## Women's field hockey win AUS championship

### Break UNB 11 year winning streak

This past weekend the Atlantic University Sport held its Field Hockey Championships at Huskies Stadium in Halifax. On Friday night the Huskies faced the UPEI Panthers who they defeated 2-0 on Friday night to move on for the chance to play against the 11 time defending champions the UNB Varsity Reds on Sunday.

The Huskies faced their greatest challenge of the year playing the UNB Varsity Reds. The Varsity Reds have not lost an AUS Championship in the past 11 years. The Huskies came out hard in the first half of the game getting the ball past UNB Goalie Rebecca McCance. The goal was called back because of a field hockey rule which says that the ball must be shot below a certain level on the first shot, and then you can shoot anywhere in the net you can. The Huskies goal was just high of this level, so the goal was called back. Five minutes in the game, the Huskies shot the ball and it hit a UNB player in the leg, and when she fell the refs called injury time so that she could be attended to. When the game resumed, the Huskies

continued to play a very solid game keeping the ball in the UNB half of the field. At the end of the first half, the Huskies had four shots on goal while UNB had only two.

The Second half of the game brought the Huskies back to the turf with a desire to get the first goal, knowing that the first goal could be the one which would bring them victory. There was one play in particular where UNB had a corner shot, which almost led to a UNB goal, however Hockney threw herself in front of the ball to ensure it would not go in. Just a few moments later the Huskies were on a two on one and it looked as though it would be time for the Huskies to score. UNB Goalie Rebecca McCance was able to stop the onslaught by the Huskies keeping the score at 0-0. The Huskies scored with only 4:50 left in the game #4 Tara O'Reilly took a chance and made a blazing shot which hit the bottom left hand corner of

## Another Metro Transit strike possible

Once again we are potentially faced with a Metro Transit strike. On October 29th, 2000 the union members, with a total of 97 percent, voted in favour of an across-the-board strike. This would include bus drivers, maintenance workers, access-a-bus drivers, ferry operators, and mechanics. This would leave us literally out in the cold.

The unions' biggest issue, besides the usual wage negotiations, is the city's proposal to eliminate a contract clause

that protects injured workers wages. The clause has been in the contract for over 30 years, the city had not previously said anything about changing the clause until after the union refused to budge on the wage issue. The union's understanding of the city's proposal is that if they give up the clause, then they will get their raise. But the union has put their foot down, saying that they refuse to lose the clause just to get a pay increase. At the moment, the average transit worker's salary is approximately \$15.78 an hour. If it had

been accepted, the city's offer would have made the transit workers the highest paid in Atlantic Canada. But with most of the other union contracts being reassessed at the end of this year or early next, they would only be the highest paid temporarily. And even with a wage increase, their salaries are lower than the average across the country.

The head of the union, Robin West, has said the earliest strike date would be De-

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## Dr. Dodds installed as 33<sup>rd</sup> President

Hundreds of students are now alumni of Saint Mary's University. On Sunday, October 22, over 300 students crossed the stage at The Tower and received their degrees in Arts, Commerce, and Science.

Dr. J. Colin Dodds was installed as the 33rd President of Saint Mary's at the Fall Convocation. The University awarded Honorary Degrees to three well known woman, and presented Dr. Henry Veltmeyer, Professor of Sociology at Saint Mary's, with the President's Award for Excellence in Research.

Earlier this year the Board

of Governors of Saint Mary's University unanimously acclaimed the appointment of Dr. Dodds as the University's 33rd President. He took office on July 1, 2000

His goal is to have Saint Mary's recognized in the changing global marketplace for what we espouse in our mission statement - excellence in teaching, research and the advancement of scholarships, outreach, and service to our students.

Dr. Dodds is known for being passionately committed to lifelong learning and providing a range of educational opportunities for all learners.

He has published many

books, is a member of the Canadian Scholarship Trust Board, and serves on the Boards of many community/volunteer organizations. Six year ago he was inducted into the Atlantic Canada Entrepreneurs Academy.

He received his education in the United Kingdom with a B.Sc. (Econ.) Hull; M.A., Ph.D. Sheffield; B.A., Open University. Dr. Dodds held various research and lecture-ship appointments at Sheffield University, and since coming to Saint Mary's in 1982 he has held the positions as Dean of Commerce and Vice Presi-

dent, Academic & Research.

