SMU Adopts Assault Policy

Proposed one year ago, Saint Mary's is now only weeks away from being one of the few universities in Canada to implement a Sexual Assault Policy.

Presently, there are no formal procedures for Saint Mary's to handle sexual assault cases. The new policy would mean that "members of the university community committing sexual assaults will be subject to a range of disciplinary measures up to and including dismissal or expulsion."

Also, the policy outlines the procedures for sexual assault cases in residence. It would determine whether the alleged respondent should vacate the premises immediately. The investigation will include informal meetings with the sexual assault survivor, the alleged respondent, Director of Student Services, Sexual Harassment Advisor, the Director of Residence, the Assistant Director of Residence Life and the Counseling CO-ordinator.

The procedure for handling complaints will be supervised by the Sexual Harassment Advisor. Following a complaint, the accused will be contacted. Then, an investigation will be launched and both the alleged victim and the alleged respondent will be expected to CO-operate with the advisor.

Those involved in the judicial process of

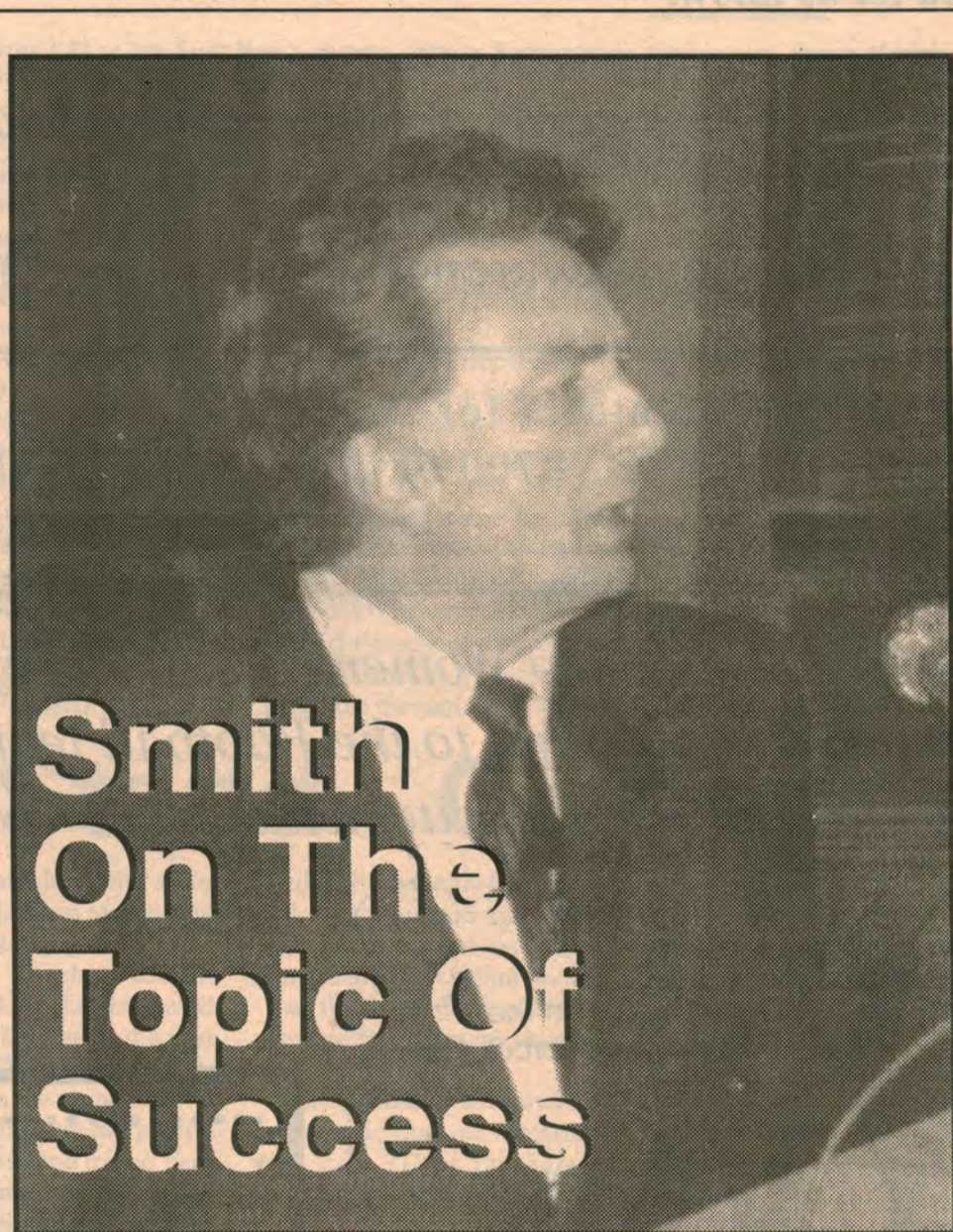
a sexual assault case would maintain confidentiality of both the alleged victim and perpetrator. The only time confidentiality would be disclosed is for security reasons on campus.

