TO ADDRESS ALUMNI ANNUAL DINNER

Ralph T. "Arky" Vaughan will be the guest speaker at the Annual Dinner and Reunion of the Alumni Association to be held on Thursday, December 8 at The Nova Scotian Hotel.

Ralph, a native Haligonian, received his B.A. from Saint Mary's in 1941 and subsequently his LL.B. from Dalhousie University.

He served in the Canadian Army from 1944-1946 and rose from private to captain during this period. After being discharged from the Army he was employed as News Editor of the Halifax Herald for a number of years.

In 1948 he was admitted to the Bar of Nova Scotia and practised law with the firm of Fielding, O'Hearn and Vaughan until 1951, at which time he became Executive Assistant to the late Premier Angus L. Macdonald.

Following a shakey start, Saint Mary's came back strongly during the first quarter to score a major by Ted Purnell, and a safety by John Murphy and thus led, 8-0 at the end of the first quarter.

In the second quarter the St. F. X. ground attack began to roll and at half time the score was 13-8 in favour of the team from Antigonish.

During the third and fourth quarters the X defensive unit, which had allowed only 12 points during the five previous Conference games, held Saint Mary's ground attack to a scant 20 yards.

ALUMNUS HEADS CHRISTIAN BROTHERS

A graduate of Saint Mary's University who was later a member of its faculty, Brother A. Loftus, was elected superior general of the Christian Brothers of Ireland at the order's general chapter meeting in Rome last April.

In his new post, Brother Loftus, who received his Bachelor of Arts degree from Saint Mary's in 1928, will be responsible for more than 300 schools operated by the Irish Christian Brothers in five continents, including 12 in Canada.

A native of New York, the 61-year-old superior general also holds a master's degree from Notre Dame University and a doctor of philosophy degree from Fordham University.

Brother Loftus joined the Christian Brothers of Ireland in 1918. Besides Saint Mary's, he taught in a number of schools in New York and Chicago before serving as president of Iona College in New Rochelle, N. Y. from 1946 to 1953. He was provincial of the American Province of the order from 1953 to 1960 and most recently had been principal of Essex Catholic High School, Newark, N. J.

A Canadian Province of the Christian Brothers of Ireland was established in 1963 and another Saint Mary's alumnus and native Haligonian, Brother W. C. Penny, is its provincial.

The order now conducts eight schools in Newfoundland, one in each of Montreal and Victoria, and two in Vancouver. One of the first schools administered in Canada by the Christian Brothers of Ireland was Saint Mary's University which, with its then associated high school, they administered from 1913 to 1940.

33 WIN DEGREES FROM SAINT MARY'S

Very Rev. C. J. Fischer, S.J., president of Saint Mary's University, announced Oct. 12 that 33 degrees would be conferred at the Fall Convocation of the University to be held October 14, in the new library.

In the absence of Most Rev. J. M. Hayes, D.D., apostolic administrator, Archdiocese of Halifax and chancellor of Saint Mary's, the invocation was given by Right Rev. W. H. Smith, D.P., V.G., P.P., Vice-Chancellor of the University.

The address to the graduates was given by Rev. F. J. Devine, S.J., M.A., Ph.D., Diplome de l'Ecole Superieure des Professeurs de Francais a l'Etranger (Sorbonne), associate professor of French at Saint Mary's.

Saint Mary's University Alumni Association Constitution

Article 1. — Name

The name of the Association shall be Saint Mary's University Alumni Association.

Article 2. — OBJECTS

The objects of the Association shall be:

- (1) to unite and maintain the organization of the Alumni of Saint Mary's University, Halifax, Canada;
- (2) to perpetuate the close and kindly ties of friendship formed during attendance at Saint Mary's;
- (3) to foster these close and kindly ties through all appropriate means including meetings and an official publication;
- (4) to cooperate with the University in making known to the widest possible audience the merits of education at Saint Mary's;
- (5) to direct its efforts for the purpose of promoting the best interests of Saint Mary's University.

