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SMU to offer Diploma in Forensics

Canada's first forensic agreement signed by Saint Mary's and RCMP

Saint Mary's gained a great deal of national recognition today, when members of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and the SMU Science Faculty signed a Memorandum of Understanding for the creation of a Forensic Science Program on campus.

This program is designed to give students and police officers a better understanding of the sciences involved with forensic study – biology, chemistry, and physics. This diploma program offered at Saint Mary's is unique from others in the country in that it is designed to provide the scientific background necessary to understand the basis of forensic techniques rather than forensic methods.

"I am extremely pleased and feel that we are well on our way to enhancing forensic identification in Canada," says Lee Fraser, RCMP Superintendent. "It is our long term hope that police officers interested in the forensic identification field can obtain future training online."

The facility that has been set up on the fifth floor of the Science Building has some of the most advanced equipment in eastern Canada for this type of fieldwork. SMU professors will teach all the courses necessary for the Forensics Diploma and they will constantly receive input about the program from groups with expertise in the field, like the RCMP. The Dean of Science, Dr David Richardson, says that collaboration with outside organizations will make this program very exciting.

"Students I've spoke to are already excited about enrolling in the new Diploma in Fo-

rensic Science," says Dr. Richardson. "Our forensic graduates will have the expertise needed by private and public organizations that investigate criminal activity."

Students wishing to enroll in the program must first be accepted into a degree program at SMU (e.g. BSc, BA, or Bcomm) or be admitted as a diploma student. To graduate from the Forensic Program, students must achieve a QPA of 3.0 or above.

The RCMP, who have been instrumental in the planning and development of the program, will have officers involved with their forensic identification department, take courses and finish the proposed diploma program. Officers also have the option of entering the program as students to receive the full degree. Forensic Identification Services will have officers teach courses here at Saint Mary's as well.

The Forensics Diploma will be apart of the Biology Department but will contain courses from numerous disciplines within the Faculty of Science. The courses are also planned to be offered online as part of a distance education through web-based offerings, available anywhere in the world. Only 1.5 credits of the program are not already part of the regular course offerings, so students could complete required courses at other institutions and have them count toward the program.

In its initial opening, the program has 21 science students signed up. Among those are RCMP officers and Saint Mary's students who were involved with the program since its inception almost 2 years ago.

CIBC Run for the Cure

Held annually, the CIBC Run for the Cure is Canada's largest, annual fundraising event dedicated to raising money for the fight against breast cancer. With approximately 70,000 participants and over 6.7 million dollars raised in 1999, they hope to beat their previous mark this year. On Sunday October 1st, 2000, more than 85,000 people in 29 communities across Canada participated in the run. Their goal was to raise over eight million dollars.

In Halifax, the event was held at Saint Mary's University. Over 5,000 people registered for the event and an estimated seven to eight thousand attended, the run raised more than \$450,000, with money still to come in. People registered in teams through work or their community or as individuals. While most of the people out or

the event are recreational walkers and runners, prizes were given out to the winners of the 1km and 5km races. The walkers received medals and the runners received prizes from Nike.

With hundreds of volunteers participating, both front stage and behind the scenes, the event was a great success. One volunteer, Sheila Mclean, who has been participating in the run for the last 5 years remarked that after her first year helping with the run, she became addicted. She truly believes that there is a cure for breast cancer, and the more people who help in the fight for a cure, the faster it will be found. Mclean remarked how inspiring it is to see the

number of people trying to help make a difference. A lot of the people participating in the event have been touched by breast cancer, either as survivors and family, people who have lost someone to breast cancer, or those who just want to help make a difference.

In the past decade, nearly two million women have been struck with breast cancer. In 1999, almost 178,000 women were diagnosed with breast cancer. This disease affects one in nine women who live to be the age of eighty-five in their lifetime. Breast cancer is the leading killer of women ages thirty-five to fifty-four. In the course of a 5km run, which takes approximately thirty-three minutes to run, eleven women will be diagnosed with breast cancer. Every week, 100 women die from this devastating disease.

Of the money raised, 75 per cent of the net proceeds raised in each run

Du Maurier Arts Council appoints new president and chairperson

On September 26, 2000 in Montreal, the du Maurier Arts Council announced the Robaert Bexon and Neil Blanche have been named to the organization's board as chairman and president respectively. The du Maurier Arts Council is Canada's largest private sector source of arts funding.