Sexual harassment Advisor, Jo Stern says the main concept of the policy "is to educate those on campus of what sexual assault actually means." She adds "I'm not talking about all guys, but there are some critical misunderstandings that young men often

have about communicating and listening to communication from other women. The big thrust is educating people and assisting the survivors of sexual assaults."

For the policy to become implemented it still has to be approved by the Board of Governors (BOG). Jo Stern says that at the October 26 BOG meeting "the policy elicited con-

A success story just hit Saint Mary's. Last Wednesday evening Roger Smith one of Canada's most successful entrepreneurs spoke at Saint Mary's.

Smith started with nothing and has made millions from processing salt fish for the Latin market with his company, San Souci. At age 51, Roger Smith has realized the success and failure of being an entrepreneur. He admits his experience of tough times, but has transformed failure into success.

"Life is a learning process, It never stops. Your future will be created by no one but yourself" says Smith.

The audience of over 100 people were primarily SMU students. The Association of Collegiate Entrepreneurs (ACE) and Saint Mary's University worked together to have Smith speak at SMU.

Smith's lecture was structured in the form of seven qualities and principles to help people make their lives, careers and relationships successful.

Having self esteem, passion for life, being people oriented and visualizing yourself in succeeding are ways Smith believes will help make life successful.

Smith says that some people are more successful than others because of self esteem. "No one will rise higher than their definition of themselves. Look at yourself as unique and different, and be proud of who you are."

Smith believes everyone should have a purpose in life and not just goals. Smith acknowledges that few people have found their purpose. "I know what it is like to live in the fast lane and to set goals without purpose. Life's purpose runs deeper than setting goals. Ask yourself, what can I give to life rather than what can I get from life," says Smith.

"We can all make a difference in other people's lives. If I can touch your life in any way tonight that means my purpose will be met" says Smith.

Smith encourage positive thinking and

Axworthy Insists On Cuts

The possibility of tuition costing close to \$6,000 by 1996 is becoming more of a reality.

Saint Mary's University Students' Association Director of External Affairs, Boris Mirtchev and other student representatives from Atlantic universities attended a meeting last Wednesday at the Provincial Legislature with the Federal Minister of Human Resources, Lloyd Axworthy. All 25 student representatives expressed concern to Axworthy regarding the recent proposal of social policy reform cuts which would ultimately affect the cost in tuition. Axworthy's plan to cut \$2.6-billion in cash transfers to the provinces would result in Nova Scotia losing \$93-million in education.

"As you are aware this would effect stu-

The shift began at 9:00 pm and finished at 11:15 pm.

9:00: Head of Security, Joe Varner introduces Young and Cordy to Journal Staff Members.

Varner: "Well I wasn't really expecting you guys to come tonight. But since your here I will assign you with Jullian and Tanya and they'll show you the ropes of what goes on around here."

9:05: Young radios to the main desk. "Starting patrol in underground parking-lot."

Main desk: "proceed."

9:15: Young radios the main desk. "Starting patrol in Rice."

Young and Cordy check in

at the Rice Residence Desk.

Young: "On our way through rice we have to let someone into their room."

9:23: Take elevator to the 16th floor.

Young: "We start up here and make our way down to the bottom floor. We have to do that in all the buildings."

Journal: "Ever run into problems when going from floor to floor like this?"

