

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Alumni President's Message

The Nova Scotia University System is under review.

Questions we have heard voiced are whether the system ought to change and, if so, in what way(s)?

The administration, faculty and students of Saint Mary's University have all been valuable participants in the debate. Your Association Executive has joined the debate in an effort to provide a responsible and constructive point of view.

Earlier this year, a "rationalization forum" was held on our campus with members of the Nova Scotia Council on Higher Education. Similar forums have been held at other universities in Nova Scotia. However, our belief is that none of the others showed the support like that at Saint Mary's University. Your Alumni representatives were present and offered the views of our members.

Around the province there appear to have been several views expressed in the rationalization debate. Positions have also been defined at both extremes of the debate. At one extreme, there is the view that the status quo should be maintained. At the other extreme, has been the argument for amalgamation or merger of universities. Some had even presumed to suggest a merged "University of Halifax"! The Executive of Saint Mary's University Alumni Association considered the matter and rejected the merger model.

The responsible view is one which attempts to synthesize and respond to the various pressures for change. There appear to be economic, social and institutional pressures, to name a few. A model of partnership and cooperation among universities would, in our view, stand the best chance of meeting the pressures for change. We support the Partnership Proposal.

The partnership-style model carries a significantly better opportunity for success. It is a far less bureaucratic structure than the merged model. Cooperation and trust are its hallmarks. The focus is shared appropriately with the education of undergraduate students.

There is a responsible view that mergers tend to place emphasis on the more expensive graduate programs at the expense of undergraduates. The lack of funding tends to bring about a shift of limited resources from undergraduate to graduate programs. Furthermore, mergers posed infinite problems, not the least of which is that they force a union of different university cultures. Some have noted experience elsewhere as demonstrating that mergers give rise to great inefficiency and cost.

In short, the Partnership Proposal first put forward by Dr. Ozmon is a creative and thoughtful response. Its aim is to respond appropriately to the legitimate pressures for change. It shows imagination and is not imbued with the stridency of the extreme positions in the debate

Advanced Accounting Program for Commerce Degree Holders

The Society of Management Accountants has created a ten-month intensive program of study to prepare recent commerce/business graduates for the Society's Entrance Examination. The prestigious CMA designation is granted to those individuals who successfully complete three rigorous academic studies with appropriate accounting and managerial work experience.

Life-long LEARNING

One of the most successful community focussed initiatives of Saint Mary's University is the Division of Continuing Education. In 1952, Father William Stewart SJ, taught the first Continuing Education course in a classroom in the basement of the McNally Building. Father Stewart recalls how many other universities laughed when he described to them how he planned to teach a Philosophy course "after hours". Little did the wags realize that forty years later, the Division of Continuing Education would be a key reason for the growth in reputation and stature of the University. The need for life-long learning and the importance of offering courses and programs in places and at times appropriate for, so-called, non traditional learners has made it almost mandatory for any urban university to offer continuing education programs. Many non traditional learners are working and have family and career commitments but they have realized that they need to raise their educational qualifications in order to advance their positions.

Margaret-Anne Bennett, Director of Summer Sessions at Saint Mary's, has contributed a few ideas on what Continuing Education can offer alumni of Saint Mary's University.

To retire or not to retire...

Seminars help those idled before their time

Mark Surrette, MBA'80, is president and managing partner of Robertson-Surrette. He conducts seminars counselling people who are preparing to retire early. His advice? Don't procrastinate. Mark would like companies to start pre-retirement counselling when employees are much younger than today's 50-55 target group. He says "We like to be called in at the age of 30 so you are learning what RRSPs are and what they are all about, what life-style and health issues are all about for when you decide to retire."

"I'm amazed at how little communication there is between parties. Husband and wife, boyfriend-girl-friend. They seem to avoid talking about it or doing any planning for it until the 11th hour."

Mark believes the most important item to consider before you are ready to take early retirement is finances. Ask yourself, he says, if the amount of money being offered is adequate to sustain retirement. That calculation involves lifestyle and aspects like whether your kids are still at home; whether you still have to pay for their education; whether your mortgage and your car are paid off; and whether your spouse works.

