## SCIENCE STUDENTS FORM ALBERTUS MAGNUS GUILD

### Three Societies Open Campaign

Saint Mary's University is now actively engaged in bringing Christ back to Christmas. The three major societies of the University have undertaken to put before the people of Halifax some tangible reminder of the necessity of Christ in their lives.

The Arts Society, headed by Ed Fitzpatrick, will place in front of The Memorial Library, a crib depicting the Christmas story. The Engineering Society, under William Flinn and Wajih are engaged in building the crib, while the Commerce Society has arranged for the purchase of five hundred Christmas Cards of a religious nature, from the Mission Society.

There is sacrifice, hard work and humility involved in a campaign of this nature, and it is well worth the support of the entire student body.

### Sodality Prepares For Feast Day

The Sodality has been meeting each week, keeping always in mind its three aims of personal sanctification, apostolic work for souls and training in Catholic leadership. The best means to accomplish these important aims is the keeping of the Sodality Rules. It is not the number of Sodalists that count but the number of Sodalists who keep the Rules. If the Sodality and Sodalists keep the Rules of the Sodality, these Rules will keep care of them.

Working on this sound principle, Father Moderator, at the October 29th meeting, explained and introduced the "Daily Duties Card" as a personal help for each Sodalist to improve his living of the important Rule 34. Then Rev. J. Murphy, S.J., as Guest Speaker, gave an enlightening talk on Mental Prayer, which is one of these daily duties. "We turn over in our minds thoughts about God and the things of God and apply them to ourselves, in God's Presence, asking His help to understand and apply them". "If we really think like this about such truths as Heaven—or of the truths expressed in the 'Our Father'—or of God and His Presence everywhere in the world—in tabernacles, in our souls in sanctifying grace, such thoughts can change our lives. Men who make mental prayer become men of strength and character". Such were some of Father Murphy's words.

At its last meeting Our Lady's Planning Committee brought before the Sodality plans for a Triduum of Masses and Communions as a fitting preparation for the Feast of the Immaculate Conception. In response to Our Lady's requests at Fatima, the motion to continue the public

recitation of her Rosary every day in the Chapel at 11.50 was passed.

The Apostolic Planning Committee proposed some projects which were adopted at this meeting. As a result groups of Sodalists every week go to the City Home and the School for the Blind, and the Sodality also carries on a little work of apostolic charity at Saint Joseph's Orphanage.

The Friday Morning Mass attendance has been increasing. But the Chapel is still far from overflowing. This meeting together of Saint Mary's students every Friday morning around the Altar to pray for the University, the Diocese, the Church, the World, is a privilege and an opportunity.

### Taxation Expert Addresses Students

Mr. Arthur Gilmour, a taxation expert and a member of the Clarkson, Gordon & Co., Chartered Accountants, addressed the Commerce Society on Tuesday, November 3, on the life of the professional Accountant, and the work of tax computation. Mr. Gilmour placed special emphasis on the theory of taxation, its computation, and the importance of keeping abreast of the latest laws so that we might not only be able to apply these laws to practice, but also that intelligent and constructive criticism may be brought to bear on those responsible, in order that we have a more exact and equitable taxation system.

Introduced by Professor H. G. Beazley, Dean of the Commerce Faculty, Mr. Gilmour was thanked for his enlightening talk by Ross McDonald, president of the Commerce Society.

### MIDL Conference

Laurie Brean and Patrick Napier, third year students, returned last week-end from Acadia University, where they represented Saint Mary's University at the Annual Maritime Intercollegiate Debating League Conference.

The Conference, held November 6-7-8, concluded Friday with a banquet held at the Paramount Hotel in Wolfville in their honor. Dr. Vince of Acadia University's faculty gave an address to the delegates.

The Saint Mary's representatives were instrumental in having the old judging forms for debates changed. "The old ones", said the two delegates, "were outdated and caused much confusion among the judges." The schedule for Saint Mary's debates were released. All take place after Christmas with Saint Mary's meeting King's and Francis Xavier at their home Universities, and entertaining Saint Dunstan's, last year's M.I.D.L. and C.U.D.A. champions at Saint Mary's.

