



Students Fight For Master's Program

The Master of Clinical Psychology program at Saint Mary's may shutdown, and students on campus are threatening to put up a fight to keep it open.

A petition of 200 names in support of the program has been handed over to the Vice President Academic, Dr. Colin Dodds. Some students will be meeting with the President, Dr. Kenneth L. Ozmon this morning. There will be a meeting on whether or not to close the program this Friday, and students attending are even warning that they have some tricks up their sleeves to surprise everyone. However, they wouldn't give details of what they intend to do.

Over the last few years the number of faculty and courses in this department has declined. This means that students have had to attend Dalhousie University in order to obtain certain

credits in this field. However, a letter released almost two-weeks ago from the Department of Psychology at Dalhousie indicates that they no longer can accommodate the increase in students from Saint Mary's. The letter also indicates that they would prefer not to take Saint Mary's students, period.

Harvey Dorey, a graduate student in the Master Program for Clinical Psychology, is active in voicing student and faculty concerns. "This is very stressful for everyone in the program. There is a lot of stress knowing that the program may close, and also a lot of stress because Dalhousie no longer wants Saint Mary's students," he says. "The fight is not over yet. It is not going to be a typical thing where students protest and then things die down. The students will continue to fight for this program."

Education Day In Protest

Today is Provincial Education Day.

At Saint Mary's University there will be what the Director of External Affairs for SMUSA, Ephrem Abraha, calls a "Wall of Shame." This is a mural that will be hung up by the residence desk in Loyola. Written on that mural will be the words, "Education: This is your future, don't let them kill it!" The mural is there for students to sign in protest of the cuts to post-secondary education.

"Right now, students are pay-

ing about 50% of SMU's revenue, and university is only going to get more expensive," says Abraha. "If the protests over education are successful, then education may take priority in the coming Federal election."

According to the President of the Students' Union of Nova Scotia (SUNS), Jennifer Smiley, "The future of post-secondary education is of primary concern for students in Nova Scotia. Every year students must contend with increases in tuition and potential program cuts as government funding of education continues to decline"

This time brave thieves impersonate University employees...

The thieves on our campus seem to be getting much smarter.

According to Bill Promaine, Manager of University Security, two males impersonated campus employees to gain access to a locked change room at the Alumni Arena, and stole a sum of money on January 27, at approximately 6:20 pm. He anticipates that the thieves will return, and is encouraging all departments on campus to be extremely cautious. However, Promaine was not available at press time to confirm how much money was stolen.

From the information gathered by investigators, suspect number one approached a hockey player on the bench requesting access to the change room, alleging he was a tradesman for Saint Mary's University and needed to repair a heater. He was carrying a ring of keys and

a notebook which convinced the hockey player that he was in fact a University employee.

When they arrived at the change room, the hockey player unlocked the door. They were then met by suspect number two who was wearing a tool-belt. This suspect was posing as a contractor.

"I believe it is important to alert the community of this incident, and the fact that these people are impersonating University employees to commit this crime," says Promaine. "The possibility exists that these suspects may attempt to obtain assistance in gaining access to other locations on campus. No one should let unidentified persons into buildings or secured spaces, and should have University Security handle the matter."

He has not indicated, however, if these are the same thieves that robbed the Alumni Arena on January 16. That evening, a

group of hockey players returned to their dressing room to find a number of their possessions stolen. Some of the players believe that the thieves might have placed the stolen items into one of the hockey bags and casually left the arena.

Suspect one is a white male, approximately 35 years old, almost 6' in height, and has a medium build. He was well dressed, and wore a Far West jacket. Suspect two is also a white male, approximately

35 years old, 5'10" in height, and has a medium build. He was well dressed and wore a leather tool belt.

Dorey has already met with Dr. Dodds. However, Dr. Dodds was not available at press time for comment. Dorey proposed to Dr. Dodds that the University hire more part-time faculty in order to teach courses in the Clinical Psychology field. This would mean that students would no longer have to attend Dalhousie. Dorey argues that the University has a significant surplus in this year's fiscal budget, and they should be able to afford more part-time faculty.

"It wouldn't be a problem for the University to hire these people because it is clear that they in fact have the money to do it," says Dorey. He adds that the full-time faculty in the department support his proposal, and are also offering to teach more courses if the program stays

open. Some faculty in this department would not comment on the situation.

