Strike update

By now most everyone at Saint Mary's University has heard talk of the possibility that the part-time faculty will go on strike March 30, 2001. This past Monday the 19th of March, the Senate office of Saint Mary's University issued a bulletin to the community of Saint Mary's to assure students and other concerned parties that should the strike indeed take place, every effort will be made to keep disruption to a minimum. It is now official that the part-time faculty is now in a position to go on strike at 9:00 the morning of March 30th.

Whether or not the strike will occur is something that

cannot be accurately predicted, because between now and the 30th anything could happen. An agreement could still be reached, despite the fact that for now conciliation has ended. There are two sides to the coin: the first is, University officials have assured that they are trying to avoid interfering with classes or exams. The second is, the same officials have said there is no room in the budget for the increase the part-time faculty is asking for. So will the University become more flexible as the strike date draws closer? Or will the University not do so?

Mir space station coming home

After almost fifteen years orbiting our planet, the Russian Space Station Mir will be returning. Mir's planned re-entry is for tomorrow, March 22, 2001. The aging space station has now become uninhabitable and outdated, so it must be taken out of orbit. Mir has played a very important role in humanity's advancement in space. Not only did Mir improve Russian-American relations by providing a place where American and Russian astronauts/cosmonauts could interact and work together, it has in its past also docked with 31 different spacecraft, docked with 64 cargo vessels, been the purpose of 17 space expeditions and been host to 28 long term crews and 125 astronauts/cosmonauts from 12 different countries.

This week a large group of Russian cosmonauts and one of the original designers of the Mir station traveled to Fiji to await tomorrow's event (the re-entry). The station weighs an astonishing 140 tons, and is predicted to plunge into the South Pacific Ocean. It is the belief of scientists that most of the station will burn up as it re-enters, and that any fragments that do not, will land in the ocean. However, it is im-

possible to predict one hundred percent accurately what will occur during the re-entry.

There are concerns all around the world that a mistake could be made (after all, accidents happen), and that the Russian mission controllers guiding Mir could miss their 380,000 square mile target of ocean. The country uneasiest about the situation is of course Japan. Japan's southern islands are the last densely populated place that the space station will pass over before striking the ocean. Tokyo officials are considering recommending citizens stay indoors during the re-entry, just in case something goes wrong and falling debris becomes a

reality.

Although it is not likely to happen, this is what could go wrong: If the rocket engine guiding Mir into the South Pacific fails halfway through its burn, debris could strike parts of Europe. If the engine fails sooner, then Mir could potentially land anywhere. This is not a pleasant thought, especially because Mir will pass over almost every major city in the world during its final orbit. If something did go wrong, Mir could land on you. The odds of this occurring are very minimal though.

"It's 2 billion chances to 1 that you're going to get struck

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ried that exams would be taking place earlier in anticipation of the strike can rest easy, but what about those who are worried about part-time faculty withholding marks? This is likely to happen. If the part-time faculty does strike, classes will be over, except for exams (something will have to be done about that, possibly the elimination of exams entirely), and if classes are over, the only thing part-time faculty can use as leverage against the university, is the withholding of student's grades.

The University is basically saying they don't have the money right now to give the part-time faculty the raise they have asked for. One university official has said, "We'd like to

settle the problem, but the demands of the part-time faculty are impossible to meet."

If this is true then it seems almost inevitable that a strike will happen. If and when it does, one side will eventually have to cave in. Either the University will have to find enough money to reasonably meet the part-time faculty's demands, or the part-time faculty will have to settle for less than they desire. Even if the University has to make budget cuts to accommodate a pay raise for part-time faculty; hopefully those in a position to do so will realize that doing so would be better than a raise in tuition. There would be nothing worse in the eyes of the students than a strike that disrupted exams, and was then settled with a raise to tuition.

audiences serving his dual role as the vice-chair of the Council of Canadians and the voluntary chair of the Polaris Institute, which aims to retool "citizen movements for democratic social change in an age of corporate-driven globalization."