"We spend all of our youth programmed to get a job, go to work. All our schooling is also directed to that end. Then all of a sudden, at our peak, someone says "Well, we don't need you any more.' It can be pretty devastating."

"I think there's going to be a whole new series of career options created for early retirees. A whole different set of employment opportunities is evolving from this. Look at the small businesses out there getting started who would do anything to gain the benefits of someone with experience."

The province retains a company called the Retirement Planners Association of Nova Scotia for the workshops. It's a non-profit operation which set up shop last year and lists among its clients the Nova Scotia Teachers Union, the Workers' Compensation Board and several hospital authorities .

Mark says " Retirement seminars don't tell you what to do, they identify sources of information and options and alternatives."

Over 1,000 degrees and six honorary degrees were served up at Saint Mary's University during Spring Convocation in May.



David R. Thomas, Founder and Chairman of Wendy's Old Fashioned Hamburgersrestaurants was presented with a Doctor of Commerce for his entrepreneurial suc-

cess with Wendy's International. Throughout his career, Mr. Thomas has been actively involved in many volunteer agencies including the Board of the Children's Hospital in Columbus, Ohio, and the St. Jude Children's Research Hospital in Memphis, Tennessee. Thomas exemplifies the drive and determination required of the entrepreneurial spirit and the success that can be derived from hard work and perserverance. Today, "Dave" is the popular commercial spokesperson for the Wendy's chain.



Sylvia Hamilton, a writer and film-maker, has brought the life experiences of African Nova Scotian women to the mainstream of the Canadian arts. She received her

Bachelor of Arts degree in 1972 from Acadia University augmenting her academic education with courses in film-making and directing. Throughout the 1970's, she worked as a radio journalist for private stations and did freelance work for the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation. She won a Gemini Award in 1994 and the 1994 Japan prize in Tokyo for Speak It! From the Heart of Black Nova Scotia. Hamilton received a Doctor of Letters for her accomplishments, volunteerism and persistence to tell the story of the Black Cultural Society.



Dr. Sidney van den Bergh, a world renowned scientist received a Doctor of Science for his work in the study of astronomy and his research theories on the extinction

of the dinosaurs. He received the Order of Canada in 1993 and the Russell Lectureship, the highest award of the American Astronomical Society. With over 450 scholarly publications he continues his academic career at the Dominion Astrophysical Observatory, Herzberg Institute of Astrophysics in British Columbia. Dr. van den Bergh has worked to improve the study of astronomy both in Canada and around the world, through his many administrative posts, his teaching and by his encouragement of the development of science on the part of students, co-workers and colleagues around the world.




Maureen Kempston Darkes, not only broke into a field, traditionally reserved for men, but she successfully strengthened a company in an extremely competitive market.

Kempton Darkes is the first female President and General Manager of General Motors of Canada Limited. Joining the Company in 1975, Kempston Darkes has served in numerous positions within the Company and now serves on several boards. Mrs. Kempston Drakes was honoured with a Doctor of Commerce degree.



Hector Jacques received his Bachelor of Engineering from the Indian Institute of Technology in 1966 and his Masters of Engineering from the Nova Scotia Techni-

cal College in 1968. An active member of the Professional Engineers Society, Jacques formed the Jacques, Whitford Group of Companies in 1972 and today is the President, Chief Executive Officer and Principal of Geotechnical Engineer. He has received numerous awards over the years and is actively volunteering for a variety of community based organizations including the Victoria General Hospital. Mr. Jacques received a Doctor of Commerce.



Frank Stronach arrived in Canada in 1954 with a working background in tool and machine engineering. In 1957 he formed a tool and die company, Multimatic

Investments Limited before merging with Magna International and in 1973 the company was transformed into Magna International Inc. Stronach is best known for this management philosophy called Fair Enterprise which is a business Charter of Rights which makes every employee a shareholder in the company. Today, Magna is one of the world's largest suppliers of automotive systems and components with over 21,000 employees at 86 manufacturing operations in 10 different countries. Mr. Stronach received a Doctor of Commerce.