Dr. Dodds became an Associate Member of the Alumni Association in 1995. He and his wife Carol, a Saint Mary's graduate (M.A. and M.Ed.) have two children: James, who is a Legislative Assistant on Parliament Hill and a graduate of Saint Mary's (B.A. and B.Comm., both cum laude); and Elizabeth, who as Head Girl at the Halifax Grammar School, graduated this year on the Honour Roll with her International Baccalaureate Diploma.

Dr. Ann Elizabeth Duggan received a Doctor of Science. She was born and raised in Newfoundland, and spent the last two years working in Halifax at the Northend Community Health Centre on Gottingen Street.

She has a Bachelor of Science degree in Biology from the University of Ottawa and a M.D. from the Faculty of Medicine at Queen's University, Kingston, Ontario.

She completed her family practice residency at Memorial University in St. John's, Newfoundland. Five years ago she was awarded a Diploma in Tropical Medicine and Hygiene from the Liverpool School of Tropical Medicine in England.

She is the only person in the Region who has completed more than two mis-

sions with the Medecins Sans Frontieres (MSF), an organization of doctors that were awarded with a Nobel Peace Prize last year. She has worked as the Medical Coordinator a number of times in Sierra Leone. Last year she traveled to Macedonia and North Sudan. She has also traveled and worked in El Salvador, Indonesia, and Sri Lanka. As well she has been the Medical Coordinator in Uvira Zaire, Monrovia Liberia, and Azerbaijan.

Her work in Canada focuses on Family Practice in rural/isolated areas which include the Inuvik General Hospital and Medical Clinic in the Northwest Territories; Baffin Regional Hospital, Iqaluit, Nunavut; the Northend Community Health Centre in Halifax; Saskatchewan Northern Medical Services, Ile-a-la-Crosse, Saskatchewan; Locums in James Paton Memorial Hospital, Gander; in Cornerbrook; and in Green Bay Medical Centre, Springdale, Newfoundland; Kingston General Hospital; Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology; and lastly, Planned Parenthood in Ottawa.

She is currently practicing in Boston, and recently began a program of study at the Harvard School of Public Health, which leads to a Master of Public Health degree.

The Honourable Constance R. Glube, Chief Justice of Nova Scotia Court of

Appeal, received a Doctor of Laws.

Born in Ottawa, Her Honour received a Bachelor of Arts degree from McGill University and a Bachelor of Laws degree from Dalhousie University. While at Dalhousie she received the Carswell Book Prize. In 1956, she was admitted to the Nova Scotia Bar. She has already received two honorary degrees, namely, a LL.D. from Dalhousie Law School (1983) and a L.H.D. from Mount Saint Vincent University. Three years ago, she received the Francis Fish Award (Women Lawyers Achievement).

She has been a Barrister and Solicitor with the law firm of Kitz Matheson, and partner in the law firm of Fitzgerald and Glube. She has served as Solicitor in the Legal Department of the then City of Halifax, and became the first woman in Canada to hold the position as City Manager for Halifax.

On September 21, 1977, she was appointed Puisne Judge of the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia (formerly Trial Division) and ex-officio member of the Nova Scotia Court of Appeal - the first woman on the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia. On November 8, 1982, she was appointed Chief Justice, Supreme Court of Nova Scotia (formerly Trial Division) - the First Woman Chief Justice in Canada, and on June 30, 1998 was appointed the

Chief Justice, Nova Scotia Court of Appeal. She was the first woman on a Federally Appointed Court in Nova Scotia and just the 15th woman as a Federally Appointed Judge in Canada when she went to the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia in 1977.

She has served on a large number of Boards and Advisory Committees, including the Shaar Shalom Synagogue, the Halifax Grammar School, the Institute of Public Administration of Canada, the Halifax Court House Commission, and the Canadian Institute for the Administration of Justice. Over the years she has chaired the Education Committee of the Canadian Judges Conference, the Administration of Justice Committee, and the Equality Committee of the Canadian Judges Conference.

Today she serves as a member of the Canadian Judicial Council, Judicial Education Committee, and National Judicial Institute. She is an Honorary Board Member of the Canadian Institute for the Administration of Justice, and is Chair of the Nova Scotia Archives. She has written articles on Access - Family Law, on Mediators, and on the Professionals in Justice: the Role of the Judge.