Mr. Blanche, currently the Director, Marketing Communications at Imperial Tobacco Canada Ltd., is succeeding Chris de Minckwitz as council president. While Mr. Bexon, the president and chief officer

of Imperial Tobacco Canada Ltd., is taking over the position of Council chair from retiring Don Brown.

"The du Maurier Arts Council has made tremendous strides since its inception in 1971," said Bexon, a graduate from the University of Toronto's faculty of Arts with a degree in English Literature. "That is a tribute to the people who have worked so diligently over the years to transform vision to reality, and to the creative Canadian Artists, whose fresh, contemporary ideas keep the arts in this country so vibrant."

Mr. Blanche, who has had

extensive exposure to Canadian artistic initiatives, most recently through du Maurier Concert Stage, stated that the existence of funding organizations such as the du Maurier Arts Council is more important than ever.

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CTNS awards professor with \$14,000

Dr. Phil Street of Saint Mary's University has been awarded \$14,000 from the Centre for Theology and the Natural Sciences (CTNS) in Berkeley, California for his course "Science and Religion: Psychological Contributions to the Conversation."

"I'm extremely pleased that Saint Mary's has been honoured with this award," says Dr. Street. "With its strong Commerce, Science and Arts faculties, together with the excellent program in religious studies, Saint Mary's is the ideal academic environment where the conversation between science and religion about the "bigger questions" can take place."

The course, scheduled to

begin in January 2001, is offered at the senior level as a special topics course, cross-listed with religious studies. Approximately 10 faculty from various disciplines in the sciences and humanities have agreed to provide invited presentations.

The Science and Religion Course Award Competition, Established in 1994, is designed to support scientists and religious scholars from a wide range of disciplines as they address of science and religion thought of teaching.

The Centre for Theology and the Natural Sciences (CTNS) grants a number of these awards every year to professors from around the world for designing new courses in science and religion.

SMU's Science department receives over \$600 thousand in grants

Professors in the Faculty of Science and Commerce at Saint Mary's have been awarded over \$600,000 in new research grants from the Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council (NSERC). This adds to the millions in funding the University already receives from prestigious research organizations from across Canada and around the world.

The funding will allow eight professors from Astronomy and Physics, Chemistry, Finance and Management Science, and Mathematics and Computing Science to conduct leading-edge research in the region.

"It is a real honour to receive funding from NSERC," says Dr. Tony Charles, Finance and Management Science Professor. He will receive \$109,536.00 over the next four years to develop and apply clear measures of what it will take to manage natural resources here in Canada and around the world.

"It's exciting work, and a real challenge - trying to help

in avoiding human-made disasters like the cod collapse that hit Atlantic Canada in the 1990s," says Dr. Charles.

Dr. Pawn Lingras, a professor in the Mathematics and Computing Science Department, will receive \$30,000 over the next four years. "NSERC grants are very useful in providing students with an opportunity to get involved in research," he says. "This summer, two students will be working with me on modeling of some real-world data such as highway traffic using genetic algorithms, neural networks and statistical methods."

The research funding is a real benefit for students, many of whom will be hired by their professors to work during the summer and during the academic year. The students benefit from the real world experience they gain while in undergraduate or graduate programs, which prepares them for graduate school or the work force.

Twelve undergraduate students will receive a total of \$55,000 to conduct summer research. They include: Ryan MacLellan, Astronomy and Physics; Steven Ings, Geology; Amber O'Hearn, Mathematics and Computing Science;

Wendy Turner, Biology; Elizabeth Turner, Chemistry; Carolyn DeAmicis, Chemistry; Joel Patterson, Mathematics and Computing Science; Michelle De Young, Geology; Ann Clarke, Biology; Chad Greene, Astronomy and Physics; Paul Mountford, Mathematics and Computing Science; and Gavin Beck, Chemistry.

Four graduating students will receive almost \$140,000 for graduate studies in science. They are: Jeremy Finden, Chemistry; Nicole McLearn, Biology; Melissa Smith, Biology; and Leanne Spracklin, Mathematics and Computing

Science.

