NEW LIBRARY BUILDING NEAR

THE FIRST TANGIBLE RESULT OF SAINT MARY'S CURRENT DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME, NOW NEARING THE TWO-THIRDS MARK IN ITS DRIVE FOR A MINIMUM OF \$1,565,000., IS FAST TAKING SHAPE.

ARCHITECTS' FINAL DRAWINGS ARE BEING PERPARED FOR A NEW ON-CAMPUS LIBRARY TO COST AN ESTIMATED \$600,000.

It is hoped that the Canada Council will make a grant of \$150,000. or more towards the cost.

Probable site of the building is immediately east of the present main building and north of the football and playing fields. The new Library will be capable of housing 100,000 volumes and will include two lecture theatres. Study and reading facilities of the present library in the main building are already inadequate and stack space is not sufficient for present holdings. Accepted library standards require 60,000 carefully chosen and accessible volumes for present enrolment and 10,000 volumes for every additional 200 students.

Next expansion step after the Library will be a new Chemistry and Biology Building.

Although Saint Mary's was founded in 1802 and is one of the oldest universities in Canada, the current Development Programme is the first national public appeal in its history. Existing facilities, commenced in 1951 on its 30-acre Gorsebrook Campus in South Halifax, were constructed at a cost to members of the Archdiocese of Halifax of more than \$5,000,000. This undertaking, borne by annual capital debt reduction, is one of the most significant financial contributions at the local level to higher education in Canada.

The Development Programme office, in an eve-of-publication interview with the "Maroon and White", said the response of local and national business firms has been outstanding. Alumni are actively supporting the Programme in many localities and are winning countless new and valued friends for Saint Mary's.

\$19,223 Pledged By Alumni

The total of alumni pledges to the Annual Fund Three Year Plan and contributions by alumni to the University Development Programme is nearing the \$20,000. mark, it was announced by Edward T. Cosgrove following a recent meeting of the Annual Fund Committee.

Mr. Cosgrove stated that these returns are indeed very encouraging, considering it is just six months since the Three Year Plan was established. There is, of course, still much work to be done but the Annual Fund Committee is quite confident contributions over the three year period will enable the Alumni Association to provide substantial assistance to the University, he added.

To date \$4,630. has been contributed by alumni directly to the University Development Programme and \$14,603. has been pledged to the Annual Fund Three Year Plan. A total of 117 alumni have contributed. Comtributions range from \$15. to \$1,000.

Six Appointed to Faculty

Six appointments to the faculty of the University have been announced recently by Very Rev. C. J. Fischer, S.J., president.

Dr. Stanislas Swianiewicz, an internationally-known expert in the economics of under-developed regions, has joined the University as Professor of Economics.

Dr. Swianiewicz studied at the University of Vilna, Poland, where he obtained his masters degree in 1924 and four years later his doctorate. In 1931 he completed post-doctoral studies in political economy. He later became professor of political economy at Vilna and has since completed several research projects dealing with the problems of under-developed areas. He has also studied extensively in the area of soviet industrialization and has had numerous works published.

Donald Clairmont has been appointed to the teaching staff of the University's department of sociology.

He received his B.A. degree in 1960 from McMaster University and in May of this year obtained his Master of Arts in sociology. For the past two years he has been engaged in various research projects on native Canadian ethnic groups for the Department of Northern Affairs and National Resources.

Roger H. Crowther, who received his B.A. degree from Downing College, Cambridge in 1961, has joined the department of English. He is now completing his master's degree in English and holds a postgraduate certificate of education from London University.

Lecturer Crowther has taught English at the University of London Summer School, and after coming to Halifax, at B. C. Silver High School and Armdale Junior High School, where he had been vice-principal until coming to Saint Mary's.

Otto Haenlein has been appointed to Saint Mary's department of German.

Mr. Haenlein received his early education in Germany and came to Canada in 1953. He holds a B.A. degree from Dalhousie University and is completing his Master of Arts degree in German. While attending Dalhousie, Lecturer Haenlein taught industrial arts in Halifax city schools.

Dr. Dangety S. Murtry has joined the University's physics department.