She has three sons and one daughter and now has three grandchildren.

Hanan Mikhail-Ashrawi received a Doctor of Civil Law. Last year, she was named one of the 100 Personalities of the Century and one of the top 50 Women of the Century.

From 1996 to August 1998, she served as Minister of Higher Education and Research while becoming the elected Head of the Political Committee/PLC. She has been an Elected member of the

Palestinian Legislative Council - Jerusalem District. Since August 1998, she founded and has served from that time to the present as the Secretary General of The Palestinian Initiative for the Promotion of Global Dialogue & Democracy - MIFTAH.

Dr. Ashrawi was born in Nablou-Palestine. She received a Bachelor of Arts degree and a Master of Arts in English from the American University of Beirut. She received her Ph.D. in English from the University of Virginia in Charlottesville.

In 1993 she received a Doctor of Humane Letters from The Virginia Theological Seminary and a Doctor of Laws degree from Bath University, England. Last year she received a Doctors of Humane Letters from both Smith and Earlham Colleges; and a Doctorim Universitatis (honoris causa) from Vrije University of Brussels in 1997.

Since becoming a faculty member at Birzeit University in the early 1970s, Dr. Ashrawi created the Department of English and went on to serve as Chairperson for the Department. She is the founder of the Birzeit University Legal Aid Committee/Human Rights Action Project. She has been the Dean of the Faculty of Arts at Birzeit University.

She has served on the Intifada Political Committee, and was the official spokesperson of the Palestinian Delegation to the Middle East Peace Process. She has an impressive list of publications including a number of books, poems, short stories, and several papers and articles on Palestinian culture, literature, and politics.

She was the first holder of

the Marvin Weissberg Distinguished Chair in International Studies at Beloit College, and this year held the Leo Goodwin, Sr. Professor of Law, Nova Southeastern University Law Centre.

She has also earned a significant number of distinguished service awards, including the Distinguished Alumna Award of the University of Virginia Women's Centre, Harvard Foundation of Harvard University, The Jane Addams International Women's Leadership Award, and the Pio Manzu Gold Medal Peace Award.

Dr. Henry Veltmeyer, received the President's Award for Excellence in Research. Dr. Veltmeyer is widely known as being a scholar of significant interdisciplinary scope and international reputation.

Dr. Veltmeyer has a Diploma in Fine Arts - Painting from the Royal Melbourne Institute of Technology. He received his degree in Arts at Universidad Católica de Guayaquil, and earned two Master of Arts degrees from the University of Alabama. He earned his Doctorate of Philosophy degree in Political Science from McMaster University in 1976.

He has authored and edited numerous books as well as dozens of articles and book chapters. His research awards totals \$1,574,890.00. These awards come from prestigious research organizations in Canada which include the Social Sciences & Humanities Research Council of Canada, University Senate Research Committee, and the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA).

He joined the Department of Sociology at Saint Mary's University as an Assistant Professor, and in 1979 was promoted to Associate professor. He earned his Full Professorship in 1985, and has been Chairperson of the Department of Sociology. He has also served as Coordinator of International Development Studies, and was an Adjunct Professor in the International Development Studies program at Dalhousie University. In the mid 1990s he was a Visiting Professor at Maestria en Ciencia Política, Universidad Autónoma de Zacatecas.

Dr. Veltmeyer was a major participant in the development of the graduate program in Atlantic Canada Studies as well as central in the founding and growth of the undergraduate and graduate programs in International Development Studies.

