Student Representative Council President John G. MacLaughlin

In April 1971, the newly elected Student Representative Council was considered by many students as one which faced doom. There was no way possible the S.R.C. under the leadership of President John G. MacLaughlin could overcome the barriers created by previous councils.

The S.R.C. faced tremendous debts built up by the 1970-'71 Student Union. Many organizations as the Yearbook and Radio Saint Mary's were faced with extreme financial difficulties brought on by poorly run organizations. Most of the societies were no longer existing. In all the outlook was not bright.

However the S.R.C. put a program of tight budgeting into effect. Every organization was given a set amount of funds to run on and that was all they had. It meant that everyone had to limit their expenses to a minimum in order to exist. There was growling but things worked out and the picture brightened.

The S.R.C. created the Entertainment Committee under the Directorship of Bill Manley. This committee reorganized entertainment on Campus and worked on a profit basis unlike previous councils. Another new addition was the Director of Operations position which centralized all purchasing within the Student Union. This position has saved the union close to \$1500.00 in the first year of its program.

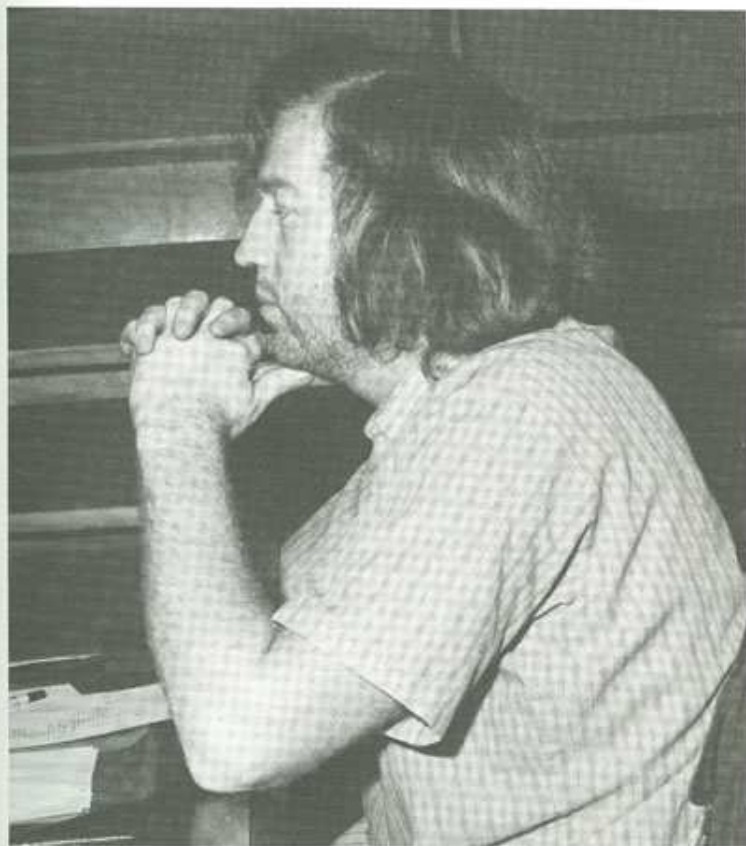
Brooks Diamond was another addition to the Union with the Maritime Entertainment Union. Diamond sponsored two successful events, the Autumn Weekend and Winter Carnival. Also, the I.S.J.B. or the Interim Student Judicial Board was another addition to the Student Union as it put the power of judicial decisions in the hands of the students.

