SMUSA Appoints President

There is a new president of the Saint Mary's University Students' Association.

The student council made their decision at last Sunday's Council meeting, and elected Director of External Affairs, Boris Mirtchev. The final choice between Mirtchev and Mature and Part-Time Representative, Annie Grosvold was made by secret ballot, with outgoing president Jeff Young abstaining from the vote unless a tie breaker was needed. Mirtchev and Grosvold, are, according to Young, "both equally qualified to take over the presidency".

Bob Pearson, Vice president of administration, said "I voted for the person most capable for the job." He is pleased with the result of the vote.

Young also mentioned that while he is pleased with the outcome, "this will be a good experience in case [Boris] decides to run next year." He thinks Mirtchev has

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Proposed Cuts Cause Concern

Saint Mary's Faculty Union President, Jack Ginsburg warns that the doubling of tuition, cuts in faculty and staff positions is anticipated to occur by 1996.

Ginsburg says that the recent proposed cuts by the Liberal Government could drastically affect Saint Mary's.

In mid October, Human Resource Minister, Lloyd Axworthy announced a proposed \$7.5-billion in cuts for cash transfers to the provinces. Finance Minister, Paul Martin however anticipates that the Liberal cuts could increase to \$9.5-billion this March. If the social policy reform proposal is accepted, the \$2.6-billion in cash transfers to the provinces for education will be abolished and made available for student loans.

The result from the proposed cuts will ultimately hit the pocket books for students as tuition is expected to double. Also, they will damage the internal operations at Saint Mary's.

Ginsburg however also says that if the Liberal's cuts are turned down, the Nova Scotia Provincial Government may make severe reductions for funding to post-secondary institutions. He says "we are now faced with a problem that does not directly relate to Axworthy's announcement... this is really a frightening situation." He says "it is the attitude the province has right now. If the cuts are not made at the Federal level

Women Remembered

Over 50 students, professors, and staff have volunteered their time to participate in a "Week of Reflection" at Saint Mary's University.

The five day memorial, which began on Monday of this week, was started primarily in remembrance of the 14 women who were brutally murdered by Marc LePine at the University of Montreal on December 6th, 1989. However, Lesa Doucett, a principal organizer of the event, stresses that the memorial is intended to honor and remember all women who have been and continue to be victims of violence. "The main goal of this week is to make people more aware of the seriousness and extent to which women are victims of violence in our society," says Doucett. She adds "we will also try to raise money for women's shelters in Nova Scotia." One of the main features of the "Week of Reflection" is the Purple Ribbon Campaign. Purple ribbons will be available upon donation, for the purpose of show-

ing support for past victims of violence. "They can be worn on any shirt, sweater or jacket. The idea is that people who may be unaware of the memorial will ask what the ribbons are for. In this way we hope to spread our message, says Doucette. She then says that it is from the sale of these ribbons that all anticipated proceeds will be raised. The ribbons can be purchased for any price, and will be on sale every day in the Student Union Building and Loyola Colonnade. Organizers of the campaign are hoping that around 600 ribbons will be sold in order to support their cause. The main ceremony will take place on Friday, beginning at 12:30pm in the Loyola Private Dining Room. It will include readings, music, poetry, and moments of remembrance. The memorial will also include the screening of two movies. Tonight, at 7:00pm, "After the Montreal Massacre" will be shown. Tomorrow (Thursday) at the same time, "Safer For Women, Safer For Everyone," will be the feature. Both movies will be shown in the Student Conference Centre.

Barlow Challenges Axworthy's Cuts

"Canada is in the midst of serious change," said Maude Barlow.

Both author and political activist, Barlow gave her perspective last Thursday night to over 100 people at the Saint Mary's Burke Education Centre on how the Liberal's proposed cuts "will destroy the principles of universality and equality in Canada's social programs."