He received his doctorate of science degree in 1956 from Andhra University, India for research work in ionospheric physics, Until coming to Saint Mary's he had been

T.V. Classroom Course Offered

The first combined television-classroom course to be offered to adults in Halifax and Dartmouth, "Exploring the Universe", was announced recently by the University.

Eleven half-hour television programs, hosted by internationally-celebrated TV personality Dave Garroway, are being broadcast by CJCH-TV on successive Sundays at 1:45 p.m. They are being followed by two-hour discussion classes Monday evenings at 8 p.m. at the University. The classroom sessions are conducted by Reverend M. W. Burke-Gaffney, S.J., Ph.D., professor of astronomy here.

A special textbook, "The Exploration of the Universe", has been designed to accompany the TV programs.

The television broadcasts are being seen by viewers of Channels 6, 8 and 10 as well as Channel 5.

"Exploring the Universe is an exciting look into the modern theories and advances of science, from the possibilities of life on other planets to the creation of this universe," Reverend M. J. Belair, S.J., director of adult studies at Saint Mary's, said in announcing the series.

Sixty-Seven on Faculty

LES GOODWIN NEW BASKETBALL COACH

Les K. Goodwin has been named coach of basketball at Saint Mary's, it was announced recently.

Born in New York City, Coach Goodwin attended elementary and secondary schools in Linden, New Jersey. He studied physical education at Panzer College, N. J., and later at Rutgers University where he obtained his Bachelor of Science and Education and his Master fo Education, majoring in physical education. While at Rutgers he taught extensively in physical education and held various coaching and administrative positions. He has since followed several postgraduate courses in physical education at New York University and at Rutgers.

Junior and senior high school and Panzer College basketball teams under Coach Goodwin played a total of 727 games. He has estabiished a won-lost record of 510-217, a percentage of 701.

BERT McCUSKER TO COACH HOCKEY

Bert McCusker, B.Sc., has been named Coach of Hockey and residence director at Saint Mary's University, it was announce recently by the University. For the past two years he has been head coach of football with Atlantic Football Conference Shearwater Flyers.

Mr. McCusker was born in Quebec City and received his elementary and high school education there. He entered Saint Francis Xavier University in 1955 where he became captain of the varsity hockey and football teams. In 1958 he returned to Quebec City for a year, during which time he taught high school and coached high school football.

He returned to Saint Francis Xavier in 1959 as junior varsity hockey coach and assistant varsity football coach. He also resumed his studies and in 1960 received the degree of Bachelor of Science.

McCusker remained at Saint Francis Xavier following graduation as head coach of hockey and assistant football coach. Until joining Saint Mary's McCusker has for the past two years taught at Graham Creighton High School in Westphal, Halifax County.

Three Join Jesuit Faculty

Very Rev. C. J. Fischer, S.J., university president, announced recently the appointment to the University's faculty of Rev. Thomas Macho, S.J. and Rev. Lawrence F. Murphy, S.J.

Appointment of Rev. John Masterson, S.J. to the position of assistant student counsellor at the university was also announced.

Father Macho was born in Spain and received his early education there. He entered the Society of Jesus in Belgium and in 1949 was sent to Cuba where for several years he taught and was active with the Young Christian Workers of that country. Father received his Ph.D. degree in philosophy from Fordham University, New York. He will lecture in philosophy and theology at Saint Mary's.

Father Murphy was born and received his elementary and high school education in Montreal where he entered the Society in 1947. He has received the degree of master of arts in classics from the University of Ottawa and has taught at Regiopolis College, Kingston and Campton College, Regina. He will lecture in classics and translation as well as theology.

Father Masterson was born in Ottawa and attended Loyola College High School. He entered the Society of Jesus in 1925 and has since taught at Saint Paul's College, Winnipeg and at Loyola where he has held the positions of Dean of Men and Vice-Rector. From 1956 until 1961, he was the pastor of St. Ignatius Parish in Montreal and until coming to Saint Mary's has been engaged in Jesuit retreat activities.