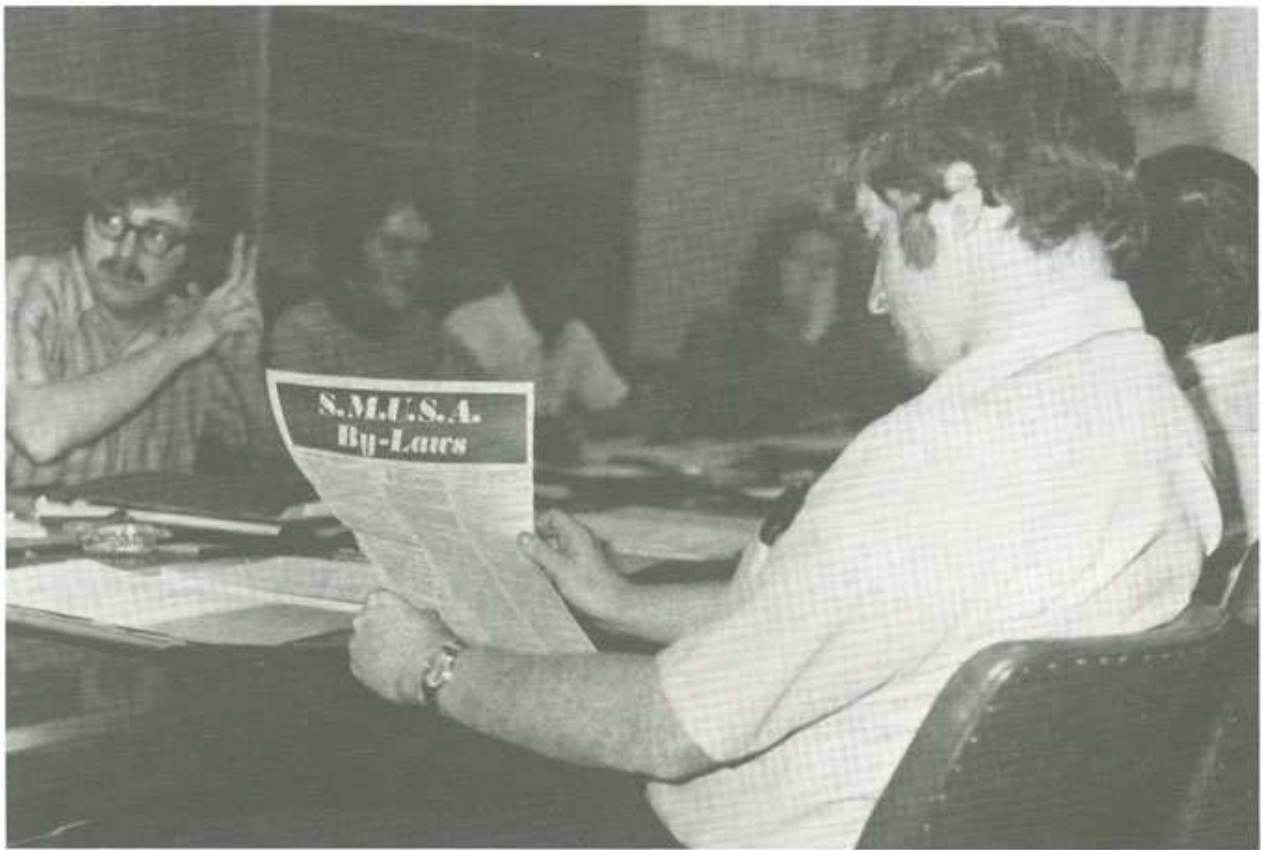

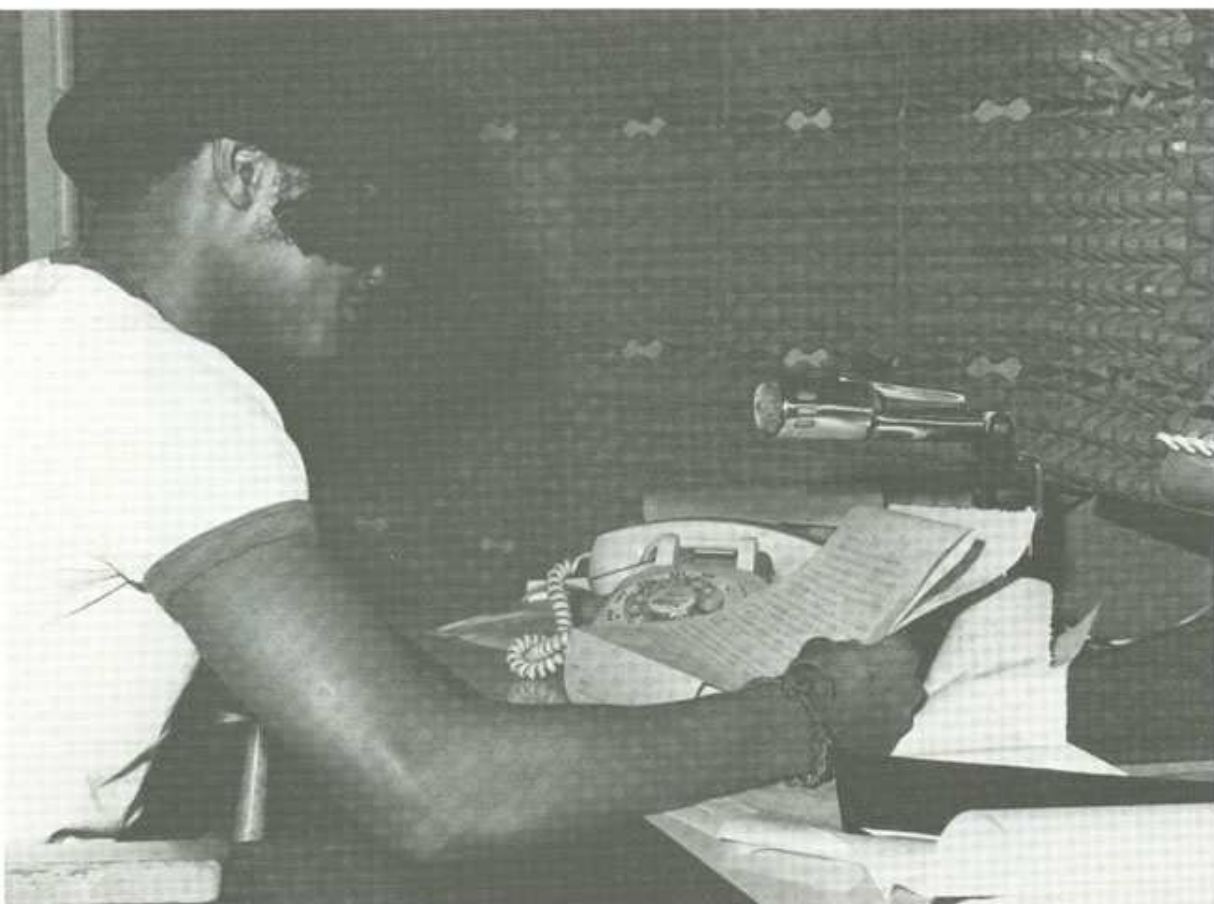

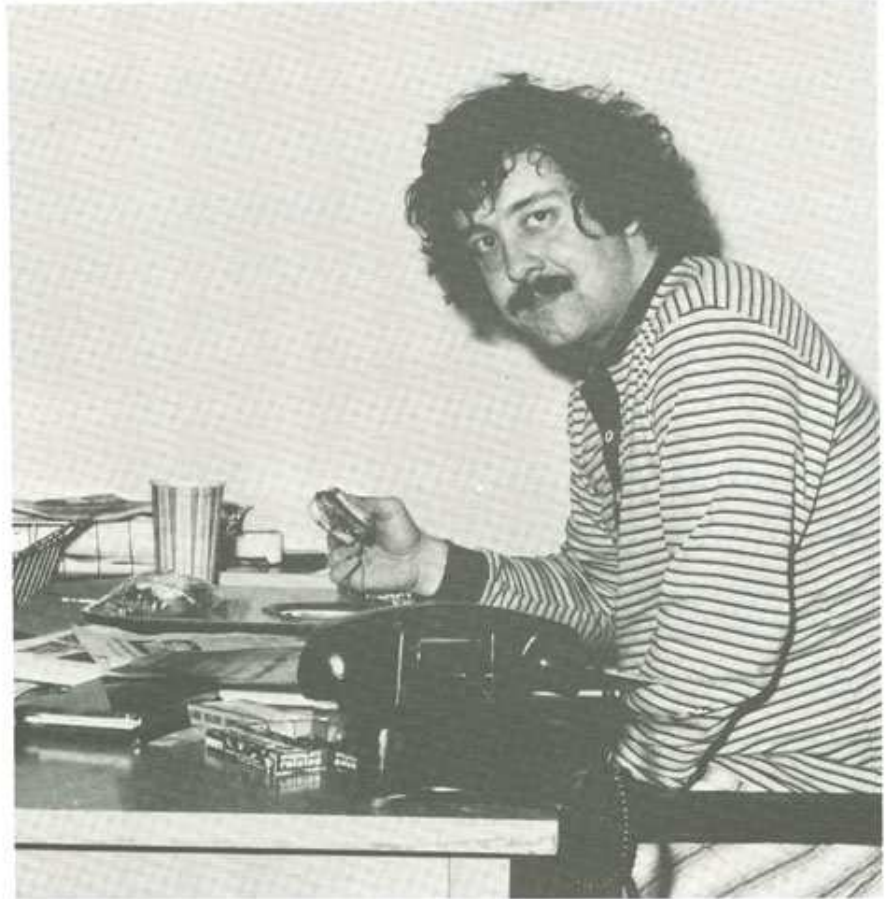
In all we hope you enjoy the book even though it is thinner than the 250 - \$12,000.00 one of last year.