The proposed \$7.5-billion cuts for payments to the provinces, which were announced in mid October by Federal Human Resource Minister, Lloyd Axworthy, has Barlow "concerned about what direction our country is moving towards."

She also said that Finance Minister Paul Martin has "proposed that \$7.5 billion is being cut, and now we are hearing close to \$10-billion. Whatever it is we should not accept these cuts," says Barlow.

She said "Canada was built for everyone. Social security is what makes us strong and it is the belief in the public sector that has shaped Canada. With the proposed cuts this may be ruined."

"These cuts are right on schedule to what was predicted in 1987," said Barlow who added "now I can say I told you so." She said that since Canada's entry into the global economy, the power of our country "is now in the hands of large business corporations which the government refuses to tax."

She said that the government is blaming social programs for the reason of Canada's severe debt. "They know full well that the reason that our country is in debt is due to the fact that these large corporations are not taxed."

She indicated that new corporations such as Walmart are the beginning of a new trend for Canadian workers. "Walmart for example only hires part-time employees. They don't want to worry about staff getting sick and they do not want to worry about benefits." She added "there is going to be more part-time employment over the next few years in Canada." Barlow said that from 1975 to 1993 part-time employment has increased by 120%.

"We know many young people are being trained for jobs that won't be there in the future," she said. She noted that with the Liberal cuts "most students will not be able to pay off their debts because only dead end jobs such as fast food services and trucker positions will be available."

Barlow said that since these large corporations are favoured, "Axworthy is not going to listen to a 22-year old tell him he is wrong by cutting social programs. So therefore he is going to let the head of the C.D. Howe Institute Party to tell him what to do." Following laughter from the crowd she added "the C.D. Howe Institute feels our country can not afford to have people living in certain parts of Canada anymore. They [C.D. Howe] say that while there are no fish in Newfoundland then perhaps we should get everyone to move off the island."

Barlow indicated that the proposed cuts could result in the increase of privatization for services. She said that Canada could follow the present Alberta model of privatization. Alberta Premier, Ralph Clyne has targeted 48% of municipal services to eliminate the defect. "In Alberta they have thousands of children who did not show up for kindergarten class

because their parents could not pay for it... this is what privatization can do."

She then said "they are also privatizing hospitals. They are firing all the nurses and then bringing them back one by one to ask them what their qualities are only to avoid dealing with

them as a union." Barlow added "there was one instance due to the emergency ward being closed down that a little boy had part of his hand cut off and could be easily attached, but after he was taken by helicopter and transferred it was too late." Barlow then stressed that

"what I'm seeing in Alberta is so close to the way the rest of Canada may become."

She then said that "we are a country that is slowly dying. The increase of privatization will ruin us. Social programs are to help Canada, and now they are being taken away."

Dealing With A Disorder

Multiple Personality Disorder. Those words may bring visions of Oprah like talk show guests, and TV. movies of the week. But it can strike anyone. Heather Doose is one of those people.

Doose spoke about her experience with MPD, last Wednesday in the Burke Education Centre. The Psychology Society sponsored event was held to make students aware that people with disorders "have no certain look," says Suzanne Devomey, President of the Psychology Society. Devomey also asked Doose to speak so that students could "put a face to a disorder," and realize that "anyone can have a disorder," says Devomey.

The 50 students who attend the discussion, heard Dooes memories of her behavior and her childhood experiences which she felt contributed to her disorder. Doose began her story by stat-

ing that it was a "personal view" of MPD.

Doose explained that one of the criteria for MPD is the ability to dissociate. For example, when you start day dreaming in class, and can not remember the last thing the professor said. The second criteria for the disorder is that there must be a repeated trauma, with no rescue from that trauma. Therefore the child keeps the secret inside. This usually happens before the age of five, explained Doose. She thinks that her personality first became separated when her grandfather abused her as a child. She says "it was easier for someone else to (deal with it) dot it."