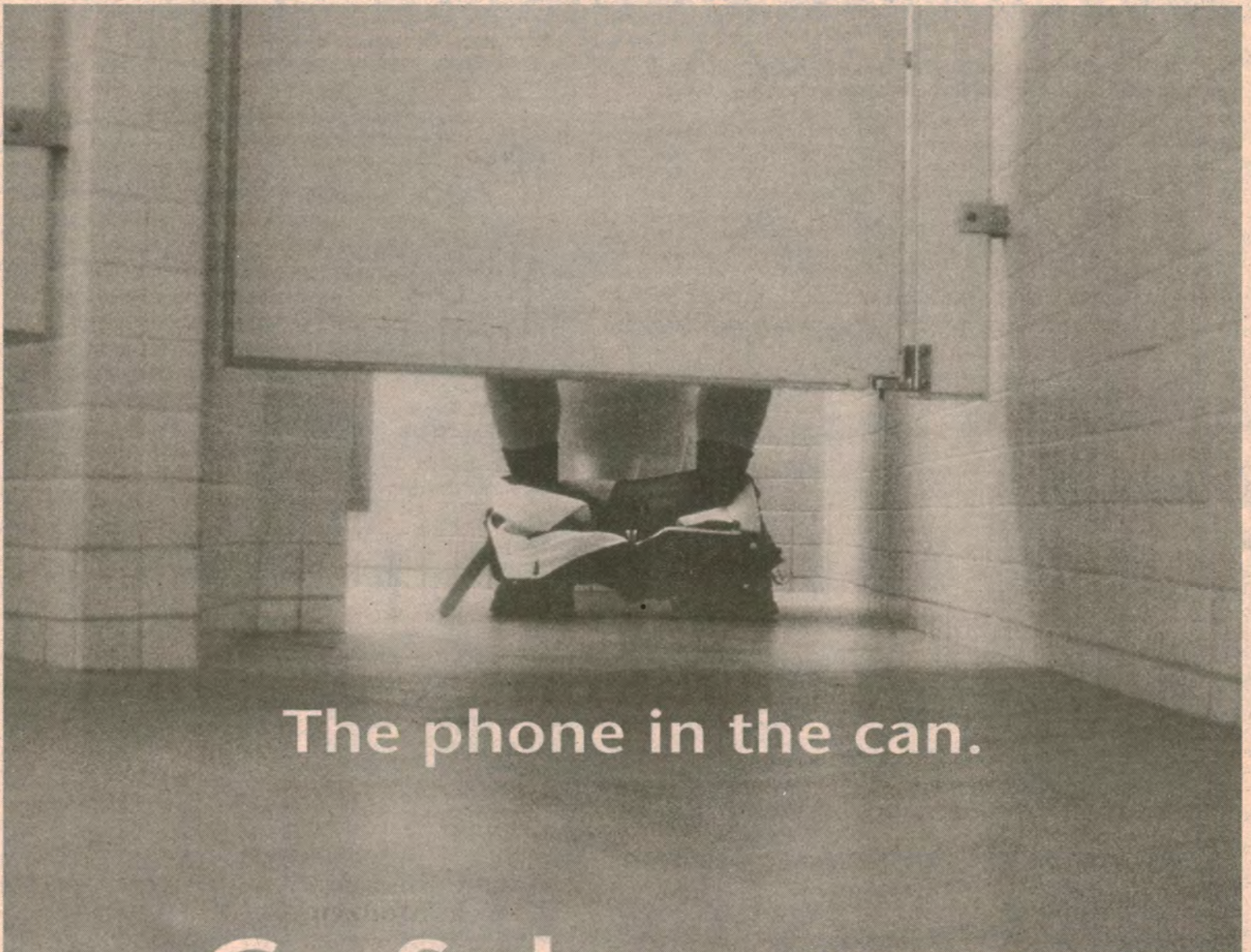

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One man's legacy