Young: "Oh yes. At times we have to deal with loud people and rowdy people. Alcohol always plays a part in peoples behavior."

9:30: Young opens door on the 11th floor.

Young: "That music is loud. Some people are starting to feel good."

Young then opens an apartment door for someone who lost their keys. Then continues to check the rest of the floor.

Cordy then looks inside the glass door where the fire hose is kept and finds a rotting pumpkin.

Even though there are still wild parties, It has really become a quiet place to live. We have had some incidents this year and it only makes my job harder. You get those kind of people who come home all stoned up looking for a fight. People sure are different when they've been drinking."

10:15: Loyola 21. People out in the hallway drinking from mugs.

"This is only coffee that we are drinking," says one person.

Cordy: "I know I can see the stains on the edge of your mugs."

10:18: Young comments on garbage piled up and a hockey bag near the exit door.

Young: "Loyola has always had a bad smell. The top floors on Loyola have all the jocks. Their equipment smells and they live like slobs. Just look inside the washroom on this floor it just smells."

While in the stairway, Young points out holes in the wall.

Young: "Someone feeling good and taking their frustrations out on a wall. Crazy isn't it."

Young: "She is on the phone. Everything is fine."

10:40: Cordy continues to check hallways.

Cordy: "I always check the light on the smoke detectors and also check the inside of the glass doors where the fire

hose is kept."

Journal: "How do you like your job?"

Cordy: "Some people like us and others don't. We have a job to do and we are here to make sure everything is safe and secure."

10:55: Meet back in Varner's office.

Varner: "So that's how it is. It's going to get busier later on."

He looks out his window and adds "all those people over there in that pub. No telling just what might happen later on. Alcohol is the main cause of incidents that happen around here. We are just keeping an eye on everything."

siderable discussion and after an hour they deferred to vote on the policy only because they wanted to obtain more information regarding the legal matters." She adds "the Board will vote on it at the November 30 meeting."

Stern indicates that BOG is concerned about whether or not the university can follow its own internal judicial procedure without jeopardizing a criminal court process. Stern says "the policy does not say don't go to the police, and in fact the victims who experience any type of assault will be informed of their rights."

Stern comments on the amount of sexual assault cases at Canadian universities. "The reality is that very few young women of university age group who are the primary victims of date rape want to go through the criminal process. The process in Canada still largely re-victimizes the victim," says Stern. She also feels

the amount women reporting a sexual assault is minor compared to the percentage of women who will reveal being assaulted years after the fact.

Saint Mary's President Dr. Kenneth Ozmon says "I feel bad about having this policy simply because that situations in society and on university campuses mean we have to deal with these types of things. On the other hand I'm happy that we will be adopting a policy that will help those on campus with these problems."

Vice President Academic Colin Dodds feels that the policy "is fully needed."

He says "we need things like this on campus to ensure that there is safety. Normally the police would handle a sexual assault case, but now the university can help in such a situation."

Dodds feels that having a policy on campus would educate and "hopefully prevent situations like assault from actually occurring."

New degree at Saint Mary's

Taste Of The Environment

University students yearning to save the environment now have a hard core program to invest their time and energy in. A new Environmental Studies Degree, offered at Saint Mary's, will be in full swing by September 1995.

This new degree, developed by former Dean of Science Bill Jones, is a combination of courses in Science, Arts, and Commerce. Students eligible for this degree must at least be in their second year, and have a background in science.

Research officer, Terence Day, is in charge of the program. He feels anyone who loves the environment should consider this degree. "We're interested in people with commitment", says Day.

This new degree was offered in the 1994 Saint Mary's calendar, but was only approved by the Maritime Higher Education Commission two weeks ago. Now that the program has been approved, Day's main focus is to interest students. "I think it's important to establish a dialogue between students and the people running the program", says Day. He adds "the importance of the program is that it will put graduates into influential positions".

Although courses in Arts and Commerce are required credits, the program focuses mainly on science. Biology, Chemistry and Geology are important credits first year students should consider if planning to enter the program in their second year.