According to Dorey, three recommendations have been made by Dr. Dodds. One is that Dalhousie and Saint Mary's work out a new agreement in sharing courses. The second is that the department of Psychology support the Master of Clinical Psychology program. The third is that the University suspend all applications for this fall.

"It appears that the University is serious about suspending applications for the fall term, and this only means that the program will in fact close," says Dorey. "It looks as though the University is not interested in continuing the program. The students and faculty in this field of study get the impression that the University only cares about its new business school."

International Representative shall be elected solely by members recognized as international students by the university?"; 2) "Do you agree to amend the SMUSA Constitution so that the Residence Representative shall be elected solely by members living in university residence?"; and 3) "Due to the lack of funding which student societies have received over the past years, do you agree to add an additional \$4 to your student fees for society funding?"

The third question is of particular interest to CFSM (Radio Saint Mary's), who recently expressed a desire for autonomy and a referendum question of their own. SMUSA Council members say that if the \$4 ques-

tion gets a yes vote, approximately \$30,000 would be generated for societies. A good portion of that extra money could go to CFSM- who desperately need it in order to obtain an FM licence under a new contract with SMUSA. Station manager, Kevin Smith, feels that a new contract would be preferable to autonomy.

Current SMUSA President, Chris Webb, in discussion with Smith at council, seemed positive that a healthy, long term contract with CFSM is a good possibility. The \$5000 that CFSM currently receives, along with a possible portion of the \$30,000, would then be channeled into SMU's other societies, who are also feeling financial woes.

Entrepreneurship Workshop An Exciting Venture

Entrepreneurship seems to be the buzzword of the '90s. For many, the thought of starting their own small business is terrifying. For others it is an exciting adventure. For most, these days, it is a necessity.

An older friend of mine told me about her experiences trying to find a job 25 years ago. She decided she wanted to work in a bank, so she filled out an application. Without education or experience, she got a job. She felt that the bank was too far from her home so she asked to be moved to a closer branch. She was moved. Another time, she decided to be a travel agent so she applied. Again, with no training or experience, got a job!

For you and I, this sounds like a fairy tale. Today, entrepreneurship is the reality. As David Swick put it in his Daily News column (Jan. 29/97), being an entrepreneur is a "career never before recommended".

Okay, let's take all that as a given. Let's look at the positive angle of all of this. A post-secondary education, on average, means a greater chance of success at whatever venture you plan to start; so going to SMU is a step in the right direction. Be Careful With That Vote

The candidates and their campaigns are all up and running. They're taking the punches in strides, and each one is watching their enemies very closely. It is important that each of them know what's going on at all times, and that they are prepared to counteract any negative attacks. It is also important that they don't let positive support rush to their heads. This is all a game, and whoever can overcome the obstacles will have an even greater chance of winning. But all of us need to look beyond the games that the candidates and their campaign camps use in order to obtain votes. We also need to look far beyond those posters advertising the "good," and the brochures that many of us will be handed during the week. Instead, we need to make a careful choice of who we should elect to hold power. Students should ask as many questions as possible to the candidates. After all, the winners hold executive positions, and with the job comes the power of decision making. We, as the students, are the ones who pay their salaries, and thus have to follow the rules that they implement. Don't let the advertising and the smiles determine your vote. Instead, ask some serious questions in regards to the issues that are of extreme importance on campus.

There are a number of issues that students can address to the candidates. One is the growing concern of tuition increasing. Each year tuition rises, and all students should think about having leaders in office who can effectively work with the local politicians. After all, tuition increases almost 10% each year. Just look at Saint Mary's University. The cost for tuition in 1990 was approximately \$2600. By this Fall it is expected to be roughly \$3500.

And what about our new business school that will house The Frank H. Sobey Faculty of Commerce. The University intends to have it up and running by September, 1999. This new school means a lot to students, and therefore we should have a strong voice during the planning stages. The building is for the students, and it will be up to our leaders to determine its fate.

Students should also be asking the candidates about the Metro Consortium Business plan. This, for those who don't know, is simply a cost savings plan that allows all universities in Metro to share programs and services. How will Saint Mary's benefit from this plan? Or, how could we suffer from it?

