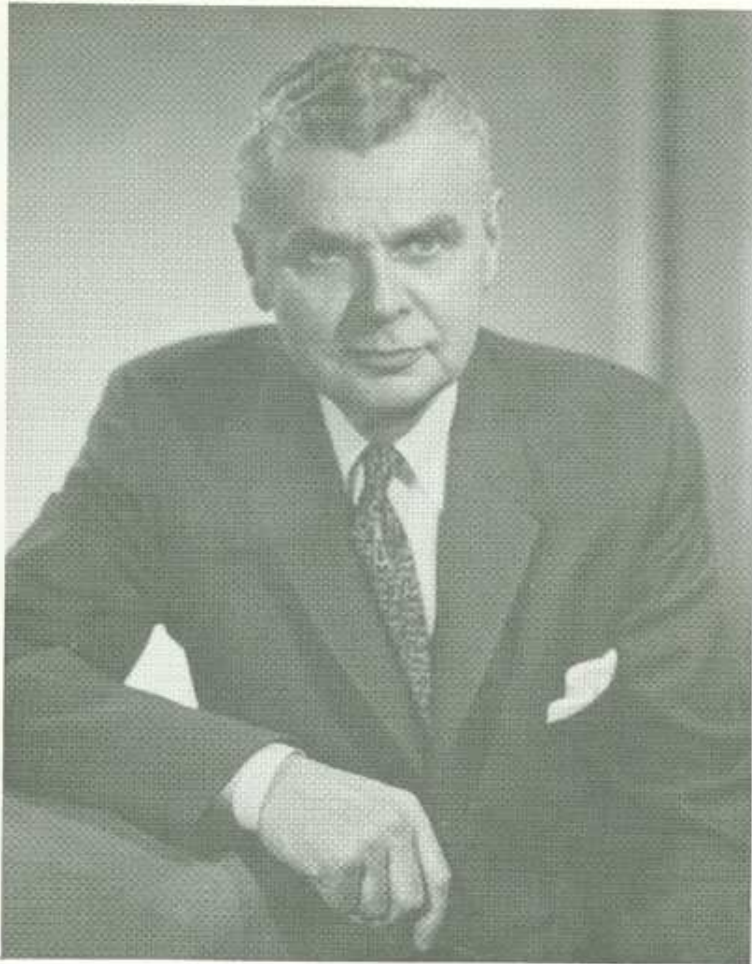
Dear Graduates of 1959,

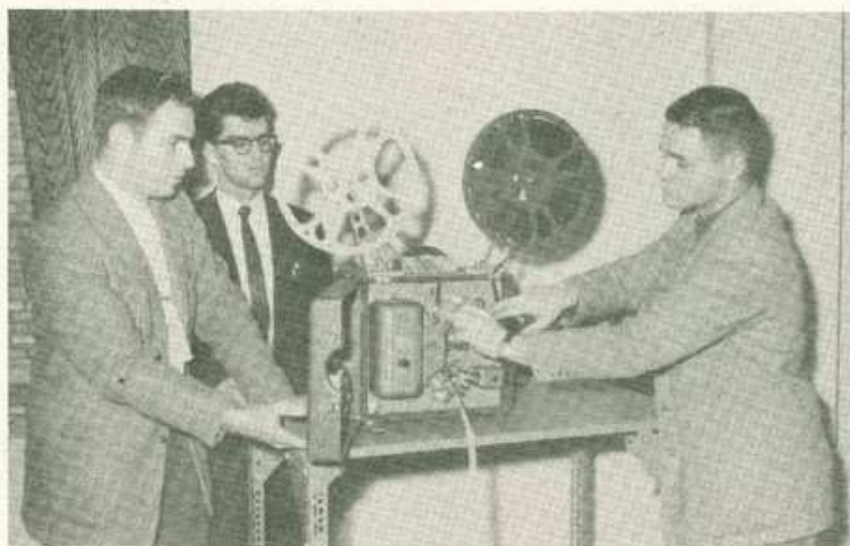
The Canadian Catholic Student Mission Crusade