Global Showdown chronicles the growing activism trend in Canada, illustrating why and how our time has come-inspiring the audience for the future. The book cites how activists and other concerned individuals can build upon current efforts. The authors document the numerous international battles, supporting issues and writing against trade and transnational bodies. Global Showdown's overall theme is that activists are creating history-not merely watching it.

The international battles are simply too numerous to mention. Of note is the increasing level of corporate influence in our government policies and practices, taking form through the FTAA (Free Trade Area of the Americas). The FTAA expands NAFTA using WTO regulations, adding reformulated versions of the MAI and GATS, forming a collective poison, which will affect every Canadian. The FTAA will encompass nearly the entire Western Hemisphere, covering not only goods and commodities cur-

rently traded, but Canadian services including our water, health and education systems, energies and prison systems, libraries and Canadian content regulations. The 34 member nations are now speeding along the FTAA negotiations, aiming to avoid continued activist pressure and public interest.

We are winning the battle, but the war rages on. To defeat policies such as the FTAA, we need to spread the truth throughout the entire hemisphere, because our governments aren't. They're too restricted by corporate influences and lobbyists. Propoganda from our governments and corporations aim to confuse the unaware. Mainstream media is biased (bought by businesses), governments only release the information they wish to or can. Opening the lines for equal and fair communication is a frustrating path to forge toward, but progress is possible through continuing the movement toward the truth.

Certainly various activists stand for various things, but a common thread exists. We're about something; we're for something. But what is that thing? We're for our futures. As more people resist and react against the status quo-change occurs. Maude Barlow says, "another world is possi-

ble".

By continuing to force and fight for our issues and ideals, equally participative governments will be formed, harmful practices such as global warming will be defeated, unfair trade policies such as the FTAA.

Bodies like the WTO, shift their meetings and summits into increasingly elusive locations (to avoid activist presence and interference), while claiming we're ineffective. Anti-protestors believe our actions and voices are unrelated, scattered and thus ineffective. Tony Clarke said this isn't true. Due to our shared cultural, social, political and educational values our protest efforts are effective and are working. Tony and Maude feel the momentum is growing globally, as they report and support it daily via activities, writings and speakings.

Want to become involved? An essential first step is learning to act and to speak out, followed by discovering that change truly is possible. If interested in what you've read: buy the book *Global Showdown* (preferably from an independent book retailer), look around for posters, articles and websites against the FTAA, WTO and other alphabet soups we don't need or want. Get involved, you can make a difference!

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Agreement with Faculty Union ratified

The Board of Governors of Saint Mary's University and the Saint Mary's University Faculty Union has ratified a new three-year contract. The agreement brings far-reaching changes and marks the beginning of an innovative co-operative effort between administration and faculty to ensure accountability.

"This Agreement will ensure that the University continues to achieve its mission of excellence in teaching, research and service, particularly by attracting, retaining and enhancing excellent faculty and students," says Dr. J. Colin Dodds, President of Saint Mary's University.

"I am confident that the other Agreements currently under negotiation will complement the foundations here so as to permit Saint Mary's to continue to innovate and thrive in the emerging globalized knowledge-based economy."

Dr. Linda Van Esch, President of the Faculty Union says,

"I'm very pleased with this new Agreement. Both the Administration and the Union focused on promoting excellence and enhancing Saint Mary's ability to recruit and retain academic staff during a period that promises very intense competition between universities."

The Agreement includes a number of important principles such as a teaching load that acknowledges the increased focus on research. It recognizes the responsibility to assist new faculty in getting a strong start with a reduced teaching load and the opportunity for probationary faculty to defer renewal and tenure decisions for one year if they take an extended leave for research or personal circumstances.

A number of ongoing issues will be mutually explored by the Union and the University through Memo-

randa of Understanding, throughout the term of the contract. This includes compensation structures and Faculty participation in student enrollment and fund raising initiatives. Other points include the protection of e-mail/voice-mail/Internet privacy, improved process regarding cross-appointments, and a commitment to examine the current methods of assessing teaching performance including the student opinion survey.