Not many people in a country's history considered to be heroes. Canada is no exception. 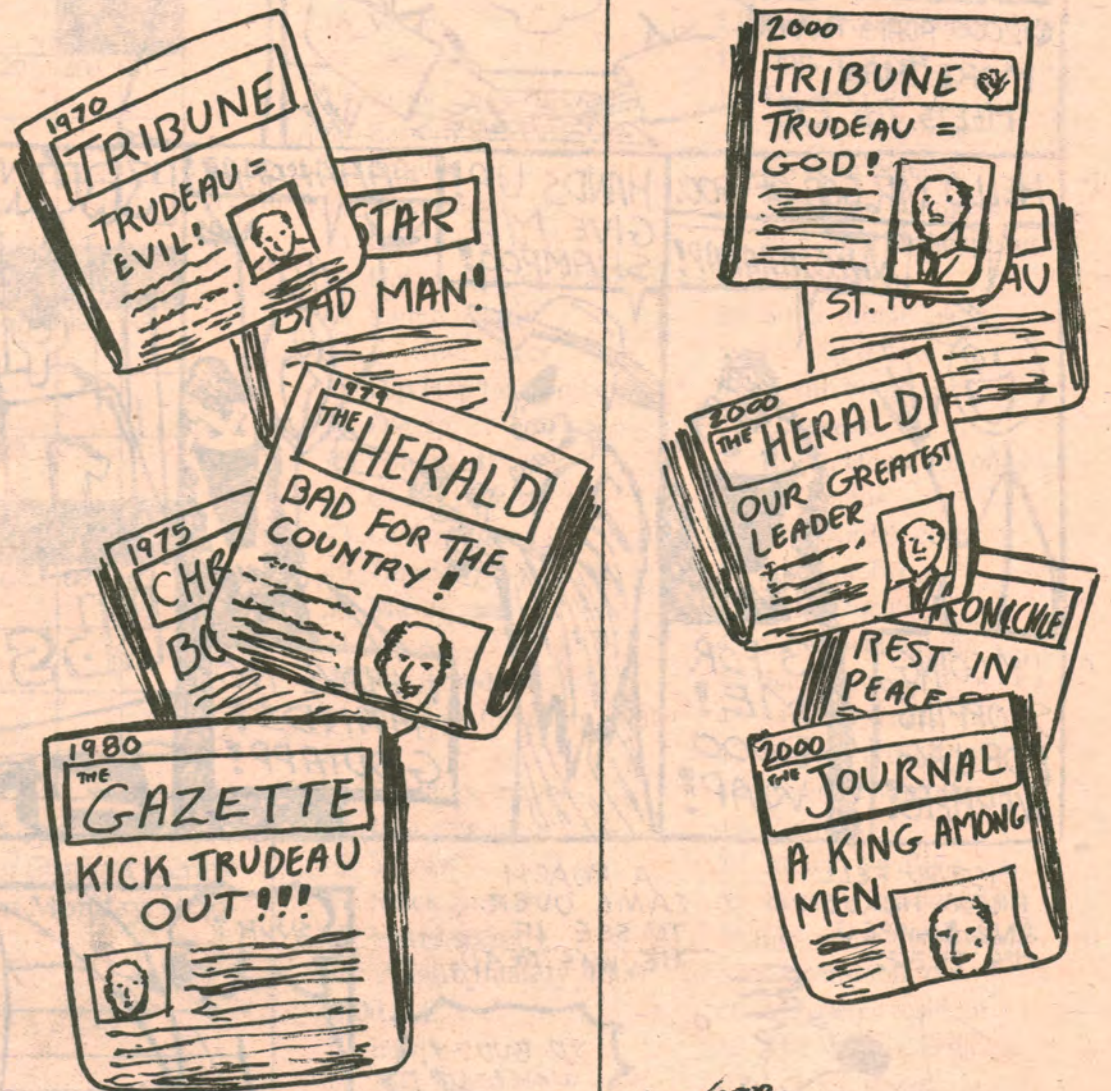