Doose was not diagnosed with MPD, until 1989, but before then she had a history of problems. At age 11 she had tried to commit suicide, which was not seen as a serious problem at the time. For the next 20 years Doose went from "psychiatrist to psychiatrist looking for answers."

Throughout her life Doose has realized that something was wrong. She described her experiences of doing term papers, but not remembering how she did them.

Once she was diagnosed in 1989, she went through a year of therapy. She says that she "wouldn't accept the diagnosis," having not heard of Multiple Personality disorder, except for the story of Sybil. Doose says she was "terrified of having the disease. She has been in therapy for the past three years. Where she says "cooperation and integration are the keywords." The goal of the treatment is to have "osmosis of the parts," Doose says that she has not disassociated for over a year now.

Doose has spoken to high schools, and other medical groups. She thinks that it is important to speak because she wants to "educate people, you are the future." I can only pass on my experience."

The Student council is also considering filling Mirtchev's former position. It was suggested that a member of the External Affairs committee take over the position But a decision has not been made as yet.

Mirtchev's presidency is effective from the second of January.

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then the province can cut and tuition can go up anyway."

Ginsburg says "that no matter what way you look at it, this is a university issue and funding directly affects the operation of the university." He adds "it can affect salaries, programs, and the ability to deliver quality programming."

Even though doubling tuition may pay for the loss in funding through the Liberal's proposal, Ginsburg says it will still leave Saint Mary's with less operating money. "Therefore, if we have less operating costs, that will mean reducing sala-

ries, and reducing staff." He adds "the problem with this government is that their acting like their the employer of a business. If the employer feels that they are in a financial bind then they will make cuts."

Ginsburg says that "cuts for laboratory supplies, equipment, utilities, employee benefits and cuts to departments for faculty and staff could in fact happen."

Also, Ginsburg says "that when you double tuition, there will be less people attending school and therefore less people on staff will be needed."

Axworthy, who is presently traveling across Canada to dis-

cuss the proposed cuts has been met with angry rallies consisting of thousands. Axworthy has had everything from food thrown at him to students voicing their concerns.

A meeting consisting of student union members from across the province last Saturday at the Nova Scotia College of Art and Design (NSCAD) also has them worried about the future of their universities.

"We had a forum at our school at the beginning of the month and Axworthy was kind enough to speak," says Saint Francis Xavier Student Union President, Jim Curry. He adds that "He got pretty defensive at

times but believe it or not when people gave suggestions he seemed to listen."

Curry however stresses that Axworthy did not address the whole social policy reform. "Things were left out and questions went unanswered and I think that really frustrated people... Axworthy is a smooth talker and I can see why he has his job," says Curry.

NSCAD Student Union President, Tasha Bollerup feels that Axworthy's consultation process is flawed. She says "You have to apply to speak with him regarding the cuts and we [NSCAD] were denied. I know of other universities that

have also been denied."

Bollerup says that she is concerned that the Liberal's plan on paper "looks good, but only for people who do not understand it. This plan is vague and people must be educated and informed about what actually is going on."

With Axworthy being in town this December 13, SMUSA Director of External Affairs, Boris Mirtchev says that he "wants every one to get involved." A march is being planned to take place at 2:30 pm at the Saint Mary's Student Union Building and arrive at the Holiday Inn where Axworthy is expected to arrive.