For the first time ever Saint Mary's University held two separate ceremonies to accomodate the increasing number of graduates. The Metro Centre, Halifax was the site for both ceremonies.

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Award winning students **Engineering:**

Adair Fowler, a second year Engineering student will receive \$1,500 for three consecutive years while attending the Technical University of Nova Scotia, thanks to winning the Nova Scotia Power Centennial Scholarship.

Graduation class bursaries:

This year for the first time, two Saint Mary's students received \$500 each, on behalf of last years graduation class. They were Sheri Lynn Miller and Una Hubbard, both graduating Arts students.

Other awards:

Stephen Vail, a Small Business Entrepreneur student participated in the Queen's University Entrepreneurship's Competition. This is the first time a Saint May's student was selected to the group of eight finalists and on March 24, 1995 he presented his business plan at Queen's.

Two students were chosen in the 1995 Far Horizons Paper Competition that was organized by the Centre for Canada-Asia Business Relations, School of Business, Queen's University.

Mary Cheng Fen Tou, 23, a second year Master of Business Administration (MBA) student won for her paper, "Promotion in China: Reaching the Chinese Consumer." Her paper was selected as winner in the top ten. Also Tou recently was hired by the Hong Kong Bank of Canada.

Trevor Curwin, 25, a first year MBA student also won at the competition and his paper, "Potential windfalls and political minefields: Canadian trade with the Union of Myanmar," was placed among the top 11-15 papers.

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Partnerships proposal update

by Dr. Kenneth Ozmon, President, Saint Mary's There have been on-going discussions about the Partnerships proposal announced in February 1995. Talks have been directed by the two vice-presidents at the four partner institutions at the departmental level within a number of faculties and administrative departments.

In May, the seven Metro Halifax university presidents and board chairs agreed to end merger and federation discussions and pursue the PARTNERSHIPS MODEL (Maroon & White, Winter '94). It is gratifying to have Saint Mary's take a leadership role in re-defining the higher education system for Nova Scotia.

Support from faculty, staff, students and alumni continues to gratify me. At all of our public briefings with key decision makers, including government leaders and business groups,

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the broad base of support has appeared to impress those with whom we have spoken. The Alumni Association has played a particularly active role.

A sub-committee of the Alumni Association has participated in many of the discussions on the future of our University and has been more than helpful talking to decision makers about the benefits of the Partnerships proposal.

Both the Saint Mary's Board of Governors and the Government and Corporate Affairs Committee have been active on our behalf and especially busy ensuring that our proposal is understood.

At a meeting with the Nova Scotia Council on Higher Education (NSCHE) in March, Saint Mary's University and Mount Saint Vincent University, the Atlantic School of Theology and the Nova Scotia College of Art and Design, presented an overview of why the Partnerships proposal is the best direction for higher education in the province.

Feedback has been encouraging because of what the proposal will accomplish for Nova

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Scotia. The partnership will save money, generate new sources of income for universities and colleges, refocus attention on the many strengths and attributes of our institutions: our faculty, staff and students.

A key element will be a new funding formula to be adopted by the provincial government. Our University's history of inequitable funding has been recognized. It is hoped that with the adoption of a new funding formula, Saint Mary's will receive a fairer share of government funding. We are concerned that some of the proposals presented to the NSCHE do not reflect the importance of undergraduate students in determining funding levels. We are also worried that the models presented so far will entrench an already inequitable distribution. The current funding formula has not helped Saint Mary's and in many instances has penalized our University for doing a good job.

The timetable for change is short. We believe that with the widespread acceptance and support of our Partnerships proposal and with our response to the funding report presented to the Council, Saint Mary's will weather the current crisis. We have very successful universities and colleges throughout Nova Scotia that are vital to the province's economic growth and development. We will continue to work for a stronger university system for Nova Scotia.