The issue of food service on campus should also be another issue for students. And the candidates should have some answers and ideas for this issue next year. Just look at the amount of students who have complained about the quality of the food on campus. This goes for both on and off-campus students. Is the food going to be worse next year? And, how can the student government be effective in ensuring that we all can purchase some quality grub that can sit comfortably in our stomachs?

It is also important that everyone ask the candidates about the entertainment they hope to bring to our University next year. After all, better entertainment means much more enjoyment. Have any candidates been looking into this issue for next year? We should all ask them this.

But we should ask as many questions as possible. The winners are the ones who will control things around here, and we shouldn't be easy on them. I understand that our student leaders can't change everything, but they do have a direct influence.

So when you cast your vote this Tuesday and Wednesday, be careful of who you vote for. The campaigns aren't everything that they're cracked up to be.

Keelor brings solo performance to Cohn...

Keelor's Odyssey

It was Friday night at the Cohn, and Greg Keelor was set to kick off his first solo show in support of *Gone*, the first full-length product of his venture after twelve years as part of the world-renowned Blue Rodeo. There was only one problem: some key musical instruments had failed to arrive on time.

"Over there, that's where the drum set was going to be...it's going to be pretty much stand-up tonight," deadpanned the

friend had learned the name of his real mother, Mary Theresa McIntyre, and that she was from Inverness, Cape Breton. Keelor was forced, despite this stunning news, to put off a trip to the Island until after the album was completed.

He finally did make it to Cape Breton, when *Nowhere To Here* finally wrapped—and after barely recovering from a fall from a ten-foot ladder. However, on his arrival in Inverness Keelor was unable to immediately locate Mary Theresa.

serene Keelor to a gracious audience after roughly a half-hour's delay. "Oh, and there's no refunds."

The first half of the evening consisted of a performance by John Bora. Accompanied only by his own acoustic guitar, Bora swung through a repertoire of crooney tunes which moved to an easy, folksy beat.

Keelor emerged, and after his explanatory preamble regarding the instruments, told the crowd the story of his personal and musical odyssey—an odyssey that began him on a long journey, and eventually brought him that night to the Cohn's stage.

Keelor had found out that he was adopted, and that his birth name was Francis McIntyre. Just as Blue Rodeo were set to go into the recording studio for *Nowhere To Here*, their most recent album, Keelor received a phone call. A

Keelor drove back home, and eventually his birth mother was found. Shortly after meeting her, Keelor left for India. The music of the country influenced him, just as had the music of Cape Breton during Keelor's time there. These two widely different influences, under Keelor's talented, veteran hand, blend with meditative grace in *Gone*.

Over the course of his career, Keelor has been no stranger to the songwriter aspect of the music business. He, together with fellow band member Jim Cuddy, wrote the songs which made Blue Rodeo into an internationally acclaimed band, and a force which forever changed and expanded the face of Canadian music. They have been called for years by the media "the hardest-working band in Canada." According to Keelor, the ramifications of this type of work ethic

was something which the band eventually found entrapping. "That's what we're trying to shed—that workhorse image. We spent so much time trying to play that we just weren't enjoying it anymore. On the last album I just wasn't having fun," he explains. Will Blue Rodeo continue to exist? Keelor, for his part, considers his solo foray to be simply a part of the band's continuing existence, and talks of Blue Rodeo coming back together and picking up where they left off some time over the coming year. Reassuring news, indeed.

Keelor and his band, who played grand piano, skin drums, cello, bass, and acoustic guitar, immediately created a close bond with the audience, comprised primarily of university-aged students. Keelor casually told the crowd background stories for most of the songs before performing them, and he and other band members talked and joked amongst themselves between numbers. Keelor also happily shared the spotlight with his fellow players—opening performer Bora was his bass player, and solos were performed by different members of the group, most memorably by Keelor's cellist and pianist, Anne Bourne. She sang stunningly beautiful versions of some of her own works—the first, "Robin's Egg Blue," broke the audience's heart. She received loud, appreciative applause.

Many of the evening's reper-

toire was followed by lengthy interludes of simple, lyricless playing by Keelor and the others, a practice which comes

Rodeo. "Hey, hey, I guess it hasn't hit me yet..." sang the crowd along with Keelor, clapping and loudly cheering before

across at many concerts as a "filler" technique to make up for scant material. On this night, however, it served as a soothing backdrop to the live performance of *Gone*, an expression of musical mood that more than captured the spirit of the work as a whole.