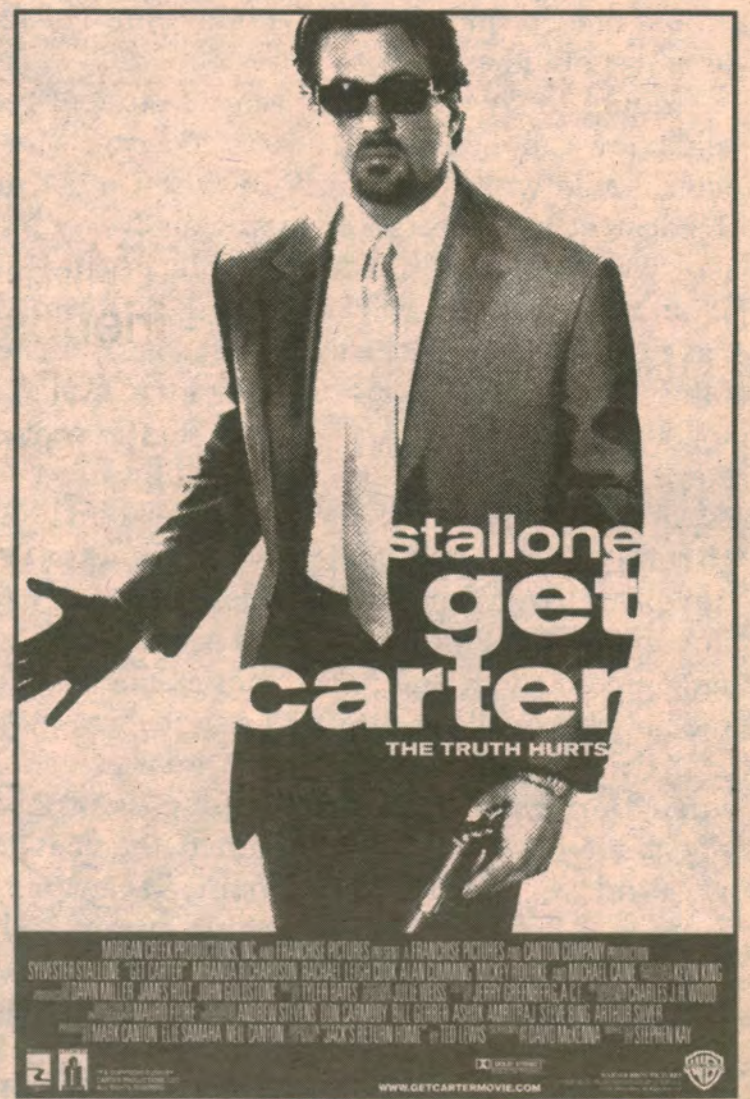

What happens when a 60's era diva like Shirley Bassey does the vocals for an elec-



tronic group like the Propellerheads? You get "History Repeating," the single off the Propellerheads' debut album that but Miss Bassey back in the Top 40 a couple of years back. And due to that success, we know have a whole album of remixed Shirley Bassey songs. The common person probably knows Shirley Bassey as the voice of the theme songs for such James Bond movies as *Goldfinger* and *Diamonds Are Forever*. Trans Am's 5th album, Red Line, I've heard, is fittingly named for a metro line and symbolically represents the crazy 70 minute plus musical journey that they take their listeners on. Trans Am always

They have a more mature, full sound, that definitely comes through on the album. The first single "What I Die For" was the summer song in Ontario, and any number of tracks off this CD could do the same across the rest of Canada. Infectiously catchy and full of excellent riffs, melodies and lyrics, The Weekend is a band you should expect to see on MuchMusic and hear on the radio very soon, but if you like this kind of music, I suggest picking their self-titled album for yourself.

So that's the 2000-2001 television season in a nutshell. Happy channel surfing to all and to all a good night.