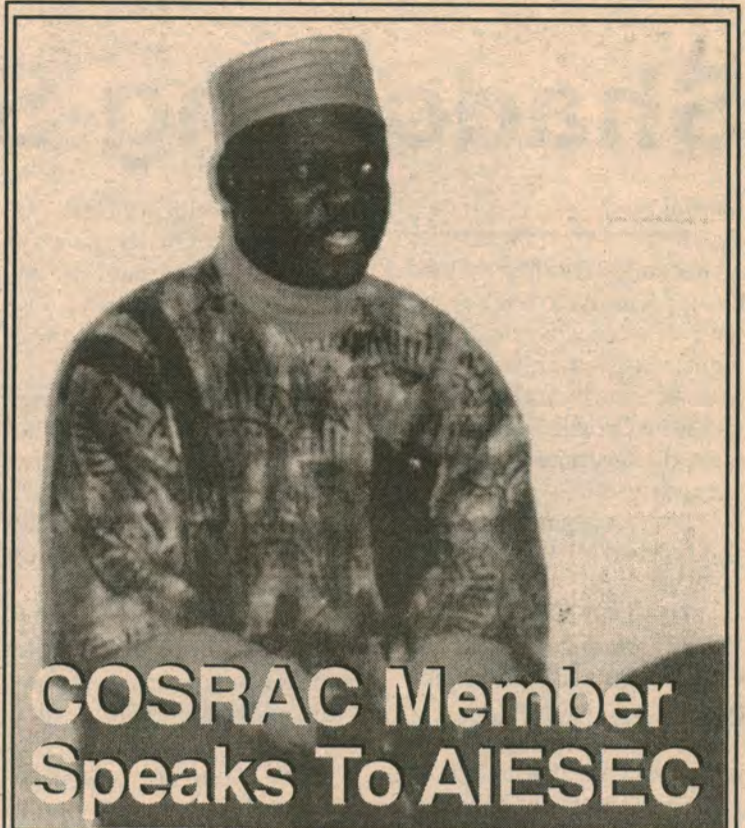
The program offers many courses which range over a wide area of study. However, the program is not a specialist degree. Graduates would have to pursue special training in their specific field of interest. For students interested in work experience, the program offers a co-op plan.

Although Saint Mary's was the first to propose the Environmental Studies Degree, Acadia has now joined the ranks, and program organizers hope to establish a link between the universities. Although no funds are available to accommodate the exchanges, organizers are looking to make credit transfers from the universities easier.

students," said Axworthy who added that "the governments response to that is the availability of a student loan program combining both loans and grants."

He then said that students applying for a loan or a grant would be reviewed individually. "Through the Income Contingent Loan Repayment Program all students would qualify for funding since the program is not based on financial criteria."

cial criteria."

Axworthy pointed out "the loan repayment program would have an income threshold of approximately \$30-thousand, where students below that income level would not be required to make any payment following graduation."

After meeting with Axworthy, Mirtchev felt that the future for education in Nova Scotia is "in deep trouble."

"It looks like the federal government is going ahead with the proposed cuts which would double the cost in tuition," said Mirtchev.

Mirtchev said Nova Scotia would be affected the most among other provinces. "The federal transfers are calculated on a per capita basis and not by the number of students enrolled in post secondary institutions."

"With this program, I see that the government is transferring the responsibility of funding for post secondary education into the hands of the students," said Mirtchev who added "with this loan program which is presently being proposed the student debt after graduation would drastically increase and it really worries me."

I Knew C-41 Was Explosive

An interview with Digable Planet's Butterfly & new vinyl Blowout Comb

After being recognized for their first album with such honours as Billboard Music Video, Soul Train's Best album of the year, and Best Performance by a group Grammy awards, **Digable Planets** are not just riding high on the success of their first album. They went right back to business and produced another lyrical delight.

Blowout Comb is Digable Planets' second phat album release under the Pendulum/EMI label. After the success of their first multi-million selling album *Reachin' (a new refutation of time and space)*, DP wasted no time in pleasing their fans with another album and a more serious message.

"It's serious because the issues that we are confronting are more serious and we're more serious this time...we feel more confident of what we say and how we choose to say it" was the explanation group member Doodlebug offered on the change of the album's tone.