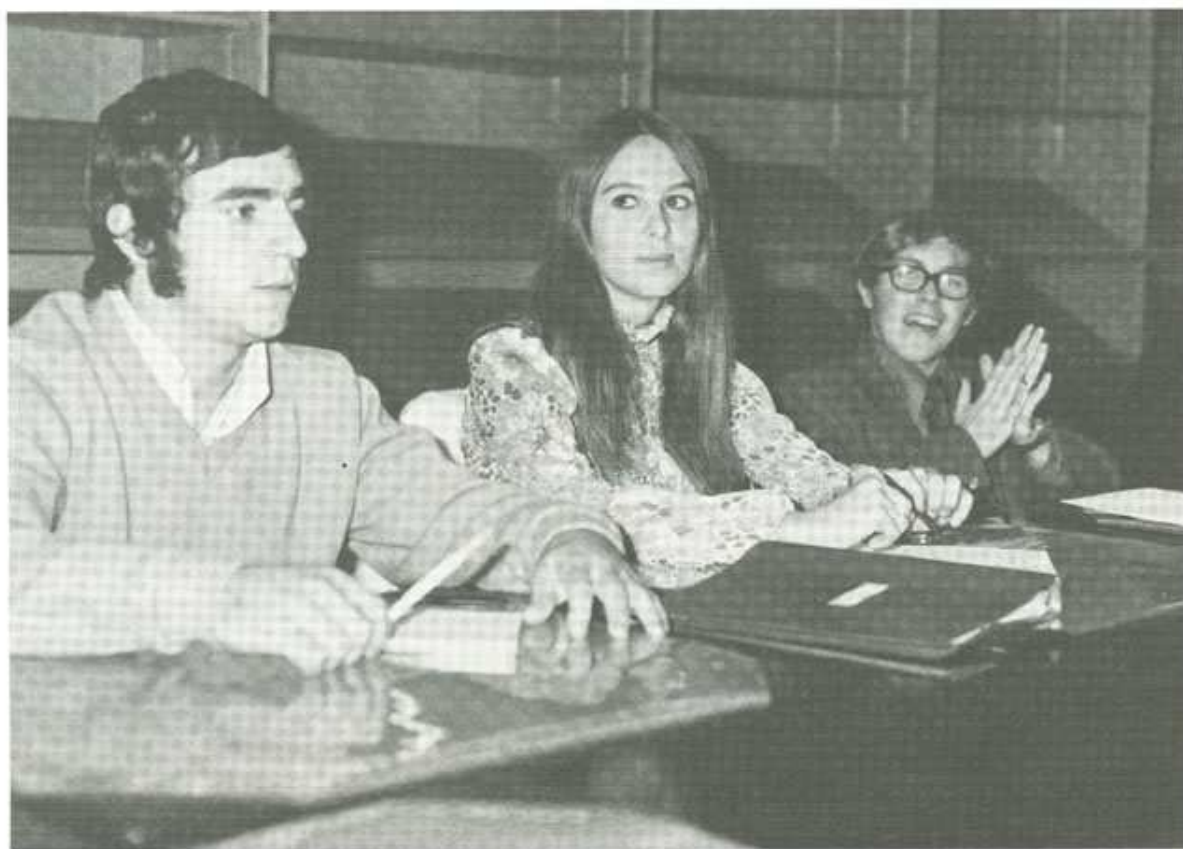

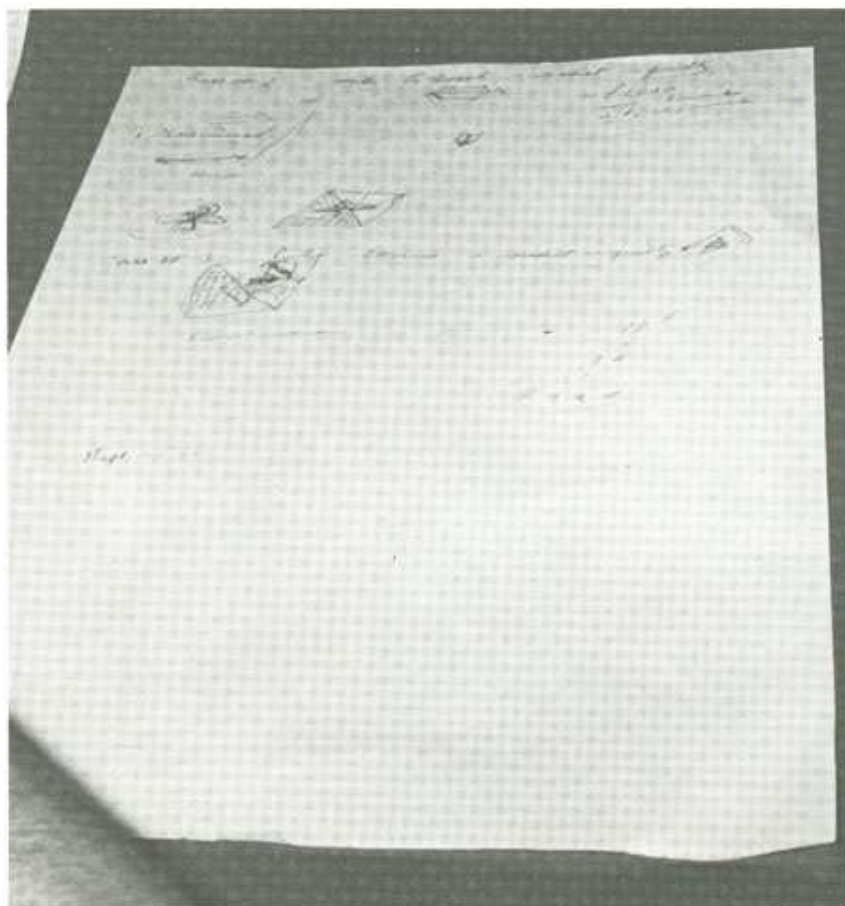


Interim Student Judicial Board



The Interim Student Judicial Board was a very controversial part of the school year 1971-'72. The board was formed after a Senate investigation committee decided that students should be judged by students not by administrators.

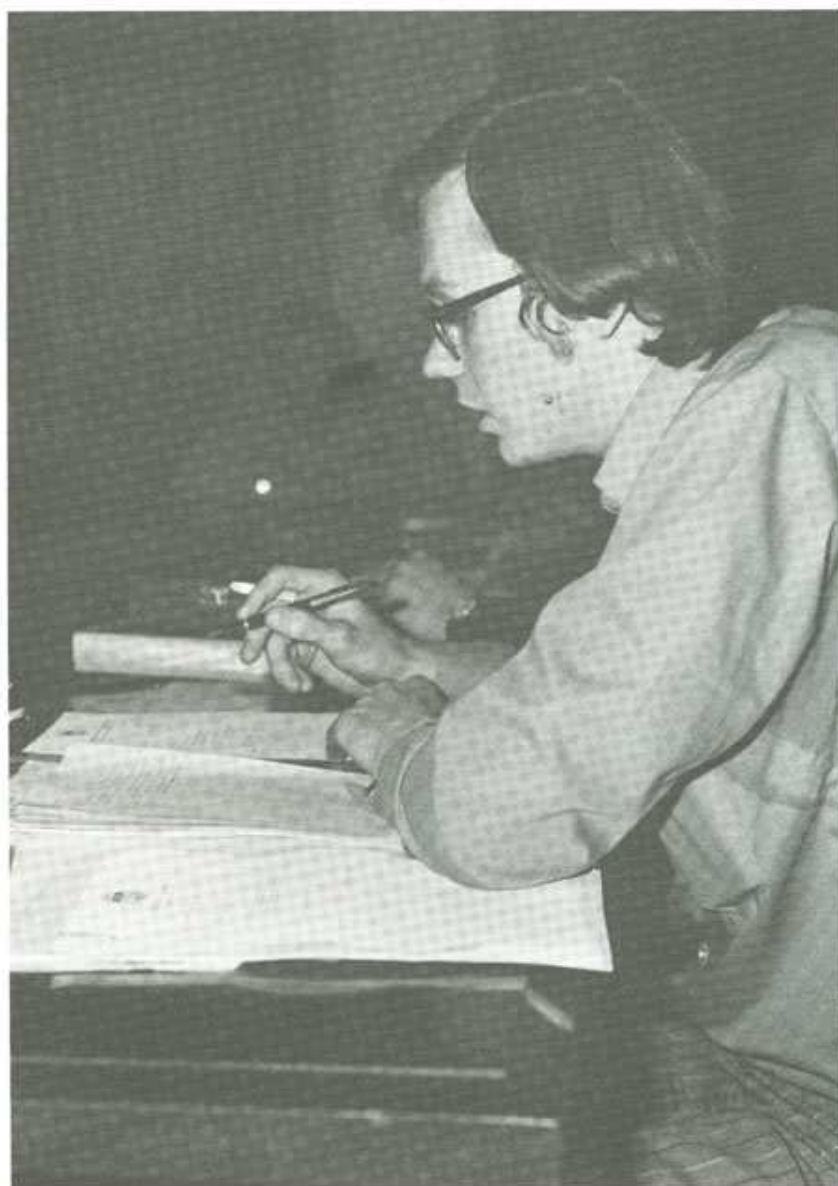
The Student Representative Council accepted the I.S.J.B. as a provisional judicial structure until a better organized and highly developed structure was drafted. As a result the I.S.J.B. dominated the Judicial scene from October 1971 to Mar. 1972. A new structure drafted by the Student Representative Council was submitted to the Senate Committee on Discipline (Student) for their approval where it has remained to date.