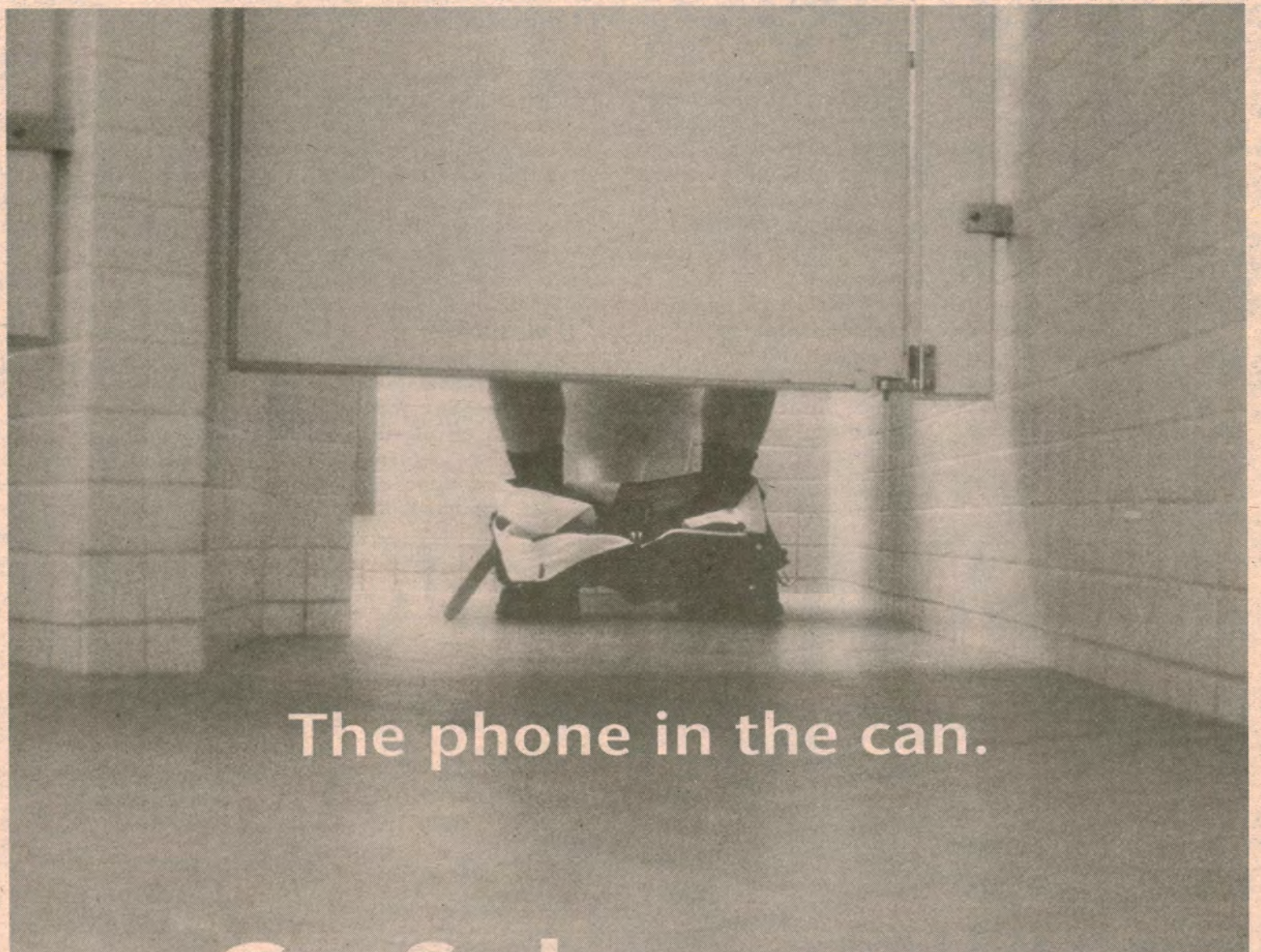

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## Blair Witch 2: Book of Shadows - He said/He said