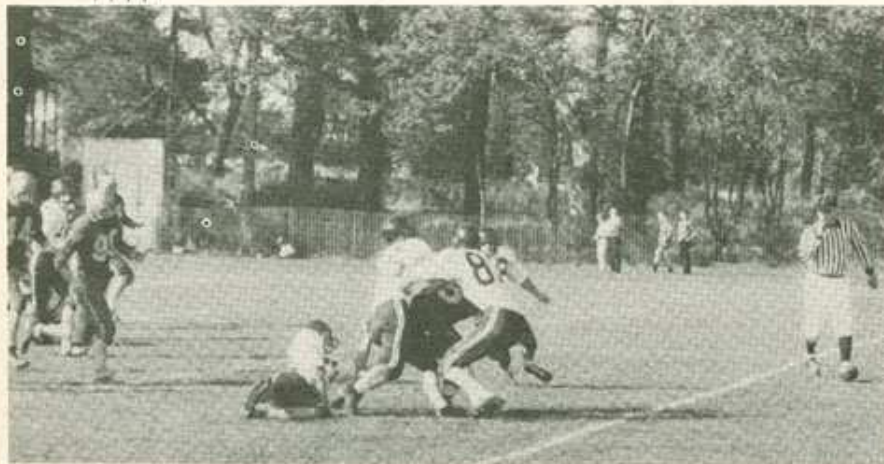

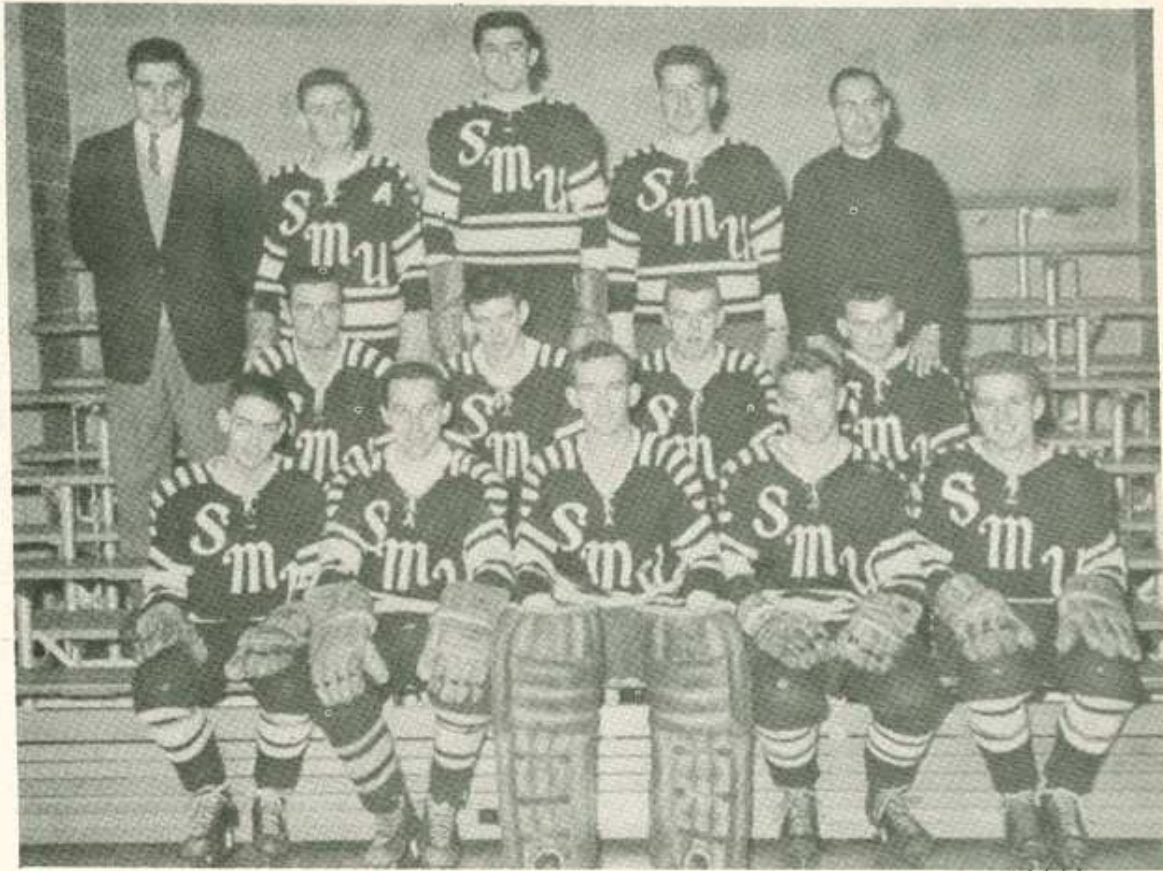

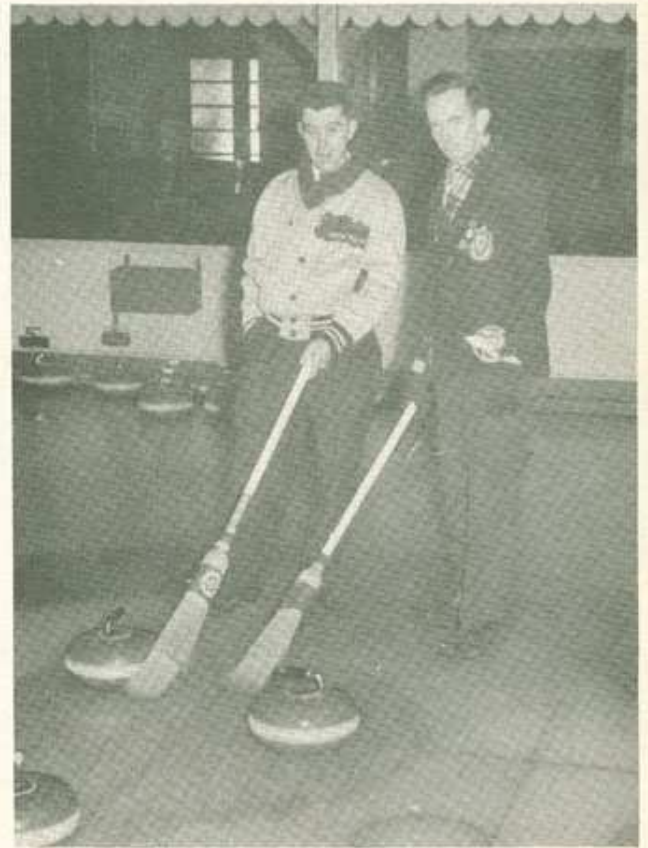