During this past year, the I.S.J.B., handled over 25 cases ranging from Grand Theft to Curfew violations. At the beginning of the school year, a heavy verbal battle broke out between the I.S.J.B. and the dissolved (by Senate and Board of Governor decree) Residence Judicial Board. However, things quietened down in November after the Residence Board fell out of the Judicial scene.

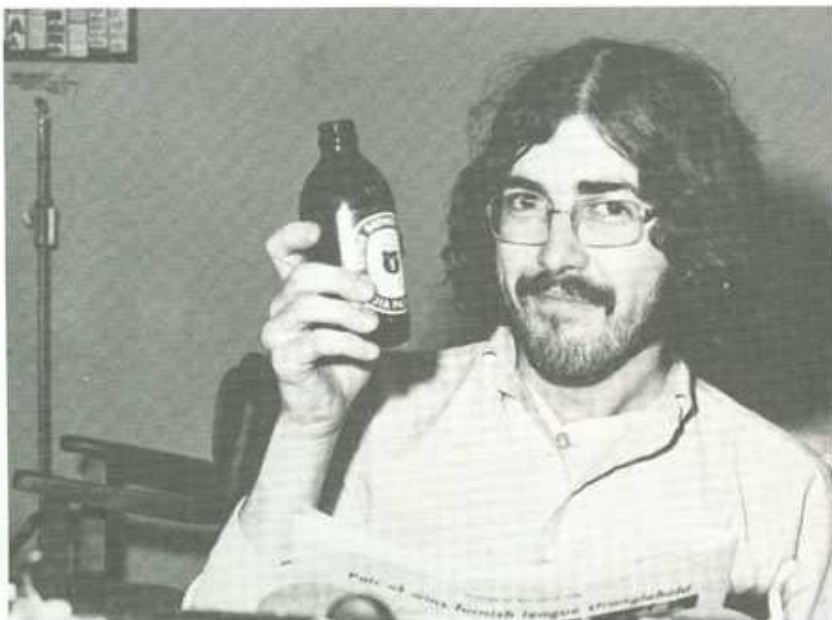
Whether or not the I.S.J.B. will remain this year is uncertain, as the new system of courts has not been approved. If it remains another term, marked improvements on the Judicial level of Saint Mary's will be dominant this fall.