The Union also conceded that it is fair to require academic staff to provide annual reports of their activities. Dr. Van Esch says,

"I expect that the main consequence of this will be a better appreciation of the work faculty are currently doing; studies at the University of Western Ontario, showed that the average work week for their faculty, who have a lower teaching load, was 50+ hours. Without annual reports, there is no mechanism to inform deans and senior administrators about all of the work we do, particularly those less visible activities."

The agreement was ratified earlier by the Faculty Union membership.

For my last trip to the restaurant scene this year, I decided to sample a newer spot on the Halifax food circuit, The Mongolian Grill on Bayers Road. I had been getting rave reviews from friends about this place and was quite curious to see what all the fuss was about. I was definitely not disappointed.

Incorporating the buffet style, with a stir-fry, The Mongolian Grill offers a new way to look at stir-fry. With a huge variety of ingredients to choose from, a customer just piles everything they like into a bowl, and then gives it to one of the happy little grill dudes. They throw it on the grill, cook it, and then return it to you. When you return to your table, the server would have, in your absence, left a bowl of rice for you along with some cut up pita bread. Sounds simple? Well, it is, but very good. If you are at another restaurant, and order a stir-fry, chances are you will get parts of the final product that you really don't care to eat. Not here, everything you put in is what you like so you are guaranteed a tasty meal.

There are 4 main types of stir-fry you can get there, beef, pork, chicken, or shrimp. I myself, making two trips to the grill, was fortunate to try the chicken and the beef. If I had to choose which one I liked better, I'd have to go with the chicken, but it's not to say that I didn't love the beef choice. Along with the various solid food ingredients, you are also treated to about ten different choices of sauces and a plethora of spices to garnish up your animal selection.

About the only this I can say about the finished product was that it was fantastic, so I'll leave it at that.

I also treated myself to the local selection of cheesecakes they offered and they were exquisite (I'm kind of biased because I love just about any cheesecake made).

The buffet itself wasn't that expensive, coming in at only \$8.99, and for an all-you-can-eat deal, you can't go wrong.

The service at the table was much to be desired, often not returning with orders for an extended period of time, but I'm not one to complain.

Another part of the experience was to constant banging of spatulas but the grill chefs. This was so annoying at times, I just wanted to throw something at them, but, like I said, I'm not one to complain.

Despite the few bad things about the non-meal part of The Mongolian Grill, I will definitely be returning to this place. The food was just too good to pass up.

Saint FX wins back to back National Championships

This past weekend was the CIAU National basketball championships at the Halifax Metro Centre. On Sunday it was the Saint Francis Xavier X-Men against the Brandon Bobcats. This was the same matchup as last year and it once again turned out to be one of the best games in tournament history.

The opening tipoff featured two marquee players, Dennie Oliver of Saint Francis Xavier and Earnest Bell from Brandon. It looked like St. FX

was a little off, because Oliver didn't even jump for the ball, but soon after, things changed. The first shot of the game was blocked by Fred Perry and it was evident that the crowd was there for X; the place went crazy over the blocked shot. This was short lived though, with Donald Phillips in the game, he hit some key shots for Brandon to keep them up to speed with X. At the end of the first half, the score was 45-34 for St. FX. Randy Nohr was having an amazing game, during the first half, he was perfect from the floor hitting three for three on his field goals, and one for one from three point land, it was an amazing half. Also for the X-Men was Fred Perry who went 6 for 9 and 2 for 3 on three pointers, with 14 points. Along with Perry was Dennie Oliver who hit 5 for 8 from the field and went 0 for 1 in three point land for a total of 10 points. Those three gave X 26 of their 45 points. On the Bobcat side of the ball, Donald Phillips and Tyrone Smith were the men to watch. Phillips had hit 4 for 6 from the field and 1 for 2 from beyond the arc. The bobcat's totals however were not as impressive as Saint FX's were. X went 20 for 31 from the field and 4 for 7 from beyond the arc. It was impressive to say the least, and at halftime I believed that X would roll over Brandon. That was what I had thought. It turns out I was wrong. The second half allowed X to have the first possession of the ball, this is where X's problems all began. The ball ended up in the