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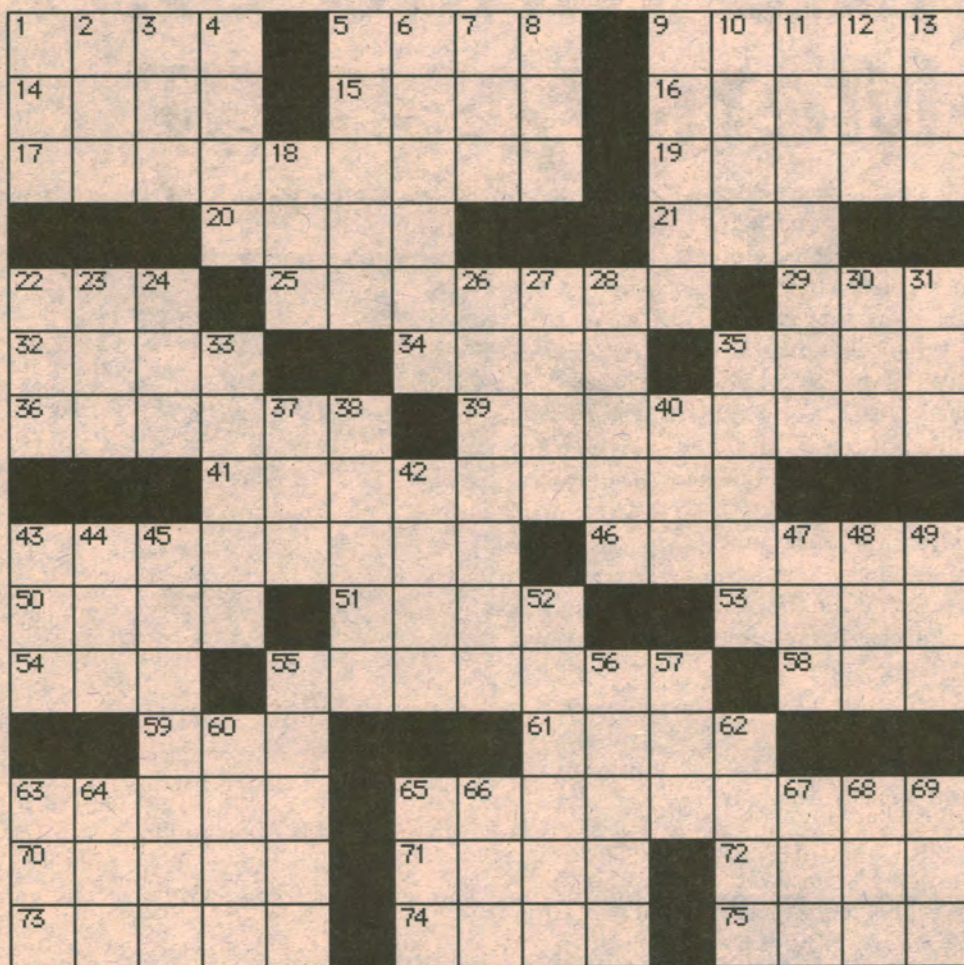

