


BURKE, JOHN Chelsea, Massachusetts






BYRNE, JAMES Buchans, Newfoundland

"He who tastes not of sorrow drinks not of the fountain of wisdom."



COOLEN, MICHAEL Halifax, Nova Scotia


". . . little by little, a fool grows wise."



"It is better to have loved and lost than never to have loved at all."



"Woe be to him who reads but one book."



DOUCETTE, HAROLD Halifax, Nova Scotia


"The winds and waves are always on the side of the ablest navigators."

"A truly educated man has not only acquired knowledge but has the wit and will to use it."



GALLAGHER, TERRY Halifax, Nova Scotia


Time passes

"The devil can cite scripture to serve his purpose." Therefore, when I am old, ask me what I have accomplished."



"A woman, especially if she has the misfortune of knowing anything should conceal it as well as she can."



"Pure friendship is something which men of an inferior intellect can never taste."



"Each man must be true to himself and follow the good as he sees it."



KEITH, ALLAN Westmount, Quebec



"Never think that thou hast made any progress till thou lookest upon thyself as inferior to all."



KENNEDY, JOSEPH Grand Lake, Nova Scotia




KENNEDY, WILLIAM Trepassy, Newfoundland



LAWLOR, WILLIAM Dartmouth, Nova Scotia


"Nothing great was ever achieved without enthusiasm".

Bill came over to Saint Mary's from the Twin City. A History major, Bill has not decided as yet whether he will go after his degree in education or pursue a master degree in History.




LAWRENCE, JAMES Brulington, Vermont, U.S.A.

LEBLANC, JOHN Bachelor of Arts



MacADAM, DOUGLAS Halifax, Nova Scotia


"With wearisome labour keen Books of weight have seen Day by day have increased my lore Yet I am wiser than before."



McDUFF, RAYMOND Gaspe, Quebec


"The secret of life consists not in doing what you like, but in liking what you do."




McHALE, NORBERT Lowell, Mass., U.S.A.

"Imagination is more important than knowledge."



"Men at some times are masters of their late,"



MURPHY, JOHN BRIAN Saint John, New Brunswick


"To the painfulness and slowness of the formation corresponds the stability of the product,"



Their constant performance is a perfect example of the spirit and initiative that sparked the Huskies to their first Atlantic Bowl win.