Astronomy and Physics big winners with NSERC

Funding for the Natural Sciences and EngineeringResearchCouncil ofCanada (NSERC) went up by 13 per cent this year and for the first time Saint Mary's received more than half a million in annual funding.

The total awarded was \$559,310, which included continued NSERC funding commitments, and of that amount \$173,883 went to new research grant applicants.

The big winners were the Astronomy and Physics Department, which received more than a quarter of a million dollars in new grants (\$343,000) over the next four years. That

amount includes the NSERC equipment grant of \$75,000. The department also received a Canadian Space Agency grant and one supercomputing allocation from the American National Science Foundation. These awards went to the seven full-time faculty members of the Astronomy and Physics Department.

Only seventeen major equipment grants were awarded by NSERC and Saint Mary's received one for the Astronomy and Physics Department. The University will contribute an additional \$11,000 to this grant. Funds will cover the purchase of the new state-of-the-art UNIX-based SPARC-stations. One of the new computers will be Saint Mary's first multiprocessor machine capable of high-speed processing.

Of the seven NSERC awards approved this year, four were new applicants and 22 grants were continued from previous years.

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The new awards included a conference grant to Dr. Michael Zaworotko, Department of Chemistry, for \$3,383 and operating grants to Dr. Vlodek Tarnaswki, Division of Engineering who received \$45,600 and Dr. Victor Owen, Geology Department, received \$68,400 over the next four years.

Funding for the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council (SSHRC) went down by 28 per cent, but that amount could go up over the year as more awards are sometimes granted later in the year. This year's total was \$243,354. Sixteen applicants were submitted for research grants and two were awarded, but three additional grants have been recommended. Dr. Karin Flikeid, Modern Languages and Classics and Dr. Darryl Bruce, Department of Psychology both received research grants from SSHRC.

All-Canadian supernova discovered at Saint Mary's

An Observatory Technician, a graduate student and a community college student share the unique discovery of finding the first all-Canadian supernova, some 70 million light years away and of having their names placed in the history books.

David Lane, Observatory Technician at Saint Mary's, Beverly Werstiuk, graduate Astronomy and Physics student and Paul Gray, Observing Chair, Halifax Chapter, Royal Astronomical Society (RASC) made the discovery on February 10, 1995.

The supernova, known as Supernova 1995F, was found in a galaxy known as NGC 2726, which is in the constellation of the Big Dipper.

Supernovas are exploding stars that have violent deaths and are often thousands of times brighter than the Sun. This one exploded



between 62 and 74 million light years ago, during the age of the dinosaurs. Its light has been traveling to Earth ever since and astronomers are just now able to see it.

Lane and Gray, along with Werstiuk and other RASC members now call themselves. "Team SuperNova Scotia." They have been working on the Supernova Search project, which is a collaborative effort between the University and the RASC, since August 1994.

"I was suspicious on February 10th. The galaxy just doesn't look right, says Gray, 22, who is the youngest amateur astronomer to make this kind of discovery. "We had this instinctive feeling that things just didn't look like they should, but we didn't have anything to go on." What made them suspicious was a bright star that seemed to shine overtop the centre of the patch of light, which is galaxy NGC 2726. While there is nothing unusual about this, they could not find any image of it anywhere. The team decided to go back up to the observatory three days later for another look.

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On the night of February 13th, another image was taken to ensure that the supernova was still there. They found the spot they were looking for and took one more picture. The Lick Observatory in California was asked by the International Astronomical Union to confirm the discovery, which came about one week later on February 24th.

High school students learn about Saint Mary's

For the first time 30 high school students had the chance to discover what university life was like. Invited by the University to spend one night with a 'residence buddy' during March break the students had the opportunity to go to classes with their buddies, have a tour of the facilities, eat in the student cafeteria, take a tour of the Halifax area and experience university.

Students from across Nova Scotia, New

Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and one from Newfoundland converged on the University.