This year's Canadian University Association winners will be invited to tour South Africa to debate against teams from various educational institutions in that country, with all expenses to be borne by them. The C.U.D.A. finals will be held this year in Winnipeg.

### Student Council Meets

On November 4, the Students' Council of Saint Mary's University met in Room 134 and discussed the following matters:

#### AWARD SHIELDS—

An agreement could not be reached as to when the Students' Council should make the presentation of their award. It was felt that the Shield should be awarded at Christmas in order that it could be seen by the students. However, many will gain extra points for activities during the second semester, and so the matter was deferred to a later date, when it could be discussed more thoroughly.

The Council unanimously voted that the point system for this award should stand.

#### MOUNT SAINT VINCENT

The Councils of both Mount Saint Vincent and Saint Mary's University will meet informally, in the near future, to discuss items of mutual interest.

#### CHRISTMAS CAMPAIGN

The Council voted their wholehearted support to the "Bring Christ Back to Christmas" campaign now under way in this institution.

#### INTERFACULTY AWARDS

As neither the A.A.A. nor the Students' Council had sufficient funds for interfaculty sports awards, it was decided that each faculty pay a fee of \$5.00 for each sport entered, and the Council would assume any further cost.

### Institution To Feature Day of Celebration

Indicative of the expansion of the University, a new group has been born on Saint Mary's campus. Highlighting a day-long celebration in honor of St. Albert the Great, Patron of Science and Science Students, the formal institution of the Albertus Magnus Guild will take place on Saturday morning, November 15, at the University. The Guild will give a corporate life to the increasing number of Science students who will be coming to Saint Mary's to avail themselves of the new Honors Science courses. Since Science will form an important portion of their curriculum as well, the Pre-Medical Students have also been invited to form part of the Guild.

At a meeting last Monday afternoon, the prospective members defined more clearly to themselves the aims and purposes of the new Guild. The organization will be geared to promote and develop the common good, defined by the community of interests of its members, not alone intellectual, through lectures, seminars, symposia, series, conferences, clubs, and other means, but also spiritual, civic, physical and social. It will work on the active principle that to every right and privilege there is a corresponding duty; those to whom is given the privilege of being University Men of Science must fulfill the duty properly to prepare themselves for service in life—not alone technical, but also cultural; not alone physical and social, but also spiritual.

The Science men have chosen Saturday for their institution because it is the feast day of their illustrious Patron, Albert the Great. And they have lined up an imposing programme. Very Rev. Frederick Lynch, S.J., President of Saint Mary's University, will preside.

The day's proceedings will open with Mass and Holy Communion at the University at 9.00 a.m., with Rev. N. W. Burke-Gaffney, S.J., Dean of Science, officiating, and delivering a short address. Following this, the Charter Members of the new Guild will partake of breakfast, and hear a short address by Dr. John A. H. Duffie, of Saint Mary's Physics Department. Then will follow the formal institution of the Albertus Magnus Guild, the election and installation of officers, and a discussion of plans for the future.

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## Open Letter To The Journal

Dear Sir:

This letter was written for the purpose of discrediting an article, written by the Sports Editor of the "B" Staff, which appeared in the last issue of the Journal. Were the students the only victims of such ridiculous nonsense my attack would certainly be unnecessary, but as our University paper circulates among many outsiders, I cannot, in conscience, have them go away with a warped and erroneous opinion of the A.A.A. and of the students.

If the author of this travesty was aware of the facts, I should then denounce him as a deceiver and a sensationalist, and his article as an insidious and spurious attempt to dishonor and frustrate the efforts of the A.A.A. If, however, he was ignorant of the proceedings, I have no alternative but to condemn it as a misrepresentation of the truth . . .

I must say that it is appalling to find his ignorance of the objectives of Interfaculty sports, so pronounced in that article. Certainly a man with his responsibilities should know that the aims of the A.A.A. are: To encourage participation in Athletic activities, to supervise and control Collegiate and Interfaculty competition, and most of all to promote good sportsmanship among its members.