hands of Dennie Oliver, who took a bad shot and when the ball came down, Fred Perry went for the rebound and got an elbow in the eye. This caused him to lose a contact (this is the same thing that happened to him last year). This also caused him to leave the game for almost three minutes. In those three minutes, the Bobcats were only able to hit one shot, while X continued to hammer them, with the score of 47-36. This is when X started to fall apart, with about 15:00 left in the game, when Dennie Oliver lost the ball and had it stolen by Josh Masters who dunked the ball. This was something that normally would get X going, but it didn't really phase them. With only 11:01 left, Charleton Weaslehead was fouled while going to the basket, this foul gave them the chance to come back within five. He hit both foul shots and the Bobcats found themselves within five 58-53. With only 8:56 left, Josh Masters fouled Fred Perry. Masters didn't like the call, but instead of just walking away, he continued to talk. The referees didn't like what he was saying and he also received a technical foul on top of the foul he had just received. Perry hit one of two to make the score 60-56. On X's next possession, Perry drove hard to the hoop, but Brandon was able to recover and cause an offensive foul on Perry. Over the next several minutes Brandon attempts to mount the comeback, and with 6:35 left on the clock Brandon does it, and ties the game up 61-61. The next time that Saint FX gets the ball, it is like a new game for both teams. E.L. Adams brings the ball up the court and gets it to Dennie Oliver who gets the basket and the foul against Earnest Bell. Oliver hits his shot with 6:10 left on the clock making the score 64-61 with ten minutes left. On the next possession Brandon misses their shot and X gets the ball back, there was a travel call by Maksymiw. The Bobcats get the ball back. Neither team

could hit for a while, but while attempting to drive the lane, Fred Perry was called for another offensive foul and this knocked him out of the game with just over four minutes left. Neither team could hit for the next two and a half minutes, until Randy Nohr hits Tyrone Smith while he was shooting a three pointer, Smith misses the shot, but gets three free throws because of it. Smith hits all three shots to put Brandon up by three. On the next possession E.L. Adams hits off a rebound from Dennie Oliver to tie the game 70-70. With under a minute Earnest Bell hits a shot, however Jordan Croucher hits a shot to tie it up 72-72. With 20 seconds left in the game, Brandon brought the ball up the court, and took a shot with only two seconds left on the clock, the shot was missed, however the referees called a foul on Brandon. This is what has been called (by TSN) the worst call in the history of the CIAU. With this call, there was no time left on the clock and Dennie Oliver was to go to the line for X, if he would have hit either shot, the game would be over and X would have won the National Championship. Brandon called one time out, then a second and then Dennie Oliver had the chance to shoot. Oliver missed the first shot and the crowd could not believe it. Then Brandon took another time out to try to freeze Oliver. It worked, he missed the second free throw and no one in the building could believe it. After the game, Randy Nohr was quoted as saying that the thing that he will remember about his university career would be Oliver missing those two free throws. This put the game into overtime. During the overtime, Oliver made up for those two free throws, by hitting five of the eleven points that St. FX got. The final score of the game was 83-76 and somehow the player of the game for St. FX was Dennie Oliver? (I am sorry but I still have to question that one).

Huskies disappointed, new stars step up

The Saint Mary's Huskies may not have been in the championship game on

Sunday evening, but they retained some pride during their games at the CIAU Final Eight tournament. They also showed what they may have to offer next year as some new stars shined during the week-end.

On Friday night, the Huskies knew they would have

game on their hands.