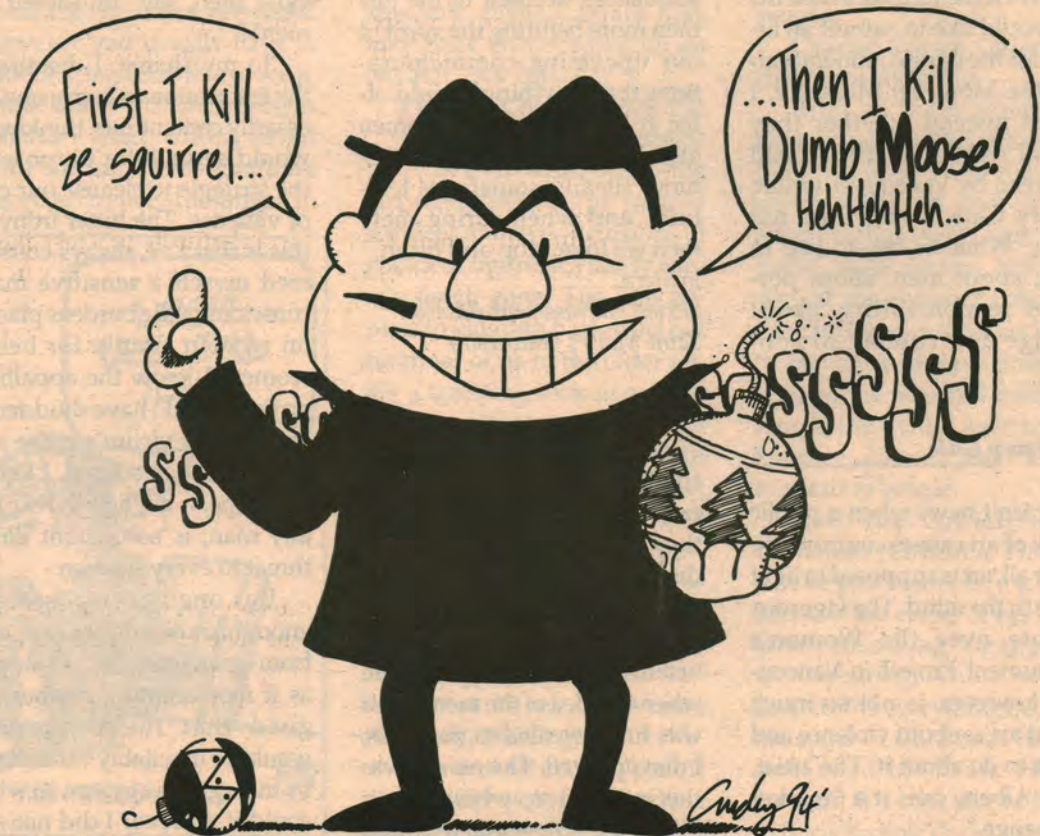

It isn't news when a public work of art causes controversy. After all, art is supposed to light a fire in the mind. The vigorous debate over the Women's Monument Project in Vancouver, however, is not so much about art as about violence and what to do about it. The artist, Beth Albert, calls it a "marker of change."

I can attest to that, because it changed my mind. I have gone from being a silent opponent of the project to an active supporter.

The design is a masterpiece of understatement: 14 benches of pink granite inscribed with the names of the 14 women slain at Montreal's L'Ecole Polytechnique on December 6,

1989. Each bench will have a small hollow that will gather rainwater, the tears of and for the women who were murdered that day, and who are murdered every day.

I cannot imagine a more beautiful memorial. And yet, when the idea of the monument was first revealed in the press, I disapproved. The reason was the inscription, which reads: "We, their sisters and brothers, remember and work for a better world. In memory, and in grief for all the women who have been murdered by men. For women of all countries, all classes, all ages, all colours."

Yes, I objected to the phrase "murdered by men." When I read the proposed inscription, I thought I was being blamed as a man, for what happened in

Montreal. Not all men are murderers, I quickly countered. Why, then, say "murdered by men"?

To my shame, I dismissed the inscription as being unnecessarily contentious, thinking it would serve little purpose in the struggle to cleanse our city of violence. The bitter irony in this is that I've always considered myself a sensitive man, conscious of the burdens placed on women simply for being women. I know the appalling statistics, and I have shuddered each time a victim's name appears in the headlines. I know that rape, a negligible fear for any man, is a constant daily threat to every woman.