There couldn't have been more fitting a finale to the evening than one which also acted as a salute to the band Blue

the song was even finished, after which all jumped to their feet in a standing ovation.

Clearly, Greg Keelor, whether singing the songs of the band he helped make famous, or singing the songs of his personal life experiences, is a memorable experience.

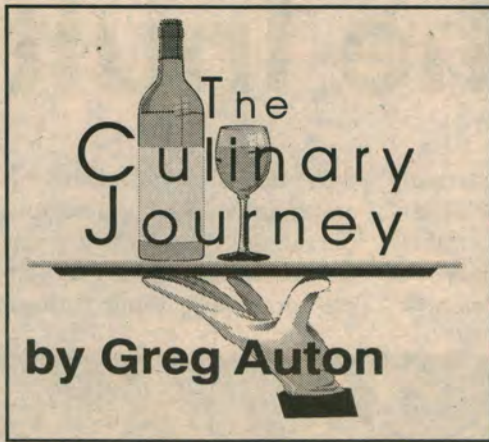

The concept of this place is neither that of the restaurant nor the bar. There are couches, coffee tables, ordinary tables, ordinary chairs, bar stools... in addition, there is an actual fire-side for those who come in out of the frigid and damp

Maritime winter.

As alluded to above, the food offerings at this place are quite delicious. When I went there I started with tostada's for an appetizer. Tostada's at Fireside are made with goat cheese, tomatoes, peppers, onion and, of course, cilantro, all wrapped in a flour tortilla, deep fried, and served with a cooling and delightful mango chutney. For the main course, I had the smoked salmon manicotti, a rich, volup-

tuous dish consisting of smoked salmon, the manicotti pasta shell, and a rich dill cream sauce. It wasn't just good, it was almost...sexy. My companion had the almond chicken linguine. This pasta dish consists of pasta, served with (obviously) almonds and chicken, as well as mushrooms and green onions, all swimming in a soothing chicken broth.

The atmosphere was very relaxing. There are comfy chairs, lots of wood and earth tones, which together contribute to an overall calming and unpretentious atmosphere.

The prices here are not outlandish. Dishes range from \$7.00 to around \$14.00. So it's no cheapo', belly-bust'in, gut-stuff'in watering hole. The dishes are on par with the best I've had in terms of taste. The manicotti did not appear "large," but because of the cream sauce it was more than sufficient to fill the gap.

Desserts at Fireside are incredible. My mother used to tell me about this dessert she'd get at Thackeray's—a butter cake full of raspberries served hot with whipped cream, vanilla ice-cream, and a raspberry puree. She'd speak of it with reverence, as though it were served in some far away ivory tower. Perhaps so, but it's also served at Fireside, in all its splendor and glory, and I savored every indulgent spoonful.

Fireside is open Sunday to Thursday until 12:00 a.m., and until 2:00 a.m. Friday and Saturday.

Well folks, that's about it for this week. Until next time, for God's sake, keep an open mind.

If you ever have the opportunity to try something new, like goat cheese, give it a shot. If they serve it on the menu there's a good chance it will not kill you. There are countries in this world where goat cheese is all there is. Really people, the life of the

omnivore is enviable. Do not waste your gastrointestinal potential. Whether it involves trying some weird stuff at a restaurant, or maybe just a couple of extra shakes of red pepper at home, get out there and take a bite out of life!

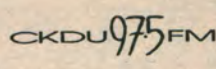
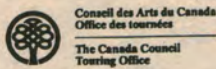

A WORLD OF MUSIC

Since I began this column, we have enjoyed music from Asia, Europe, Africa, and Latin America; however, we have not yet listened to the melodies of our "own backyard." This week's selection explores some of the finer sounds found right here in one of our own country's traditional cultures.

Susan Aglukark's album, *This Child*, offers an exciting mix of emotions. Aglukark is prob-

ably the most successful Inuit musical artist there is. Her soft voice and beautiful looks act as complements to her vocal and lyrical talent. In writing or co-writing most of her songs, Aglukark intermingles the language of the Inuit people and English to create a moving display of what's best described as traditional.