The group, currently on a promotional trip across Canada for their new album, contacted the Journal from Montreal and are definitely doing a lot of explaining along the way. Butterfly was available to offer his thoughts on what was on this writer's mind:

Starting out: "originally from Philadelphia but formed in Washington D.C... I idolized the sounds of KRS One, Public Enemy and stuff like that".

Blowout Comb, the title: "blowout is like an Afro, so blowout comb is basically like to help you achieve a certain type of natural style, that's what the album really is, a real natural style; it's like a blowout, of a natural style".

Digable Planets, the name: "Digable is like from the word dig, y'know something you can get into easily, it's digable and cool. Planet is like each individual is like a planet, so vast. That's just your rudimentary outline".

Definition of Hip-Hop: "Someone who loves the form of Rap, that type of delivery of poetry, you know, the music and beat; Beat is always a big part of Rap Music, it's the main thing... but most of all you gotta have love for the culture and music in general".

Rap is more: hard beats or creativity?: "The emphasis is definitely on creativity but that doesn't eradicate hard beats... I mean you can be creative and still have hard beats".

Swearing & the degradation of women in Rap music: "Two vastly different subjects; Swearing is a frivolous thing

which is only prevalent in certain types of Rap music. The degradation of women is a whole 'nother issue that has a lot to do with society... you're not going to get rid of it in Rap music until you get rid of it in the corporate sector, or in the infrastructure of universities and how they are politically broken down... women have been getting the short end of the stick for a long time now".

Recorded in NYC over a three-month period, **Blowout Comb** defines how **Digable Planets** are living and the world they are living in. This album also features guest appearances by other fellow Rap artists. Guru, of Gangstarr is featured in the song *Borough Check*, Jeru the Damaja is featured on a track called *Graffiti*,

while Sarah Webb (D'Influence) and hip-hop legend Jazzy Joyce also appear on this album.

Each member of the group adds to the flavour of the finished product which we call



Digable Planets. Ladybug brings her affinity for Latin rhythms; Butterfly adds his love for Jazz; while Doodlebug brings in a bit of the hard-core flavour to create a unique sound.

Butterfly has convinced me that this album is about more than just the music and the beats, "I really believe that we are always saying something that's worth hearing, and that we have an ideology that deserves to be shared by a lot of people."

The group will tour the world starting with North America in January. Not likely to come to Halifax, check out this new album and the first (if you already haven't) and don't miss out on Hip-Hop's newest sounds.

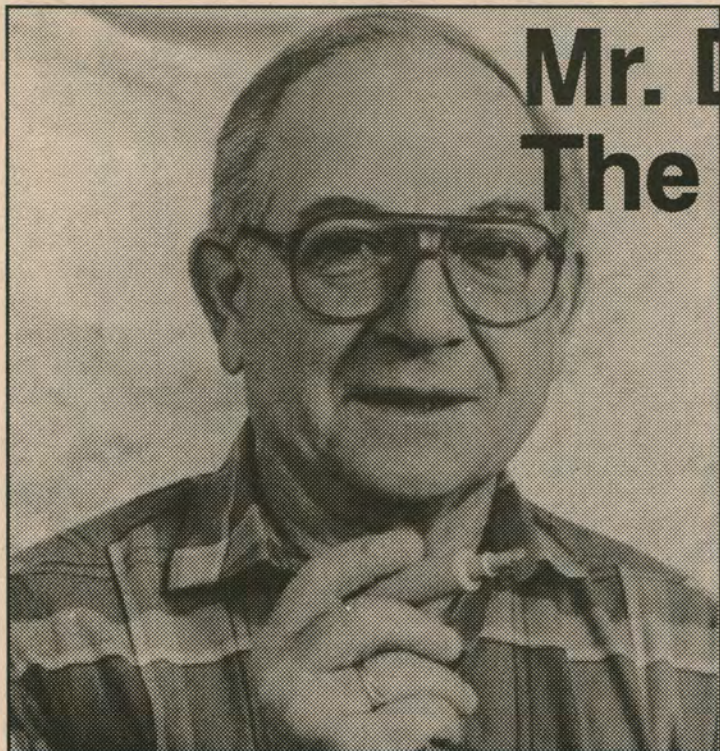

Mary-Chapin Carpenter's latest tour de force, *Stones in the Road* has recently hit local record shops, comfortably resting as the number one country album for several weeks. The lead-off single, *Shut Up and Kiss Me* is line dancing its way up the charts with its blues aura and irresistible melody.