Playing against the Brandon Bobcats, ranked third going into the tournament, the Huskies were looking for a win that could help get them to the final. The Brandon Bobcats had their own plan in mind, even if they didn't show it in the first half. Saint Mary's held their own during the first half, going with a 20-3 run early on and led by as much as eight. Jonah Taussig got the crowd of over 8,000 basketball fans cheering

with his nine steals in the first half alone. Collin Allum was dishing out the baskets, scoring seven points in seven minutes of play. At the half, Saint Mary's was ahead 29-27. But that was about to change at the start of second half. Despite Saint Mary's pulling ahead 35-27, there was a change in the game. Brandon pulled out their big gun, Earnest Bell, a first team All-Canadian, who was almost silent in the first half.

"It was embarrassing for our team," Bell commented. "Especially the first half, so I stepped up." An ally-ooop to Bell started a 13-2 run for the Bobcats. From that point on, the Bobcats outscored the Huskies with Bell scoring 12 of his 16 points in the second half. Taussig was taken out of the game after playing 39 minutes, to an ovation from the Halifax crowd and a hug from coach Ross Quackenbush. "It's really disappointing to know that we can't have a shot at winning the tournament," said Taussig. He finished a great game with 15 points, 11 steals and four assists as one of the players of the game. "I think we played as hard as we could," Kurt Henry told the Herald. "Brandon is a good team. They made some key baskets at key times." Henry was also disappointed to know that he couldn't add another ring to go along with his 1999 championship ring. He finished the game with nine points. Gabe Goree added 8.

Saturday afternoon, the

Huskies put new light back into Husky fans at the Metro Centre. They weren't going to

very good games and I am pleased with that. They are both going to have to step up

The Huskies roared past the Victoria Vikes to capture a 90-58 victory. Gabe Goree shined in the victory, capturing player of the game with his 23 points, six assists and six rebounds. The highlight of the game being Goree's dunk that also got him to the line for being fouled. He completed the three point play to put the Huskies up 90-56. Goree was all smiles when he went up to receive his award as he also received a standing ovation from the crowd. "The younger guys really stepped up this weekend," Quackenbush reflected after their final game on Sunday. "They showed what they have to offer us next year. Gabe and Damon had

next year." Damon Parachnowits played a physical game to get his eight points and two