But one never possesses enough knowledge to save one from ignorance. And, as stupid as it may sound, I further argued that the monument would be inevitably vandalized by male goons anyway, so what could it achieve? I did not see the contradiction, and the implied cowardice, in the terrible unspoken assumption: Violence exists. Therefore, why erect a monument that will only annoy people prone to violence?

And there the matter rested until two things occurred that changed my mind.

The sheer virulence of the

attacks on the project by several Vancouver newspaper columnists was disquieting. All male, they cantankerously insisted that the whole thing was a calculated insult to men. By implication, they were suggesting that the women behind the project were exploiting the deaths of those 14 women, as a means of promoting hatred against men.

How could they? How could they imagine that women, who might have been in that classroom on that day, would even think of such a thing? I remember my wife calling me at work, in tears, terrified. I was shocked and sorry, but knew, even as I tried to comfort her, that I did not feel the fear she did.

Then Pamela Cameron died. She was 16 years old and lived in Surrey, a suburb of Vancouver. On October 14 she was murdered while coming home from school. And on the following day, a 72 year-old woman was raped in Stanley Park. It was mid-afternoon. It does not take a genius to guess the sex of their attackers.

Yes, the world is drowning in a rising tide of brutality. And the grim truth is that the violence is over whelmingly perpetrated by men. Once, I plucked the "male" from "male violence" out of a misplaced sense of impartiality. By doing so, I rendered violence a causeless phenomenon, like the weather, which Canadian men and women have to endure. But there is a human face behind the fist, and most of the time, it's a man's. If we keep that face in a shadow out of a misplaced sense of propriety, then how will the violence cease?

The harm I did out of ignorance is less than other men's.

When I objected to the inscription, I did nothing more than withhold my support. But there are many men, more certain of their position, who actively seek the projector's demise. They portray the organizers of the Women's Monument Project as rabid feminists, a special-interest group with its own agenda. One opponent, MP Ted White (Reform - North Vancouver) lobbied against the project receiving, in conjunction with Mediawatch, a grant from the federal Human Resources Development Ministry.

He characterized the monument as "tasteless" and "openly offensive." The grant was denied.

Fortunately, changes in heart and mind do not require public funding. Evidence of change, which is hope in action, needs only the effort of individuals. I can oppose male violence and the degrading culture of violence that encourages men to harm women. Men who are decent, non-violent and law-abiding accept the truth of the description, realizing the truth is not about collective guilt but collective responsibility.

And they are not alone. The project is not without sponsors, and the monument will be built. But if Vancouver is to have this "marker of change," there must be a corresponding change in us. It is only just and right that everyone, men and women, embrace the vision of the Women's Monument Project.

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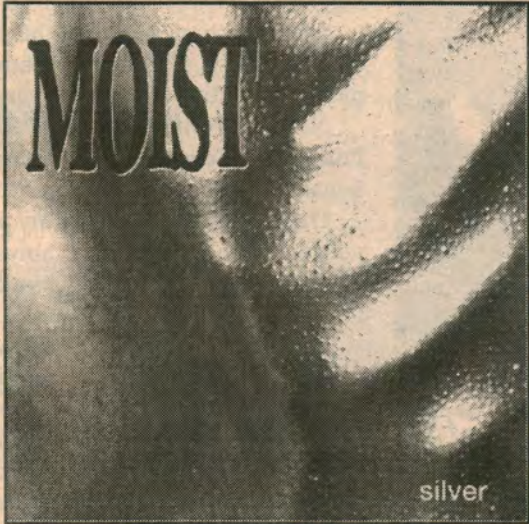
Moist Is Where It's At

Megadeth

As per usual, Megadeth delivers a rifferama, an offering devoid of pretense, and filled with Mustaine's caustic commentary. All the mandatory Megadeth elements are present; acerbic lyrics, splinter on the tongue vocals, a montage of riffs, things which have defined the band's sound since *Killing is My Business*. The band succeeds in disturbing the senses, the conscious. Mustaine is still bitter and obnoxious, a condition that has afflicted him since his well-documented ousting from Metallica, a malady that afflicts many of the band's ardent fans