Mary-Chapin Carpenter, however, has not always enjoyed such tremendous success. Her debut record, *Hometown Girl* (1987) was released with noteworthy reviews, but public interest was not there. Her second album had four hit singles and an ACM Top New Female Vocalist Award. The Gold album, *Shooting Straight in the Dark* (1990) was what

put her on the country map and earned her a performance on the Grammys. With the mega success of *Come On Come On* (1992), she finally buried her bad reputation for being "too folkie."

This prolific songwriter has been writing on her own as well as with co-producer/guitarist John Jennings from the get-go. Carpenter, who says that writing is "...the ultimate catharsis," has come up with some innovative songs. *Stones in the Road*, her fifth Columbia release, includes thirteen tracks and involves more special guests than Rita MacNeil could ever fit onto her variety show. Branford Marsalis soprano-saxes his way through *John Doe No. 24*, a piquant and depressing tune that Carpenter wrote from a blind, deaf and mentally challenged man, John Doe's, point of view. Certainly a high point of the album. Shawn Colvin

lends a hand with background vocals on *Jubilee*, as does Trisha Yearwood on *Tender When I Want To Be* and the first single *Shut Up and Kiss Me*, Lee Roy Parnell slide guitars his way through this song

Other notable songs include *The Last Word*, a magnificent thwarted cry of anger due to relationship gone sour. *House of Cards* discusses fears that people keep buried beneath their conscious mind.

Mary-Chapin Carpenter is a success story of determination. She has gone from "too serious" to selling millions of albums. Carpenter's smooth voice beautifully sings its way through each brilliantly written song to belt out one masterpiece after the next. *Stones in the Road* is a must have for under the Christmas tree-if you can wait that long. You would have to have stones in your head not to buy it.

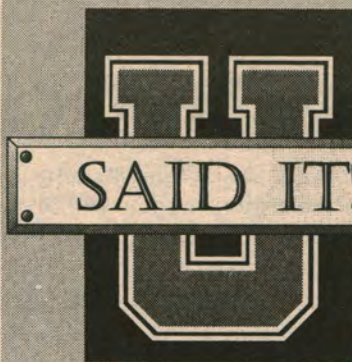

SMU Second At Subway Tourney

The Huskies reached the championship game this weekend at the Dal Subway Centennial Basketball Tournament, however, their only loss of the weekend came to the Manitoba Bisons with a score of 68-55 in the final.

In SMU's first game they went head-to-head against Lakehead University on Friday, narrowly defeating them 66-63. Major contributions came from newcomer (and Player of the Game) Norma MacIntyre with 19 while sophomores Lori Messer had 17.

SMU led Lakehead at half 45-29, but came out of the dress-

ing room a little flat, allowing the visitors to come within one point with two minutes to play. SMU regained their composure and held on till the final whistle, giving them a berth in the semi-finals slated on Saturday against MacMaster.

Leading the Huskies attack on the Marauders in the semi-finals was guard, and Player of the Game, Shawna Wright who sank 18 points. Teammate Lori Messer added 14, while Jad Crnogorac had 10 points. It was a good team effort on Saturday for the Huskies who pulled out of a 29-25 half time deficit to come out on top. SMU compensated for their problem with turnovers in the first half with

good aggressive play in the paint from the post. SMU deflated MacMaster's zone press and defense with a perimeter attack, sinking a total of five 3-pointers to give them a 64-52 win.

The two wins put the Huskies up against the Manitoba Bisons in the championship game. The Huskies appeared to lose a little bit of their spark in the opening minutes of the game, giving up possession twice on turnovers. Manitoba used a full court press for most of the game, hoping to run time off the clock and rattle SMU's offence. SMU weren't able to adjust well to Manitoba's constant pressure and went into

the locker room down 26-33 at half. Most of the Bisons' scoring was a result of their domination of the boards (26 versus SMU's 17). Of Saint Mary's rebounds, only three were offensive. What did work well for the Huskies, however, was the hustle of Shawna Wright who managed to strip Bison Terri-Lee Johannesson of the ball on several of her breaks to the basket. Leading scorers for the Huskies were guard Crnogorac (named Player of the Game) with 17 and MacIntyre with 10 in a losing cause.