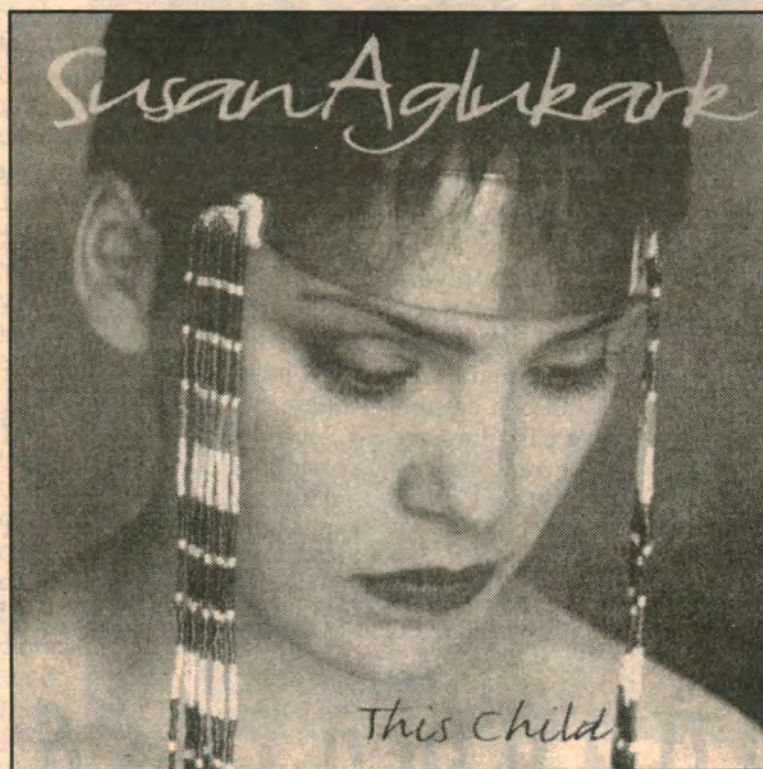
"Shamaya" tells the story of a young boy on the journey to

becoming a man. The "journey" is most probably a traditional hunting ceremony, but Aglukark presents the situation to apply to anyone. At certain points in our lives, we enter into being adults. Essentially, we are all on this journey; some of us reach the peak, and some never do. "Casualties of War" continues the theme of a journey. On this adventure, we all make mistakes, but each of them makes us stronger.

My favorite track would have to be "Dreams For You." The song tells us that it is important to dream as we look towards the future. However, the song also says that sometimes our dreams may not come true. When, in fact, we reach what we

have longed for, we are actually living the dreams of others who've failed to achieve their desires. This is an extremely important lesson for us to learn. On

Prior to writing and recording the material for *Clumsy*, Our Lady Peace had toured extensively throughout North America over two and-a-half years. The band played over five hundred shows as their first release, titled *Naveed*, was embraced by music lovers to such an unforeseen extent that it went Platinum in Canada. The band was signed by the Sony label in 1993, while they were in the process of recording their first demo.

According to lead vocalist Raine Maida, full artistic freedom was part of the deal. "If worst came to worst and it only sold ten copies, it was something that we could be proud to have in our collection of CD's. *Naveed* contained songs such as "Star Seed," "Naveed" and "Hope." The band has toured across Canada several times over with bands such as I Mother Earth, Glueleg, Spooky Ruben, Change of Heart and Alanis Morisset. Our Lady Peace has also opened for such bands as Van Halen and Page and Plant in the U.S.

According to Maida, the

hype which enveloped the band began to interfere with their song writing processes. "The pressure started to get to us just before we finished a tour in America just before Christmas. We were playing these huge arenas. When we finally focused on writing another record, there was this periphery of pressures that seemed to sub-consciously get into our playing and our mindsets...we decided to get out of the city (Toronto) and away from MuchMusic; even our management. We went up north to a cottage outside of Toronto and started writing.