Reckoning Day grinds and groans with an infectious throb,

the vocals raw and brimmed with angst. *Addicted to Chaos* is appropriately autobiographical, since Megadeth has continually suffered setbacks that threatened the band's existence- the riff forceful and memorable, the lyrics personal. *A Tout Le Monde* combines melody with a chugging riff effectively, *Elysian Fields* maims and mauls with religious references and gurgling pathos... *Blood of Heroes* and *Family Tree* are heavy on cynicism and snarl with vigor. The title track is a somber dirge with malicious and prophetic lyrics, *Youthanasia* finding the band at its most ballistic. *Black Curtains* is creepy and sinister- classic Megadeth. Mustaine's ingenuity shines in *Victory*, a song of vindication with references to past album and song titles, the victory decidedly his.

A review of *Youthanasia* would not be complete without a reference to the cover (designed by noted art director Hugh Syme- famous for his phenomenal Rush covers). What has been construed as premeditated sickness, (particularly by Wal-mart who refuses to distribute the album) is actually a poignant view of an abysmal future, the band's choice of cover is a social commentary and not the act of a group of sadistic miscreants. Both the songs and the cover are designed to annihilate the masses. Megadeth aren't for the timid and owning a copy of *Youthanasia* isn't going to make you many friends, but the disc is worth the alienation.

from what's going on in the rest of the world. They convinced us that they believed in what we were doing," says Pearce, "Plus we're Canadian, so it just made sense."

Although they have been touring for about six months, Pearce says that they still put a lot of energy into their performances. "Every show is a different thing, and we love playing live. We spend so much time travelling and doing promo stuff that the stage is our outlet. Our whole day is geared around that hour on stage, and it really keeps us sane. Our shows are really spontaneous as well, so it keeps things really fresh for us."

Before they had a label, Moist released a self-titled indie cassette with nine songs, which is no longer available. It included songs now on their 1994 release, *Silver*, such as *Push*, *Believe Me*, *Break Her Down*, *Picture Elvis*, and *low low low*.

"That tape was made when the band was just starting out, and we didn't even have a permanent drummer at the time. Our sound is developing over time, and it took a while to try and figure out what kind of a band we were... More than anything we're just a high-energy rock band," he says.

"Song-writing for us has always been a very collaborative experience, where everybody just gets together in a room, and starts off with a very small idea, and it kind of blossoms into a song essentially. Dave writes most of the lyrics these days, cause he's kind of taken it upon himself to do that... and he's really getting good at it. But on *Silver* there's a lot of lyrics that are written by other people in the band as well."