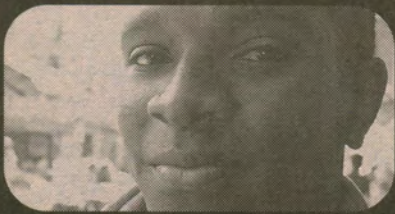

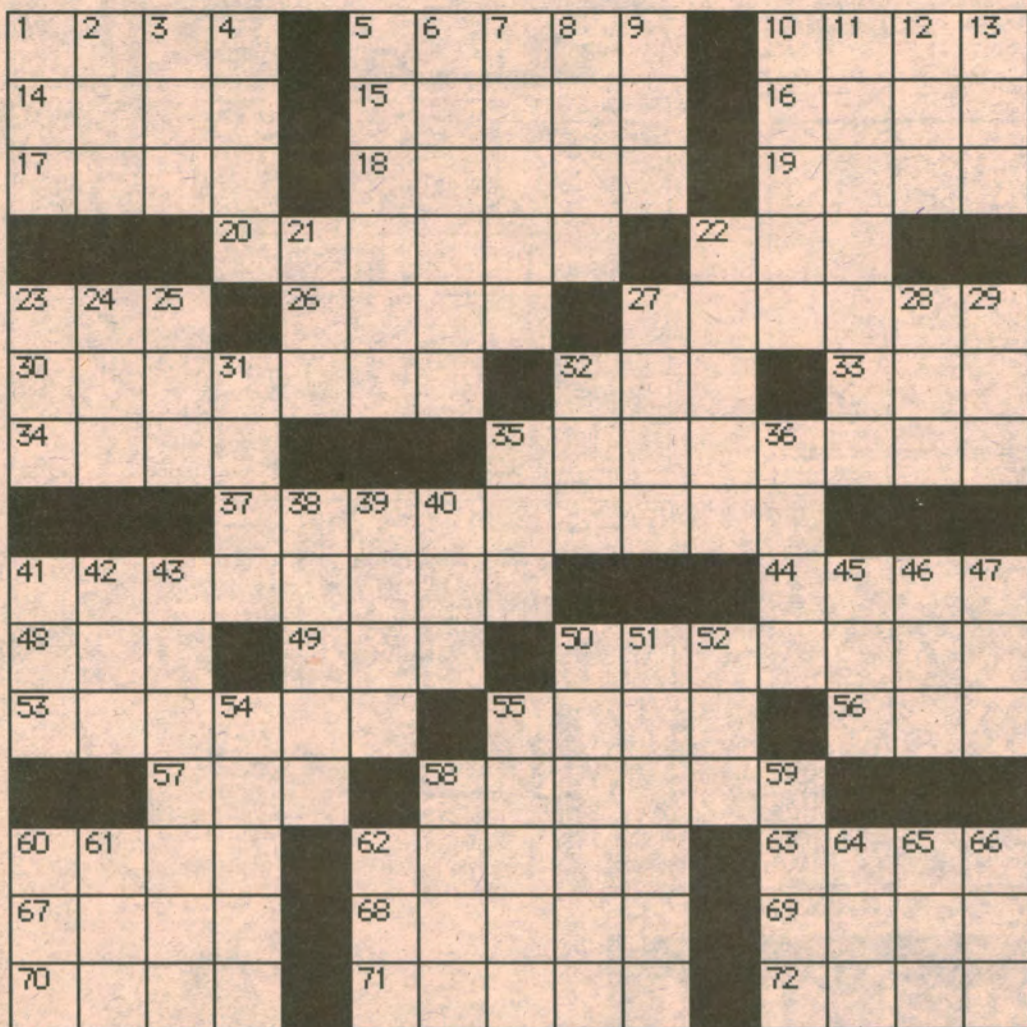

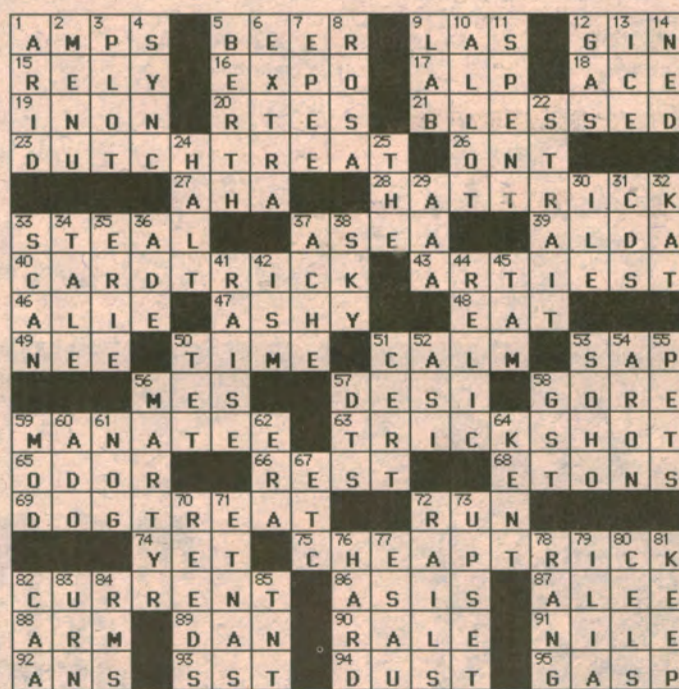