Tonia Temple, 17, from Clarenville High School in Nfld., says she came for the chance "to experience university." Tonia even missed a couple of days at high school for this chance because there was no March break due to all the storm days. Dena Minard, 19, and Tarragh Shanahan, 19, both first year Arts students from Vanier B4 were Tonia's 'residence buddies' for 24 hours. Asked why they volunteered they guickly say in unison, "Because we get to show someone around and we're outgoing anyway."

The idea for this program came out of staff meetings by the residence office and through lots of brainstorming, says Kati Kilfoil, Assistant Director, Residence Life. Kilfoil is hopeful that the program will expand and that more high school students will take advantage of this opportunity to really get to know the University.


Saying good-bye

John Young wasn't going to be a professor. Neither was his wife Nickie. The admissions come amidst much laughter in the sunny, comfortable kitchen of their home near Saint Mary's University where John is a professor in the Department of Chemistry, and Nickie is an associate professor in the Department of Accounting.

Over cups of coffee on a recent fine morning, the couple reflect on their lives in light of John's official retirement this year after 25 years at the University. But John, at age 65 a moving mass of energy with a quick wit, won't be spending much time in the rocking chair the University traditionally bestows on retiring professors.

John is Professor Emeritus and will happily continue doing research in "my beautiful lab". He also has commitments to advise at least one honors student and another student in the process of obtaining a PhD. "I've got a lot of teaching to do," he says.

Neither is Nickie, 48, likely to spend much time in the chair. "She has to work to support me," John jokes, but the truth is both love teaching too much to envision a life

without the classroom or the students who have benefitted from their commitment to excellence.

"Teaching is a fantastic job," says Nickie, who this year taught senior and intermediate accounting courses and, like John, devotes 60 hour work weeks that include time spent at their kitchen table preparing courses and marking. "I think it's great to have a job you look forward to doing when you get up every day."

Given their dedication, it comes as no surprise that Nickie is this year's recipient of the Father William A. Stewart Medal for Excellence in Teaching, the most prestigious teaching award which was presented to John in 1986. It's an especially touching honor considering students from the present and alumni have input into who is chosen. It is quite a year for awards in the Young household. Earlier this year, Nickie was named the Commerce Professor of the Year by the students in the University's Frank H. Sobey Faculty of Commerce. This fall John will officially be given the President's Medal for Research.

The Youngs feel getting to know their students is essential to teaching. One of the pleasures of John's career has been the chance to work with his students in an undergraduate research group he started in 1971 with a federal grant. That summer he and a group of students canoed the lakes of Dartmouth investigating manganese contamination in the city's water supply.

Every year since then he has obtained summer research grants which provide students with all-important practical experience as well as an opportunity to investigate new technologies and equipment.

It was through John's leadership the university has established an Advanced Fluids Research Centre allowing students to become involved in an international quest to discover ways to heat and cool buildings more efficiently. In partnership with agencies including the Canadian Centre for Mineral and Energy Technology (CANMET), the research has

> resulted in a drag-reducing agent that can be added to water in cooling systems allowing for smaller pipes to be used.

> The project started in 1986 and led to a patent being granted to John and Chris Murray, one of his former students. Federal and private sector research grants now well over \$1,000,000 have resulted in a state-ofthe-art labratory and a widening of the research work.

> John is also proud of his role in establishing Saint Mary's well-respected peer counseling program, which began on a small scale in his Chemistry department in 1984. Back then his oldest daughter Sara was an undergraduate student at St. Michael's College at the University of Toronto and enthusiastically involved in their peer advising

program which saw students were trained to provide support to other students.

The idea was such a success that John and Keith Hotchkiss, (BA'73) Saint Mary's director of Student Services, developed the university-wide program.

All of this is a far cry from the Young's original plans, hence their laughter. As John remembers it, he enjoyed his six years of study obtaining a chemical engineering degree at London University, but he'd had more than enough of university by then and was off to make a living as a research engineer in industry.

"The usual pattern of bachelor degrees, doctoral studies, a postdoctoral appointment and then the scramble for tenure at a university was not for me," he wrote in draft notes for his retirement speech.