Maida describes the songs on *Clumsy* as tales based on personal experiences. The first single of the new album is called "Superman's Dead." According to Maida, the song compares the old black and white Superman of the 1950's versus the modern Superman with the loss of innocence incurred when the ever-powerful media "manipulates children... that's where they learn how to dress, what music to listen to...their culture and personalities are defined by television. It destroys any kind of personal thought or interpreta-

tion." Last Saturday's performance at Dal featured material from both *Naveed* and *Clumsy*. The greatest quality of the band's members is their ability to connect with their audiences. I have seen them perform twice, and I'll add them to my list of bands who should record all their albums live. Throughout the show, the crowd sang along to every song. Numerous audience members moshed and crowd surfed throughout the entire set, despite explicit warnings posted in the building. As the end of the show approached, Maida announced to the crowd that since they had come to play, they weren't going to make the crowd wait through an encore and then reappear too cliché. The band continued instead to play the songs which would have been the encore.

Our Lady Peace recently gained a new bass player, by the name of Duncan Coutts. He describes the success of *Clumsy* as "...a surreal experience... to step into a band and have the first album I've ever played on go number #1 in the country, in it's first week of release." In a word, wow.

our musical path towards awareness and acceptance of cultural differences, we must consider the dreams of all. Each level to which we progress in our mission is not only for the benefit of us, but for those who've missed the chance at their dreams before.

With this in mind, we should strive harder towards peace. Yes,

Mind over muscle....

It Isn't All Physical

Think of it.... two teams competing for a gold medal; both are equal in fitness, talent and skill; the game is played in neutral territory with the same amount of

fans supporting each team; tensions are high in both locker rooms; on paper it is not possible for these two teams to be more alike. The game begins... BLOW OUT! One team comes out and destroys the other. In a post game interview the losing

coach tries to explain the loss by saying, "We've been training for this game all season long. The team was physically here but didn't show up to play. I don't know how else to explain it."

It has happened to the best of teams. How many times have you seen a #1 ranked team lose to the last place team? I'm sure that last place team played great, but still? What was it that made that first place team lose? It couldn't be because they suddenly lost their talent —although it might have looked that way. The physical side of a game can only take you so far. A winning team is built up on a group of athletes that are both mentally and physically superior to the competition. Athletes do need to be taught how to control every

aspect of their game and control competitive stress. Michael Jordan wouldn't be as good as he is if he folded under pressure.

Physical relaxation is one aspect of sport that needs to be taught, but is often ignored. It is well documented that when an athlete is too anxious his or her performance declines. Increased arousal can lead to increased tension within the muscles which can interfere with the athlete's motor skills. A point guard won't pose much of an offensive threat on the court when he is too tense to make an outside shot with any degree of success. When an athlete has perfected the skill of muscle relaxation, their optimal performance is all that closer at hand.

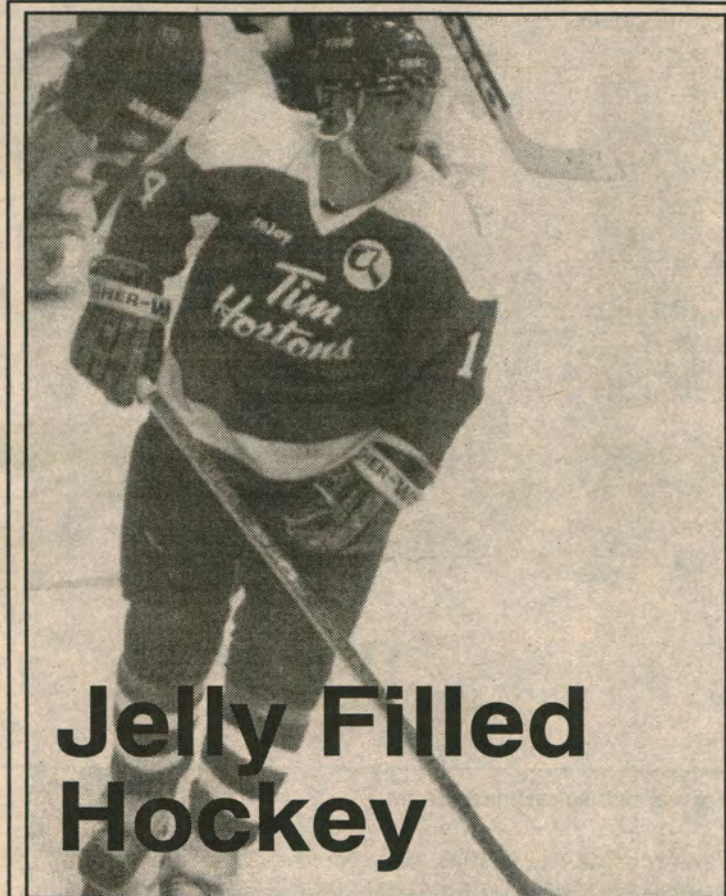
The whole idea of muscle re-

laxation is to reduce the tension levels in the muscles of the body. In 1938 a technique was developed to help athletes detect muscle tension when it occurs. In technical terms the technique is called the "isometric contraction-relaxation cycle." Basically the whole idea behind it is for each major muscle group to be systematically contracted and then relaxed, while attention is focused on what the sensation feels like.