The declaration of a champion, therefore, is not the ultimate end of the football league. Primarily, it is to give as many people as possible, and as often as possible, a chance to play the game. To have said that the league had folded and that the scheduled games were merely workouts was to bring the facts into a false light. I agree that it was unfortunate that all the games had not been played as scheduled, but with whom does the fault lie? Surely you can't expect the members of the A.A.A. to force the students to play football.

If it is your desire to reprimand somebody, I suggest you direct your remarks against those students who, through their marked indifferences, tend to disrupt the league and turn it into what you termed "an inter-farce league". I suggest also, that when you make a statement, supposedly representing student opinion, you go a little beyond that select group of conspirators, the opinions of whom bring dishonor to themselves and the student body as a whole.

These people, through their continual fault-finding and rabble-raising, gnaw at the very heart and soul of our society. Not only does this Sports-writer condone such actions, but from the impression of his most recent article, has turned his column into a defiled cesspool, blemished by the prejudiced and infamous babbling of several agitators. Surely he can look at a topic of controversy objectively, long enough at least to write a fair and unbiased account.

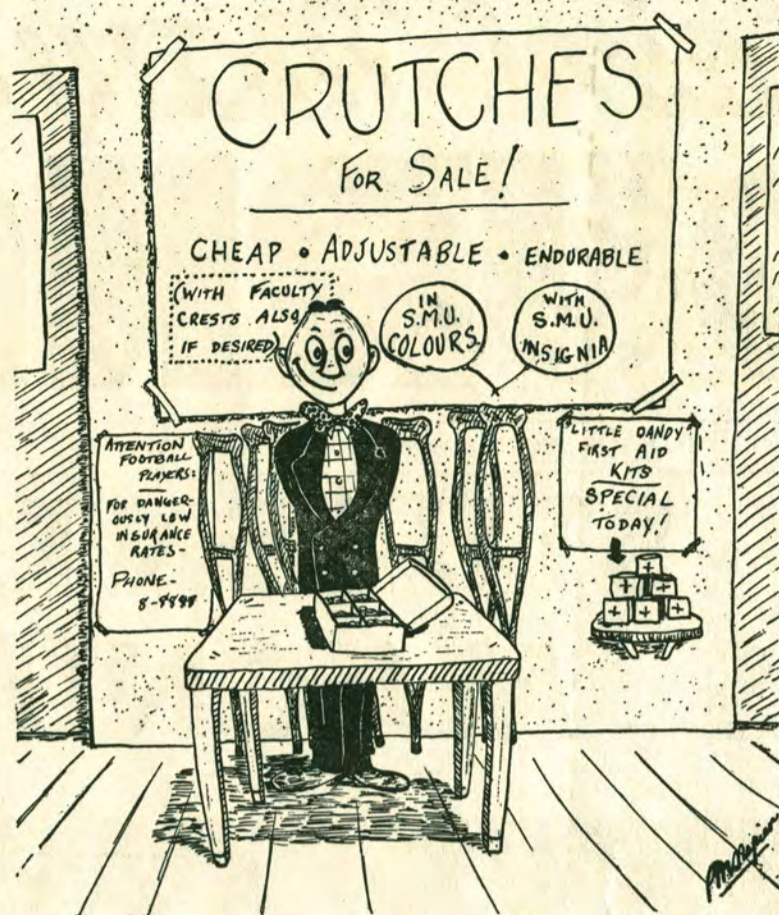
I do not contend that our association is above reproach, but I do maintain that any criticism levelled at this body for the sole purpose of degrading it (a practice which seemed to have found favor with many sportswriters in the past) should be considered valueless.

The students should remember that the A.A.A. is their association, and the efficient running of it depends upon the support and co-operation given to it by them. It is up to the entire student body to see that this is done, and by doing it your interests will be better served.