The route he took was very different than the one he had planned. After 15 "marvellous" years of travelling around the world he began work



with the Exxon Research and Engineering Company in Linden, New Jersey. After a six-month, highly enjoyable stint in Barbados, he was posted to Halifax in 1967 on what was supposed to be a three-month assignment at the Imperial Oil refinery for a research project on fluidized bed iron ore reduction.

After living in places like Barbados, Venezeula and South Africa, a posting in Nova Scotia came as an unpleasant shock. Initially confusing it with "a grimy town in northern England", the confessed urbanite wasn't much better pleased when finding out Halifax's actual location. Complete with a "hardship increment" added to his salary, he arrived for what turned out to be a nearly three-year stint. He eventually came to love the city and its people, even took up curling, and met Nickie MacAskill, a Halifax native who would become his wife.

They met at party shortly after Nickie had returned home having spent a few years working in accounting positions in Montreal. At that

time, Nickie says in gentle selfmockery of youthful bravado, she had no intention of staying in Halifax.

"When I left here, I was never going to come back," she says of leaving her hometown after obtaining a Bachelor of Commerce degree . "I didn't know exactly what I wanted to do, but it was not going to be here. It took about a year and a half to realize there was much more to life than the streets of downtown Montreal."

Meanwhile, John had ended uplikingHalifaxsomuchthatwhen he went back to New Jersey he

chucked the Venezuela job and its offer of a management position, packed his possessions in a brand-new, lemon-yellow Barracuda convertible and drove back to Halifax where he and Nickie were married in 1969.

"I married John to see the world," Nickie says with a laugh. "Turns out he liked it here."

Local jobs were scarce for people with chemical engineering degrees, so through a friend John landed a job in 1970 as research assistant with Father Henry Labelle then-president of the University.

"I did a lot of statistic work with regard to planning, the allocation of resources. It was fantastically different from what I had done before," he said. The salary was different too, only one third of his industrial salary. So low, John chuckles, that the University's business office thought he was a part-time employee until he was offered an assistant professorship in 1972. Along the way John has served on the Board of Governors, Senate and as both acting Dean of Science and Academic Vice-President.

Nickie had begun a career as a chartered accountant, attaining a

milestone by achieving extremely high marks in her chartered accountancy exams in 1971. "At that time there were very few women in the industry, so I attained some visibility that allowed me to participate in many (industry) activities," she says. "My timing was excellent."

A short time later, "the kids started coming along." The lemonyellow Barracuda became a family car with the arrival of Hilary, a modern languages major who graduated this spring from Mount Allison University in Sackville, N.B; Timothy, a second year Political Science major at Saint Mary's; and Megan, a grade 10 student at Saint Patrick High School in Halifax. John's two children from a previous marriage are Sara, a teacher in Ottawa and Douglas, a sculptor in Toronto.

At home caring for their children, Nickie got a call from Saint Mary's asking if she would be interested in teaching an accounting course parttime. It was a golden opportunity allowing her to work and still care for her children, so she began by teaching one course in 1975, and gradually

> increasing the number. Juggling children and career, she also studied at night for her MBA.

"Those were the busiest years of my life," she says now. "But it was the best of the both worlds. I'd do it all over again."

In 1987 she took a break from teaching but after a year as program development director of the Atlantic School of Chartered Accountancy found she missed the classroom. She returned to Saint Mary's after three years as an assistant professor with the department of business adminstration at Mount Saint Vincent University. Her life is still busier than most.

Recognized by industry professionals in 1990 as a recipient of a Fellow of the Chartered Accountants (FCA) for outstanding service to the profession and the community, Nickie's list of affiliations with various organizations devoted to standards of good practice within the industry is lengthy, and ranges from reviewing proposed text books to participation on a national level on Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountant (CICA) committees.

She feels a personal as well as professional satisfaction from her industry involvement. "It keeps me abreast of what is going on and and allows me to know what is out there on the leading edge," she says.

