



DR. CARRIGAN NEW PRESIDENT

Dr. David Owen Carrigan has been appointed the new president of Saint Mary's University. He will assume the presidency on July 1, 1971.

Until that date, Edmund Morris, vice-president of finance and development, will serve as interim president.

Appointed president by the university's ruling authority, its board of governors, Dr. Carrigan is principal and dean of arts of King's College, University of Western Ontario.

Under his direction, King's has recently completed a major development program which included a 207% increase in the student body, a doubling of the faculty and raising qualifications to 70% Ph.D.'s, and the introduction of new courses and programs, as well as the construction of a new library and three new residences.

A 36-year-old native of New Glasgow, Nova Scotia, Dr. Carrigan is a graduate of New Glasgow High School. His undergraduate education was at Saint Francis Xavier University, where he earned a bachelor of arts in history in 1954. He received a master of arts in 1955 from Boston University, and a Ph.D. in 1966 from the University of Maine.

A specialist in modern U.S. history, Dr. Carrigan taught at Xavier College in Sydney, Nova Scotia, and at Waterloo Lutheran University in Waterloo, Ontario, before

taking the post of principal and dean of arts at King's College in London, Ontario.

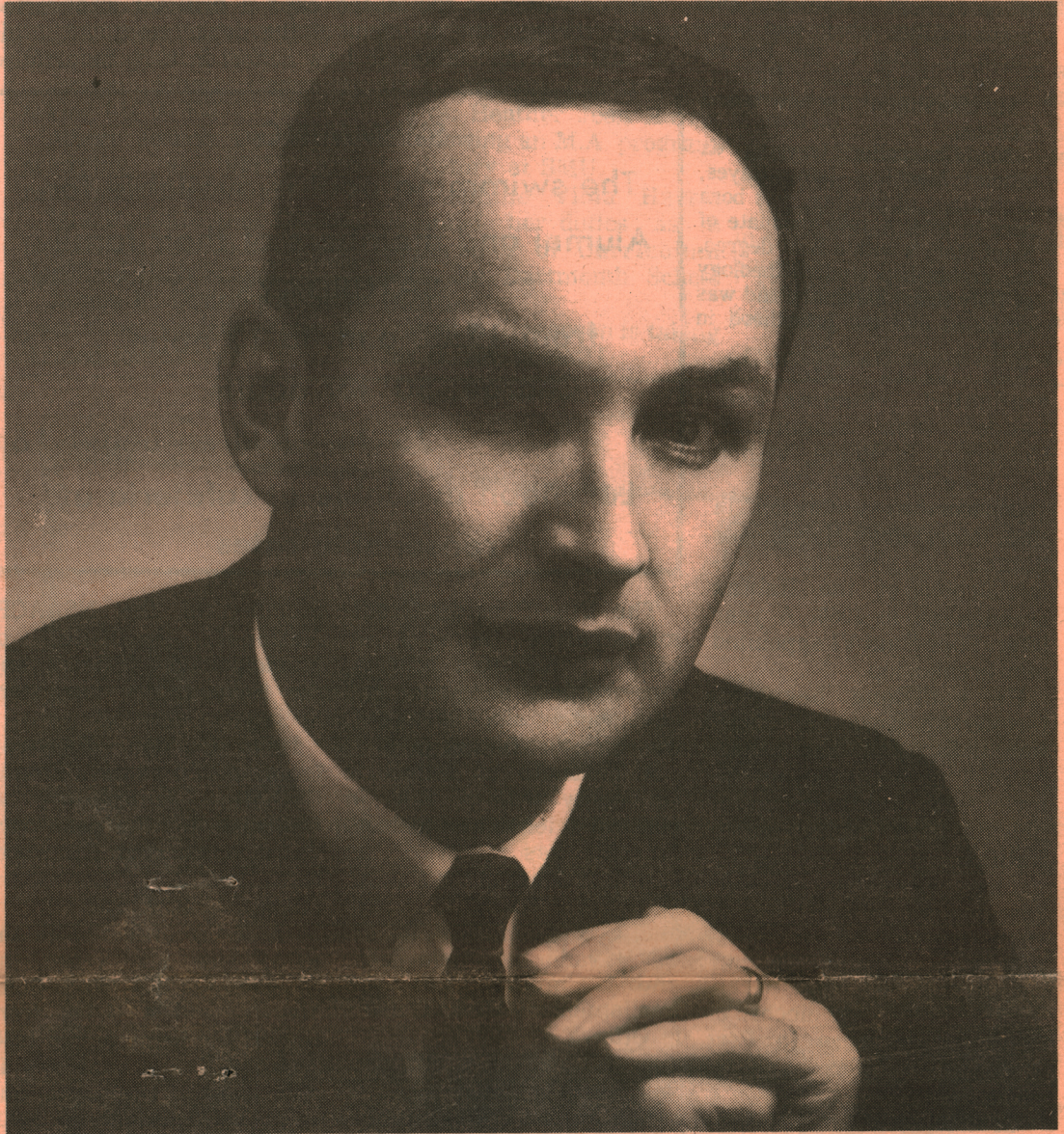
Author of *Canadian Party Platforms, 1867-1968*, a book published by Copp Clark, Dr. Carrigan has contributed to a number of journals, including *The New England Quarterly* and *The Catholic Historical Review*. He is currently preparing a book on Canadian-American relations for publication by Copp Clark.