assists in 12 minutes. Parachnowits, described as a player, "with a nose for the ball," brought out a lot of energy and enthusiasm to the entire tournament this week-end. Goree led the way for the Huskies with his 23 points, Ashkan Rajaei chipped in 17, but also committed seven turnovers. Jonah Taussig and Kurt Henry played sparse minutes to give some young players valuable time. They had eight and 13 points respectively. Taussig also added 10 assists. 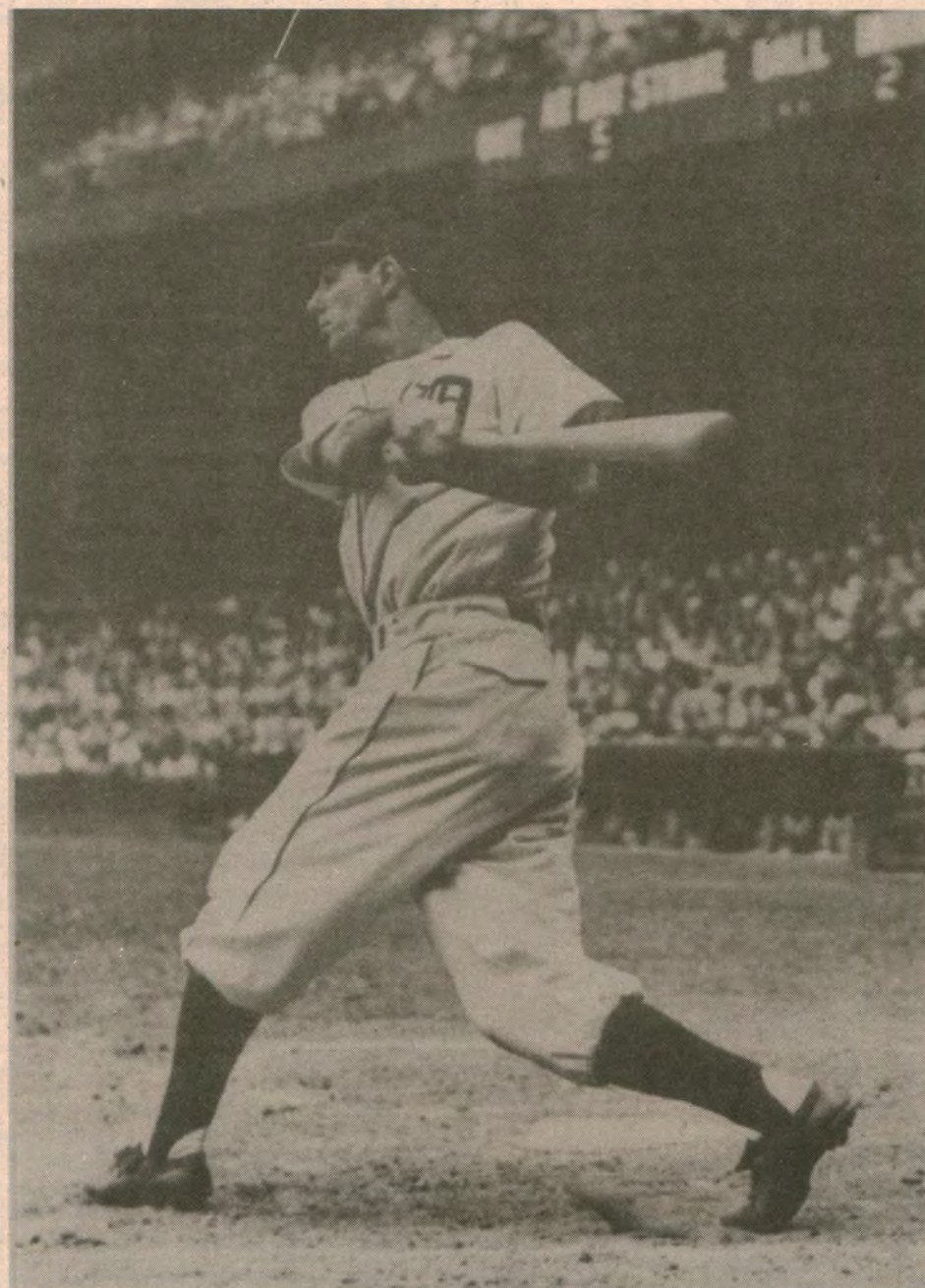
Most Valuable player in 1935 as a first basemen and again in 1940 as a left fielder. And in 1956 he was voted into the baseball hall of fame. In 1941 Greenberg made headlines for being the first major league baseball player to enlist in the Armed Services. Then in 1945 he came back to baseball after a four year leave where he hit a home run in his first game back and then was the first baseball player to earn more than \$100,000 per year.

However, Greenberg was a special player for a different reason. With all of the achievements which he had, he was also a Jewish ball-player. He was not the only one, but he was the most successful, and with his fame came many different problems. In many of the parks where he played, he often faced the challenge of anti-Semitism in major league baseball. During the 1935 Major League Series against the Chicago Cubs, the um-

pire had to intervene in order to stop the catcalling aimed at Greenberg from the Chicago Bench. This was only one of the experiences which he had to endure when he was playing.

Tonight, (March 21st, 2000), the movie titled "The life and times of Hank Greenberg" is playing in the Conference Theatre in the Sobey's build-

ing (room 201). Greenberg's story is one which many people have seen and sighted as one of the most fascinating stories that has ever been told. This is being presented by the Atlantic Jewish Council, the Atlantic Provinces Jewish Students' Federation and the Saint Mary's March 21st committee. The cost to students is \$3.00.



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