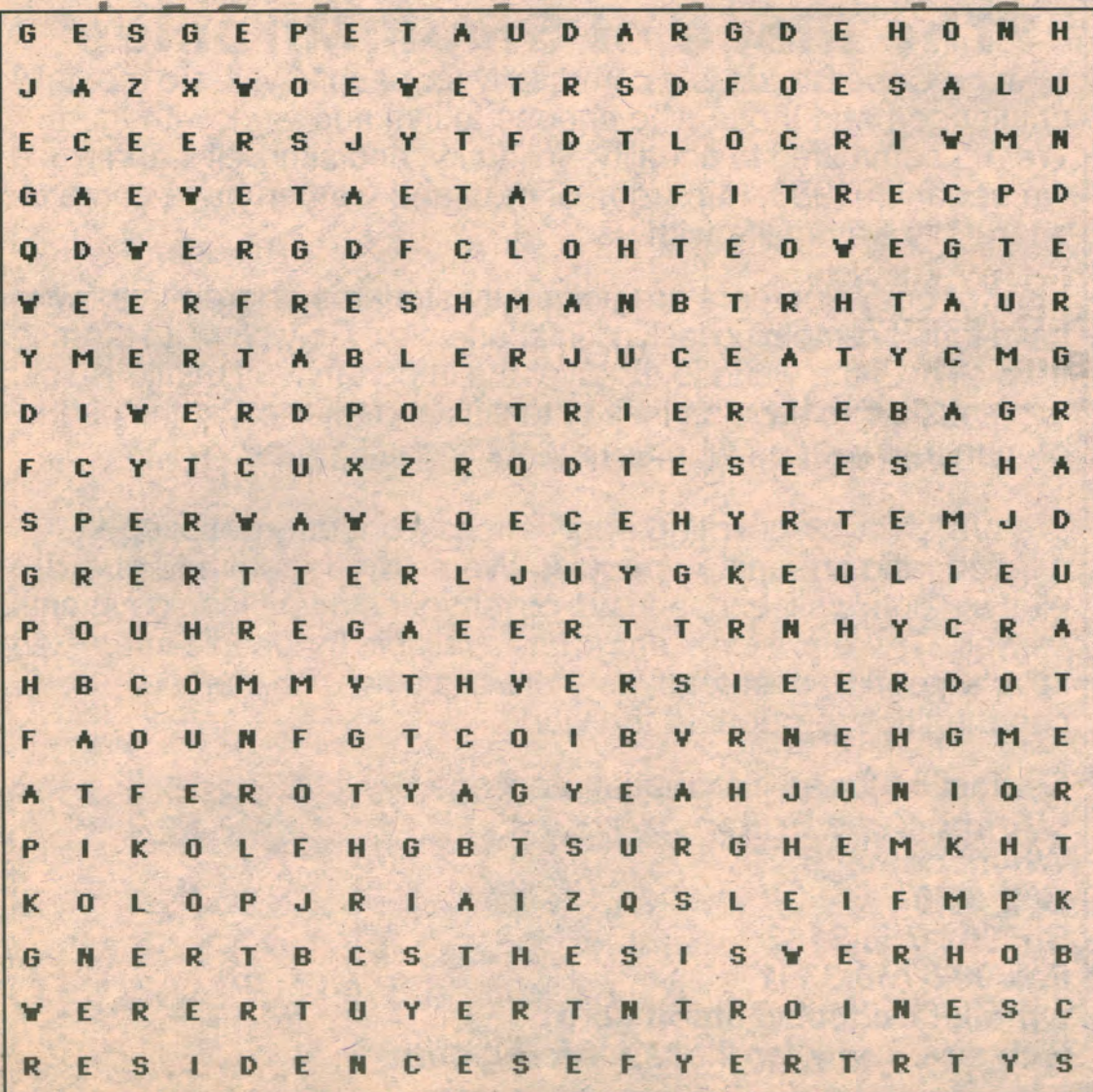

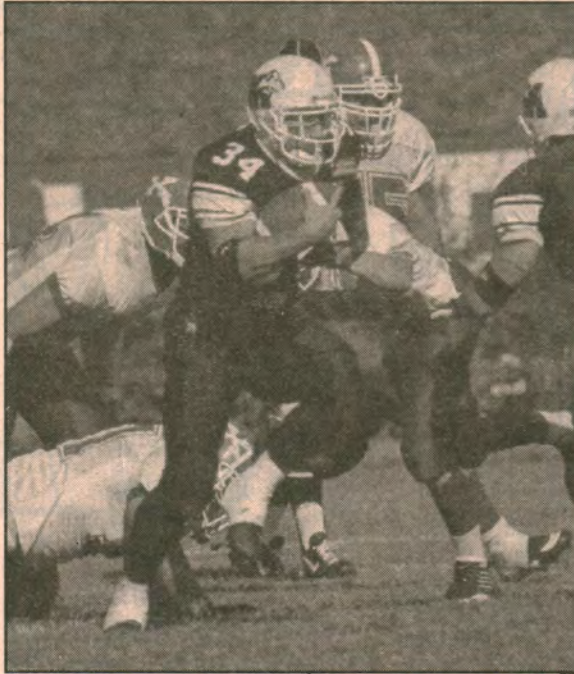

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Hockey Huskies win pre-season tournament

Defeat X-Men 5-4 in exciting final

The Saint Mary's hockey huskies have been on an upward swing for the past few years. The apparent catalyst for this has been the bringing in of bench boss Trevor Stienburg. This past week as the team was gearing up for its exhibition schedule, I had a chance to sit down with coach Stienburg and discuss the all things SMU hockey.

First we began with last season. When asked what his overall feeling of last year were, coach Stienburg said, "Great year. I don't think that at this time last year anyone expected us to do what we did. I think collectively we played pretty exciting hockey and our season as a whole was pretty successful." In the off season that followed the Huskies had to say goodbye to their solid goaltending tandem headed up by Mike Weatherbie. When asked about the off season losses, the coach was quick to point out that between the pipes wasn't the only place where the huskies lost key figures, "Obviously Webbie [Mike Weatherbie] is a huge loss. We also lost our captain, all-star defencemen Bobby MacIssac, and all-star defencemen Rob

Guinn. Everybody we lost was a big loss, we had a huge loss collectively." With players going out, there are always players coming in to take their places. In an attempt to generate a fan base by bringing in locally familiar players the Dalhousie Tigers continued their trend in the offseason of picking up ex-Halifax Moosehead players. Although there aren't as many locally familiar players in the huskie camp, SMU fans should have a lot to be excited about. According to coach Stienburg some new players that will be exciting to watch include Keith Delaney and Curtis Watson who the coach described as a "small feisty centerman who will probably grow on people."

