with

This central organization will fill a need that has been long felt in the social life of the College. The lack of support, financial difficulties, and unnecessary competition, that has bedeviled the individual societies, will be done away with, and in their place co-operation of all the societies, will, it is hoped, lead to a harmonious unity amid diversity.

The main idea of a Student Council, using the words of the Constitution, shall be, "to promote the best interests of the students by sharing with the faculty the responsibilities of College Government, in all matters not strictly academic, and in accordance with the powers conferred by Fr. Rector." With this kept in mind the Student Council should not become just "another organization," but the organization of St. Mary's College.

Although the Council has not as yet benefited the average student to any great extent, it has already established a firm internal organization. A Constitution has been drawn up and the aims of the Council clearly announced, so that those who propose to carry on in following years will be able to devote their full time to the benefit of the College at large.







During the short first semester the Auxiliary staged a Fall Bridge and the Faculty Tea, and rendered excellent service on Sodality Day, Dec. 8.




# Alumni Association

# Tau Gamma Sigma






This year's activities, although somewhat modified from those of past seasons, still achieved the same degree of success in their operation.



managed to reach the play-offs. Here they were definitely given their walking ticket, by the powerful scarlet and white squad.


The success for the year must not be measured by the number of trophies won, but by the experience gained by the many students in organized competition.