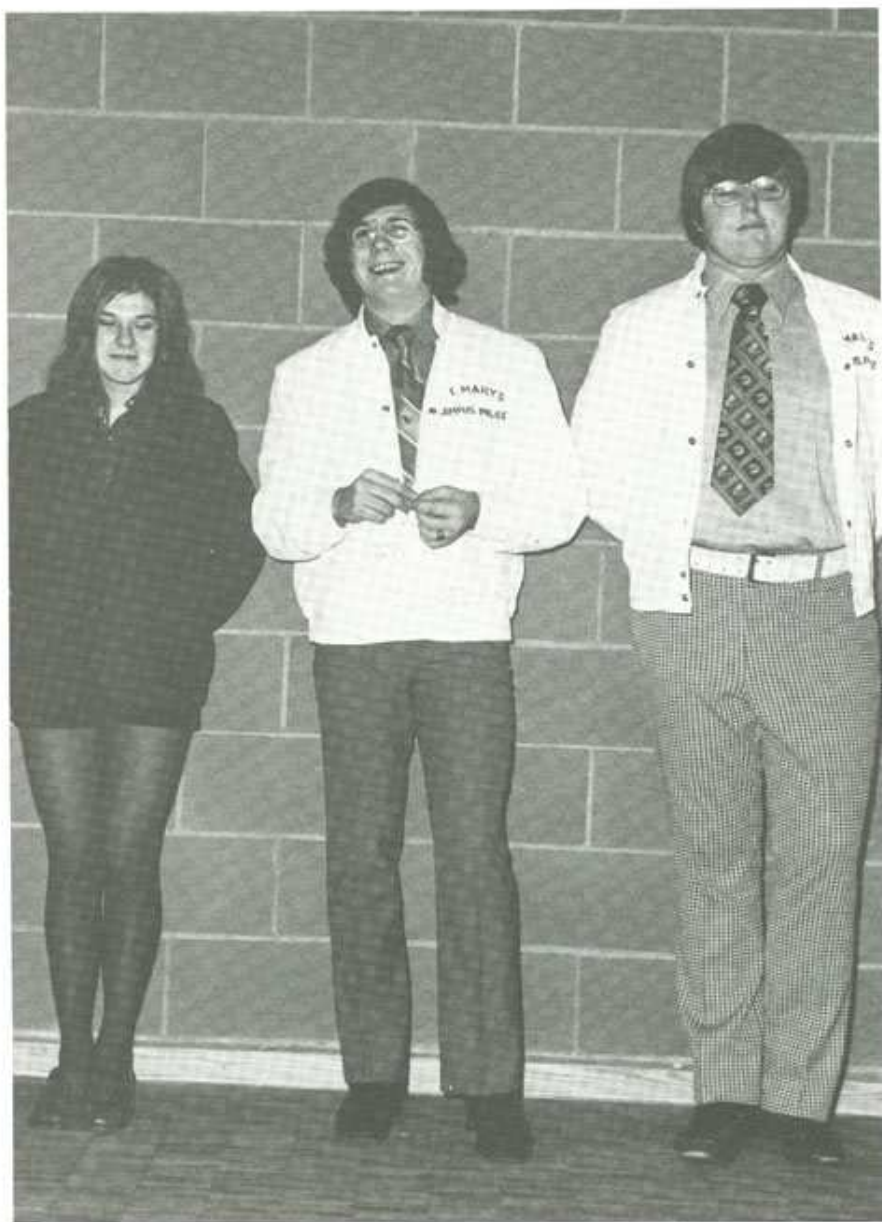
Many of the articles dealt with Off-Campus items which resulted in widespread complaining by the student body as well as the Student Representative Council.

