





PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE TO THE GRADUATES

Dear Graduates:

Your graduation from College after four years of study would seem to be the completion of a phase of your career but that is not so; it has been but an all too short acquaintance with the use of instruments by which the intellectual vitality of the world is maintained. Such instruments will always be within your reach if you are wise enough to use them, for, thanks to the opportunities of modern life, you will never be deprived of the use of books, not merely books that tell you how to make a living but rather those that tell you how to make your life ever a richer and a fuller life. The seeds of the present conflict between nations have had their growth encouraged in minds that never found the high delights of real living. The low valuation which totalitarian thinking has placed upon the most sacred principles of life has in a large measure been the cause of the world's present discomfiture and distress.

Unfortunately, for many years the material values of life have been receiving more attention in the halls of learning than those ends which, because of their very nature, must be for ever the ultimate goal of the soul's striving. It is because of this false training of the mind and heart that men have followed darkness rather than light. Out of this sham intellectualism has arisen a prejudice against College-bred men because, though they seemed to know many things, they never came to a knowledge of themselves nor of the ends of life. One cannot expect to make a proper use of that whose purpose and end he does not know. And it is this very condition which aids every effort of those who deny the highest ends of being whilst they rivet chains of tyranny upon the necks of free peoples.

In the life opening up before you, many desirable opportunities may present themselves but it will be safe to say that only those may be considered real aids to greatness which arise out of your own holy thoughts and eager striving after the noblest ends of life. When such rich assets attend your labors relay to those still in doubt and wanting in courage some of the inspirations which may have aided you along the way. For you as for them the way will never be smooth. It will, until the end of time, be always harder to follow truth than to follow a leader.



A general meeting was held soon after the year began and the executive for the year was elected:








INTERCOLLEGIATE HOCKEY