Article 3. — MEMBERSHIP

- (1) There shall be three classes, Honorary Member, Associate Member and Regular Member.
- (2) An Honorary Member shall be a person on whom Saint Mary's University has conferred an Honorary Degree.
- (3) An Associate Member shall be on the full-time Faculty of Saint Mary's University or a person connected with or interested in the University, and who in either case does not qualify as an Honorary Member or Regular Member. An Associate Member must be nominated by a member of the Executive at least one month prior to the Annual Meeting. Notice of the nominations for Associate Membership shall be given by the Executive to the membership, by mail, at the time the annual letter-ballot is mailed. The election of Associate Members shall take place at the Annual Meeting.
- (4) A Regular Member shall be a person who attended Saint Mary's University for at least a full academic year or equivalent, or a person who attended Saint Mary's University High School for at least a full academic year.

Article 4. — OFFICERS

- (1) The officers of the Parent Association shall be as follows:
 - The Patron
 - The Honorary President
 - The President
 - The Vice-President

The Executive Secretary
The Moderator

(2) (a) The President of the Association shall preside as Chairman of all meetings of the Association or the Executive and, in his absence, the Vice-President, and in the absence of both the President and the Vice-President, the Regular Members present shall elect a Chairman.

(b) When presiding at any meeting of the Association or the Executive, the President shall have a casting vote in the event of a tie.

(c) The President shall decide all questions of procedure and order not covered by the Constitution.

(d) Any person acting as Chairman in the absence of the President shall have the same powers and privileges as the President.

(3) (a) The Executive Secretary shall perform the functions and duties required by the Association or the Executive.

(b) act as Secretary of the Association and the Executive.

(c) act as Treasurer of the Association.

(d) prepare and maintain custody of the Minutes of all meetings of the Association and the Executive and other books and records of the Association.

(e) present to the membership at the Annual Meeting of the Association an audited statement of the financial position of the Association, which has been mailed at least three weeks previous to the Annual Meeting to all Honorary Members, Associate Members and Regular Members.

Article 5. — EXECUTIVE

- (1) The Executive shall consist of:
 - The Officers
 - The immediate Past President.The six representatives of the Association on the Board of Governors;
 - Eight residents of the Halifax metropolitan area, of whom four will be elected alternate years;
 - Four non-residents, of whom, two will be elected alternate years;
 - One representative from each properly constituted Alumni Branch.
- (2) (a) The Executive shall be responsible for the management of the Association and its affairs.

(b) The Executive shall meet upon the call of the President.

(c) Six members shall constitute a quorum for any meeting of the Executive.

(d) In the event of a vacancy on the Executive or any committee or in any office of the Association, the Executive shall have power to elect any Regular Member of the Association to fill such vacancy for the remainder of the term of the member or officer whose vacancy is being filled.

Article 6 — ELECTION OF OFFICERS AND EXECUTIVE

(1) All Officers (except the Patron, Honorary President, Moderator, Vice-President and Executive Secretary) and the Executive shall be elected from the Regular Members by letter-ballot and the results of the election announced at the Annual Meeting except as provided in Article 5, (2) (d). The Vice-President shall be elected by the Executive from among its members.

(2) (a) Nominations for Officers (except the Vice-President and Executive Secretary) and for the Executive (except the Members who shall serve as the Association's representatives on the Board of Governors of Saint Mary's University) shall be made at least one month prior to the Annual Meeting by a Nominating Committee consisting of at least four Past-Presidents of the Association and the Executive Secretary of the Association, with the immediate Past-President or his appointee from the Past-Presidents as convener. This Committee shall nominate one or more candidates for each office; eight or more resident Regular Members, four or more non-resident Regular Members, and two Regular Members from each properly constituted Alumni Branch.

(b) The Chairman of the Nominating Committee shall obtain from each resident nominee his consent to act, if elected, and the Executive Secretary shall obtain from each non-resident nominee his consent to act, if elected.

(c) Ballots for the election of Officers and the Executive shall be mailed by the Executive Secretary to all Regular Members at least three weeks before the Annual Meeting.

(d) The election of all Officers and the Executive shall be by the largest number of all votes cast.

(e) No elected officer or member of the Executive (except in the case of the Association's Representatives on the Board of Governors of Saint Mary's University, as hereinafter provided for in Article 6, (3) shall hold the same position for more than two consecutive years.