A member of the American Historical Association and the American Catholic Historical Association, Dr. Carrigan is also a member of the honors society of Phi Kappa Phi.

He had had wide administrative experience gained through holding a variety of posts in the institutions where he taught:

In addition to being head of King's College, he is currently a member of the senate of the University of Western Ontario, and a number of senate committees. He is also on the council of the faculty of graduate studies, council of the faculty of arts, and council of the faculty of social sciences at Western.

The first layman in Saint Mary's 168-year history to hold the position of president, Dr. Carrigan, a Catholic, is married to the former Florence Nicholson of Sydney. They have six children - three boys and three girls.

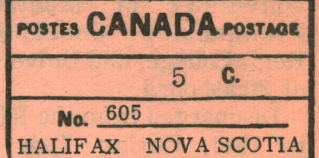

NEW BOARD OF GOVERNORS

Full responsibility for the government and control of Saint Mary's University now rests with the school's newly constituted board of governors.

Consisting of not more than 30 voting members -- a majority of them elected to office -- the board of governors assumes the responsibilities which had been nominally those of the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Halifax.

Membership of the new board includes:

The Chancellor (serving ex officio): Most Rev. James Hayes, archbishop of Halifax, was born here in 1924. A 1943 graduate of Saint Mary's with a B.A. degree, the archbishop studied theology at Holy Heart Seminary and was ordained into the priesthood in 1947.

Ten years later, he graduated "Summa cum Laude" from Angelicum University in Rome, with a doctorate in canon law.

Consecrated a bishop in 1965, Most Rev. Hayes was named apostolic administrator of the Halifax archdiocese in 1966. A year later, Pope Paul VI appointed him archbishop.

He has long been interested in work of Christian unity, and was instrumental in establishing an inter-faith study group of priests and ministers in Halifax.

The Vice-Chancellor (serving ex officio): Rev. Colin Campell, M.S.W., P.P., pastor of Saint Thomas Aquinas Parish and vicar-general of the Archdiocese of Halifax, was born in Port Hood in Inverness County, Nova Scotia.

Graduated from SMU in 1952, he studied at Holy Heart Seminary and was ordained in 1956. In 1962, he studied social work at the University of Montreal and, since his return to Halifax in 1964, he has been executive director of Catholic Social Services.

Archbishop Hayes appointed him vicar-general in June of last year. As such, he is the first assistant to the archbishop.

The President (serving ex officio): (A successor to Rev. Henry Labelle, S.J., who recently retired as president of Saint Mary's, has not been named.

The Vice-President, Academic (serving ex officio): Rev. Gerald W. Tait, S.J., born in Brockville, Ontario, holds degrees--including an M.A., Ph.L., S.T.L., and a doctor's of scientific religion-- from the University of Montreal, l'Immaculee Conception, Regis College, and University of Strasbourg.

Discharged from the RCAF in 1945, Father Tait has spent 15 years studying humanities, philosophy, science, theology and religious studies, in Guelph, Toronto, Montreal, and France.

Ordained in 1958, he has taught at St. Paul's College in Montreal. He was appointed SMU's academic vice-president last year.

MALACHI JONES APPOINTED TO SUPREME COURT

Associate deputy attorney-general Malachi C. Jones was appointed a judge of the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia trial division. On the occasion the Halifax Mail Star published the following editorial.

The appointment of Malachi C. Jones as a judge of the Nova Scotia Supreme Court is as popular an appointment as it seemed inevitable.

His thorough knowledge of the statutes of this province, gained from years of experience in the ranks of the Department of the Attorney-General, has fitted him well for his new assignment and will undoubtedly lend great strength to the trial division he will serve.

His elevation to the Board caps a brilliant and varied career through the divisions of the department. After his graduation from Dalhousie Law School in 1951, he articulated

with Walter Barss, QC, in Halifax, then joined the government service and was admitted to the Bar in 1952. Since then, he has served as a specialist in litigation, a senior solicitor, legislative counsel, assistant deputy attorney-general and associate deputy. He has acted as solicitor for all government departments and boards, including the Nova Scotia Housing Commission and the Fishermen's Loan Board, and lectured at the universities as well as serving as associate professor of law at Dalhousie.