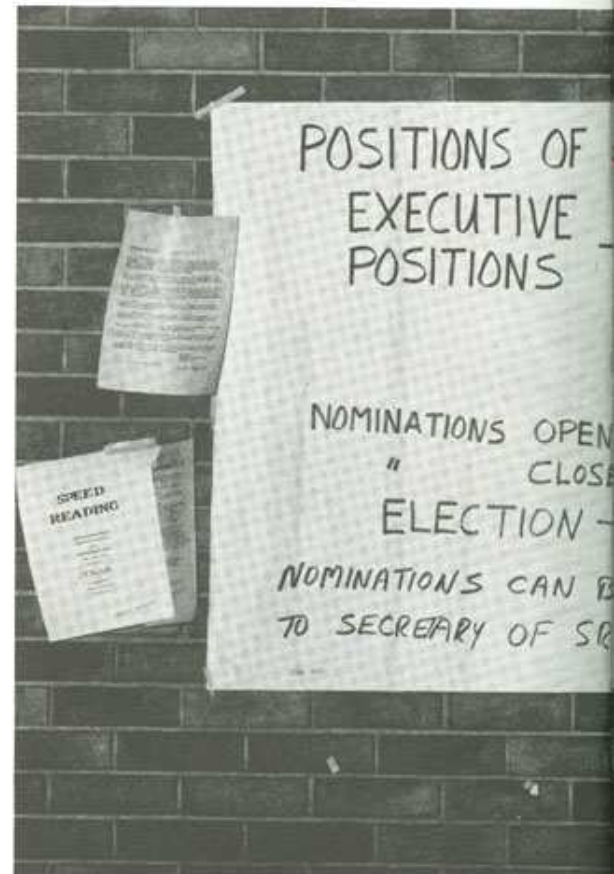

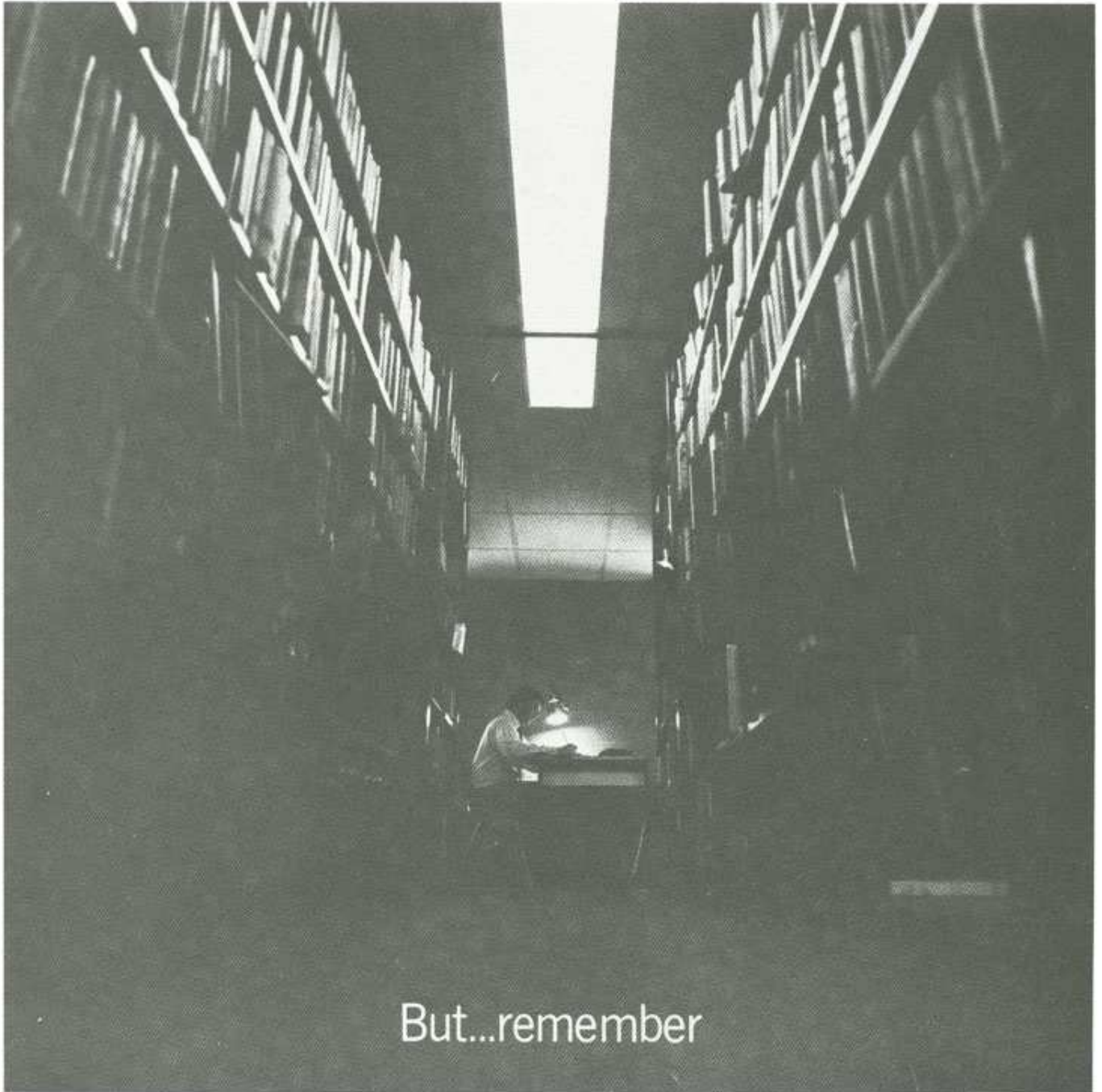
We are still growing and will continue to do so for some time and by continuing to display this mature attitude all of our future problems can be easily overcome.