This past year the AUS decided to get rid of the old two four-team division format and move all teams into one eight team conference. The problem some people saw with this was the fact that the old Kelly and McAdam divisions were so different in their styles of play. The Kelly has long been known as a tight, rough and tumble division, built on the backs of big players in small rinks. Meanwhile the McAdam has always been touted as a run and gun, more

European style division. Does the new format favour teams from one division over the other? That depends on who you ask, but the general consensus is no. There will undoubtedly be a bit of a feeling out process involved, but this season shapes up to be just another typical AUS season, tight with no clear 'best team'. Coach Stienburg illustrated this point when asked what teams SMU had to watch out for, "the rest of the league. It's true, everybody is strong, DAL is strong, [St. F] X is strong, Acadia is strong, UNB is strong. We do have a good team, if we play hard and focused hockey we're as good as anybody else, but if we think that we're better than the other teams, I think we'll be in for a rude awakening.

This past weekend the Huskies opened up their preseason play with a two game 'tournament' called the Kelly division classic. When questioned as to what he was wanting out of his team this weekend, coach Stienburg commented, "Preseason we'd certainly like to win games, but not at the price of not playing our first year players. These guys are just so excited that it's all about immersing them into something they've

waited for all summer... I just want a good solid performance so that when we start [the regular season] next weekend we're ready to go." The preseason began last Saturday night at DAL against the Tigers. Coach Stienburg got his solid performance, with a few expected mistakes, on this night as the Huskies took the penalty-ridden game 3-1. Jeff Tetzlaff, assistant captain Justin Steinbach and Brett Gibson scored the SMU goals with Dan Tudin potting the lone Tiger marker. This strong performance gave the Huskies a ticket to Acadia to play the St Francis Xavier X-men in the Kelly classic final. The X-men made it to the final by defeating the Acadia Axemen 7-6, setting up a consolation match pitting the Acadia Axemen against the Tigers of Dalhousie.

In Sunday's final the Huskies again managed to pull out a victory, this time in thrilling fashion. Defenceman Brad Morgan scored the winner with just under three seconds to go giving SMU a 5-4 victory over the X-men. Also on the score sheet for the Huskies were rookies Keith Delaney

and Brett Gibson as well as Steve Gallace and assistant captain Jim Midgley. In the consolation game of the Kelly Division classic, the Dalhousie Tigers thumped the home team Axemen 7-3.

It's worth noting, however, that wins and losses aside, the preseason generally means little. Two years ago in my first year writing of the hockey Huskies I watched them go down with three straight losses in the preseason. Only to follow it up with storming out of the gate to a 4-0 regular season start; tops in the conference, a position they wouldn't relinquish until Christmas. Regardless it's a safe bet to say that every time a SMU fan steps foot inside Alumni Arena, they will be entertained by a fiery Huskie team giving 110%, that's the only way Coach Stienburg would have it.

The Saint Mary's hockey Huskies begin playing for keeps this weekend as their season starts with a road trip to New Brunswick. SMU plays in Moncton on Friday night and follow it up with St Thomas the next evening, both games are at 7:00pm.

AUS announces World University coaching staff

On Sept. 28th the Atlantic University Sport office announced the three coaches that they have chosen to lead Team Canada into the World University Games in Poland. General Manager, Chris Larsen, announced that the Head Coach will be Trevor Stienburg of Saint Mary's University and his two Assistant Coaches will be Derryl Smith of St. Thomas University and Danny Flynn of StFX. Head Coach Trevor Stienburg is entering his 4th season at Saint Mary's and has been the driving force in manufacturing a dramatic improvement in the team's performance and results. Last year, Saint Mary's finished first in the Kelly Division and was first over-all in the conference. For the second consecutive year,

Stienburg was selected as the AUHC Coach of the Year and for the first time in CIAU hockey history, he was also selected for the second con-

secutive year as the CIAU Coach of the Year. Originally from Moscow, Ontario, Stienburg played 8 years of professional hockey in the NHL and AHL before retiring in Halifax.

Stienburg said, "As a Coach, this is a very unique opportunity and I am honoured to be selected to lead Team Canada in our quest to bring the Gold Medal back to Canada. There are 8 great coaches in our league and it is a privilege to be chosen." The World University Games will be held February 7-17, 2001 in Zakopane Poland. For the first time ever, Atlantic University Sport will be the sole supplier of players, coaches and support staff for the Team Canada hockey entry.

Team Canada's entry will be comprised of 3 goaltenders, 7 defencemen, 12 forwards, 3 coaches, 2 equipment staff, one therapist and one General Manager. Canada will also