It can be truthfully said of Mr. Justice Jones that he knows the law as well as its spirit and intent since, over the last two decades, he has helped draft much of the legislation enacted in this province. Thus he brings to the court an immensely valuable background that will serve him well in the administration of justice in his native Nova Scotia.

The Vice-President, Administrative (serving ex officio): Edmund Morris, vice-president of finance and development since last year, was born in Halifax in 1923.

A graduate of Dalhousie University with a B.A. in political science and history, Morris has served as associate editor of the Halifax Chronicle-Herald, news analyst and commentator for CJCH radio and television, and a member of the Parliamentary Press Gallery in Ottawa.

A member of parliament for Halifax from 1957 to 1962, he was parliamentary secretary to the post-master general and the minister of trade and commerce. Morris was appointed assistant to the president at SMU in 1963.

The six members elected by the SMU alumni:

Robert W. Napier, M.D., (serving three years), was born in Halifax in 1931. He received a bachelor's of commerce degree from Saint Mary's in 1951, and a B.A. the following year.

Napier received his pre-med and medical training at Dalhousie, graduating in 1962. Together with his wife and children, he then travelled to Newfoundland where he practiced for a year in the outport of Bonavista.

A past president of the Saint Mary's University Alumni Association, Napier has been engaged in a general practice in Halifax since 1963.

Donald F. Murphy (serving three years), solicitor for the City of Halifax, studied pre law at Saint Mary's and Dalhousie, graduating from Dalhousie in 1955 with a LLB.

The 41-year-old Murphy, who captained hockey and football teams at Dalhousie, has also served on the executive of the alumni association.

Chairman of the Municipal Law Section of the Canadian Bar Association, Murphy is a

member of the NSAACP, National Institute of Municipal Law Officers, and the Nova Scotia Barristers Society.

Rev. Gordon MacLean (serving two years), Roman Catholic chaplain at Dalhousie for the past five years, was born in Elmwood, Nova Scotia, in Lunenburg County, in 1932.

A flying officer with the RCAF for six years, he received his B.A. from Saint Mary's, and a B.Th. from Holy Heart Seminary in 1964.

Completing a master's in philosophy at Dalhousie, and teaching philosophy at SMU this summer, Father MacLean is chairman of both the Department of Continuing Education for Priests in the newly-established Institute of Theology in Halifax, and of the Education Committee on the Senate of priests of the Archdiocese of Halifax.

O. Paul Cormier (serving two years), associate professor and chairman of SMU's accounting and business administration department, was born in Halifax in 1927.

A B.Comm. graduate of Saint Mary's in 1946, Cormier holds an M.B.A. from Harvard's Graduate School of Business Administration. He received his C.A. from the Nova Scotia Institute of Chartered Accountants in 1953, with the highest marks that year in the province.

Between 1951 and 1964, he worked as assistant controller with Burroughs Business Machines Ltd., controller with J. & M. Murphy Ltd., and with the firm of Lee & Martin, chartered accountants.

Lawrence J. Hayes (serving two years), as associate in the Halifax law firm of McInnes, Cooper & Robertson, was admitted to the Nova Scotia Barristers' Society in 1962.

A native Haligonian, Hayes graduated from Saint Mary's in 1959 with a B.A. in honours philosophy.

He graduated "Summa cum Laude" and received the Gold Medal in arts. As a Sir James Dunn scholar, he attended Dalhousie's Law School, graduating first in his class in 1962. He was awarded the University Medal in law.

Secretary-treasurer of the Nova Scotia Medical-Legal Society, he was a member of SMU's advisory board of governors since 1968.

J. Phillip Vaughan (serving one year), is president of his own consulting engineering firm, which he founded in 1959.

Born in Halifax in 1923, Vaughan received a B.Sc. from Saint Mary's in 1943, and a B.E. (Civil) from Nova Scotia Technical College in 1945. He is currently a member of the board of governors of Nova Scotia Tech.

After active service with the Royal Canadian Engineers, he was employed with the Nova Scotia Department of Highways and Public Works. Vaughan was from 1950 to 1959, chief structural engineer within the department.

The six members elected by the SMU faculty:

Rev. William Stewart, S.J., (serving three years), is a professor of philosophy at SMU. Dean of Studies at the university from 1959 to 1963, Father Stewart first came to Saint Mary's in 1950.

Born in Montreal in 1915, he received a B.A. from Loyola in 1936, and a S.T.L. and Ph.L. from Regis College in 1950 and 1965, respectively.

Father Stewart, who was ordained in 1949, taught at Loyola High School and College in Montreal from 1943 to 1946.