(f) The Executive Secretary shall be appointed yearly by the Executive at a meeting to be held immediately following the Annual Meeting. His remuneration shall be established by the Executive and the amount paid by the Association shall be reported annually in the Financial Statement presented to the Annual Meeting.

(3) (a) Six Regular Members of the Association shall serve as its representatives on the Board of Governors of Saint Mary's University and shall also hold office as members of the Executive of the Association as provided for in Article 5, (1), for the terms of their respective service as representatives.

(b) Two representatives shall be elected each year for a term not exceeding three years or until a successor is appointed.

(c) Two or more representatives shall be nominated each year by the Executive, and the Executive Secretary shall obtain from the nominees their written consent to act, if elected. Preference shall be given to Regular Members who have served recently on the Executive. Normally a representative will not be eligible for successive terms but the Executive, in its discretion, may nominate a representative for a successive term. The representatives shall be elected by letter-ballot preceding the Annual Meeting of the year in which terms of service expire or a vacancy exists and the election shall be in accordance with the rules governing the election of Officers in Article 6, (2), (c) and (d).

Article 7. — COMMITTEES

(1) The Executive shall appoint the following committees annually, with at least one member of the Executive on each Committee:

(a) a membership committee to encourage and expand membership in the Association,

(b) an entertainment committee to provide social activities for the membership,

(c) an educational committee to foster more Alumni interest in and assistance to the academic work of the University,

(d) an Annual Dinner committee to sponsor an annual reunion of all Alumni.

(2) The Executive shall have power to appoint such other committees as it deems necessary.

(3) The President shall be an ex-officio member of all Committees.

Article 8. — MEETINGS

(1) (a) The Annual Meeting shall be held in Halifax not later than April 30th each year.

(b) The order of business shall be as follows:

- (1) Call to order
- (2) Prayer
- (3) Opening remarks of the Chairman
- (4) Minutes of the previous meeting
- (5) Business from the Minutes
- (6) Reports of Committees
- (7) Unfinished Business
- (8) Financial Statement
- (9) Correspondence
- (10) Election of Associate Members
- (11) Notices of Motion
- (12) President's Report
- (13) Report of the Scrutineers
- (14) Installation of Officers
- (15) Election of Auditors
- (16) Election of Historian
- (17) New Business
- (18) Prayer
- (19) Termination

(c) Notice of the Annual Meeting shall be sent to all Honorary Members, Associate Members and Regular Members at least three weeks before the Annual Meeting.

(2) Meetings of the Executive shall be held regularly at the call of the President, or in his absence, the Vice-President. There shall be at least six regular meetings of the Executive in each fiscal year.

(3) The Executive may, if necessary, call for Special General Meetings of the Association at any time. Notification of such Special General Meetings shall be mailed to all Honorary Members, Associate Members and Regular Members by the Executive Secretary three weeks before the date of such meetings.

(4) Twenty Regular Members shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the Association.

(5) Only Regular Members who have paid their annual dues not later than the day preceding the Annual Meeting shall have the power to vote.

Article 9. — FINANCES

(1) The fiscal year of Saint Mary's University Alumni Association shall end the last day of February each year.

(2) (a) Regular Members shall pay membership dues of Five Dollars (\$5.00) per

year or such amount as the Association shall approve at an Annual Meeting. Dues shall be paid not later than the day preceding the Annual Meeting. Regular Members who have not paid their Annual dues shall be billed for arrears but, in no case, shall the arrears be for more than two years.

(b) The Parent Association will rebate One Dollar and Fifty Cents (\$1.50), to the Branch for each Regular Member in a properly constituted Alumni Branch who has paid his annual dues during the fiscal year immediately preceding the Annual Meeting.

(3) Funds over and above the Association's expenses shall go towards carrying out the aims and objects of the Association as set forth in this Constitution.

(4) Two auditors shall be elected at the Annual Meeting each year to audit all accounts of the Association for the succeeding year.

(5) The Executive Secretary shall hold in trust all the funds of the Association which shall be deposited in the name of the Association in a bank or trust company or invested in trustee investments approved by the Executive.