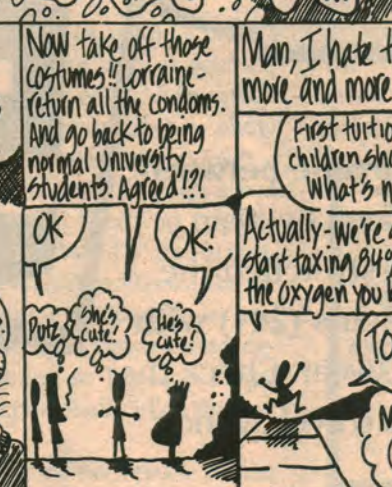
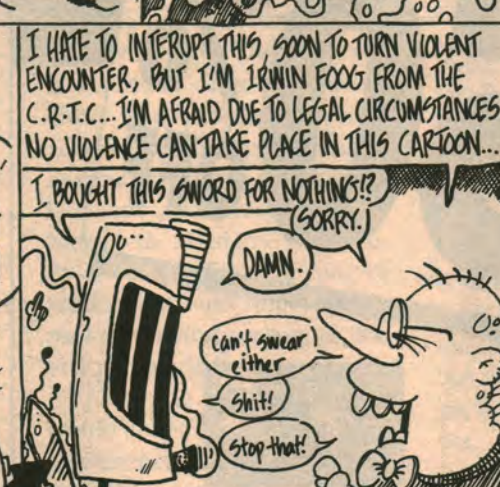
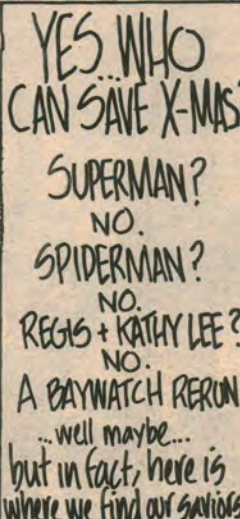
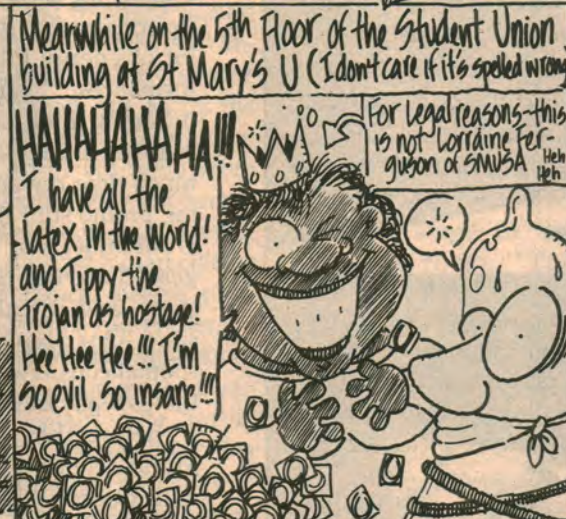
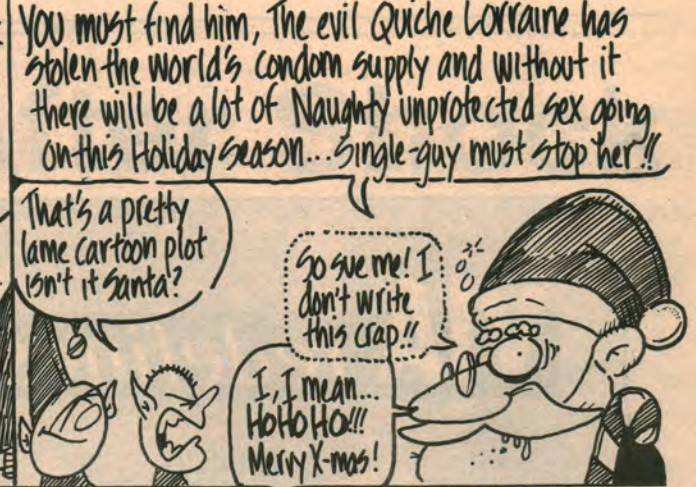
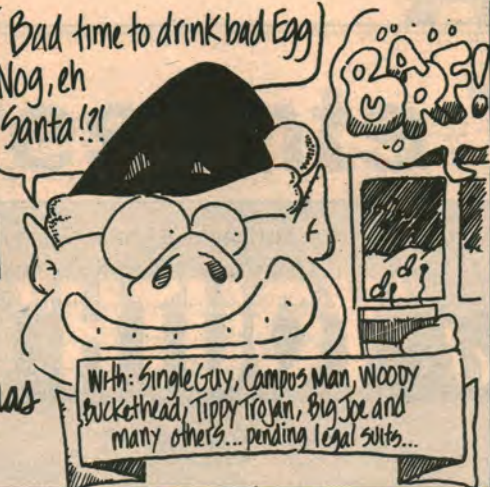