Dr. Art P. Monahan (serving three years), who will become a full professor of philosophy at Saint Mary's this September, was chairman of that department from 1963 to 1968. He came to SMU in 1961.

A graduate of the University of Toronto, he received his B.A. from there in 1949, his M.A. in 1950, and his Ph.D. in 1953. Born in Brantford, Ontario, Monahan also received a L.M.S. from the Pontifical Institute of Mediaeval Studies, Toronto.

Monahan has taught previously at several schools: Marquette University, 1953-54; St. Jerome's College in Kitchener, 1954-58; and Mt. Saint Vincent College, 1958-61.

Dr. Gerald Gordon (serving two years) is assistant professor and chairman of the psychology department at SMU.

Born in London, England, in 1943, Gordon came to Canada in 1967. He received his education in England, including a B.Sc. (Special) and a doctor's degree in psychology from London University.

Long interested in the theatre, Gordon was editor of a theatre magazine in London, directed there, acted in Halifax, and is on the board of the Theatre Arts Guild here.

He is president of Saint Mary's Faculty Association, and a member of the academic senate at the university.

Dr. Ernest Hayes (serving two years), associate professor and chairman of chemistry, was born on Prince Edward Island in 1928.

After receiving an honours B.Sc. in chemistry from Acadia University in 1948, Hayes took his master's degree at Dalhousie in 1951 and a doctor's from McMaster University in 1957. He also holds an engineering diploma from Acadia.

Working with Shawinigan Chemicals Ltd. for 10 years, Hayes served as director of the plant research department there from 1960 to 1965. He was senior research chemist at Gulf Research and Development Co. from 1965 to 1967.

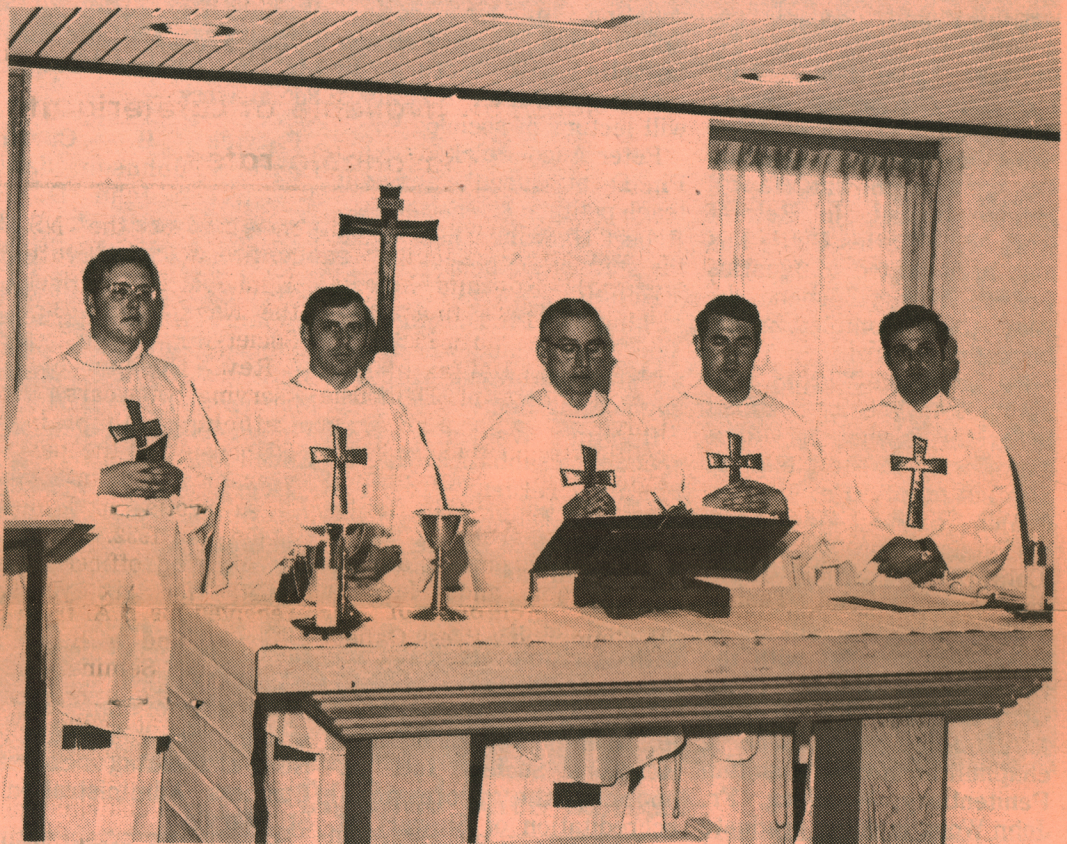