37 Courses For Evening Division Students

The University will offer a total of 37 credit courses to late afternoon and evening division students during the 1963-64 academic year.

Fifteen courses will be offered in the late afternoon, beginning at 4:30 p.m. These have been particularly designed for Halifax school teachers seeking a university degree while continuing their own teaching. The courses will include business administration, economics, German, history, Latin, philosophy, political science, psychology, sociology, Spanish and theology.

Twenty-two courses will be offered in the evenings at 7:30 p.m., including accounting, archeology and art, astronomy, English, French, geology, history, history of art, mathematics, philosophy, political science, sociology, Spanish and theology.



"Mr. Garroway and his guests, all prominent scientists, convey their own awe and wonder at the universe to television viewers. Additionally, we hope to develop a deeper understanding of the philosophy of science so that the lay citizen will be assisted in making responsible judgments concerning science and government."

Part 2 of the course, which will follow the combined television-classroom series, will be a ten-lecture and discussion series by Father Burke-Gaffney on "The Great Astronomers". They will seek to illustrate and expand the material of the first part of the course.

"Astronomy is an observational and speculative science. Of the men and women who built the science into what it is today, some were keen observers, others had keen insight", Father Burke-Gaffney says. "The lives and works of the astronomers to be dealt with in Part 2 of the course will indicate what kind of persons become astronomers, and why, and how they contribute to our knowledge of our universe".

Subjects will include the astronomers Halley, Bradley, Herschel, Laplace, Bessel, Secchi, Clerke, Pickering, Eddington and Struve.

Adult Studies Program Offers 14 Courses

For 12 years Saint Mary's has offered a credit-free study program for adults in an effort to make the facilities of the university available to all. The first series in 1951 offered four courses. The 1963-64 program offers fourteen. Father Belair, the Director of the program, expects a new high registration of over 500. "If the usual trend prevails, 60-70% of these will be non-Catholics," Father Belair said. "We still have not cracked the bingo-bridge-bowling barrier."

A "first for Halifax" feature of the new program is a combined Television-Class-room course in Science, entitled 'Exploring the Universe'. C.J.C.H., Channel 5, will run the half-hour television series on Sunday afternoons at 2:00 o'clock for eleven weeks. These will be followed on Monday evenings by a classroom discussion directed by Father Burke-Gaffney. After Christmas, Father Burke-Gaffney will continue the course with a series entitled, 'Ten Great Astronomers'.

HUMAN FACTORS IN ENTERPRISE

For the business man who does not relish replacement by automation or by the bright young boy with the B. Com., Human Factors in Enterprise should be helpful. This course of twenty lectures and discussions will concentrate on the effective use of the human potential in business.

FRENCH

Businessmen may also be interested in French Conversation now that French is back on the market. Madame Loewenstein will conduct the course, as she did last year with great success.

READING AND WRITING

The man with piles of paper work is the object of a course called Effective Reading and Writing. It is designed for the junior executive who wants to write better letters than the girl at the typewriter and for the girl at the typewriter who wants to write better letters and read faster than her boss.

THEATRE

With the Neptune professional Theatre flourishing in Halifax, new interest in drama can be developed by Theatre in our Midst—the Mood of the 60's, a reading-discussion course that will look at recent international drama and fiction to see what makes Sammy run to it and away from it.

THE NORMAL PERSONALITY

A constant demand for psychology for the layman has brought about **The Normal Personality**, a course that will try to meet the needs of people who are concerned about human behaviour in and out of the family. It will include working through a "programmed" text for an experience of scientific method in this field and then a study of Joseph Nuttin's book, Psychoanalysis and Personality.

ART

Four art courses are on the list: The History of Art (19th and 20th centuries) by Dr. A. Czako; Painting for Pleasure by Mr. J. Zarand; the Art of Photography by Professor Alan T. Sabean; and Sculpture in Wax by Sarah Jackson, one of Canada's most promising sculptors.

AND FICTION

Meaning in Literature is a reading-discussion course that examines some modern international drama and fiction that is usually considered "off-center". This course should develop canons for independent judgment. The basic question will be what should I get out of a book, or who is a mature reader?