(6) The Executive shall have power to expend the funds of the Association in accordance with the objects of the Association, and in specific cases in accordance with the conditions under which specific funds have been raised.

(7) All cheques shall be signed by the Executive Secretary and the President or in the absence of the President, by the Vice-President.

(8) Vouchers must be submitted for all expenditures and then shall be initialled by the President or Vice-President and one other member of the Executive.

(9) The accounts of the Association shall be examined by the auditors at the conclusion of the fiscal year and an audited report shall be mailed to the membership at least three weeks previous to the Annual Meeting.

Article 10 — ALUMNI BRANCHES

(1) Any group of 20 or more Regular Members of Saint Mary's University Alumni Association resident in any district may form a local branch of the Association for that district after permission has been obtained from the Executive of the Parent Association.

(2) (a) The formation of an Alumni Branch of the Saint Mary's University Alumni Association shall involve the drawing up of articles of agreement by and between the Parent Association and the group about to become an Alumni Branch of the Association.

(b) The articles of agreement shall include a mutually acceptable Constitution of the Alumni Branch by which the Alumni Branch shall abide.

(c) The articles of agreement shall be signed by the President and Executive Secretary of the Parent Association and by the President and Executive Secretary of the group about to become an Alumni Branch of the Association.

(3) (a) Any duly constituted Alumni Branch of the Association shall be privileged to bring any resolution before any Annual or Special Meeting of the Parent Association, provided the resolution has been discussed and approved by the Alumni Branch and is admissible according to the Constitution of the Parent Association.

(b) In presenting such a resolution, the Executive Secretary of the Alumni Branch shall send to the Executive Secretary of the Parent Association a copy of the resolution and it shall be the duty of the Executive Secretary of the Parent Association to move the resolution at such a meeting in the name of the Alumni Branch.

(c) A copy of such a resolution must be submitted to the Executive Secretary of the Parent Association at least one month before the date of the meeting of the Association and the Executive Secretary of the Association shall give notice to the Honorary Members, Associate Members and Regular Members of the Association at least three weeks before

the Meeting that such resolution is to be discussed at that meeting.

(4) (a) Any duly constituted Alumni Branch of the Association shall have the privilege to appoint from among its Regular Members who intend to be present at any Annual or Special Meeting of the Parent Association, a delegate who will have power to cast one vote for each TEN absent Regular Members of the Alumni Branch who are in good standing in addition to his own vote as a Regular Member of the Parent Association.

(b) Any duly constituted Alumni Branch of the Association, none of whose Regular Members are able to be present as a delegate at an Annual or Special Meeting of the Parent Association, shall have the privilege to appoint from among Regular Members of the Parent Association a delegate who may cast one vote for each FIFTEEN absent Regular Members of the Alumni Branch who are in good standing in addition to his own vote as a Regular Member of the Parent Association.

(c) An Alumni Branch of the Association may or may not, as it sees fit, give instructions to its delegate as to the way in which he is to vote as delegate on questions that may arise.

(d) It shall be the duty of the Executive Secretary of the Alumni Branch of the Association to submit to the Executive Secretary of the Parent Association, before any Annual or Special Meeting of the Association, the name of its delegate for

that meeting together with a list of the Regular Members whom he represents.

(e) The appointment and notification of delegates to represent the Alumni Branches at any Annual or Special Meeting of the Parent Association shall be entirely the responsibility of the Alumni Branches of the Association.

Article 11.—AMENDMENTS

(1) Proposals to amend the Constitution may be made by the Executive or any five Regular Members of the Association.

(2) Notice of proposed changes in the Constitution shall be made in writing to the Executive Secretary at least one month before the Annual Meeting or Special Meeting and the Executive Secretary shall notify all Honorary Members, Associate Members and Regular Members in writing three weeks before the Annual Meeting or Special Meeting.

(3) Amendments to the Constitution shall be made at the Annual Meeting or Special Meeting by a majority vote of the Regular Members present.

Article 12.—REPEAL

The existing Constitution as amended is repealed as of November 3, 1966, with the exception that the Executive as of November 3, 1966 shall act until the date of the next annual meeting as if it were the Executive as under Article 5 of the revised Constitution.
