The process to achieve these goals is a slow one, but the evidence of the hard work by everyone on the SMUSA team is the fact that we have achieved more in the past few months than was achieved in the past few years. I wish to take this time to commend the entire SMUSA staff for their hard work and dedication.

I can honestly say that at times it is frustrating and disheartening trying to keep all factions of the campus happy, but through cooperation and a slow cautious approach, I believe everyone can be accommodated. I can also say at this time that I am confident all of the actions and decisions made thus far have met with the approval of the majority of students at Saint Mary's. I also stress that I will never shrink from my responsibility by doing what I know to be wrong because I'm afraid to do what is right.

I look forward to working on your behalf during the second half of my term and I look forward to seeing SMUSA continue to grow and prosper.

I thank you for your support during the past six months and I look forward to your continuing support in the months ahead.

SMUSA Attends ACU-I Conference

The conference, hosted by the University of New England, was designed to help Student Associations run their operations more effectively. Workshops and seminars helped to educate conference attendees on a wide area of subjects from staff training, marketing and promotion, entertainment programming, idea sharing, revenue generating, communication, etcetera.

The information and knowledge gained at the conference will hopefully help SMUSA to become more effective in its delivery of services to the student body.

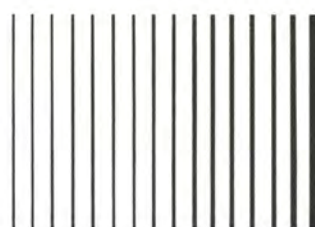

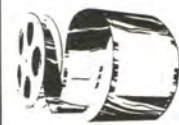

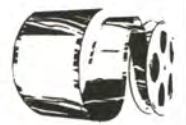