As for John, the joy his career has given him is evident when someone refers to what he does as "work"

"Work? What's this work stuff," he says with a smile. "This isn't work. This is what I do."



organized football before coming to Saint Mary's. While completing his Bachelor of Physical Education at Dalhousie University, Dwayne, in 1991, was an All-Conference volleyball player.

The decision to come to Saint Mary's was made when

Dwayne decided that he wanted to earn his teaching certification to teach at the high school level. "Saint Mary's is widely recognized for the high standards of their Bachelor of Education program," said Dwayne, "The choice was easy since I could combine a quality university program with the opportunity to play football."

If you want to play football, you have to make the team, so Dwayne's first challenge was to get noticed by football coach Larry Uteck. Dwayne started tossing the ball, scrimmaging and working out with the members of the team before tryouts began. "Everyone knew how determined I was so Dwayne to tryout as a defensive corner. "Dwayne wanted to be a receiver, but I knew he had the talent to play defensive corner," says Coach Uteck.

The defensive corner should be one of the quickest sprinters on the team and requires the ability and agility to stay with and out-think the opposition. Dwayne not only made the team but soon began as a starter. In his inaugural year, 1994, he won Rookie of the Year. For Dwayne, the work has just begun.

Dwayne is not just a two sport athlete (volleyball and football). He also excels in track and field. This year he has averaged the 60 metre in 6.9 seconds and ran the anchor leg for the 4 X 200 metre relay team.

Juggling school work, football games, track and field events and a part-time job while fitting in training time became a challenge that Dwayne attacked with vengeance. "The summer of 1994 just flew by," says Dwayne, "all I remember doing was working, training and sleeping." He recounts meeting one new friend, the night watchman at the Beazley Field in Dartmouth, Nova Scotia. With close friend April Delorme and his brother Gregory (a non-runner), Dwayne would methodically go through his training routines while the night watchman stood by and shouted encouragement.

Dwayne is quick to point out that his successes are due in large part to his parents. Lila and Donald Provo Junior have supported and encouraged Dwayne's

desire to excel on the football field. They were surprised with his decision to pursue football but brushed up on the rules and as faithful fans, never missed a home game. "We were so surprised when Dwayne said he wanted to play football," a proud Donald Provo Jr. recalls as he grins at his wife. "We didn't know the rules of the game or anything but we knew that if Dwayne put his mind to do this, he would be successful."

Other fans included the Department of Education, Dwayne's home away from home when he wasn't practicing or playing. "The Bachelor of Education (B.Ed.) program is first class. Dr. Bob Sargeant (Associate Dean of Education) and all of the other professors were always there with encouragement and congratulations. They took an interest in what their students were doing - in and out of the classroom. That's what makes Saint Mary's different from other universities. Good people doing things that they aren't required to do for others. It is a real shame to see that the Department of Education is being removed from Saint Mary's - this will be a great loss for future students who had hoped to take a B.Ed. program here."

During the annual Athletic Awards Banquet, it was apparent that this young man had spent some time reflecting on the past year as his university days drew to a close. When Dwayne received the Male Athlete of the Year award, he shared some of his views on the athletic opportunities available to students. Dwayne told fellow student athletes that the most important thing they could do personally is to believe in themselves and to remember their accomplishments and the friends they had made during their university years.

No doubt he will pass along those comments to his youngest brother Timothy who is quickly making his presence known on high school basketball courts. Entering Grade 12 at 6'5", Timothy is the starting centre for the Cole Harbour High School basketball team and is a member of the Eastern Division All-Star High School Team.

Coincidentially, Dwayne is also at Cole Harbour high school these days. He is completing his teaching practicum and had hoped that he might have a chance to teach Timothy Grade 12 English. Timothy, on the other hand, is just as glad

that their class schedules did not match.

Dwayne started playing football in jersey number 22, then changed to number two during the 1994-95 season.

He was recently asked by a Saskatchewan Rough Rider manager what number they should put aside for him for training camp, an honour in itself but especially for a rookie. Without hesitation Dwayne replied, "Number one."