Saint Mary's has displayed an impressive preview for their upcoming regular season with a record of 4 wins and 2 losses.

SMU will be in good contention this season for the AUSA title with a new, powerful force in the paint provided by the four "Big M's" - MacIntyre, Miller, Messer, and MacLean. In addition to the Huskies' attack on the inside, the opposition will have to contend with perimeter sensations Wright, Crnogorac and newcomer Marianne Berry.

NOTEBOOK: SMU's first home game is scheduled for Saturday, Nov. 26 @ 6p.m. against UCB. Jad Crnogorac was named a tournament all-star while Manitoba's Terri-Lee Johannesson took tournament MVP honors.

West is Best In Atlantic Bowl

The Huskies did win the Atlantic Bowl. Unfortunately for SMU fans, it was the wrong one.

Led by quarterback Brent Schneider's five touchdown passes, the Saskatchewan Huskies downed the Saint Mary's Huskies 35-24 in front of 9,400 fans at Huskies Stadium on Saturday. The win vaults the Huskies into this weekend's Vanier Cup, where they will meet the Western Mustangs.

It did not take long for Schneider, who was coming off a knee injury suffered a month ago, to get going as Saskatchewan scored on their first two possessions. The third-year pivot fired strikes to Cory Flaman and Jeff Slabik from 12 and 17 yards six minutes apart to open up a 13-0 lead ten minutes into the game.

Saint Mary's responded with a drive of their own before the quarter ended. Sean Mongey capped off an eight-play, 74-yard march with a three-yard run at 14:07. Schneider (18-of-32 passing, 285 yards) then struck again, finding Carey Prokop on a 43-yard pass-and-run 3:04 into the second frame to make it 20-7.

"Brent came in with his leadership and I think that's what helped us," noted Prokop, who had six catches for 97

yards. "The guys saw him out there and relaxed a little bit. We did a good job behind him, that's for sure."

The teams traded touchdowns before halftime, SMU getting theirs on a 34-yard pass from Matt Finlay to Charles Ashe and Schneider tossing a 25-yarder to Jason Johnston. Mark Dalla Riva tacked on a single off a missed field goal to send SMU to the locker room down 27-15.

The Canada West champs put the game away early in the third, converting an interception into six points when Schneider found Prokop alone in the end zone at 4:02. SMU rallied with a Dalla Riva field goal at 13:53 and a Finlay-to-Steve Sarty TD pass with four minutes left but came no closer, conceding a single point with 2:15 left to complete scoring.

"The o-line gave (Schneider) time, the running backs played great, the receivers made some good catches, and the defence was getting us the ball," said Saskatchewan wideout Jason Olynyk. "It was just a total team effort out there today."

"The offence from Saskatchewan was excellent, they moved the ball well on us," admitted Finlay (20-of-37 passing, 244 yards). "Offensively our play-action pass wasn't working and that let them key in on our running and we couldn't get our running game

going because of that."

"Schneider was the player of the game and he deserved it," added Saint Mary's head coach Larry Uteck. "He had a heck of a game. We did everything we could to pressure him and he still got rid of the ball. They deserved to win."

The loss also marked the end of the careers for several members of the maroon-and-white including offensive lineman Colin O'Donnell and middle linebacker Alex Eliopoulos, both of which reflected on their time at SMU inside a painfully quiet locker room.

"I was telling (SMU

teammate) Chris Goddard that my knees were killing me in that last quarter so that's it for me," said O'Donnell, the Atlantic conference nominee for this year's J.P. Metras Trophy as the outstanding lineman in Canadian university football. "I couldn't ask for a better five years than what I had here. It's been an amazing experience."

"If I could do this all over again I would come to Saint Mary's and play with these guys for five years," said Eliopoulos, who could win his second President's Trophy as the outstanding defensive player in the nation at Thurs-

day's all-Canadian awards banquet. "We worked hard all year and I wanted all of us to go to Toronto and play for the Vanier Cup but sometimes things don't work out the way you plan them."