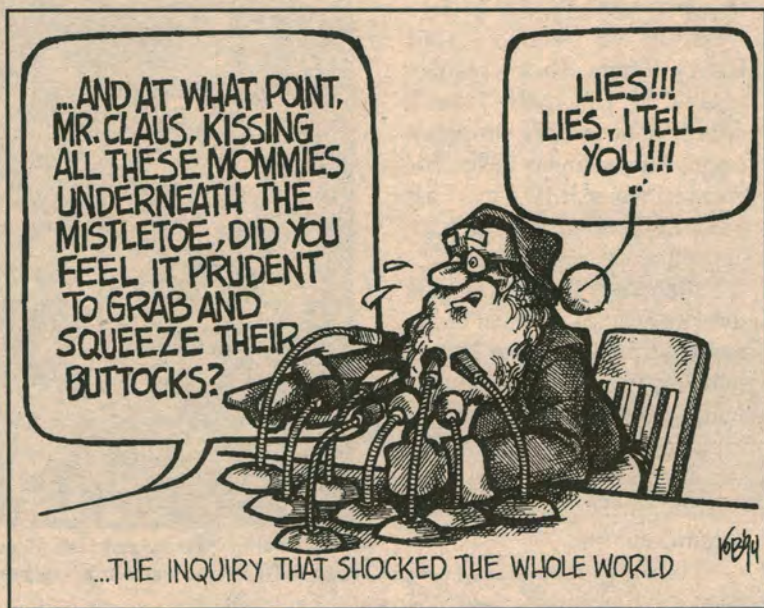
brainer, I'll admit... but I had to do it, just to clean the palate. So sue me.

Leading SMU to their 73-53 clobbering over Cape Breton was forward, and Player of the Game, Jad Crnogorac who poured in 29 points, two of which were three-pointers. SMU now sports a 1-2 record. The Tigers are 3-0 and

Also she says she needs to get the exposure so she can get a sponsor. "It's hard to get a sponsor in Nova Scotia if you are not going to get any TV coverage. Most people try and put syndicates together, meaning a group of sponsors so they can afford these horses." says the frustrated rider.

Right now Angela is doing

her business degree at Saint Mary's and is thinking about Law school for the future. "I know I can make the team, I've talked to Jill Henselwood who trains with Ian Miller and she says with the right caliber horse I have the potential to make the Canadian team. I would like to make the team as soon as possible...but I do want something to back up on so that is why I am doing business so I could run my own farm. Even Ian Miller is a chartered accountant!" She says horses will always be a part of her life no matter what. "once you're with it and dedicated to it as long as I have been, you can't get away from it."

For the next little while Angela says she is not sure of what life will lead to. She plans on riding as many different horses as she can and to hopefully find a sponsor so she can find the ever so elusive horse that will put her over the top. Riding for Canada at the world championships and the Olympics are goals she would like to fulfill. Angela's immediate future is uncertain but she knows the light at the end of this tunnel is not so far away.

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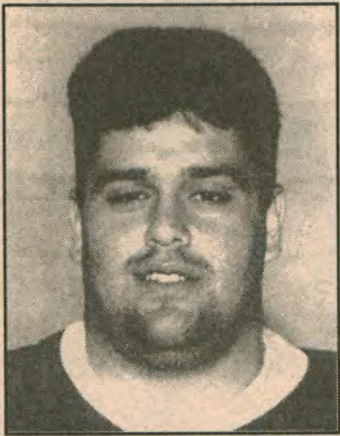

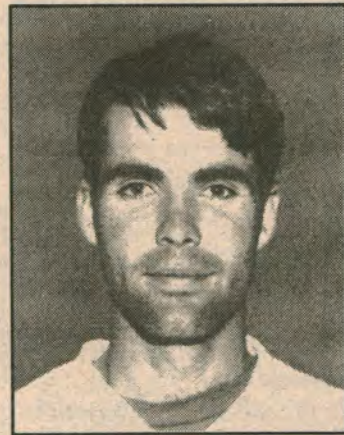
