#### THE FORTHCOMING DEBATE

It is with a great deal of pleasure that we received the news of the continuance of the Radio Debating series begun last year by the Reverend Brother President, Brother Lannon. St. Mary's has always shone in the debating field and lost none of its lustre when her boys carried their talents to the air waves and defeated Dalhousic in last year's contest. We hope for a repetition of that victory when the two teams meet shortly, but win or lose it is the participation that counts. This year is obviously bound to be one of intense extra-curricular activity and perhaps no more excellent means of carrying on these activities can be found than these air debates. They present a broader field for the display of our knowledge and talents than any other and we sincerely hope that they will be utilized to the fullest extent throughout the year.

## The Rowell Commission

A subject of controversy at the present time and a subject of vital importance to all Canadians, young and old, is the Rowell Commission. To many the name and purpose of this commission is entirely unknown. To my readers who may be in this category (and who have not left this column as yet) I beg leave to explain why the commission was formed.

The commission named after its chairman was appointed by Mr. Mac-Kenzie King, Prime Minister of Canada, for the purpose of reviewing and offering suggestions about constitutional amendments and relations between the provinces and the Dominion. In other words, they are to look into the British North-American Act to see just how antiquated it is. They are to attempt to discover if Canada has outgrown this act, if this act is still serving the best interests of the people, or, if it is a stumbling block to progress in political, social and economic fields. If they find the last to be true they are

Yet one asks how does that make any changes or amendments will surely affect the life of every Cana-

One writer defines constitution as, The general body of rules and principles controlling the distribuchanges or amendments to it. Since the B.N.A. Act is part of the conlittle deduction to see its importance.

But, is there any need of changes or amendments? Both major political parties think so. When Mr. Bennett attempted his social security measures they were declared unconstitutional. His unemployment insurance and other social measures had to be discarded. Why? According to the B.N.A. Act there is division of power between the federal and provincial governments. Mr. Bonnett's federal policies were encroaching the provincial field. Hence, even though the measures in themselves were good and would have still contained the distribution of power and the benefits that would be derived from the measures had to be pushed aside in favor of a constitutional technicality. From this we can easily see why changes or amendments are desired.

Now we reach the question why there is opposition. We realize that there is need of re-adjustment, then why not have the commission perform that task? First of all there is the objection that the Commission is not needed; that this work should be done by a conference of all political groups, both federal and pro-

Next, we are paying persons for

The third point of opposition is the selection of the commission. Some claim that the Commission has been too carefully selected. That is, that the members were chosen so that the interests of a certain party would benefit, and that the interests of the opponents would be scantily served. This conclusion would naturally be taken where there are two major parties battling for power.

Much opposition is the result of policy. The commission was ap-

pointed by the major party in power. Consequently many, not affiliated with that party, would as a matter of policy oppose it. The majority of these would be "die-hard" partisans. Anything suggested by the other party would be odious to them.

Then there is the claim that the members of the commission will look after the interests of "big business," with the result that the ordinary man in the street would come out a poor second-best. The commission being as they say, "unrepresentative and irresponsible", could be very conveniently controlled by "big business."

How is this opposition answered? First, conferences are unwieldly things. They are difficult to organize and difficult to keep together. A question of such importance would require a great amount of time. Would it be possible for the federal and provincial political heads to allot an indifinite period of time for such a conference? The usual results of such conferences are disappointing. Disappointment cannot be risked in this matter.

Finally there is too much sectionalism. Canada is sorely in need of more national unity. When such a conference would meet each section of Canada, the Maritimes, Quebec, Ontario, the Prairies, and British Columbia would bring their own ideas and would doggedly persist when opposed by another section.

Commissions before were nonpolitical. If this was deemed advisable for other questions surely it is proper for one of such moment. Still there must be another reason for no politicians. Politicians, to remain as such, must always keep their eyes on their constitutency. Hence they would not enter this work as free individuals. They would have to live up to the policies of their party and to the expectation of their constituents.

Lastly, the members of the commission are supposed to represent the different phases of Canadian They were chosen for their stitution of Canada we need very ability to represent the economic, social, and industrial aspects of Canadian life. After all, any changes of constitution will affect those fields more so than the political field. Hence since the members appointed have no political future to worry them they can give a fair, unbinsed (politically) report of the B.N.A. Act and its faults.

In this article the writer has striven to present the question itself, the opposition, and the support. In so doing he worked with the hope that both sides of the question would be fairly treated. He also had the hope that his work would result in proved beneficial, yet the B.N.A. Act the discussion of this important issue which, without a doubt, is bound to leave a deep impression on our

Art. 2, Objects: To unite all Athletic activities of both the College and High School Departments under one Governing Body. This body will have the following powers;

(1) Receive all moneys which rightfully belong to the Association, whether they be in the form of Students' Athletic Fees, Gate Receipts, Advertisements, Royalties, Social Activities, or Levies.