Dwayne Provo's story is one of success, he has worked hard to make this dream a reality. "I can walk away from this experience knowing that I have done everything humanly possible. Regardless of the outcome, I know there will never be any doubts.....if I had worked harder, trained more often, practiced more." His ultimate goal is a starting position in the National Football League. This young man from North Preston, Nova Scotia can be very proud of his successes. His future students will benefit from his passion and pursuit of excellence when he begins his career as a teacher.

Pier woman heads Ontario Women's Directorate

A Whitney Pier native has become the first black woman to head the Ontario Women's Directorate

Maryann Francis, appointed Jan. 17, 1994 to the assistant deputy minister position with the new agency established by the NDP government of Bob Rae, describes her job as "interesting, challenging and extremely demanding."

Francis, the daughter of the late Rev. George Francis, pastor of St. Philip's African Orthodox Church in the Whitney Pier district of Sydney, and his wife Thelma, received her early education at local schools and Xavier Junior College in Sydney.

She later graduated from Saint Mary's University with a Bachelor of Arts Degree in 1972 and the University of New York with a Masters of Public Administration Degree with concentration in personnel and labor relations. She has also a certificate in Equal Opportunity Studies from Cornell University and a certificate in Paralegal Studies from Long Island University.

Francis says the Women's Directorate is an advocacy body working to assist the Ontario government to develop policies designed to decrease, violence against women, discourage discrimination and sexual harassment of women in the workplace, encourage job equity for women and visible minorities within that group and advise the attorney general's office on justice issues related to women.

The head office for the agency is located in Toronto but Francis makes frequent visits to a second office the agency has in Thunder Bay.

Besides directing an 80-member staff, Francis travels extensively in Ontario doing public speaking, appearing on television and radio programs and addressing universities, schools, unions and management groups.

Because there is no deputy minister for Women's Affairs, she reports directly to Marion Boyd, Minister Responsible for Women's Affairs and Attorney General of Ontario. Francis says Boyd is an "excellent" minister who has many innovative ideas.

Francisis pleased she accepted the Ontario position because it has given her an opportunity to develop new skills.

She says, too, her appointment shows minorities from even small Nova Scotian communities can aspire to senior posts in government and business.

She says being a black women in a position of high visibility and authority presents difficulties because racism and sexism still exist but says "I always remember who I am and from where I come.

Teacher gives students the edge with her 'TLC'

In some classrooms, life-sized models of dinosaurs and mini-jungles in aquariums are more effective teaching tools than a blackboard and a piece of chalk.

For the past eight years at Judique Creignish Consolidated School, Debbie Graham, BA'77, BEd'78, has been providing "TLC" to her Grade 1 students through her "Terrific Learning Centres" program, which gives students the extra benefit of a well thought-out, imaginative science curriculum.

Spurred on by the lack of good materials for teaching science to young children. Graham developed her program to meet the need. The program covers topics such as The Sea and Jungle Animals and can last from two to six weeks.

Graham's program has become so successful that, earlier this month, she was awarded a Prime Minister's Award for Teaching Excellence in Science, Technology and Mathematics.

"I've been using these learning centres for a number of years," she says, "but they've evolved through time and we've gotten into more science-oriented themes; I've developed themes like dinosaurs, the sea, the rain forest and endangered animals.

Graham has taken each theme and created complete learning centres for them. In Graham's system, a typical learning centre would include an audio centre, which features a short film on a particular theme for the students, a science centre in which to do tests on the theme, and a reading and writing centre.

The advantages of this sort of a system are many, she adds. The young students are more motivated to learn through the learning centre method and are more motivated, too.

"And it takes the cap off learning - with this approach, there's no limit to what they might learn. Many teachers are using this approach, but not as a core part of their programs. When I started using learning centres in 1980, not many teachers were using this model, but it has since caught on."

"When we did a learning centre on the sea, we went to a nearby island to study the things we'd been learning in the classroom. We've also visited bee farms and dairy farms.

"And we also bring in resource people-once, even a person who had been in Kenya and had taken films of animals in their native habitat."


SMU CA graduates honored at gala dinner-dance

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
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