The athlete begins by lying on his or her back in an area with few distractions. Each muscle is then tightened one at a time, beginning with the calf muscle, held for approximately 5 to 7 seconds, and then relaxed. The technique usually takes about 15-20 minutes to complete; but

the time needed to achieve total body relaxation decreases with practice until it becomes almost automatic. Eventually, the idea is that the athlete will be able to detect muscle tension and then reduce the tension without having to go through the whole process.

Elite competition is a stressful experience for many athletes, especially during important games. Although the contraction-relaxation technique is not necessary for every situation, it can help produce relaxation on those occasions when the apparent demand is so great that arousal can hinder performance.

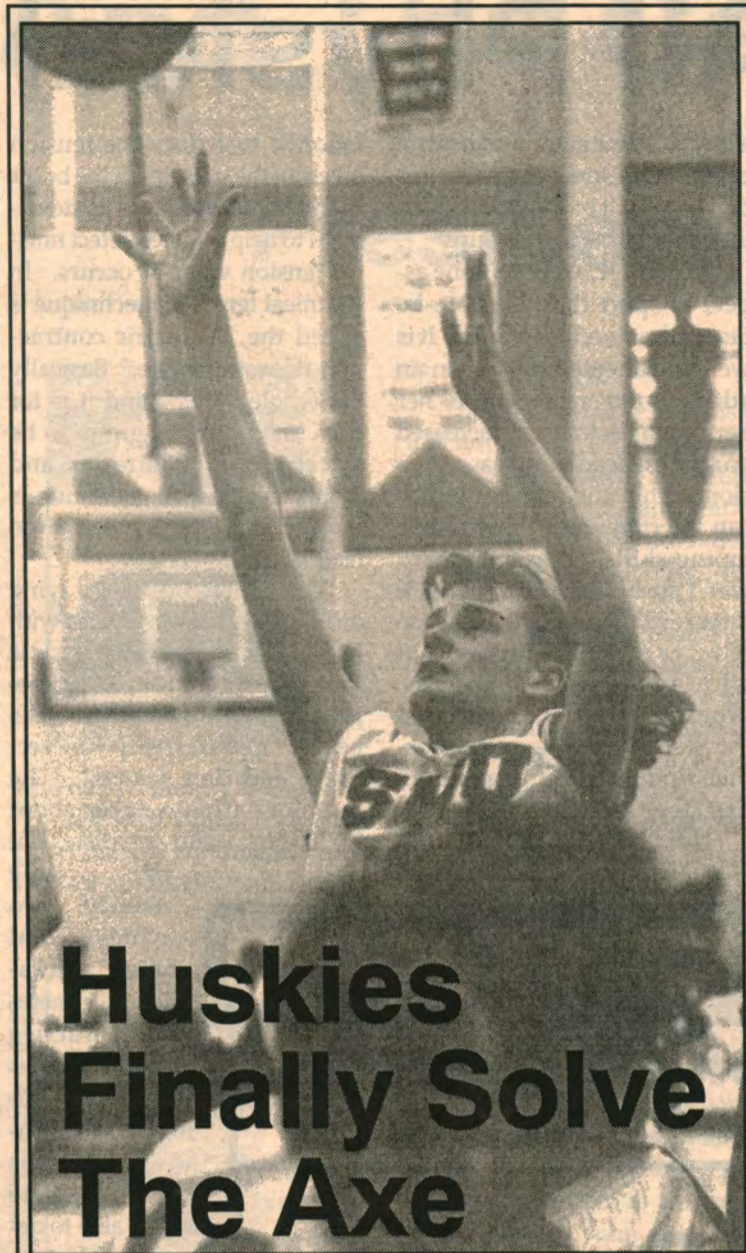