Then the game got rough. Jack McNeil kicked to the twenty line to open the second half. Max Keeping took the ball to the 50 line, where he was hit so hard that he fumbled. ## REARDON NETS FOUR IN VICTORY

Striking early and often, Saint Mary's University entry in the Halifax-Dartmouth Senior Hockey League ran roughshod over the Dal Tigers in a wide-open game played at the Dalhousie Memorial Rink Thursday night. The Tigers, pre-game favorites in many circles, failed to present a club which could skate with the high-flying Saint Mary's forwards. Outscored, outshot, outplayed, and, I might add, outpenalized, Dal fell behind early in the first period and never came close after that.

For the Saints, Robert "Puddy" Reardon made an impressive debut in his role of playing coach, as he rapped home four goals and assisted on two others. At 2:12 of the first period, after taking a pass from Jack Linihan, Reardon roared in and beat goaltender Sullivan easily. Slightly over four minutes later, big Jim Warner teamed up with Bob Chaisson to put the Saints two-up. Donnie Cable ended the first-period scoring when he took a pass from "Puddy" Reardon and drilled it into the net.

Along with their three goals the Santamarians received three penalties, Don Cable, "Ducky" Reardon and Art Flynn all being escorted to the penalty box by referee Reg Beazley.

Five goals for Saint Mary's, against one by Dal, put the game on ice in the second period. "Pud" Reardon scored the hat-trick in this frame, two of the three goals coming but fifteen seconds apart. After Harold Flynn had put Saint Mary's ahead 5-0, Hopkins of Dalhousie slapped in Johnson's rebound following a wild scramble in front of the Saint Mary's net. The final goal of the second period was scored on the prettiest play of the night, as Reardon drove in hard from the right wing, roared across in front of Sullivan, and flipped the puck back to Cable, who had only to direct it into the open corner.

Penalties in this period went to Ian Doig of Dal, Don Reardon and Bill Bailly of Saint Mary's.

The Santamarians monopolized play in the third period, particularly in the first few minutes, when Jim Warner and Bill Bailly both scored. In this canto the better conditioning of the Dal forwards began to assert itself, and it was only the stellar play of the Saint Mary's defence which held the Tigers at bay.

Final goal of the night was scored by Bob Chaisson, after passes from Bill Bailly and Don Reardon. Certainly not the biggest men on the

ice, the "Kid Line" turned in a strong two-way game, breaking up several Dal rushes before they had time to become dangerous.

With quarterback Ronnie Cole scoring both touchdowns, the Boarders shut out Engineers in the first of a two-game total-point series for the Interfaculty football championship in a game played on the University campus last Sunday.

The Boarders dominated the play right from the opening whistle, as they prevented the Labmen from getting outside their own thirty-five yard line. With only a few minutes remaining in this quarter, Al Spagnoli was tackled behind his own line, after recovering a backfield fumble, and Boarders went ahead, 2-0.

Engineers, with Spagnoli, Fultz and Bob Richard carrying, finally advanced to their own 48, where they lost possession. Starting a downfield drive, Cole went around right end for twenty-four yards. Wilson took the ball on a reverse and carried it to the Engineers' 13. Correia bucked to the 11, Cole ploughed to the 7, Cole again to the 2, Crockett to the 1, and finally Cole scored on a quarterback sneak. Correia's place-kick cleared the bar with plenty to spare, and the Boarders went ahead, 8-0.

Fighting back gamely in the second half, the Engineers worked their way to the Boarders' 18-yard line, on the strength of a pass from Fultz to Harold Flynn, and a series of line-bucks by Fultz and Spagnoli. At this point their attack again bogged down, and Correia kicked to centre to get the Boarders out of danger.

Play see-sawed around centre until finally, with only slightly more than one minute remaining in the game, Bill Wilson scooted around left-end on a reverse for a gain of eighteen yards. On the next play, an end-run, Ronnie Cole picked his way to the one-yard line, and went over on a quarterback sneak on the following play. Tom Burton broke through to spoil Gil Correia's convert attempt on the last play of the game.
